Honourable Members, there is no doubt that Kenya, and all her institutions, Parliament included, are at the threshold of a new epoch, of a new dispensation- indeed a new chapter. To borrow words from Hon. Mwai Kibaki, your predecessor, in his inaugural speech on 30th December 2002, I agree that "our Country is going through a critical moment". He continued to say that "**the task ahead is enormous, the expectations are high, and the challenges are intimidating**," However I want to assure you that the most encouraging thing is that Kenyans are fully behind the Government in its efforts to change for the better.

You are aware that for the first time the Executive is not fused with the Legislature but the two are separated in a new system of check and balance. Honourable Members know that this is a new legislature with new structures and new ways of working. Our legislature is now bicameral. Our committee system has changed. The budget making role of Parliament has been strengthened. The role of Parliament in international relations and security is larger. The systems of oversight have been overhauled to bring on board the participation of the citizenry. It is in our interest to understand and get used to these new ways of working.

So Honourable Members, as a Parliament, we must use this opportunity in our history to play our rightful role in the renewal of the country. I urge you to approach your responsibilities with dedication and sense of purpose for the common good. Failing this, our relevance will be called into question.

Your Excellency,

A quick glance at the membership of the Eleventh Parliament, gives me pleasure to report that there is an increase in the number of professionals from varying backgrounds. There are Members with impressive track records in public and private life, who have voluntarily abandoned their careers to join this August House. In addition there are more women and youth in this Parliament than ever before in the history of our Country. Equally there are more persons with disabilities and minorities are represented now. Given this scenario, we should look forward for more robust and informed debates.

As a Parliament we shall Endeavour to foster good working relations with your Cabinet Secretaries in their new role and we shall ensure they are constantly held to account in the running of their ministries, departments and agencies.

Your government shall be held to account on your commitment to implement the constitution, your support to devolved system of government and in the fulfillment of your undertakings to the people of Kenya in the elections concluded recently. You can count on the support of these two Houses to help realize these goals.

I need to observe here that we must all strive to strengthen our political parties and to instill Party discipline. Strong political parties mean strong democracies. Strong democracies mean good governance. Good governance is essential for the development of our Nation. It is for this reason that our Constitution has firmly anchored political parties as key institutions in our public governance structure.

We are all hopeful and actually trust that your Government will continue to give support to the Parliamentary Service Commission to enable it fulfill its mandate of providing facilities to the Members for the efficient and effective functioning of Parliament.
