The Speaker conveyed the following Communications –

# A) THE MATTER OF LACK OF DECORUM AND GROSSLY DISORDERLY CONDUCT IN THE HOUSE IN BREACH OF THE STANDING ORDERS

#### Honourable Members,

Allow me to welcome you to the Third Session of the National Assembly. It is my hope that we shall be able to have a fruitful year, despite having begun on a sad note, as noted to in my earlier communication.

As you are all aware, the events that took part in the House during our last Special sitting brought the dignity of the House to its lowest ebb ever. You will agree with me that the conduct exhibited by most Members on Thursday, December 18, 2014 can only be described as despicable and shameful as the image of the august House was thrown into disrepute. You will recall from a communication I had made earlier that day, that there was a fast degeneration in the propriety of our conduct, manners and references to each other in speeches. In addition, Members were witnessed creating disorder, using or threatening violence against colleagues and/or abusing their privilege. Members also showed disrespect towards Presiding Officers, while others threatened to take away the Mace during proceedings. This was objectionable and in serious breach of our Standing Orders.

**Honourable Members**, As your Speaker, I was greatly disturbed by these series of events, and take this opportunity to implore you to once again familiarize yourselves with the provisions of the Standing Orders regarding rules of debate and order in the

House and in the Committee of the Whole House, and particularly Standing Orders 98, 102, 103, 104 and 107 to 112, which should provide you with the requisite guidance on the breaches and sanctions that follow disorderly conduct in the House.

Article 124 of the Constitution empowers the House to make standing orders for the orderly conduct of its proceedings and its committees. A House of Parliament has complete authority concerning its procedure so far as it is not limited by the Constitution and any other relevant law enacted by Parliament. Any Action taken by the House on a Member under its standing orders whenever such its rules are breached cannot be challenged by any other authority. *The Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure, 2010 Edition* states, and I quote-

"The provision of the Constitution that each House shall have power to determine the rules of its proceedings is not restricted to the proceedings of the body in ordinary legislative matters, but extends to determination of propriety and effect of any action taken by the body in the exercise of any power, in the transaction of business or performance of any duty conferred upon it by the constitution.."

As I stated that day, the Standing Orders, practices and rules of the House are designed to ensure that you exercise your privilege of free speech while maintaining courtesy of language towards other Members in debate and the proper decorum as befits your stature. I wish to reiterate that any future acts of grossly disorderly conduct in the House, including disgracing or removing the Mace will be met with the greatest severity of discipline allowed by the Standing Orders and the practices of the House.

Honourable Members, I therefore call upon all of us to agree in one accord never to have a repeat of such an abhorrent incident, irrespective of our differences. Let us learn to dialogue and build consensus through consultation and compromises. Remember, Parliament is commonly described as the 'August House' which word connotes "honour and dignity". We therefore have an obligation to espouse such behaviour and deportment as that which esteems us as Honourable persons before those we represent, the Country and the world at large.

### B) THE DEMISE OF HON. GEORGE MUKURU MUCHAI, MP

#### "Honourable Members,

As you may be aware, the morning of Saturday, February 7, 2015 was a sad day for the National Assembly, and indeed the nation as we lost one of our most vibrant colleagues, the Hon. George Mukuru Muchai, Member for Kabete Constituency. The Hon. Muchai, together with his two bodyguards and a driver, lost their lives when they were attacked along Kenyatta Avenue, Nairobi.

Hon. Members, our records indicate that the late Hon. George Muchai was born on July 22, 1949. He attended St. Michael Primary School between 1956 and 1963 and Highway Secondary School, Nairobi between 1964 and 1967. He obtained a Certificate in Electrical Installation Trade Test from the Railway Training School in 1974. Later, the late Hon. Muchai attended the Kenya Polytechnic where he was awarded a Certificate in Electrical Installation Technology. He thereafter undertook several courses including a Certificate in Conciliation and Mediation from the International Labour Organization (ILO); a Certificate in Organized Labour (US Department of State) and a Certificate in Strengthening Labour Administration Systems in Africa from the African Regional Labour Centre, Harare. He also attended many labour related forums regionally and internationally.

