6. NOTICE OF MOTION - ESTABLISHMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHO-SOCIAL SUPPORT CENTERS AT THE COUNTY LEVEL

(Sen. (Arch.) Sylvia Kasanga, MP and Sen. Mercy Chebeni, MP)

AWARE THAT Article 43(1) of the Constitution provides that every person has a right to the highest attainable standard of health, which includes the right to health care services;

NOTING THAT cases of mental illness are on the rise with 1 in 4 Kenyans likely to suffer from a mental disorder at some point in their lives, coupled with the fact that many Kenyans with mental illness do not receive adequate treatment;

CONCERNED THAT the World Health Organization has ranked Kenya sixth, among African countries with the highest number of depression cases;

DEEPLY CONCERNED that there exists internal inequities in the distribution of the already low numbers of mental health workers in Kenya with the available professionals being concentrated in cities leaving rural area with very few professionals if any;

FURTHER CONCERNED THAT, delivery of mental health services is facing a myriad of challenges key among them, inadequate and understaffed rehabilitation facilities and outreach programmes leading to the provision of insufficient mental healthcare services at the psychiatric units;

NOW THEREFORE the Senate calls upon the National Government in collaboration with the County Governments to-

- 1. increase the number of specialized well equipped mental health facilities and develop effective outreach and other mental health programmes targeting Kenyans in remote areas and learning institutions;
- 2. increase the allocated mental health budget to ensure there are adequate funds targeting this specific area; and
- 3. develop initiatives to encourage more Kenyans to pursue and specialize in psychiatry and build the capacity of community health workers and staff in mental health facilities through continuous training.

7. STATEMENTS PURSUANT TO STANDING ORDER NO. 46 (2)(a)

i. The Senator for Turkana County (Sen. (Prof.) Imana Malachy, MP) made a statement on insecurity in Turkana County that has paralyzed crude oil extraction and transportation from the County.

In the statement, the Senator informed the House that the residents of Turkana County blocked trucks transporting crude oil from Ngamia 8 siting a number of reasons including insecurity, discrimination of the local community in awarding tenders and the criteria for sharing out the community's share of proceeds from oil.

The Senator raised concern regarding the shoot to kill order by the President on bandits terrorizing residents of Turkana and Pokot communities which has led to the shooting of a police reservist and livestock stolen from Lokori Ward following several bandit attacks.

The Senator further informed the House that the reports of the Kenya Bureaus of Statistic indicates that Turkana is one of the poorest at 88% compared to the national poverty level at 45% and the only hope for Turkana people in the expected benefit from the discovery of oil.

The Senator urged the government to take a keen interest and work together with Turkana people to restore peace and security in the region to ensure that the benefit of oil is felt by the people Turkana.

Following requests by Senators for clarifications and additional information on the statement, the Speaker directed the Standing Committee on National Security, Defence and Foreign Relations to investigate the matter further and report back to the Senate within two weeks.

ii. Nominated Senator (Sen. Mercy Chebeni, MP) made a statement regarding the state of emergency medical care in Kenya.

In the statement the Senators informed the House that Article 43 of the Constitution provides that every person has a right to the highest trainable standards of health care services including reproductive health and further a person shall not be denied emergency medical care. On a similar note the Health Act No.21 of 2017 defines emergency treatments and asserts the right to the same whether in a private or public hospital.

The Senator further enumerated the challenges experienced in the public health, this included a lack of specialized trained personnel, a lack of standard operating procedure of emergency operation leading to deaths of many Kenyans, a lack of resources including the ambulances, specialized equipment to facilitate the service as well as a lack of a well – connected reliable central dispatch system.

In addition, the Senator informed the House that emergency cases have over the years been seen to increase with a number of major incidents and disaster occurring in the wake of global terrorism, a lack of enforcement to the traffic and building regulations. Without a well-coordinated response such incidences are likely to be on the increase leading to morbidity and mortality.

The Senator emphasized that emergency health care should be given priority and drew the matter to the attention of the Standing Committee on Health since health is a devolved function and urged the Committee to review the matter with a view to have the provisions of the Act operationalized.