Honourable Members, as you are aware the late Hon. Muchai was an active and vibrant labour unionist having been elected as the General Secretary of the Bakery, Confectionery, Food Manufacturing and Allied Workers' Union in 1984. This was a position he still held until his death owing to his passion for and responsiveness to the needs of the people he represented. His empathy and humility largely endeared him to the workers of this nation and saw him overwhelmingly elected as the Deputy Secretary of the Central Organizationof Trade Unions (COTU) in 2001. Indeed, he never lost an opportunity to air the problems that befall the masses, especially workers, whom he has continued to represent for the last three decades.

Hon. Members, the late Hon. George Muchai made his debut in national politics in the run-up to the 2013 General Elections when successfully vied for the Kabete Constituency seat. His swift mastery and grasp of parliamentary business ensured that his contributions were keenly followed by all. Particularly, his contributions on legislations related to the labour and education sectors were insightful and tremendously enriching to the matters under debate. Of specific mention was his passionate participation in the debates during the Committee of the Whole House on the Kenya Qualifications Framework Bill, 2013 which was passed by the National Assembly at the tail-end of the last session. He was also an active Member of the Departmental Committee on Labour and Social Welfare as well as the Budget and Appropriations Committee.

Honourable Members, On behalf of all Members of the National Assembly and the Parliamentary Service Commission and indeed on my own behalf, I wish to take this opportunity to condole with the family of the late Brother Hon. Muchai, his family, the people of Kabete Constituency and all his friends for the loss of this great trade unionist and a peoples' defender at this trying time. As the National Assembly, we assure the family of our support during this period of great sorrow.

Finally, let me reiterate our earlier call to all the concerned security agencies to speedily and urgently investigate this heinous act with a view to bringing the perpetrators to book. It is only through this that the nation and indeed the family, some of whom witnessed the atrocious act, will rest knowing that justice, and indeed the inviolability of every life as enshrined in the Constitution will have prevailed.

In tribute to our departed colleague, I request that we all stand to observe a minute of silence.

May his soul rest in eternal peace.

## MESSAGE FROM H.E. THE PRESIDENT

The Speaker conveyed the following Message from the President –

#### Honourable Members,

Pursuant to Standing Order 42 of the National Assembly Standing Orders, I wish to convey a Message from His Excellency the President. The Message was submitted by way of a letter dated December 30, 2014 for presentation to the House in accordance with section 8 of the Teachers Service Commission Act, 2012.

**Hon. Members**, section 8 (7) of the Teachers Service Commission Act, 2012 requires that, and I quote;

"The President shall, within seven days of receipt of the names forwarded under sub-section (6), nominate .... (persons)... for appointment as ... members of the Commission and forward the names to the National Assembly for approval."

In the Message, His Excellency the President has nominated the following to serve as members of the Teachers Service Commission:-

- (iv) Beatrice Marembo Adu; and

H.E. the President therefore seeks the approval of the National Assembly on the nominees for appointment to as members of the Commission.

#### Hon. Members,

Standing Order 45 requires that upon receipt of notification of nomination for appointments, such nominations shall stand committed to the relevant committee of the House. This notification therefore is hereby referred to the Departmental Committee on Education, Research and Technology for consideration. It is important that the Committee immediately seizes itself of the matter aware that *section 8(8)* of the Act requires the National Assembly to consider the nominations received within twenty one (21) days and approve or reject any or all of them as the case may be. In this regard, I wish to guide the Committee and the House as follows:-

- i. The Committee should notify the nominees and the general public of the time and place of holding the approval hearings in good time to ensure commencement of the necessary hearings for the expeditious disposal of the matter; and
- ii. The Committee is expected to submit its report to the House on or before February 25, 2015 to enable the House consider the report and the nominees thereafter.
