ANNEX II

STATUS OF MOTIONS BEFORE THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

A. *MOTION - (The Hon. Onesmus Muthomi Njuki) (Departmental Committee on Environment and Natural Resources)

THAT, aware that smallholder farmers living in the buffer zone around the Mount Kenya National Park and Forest Reserve have struggled for years with the elephants that regularly invade their land and destroy their crops, which is a costly affair for these smallholder farmers where livelihoods are often lost in a single night raid; concerned that hardly a day goes by without an incident occurring between farmer and the elephants in the area; noting that Elephants from the park easily stray outside its perimeters and cause damage to crops, domestic animals and homes, and even injury and death; and further aware that the Kenya Wildlife Service' compensation mechanism is wanting and unsatisfactory, giving only Kshs. 200,000 for death and Kshs. 50,000 for injury and nothing for crop or property damage, this House urges the Government to enhance the claim for persons killed from the current Kshs. 200,000 to Kshs. 1,000,000 and for those injured from Kshs. 50,000 to Kshs. 200,000 and also consider compensating farmers for destroyed crops and property based on value.

B. *MOTION - (The Hon. Alois Lentoimaga) (Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security)

THAT, aware that insecurity in the Arid and Semi Arid Lands (ASAL) is caused by perennial cattle rustling that is aggravated by poor or no infrastructural facilities; also noting that there is inadequate deployment of National Police Reservists (NPR) who are ill equipped, unpaid volunteers with the National Police Services and lack the motivation to fight this crime leading to apathy that has seen residents lose their livestock and even lives; and further aware that there is need to restructure the Security machinery in ASAL areas to mitigate the situation; this House urges the government to urgently review the terms and conditions of the recruitment, remuneration and deployment of the KPR in ASAL areas with a view to providing them with uniforms, proper identification documents, automatic firearms, regular allowances and general improvement of their working conditions so as to restructure this crucial sector and help the KPR fight cattle rustling more efficiently.

C. *MOTION – (The Hon. James Kimaru Bett) (Departmental Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Cooperatives)

THAT, aware that milk production is a major source of income for millions of smallholder livestock farmers in the country who account for over 75% of the Milk industry's total output; concerned that whereas Livestock farming is a tedious and delicate undertaking when compared to farming of other consumable produce, smallholder farmers get a paltry Kshs 27 per litre of milk, way less than what water bottlers get at Shs 60 per litre of water; and further noting that smallholder milk producers encounter numerous obstacles amongst which is the high cost of production but are forced to settle for less when selling their produce; this House urges the government to urgently intervene with a view to reviewing farm gate milk prices in order to guarantee smallholder farmers better returns and shield them from endless losses.

D. *MOTION – (The Hon. CPA Charles M. Nyamai) (Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security)

THAT, aware that the process of obtaining national identification documents such as birth certificates and national identification cards is long and complex due to the different centres of processing such documentation; deeply concerned that there is a multiplicity of identification documents in registration of IDs, Birth Certificates, Passports, Elector's cards, Driving Licenses, NHIF and NSSF cards yet there is a proposed simplified way of doing the same; noting that the Government is embracing new ICT measures in line with Vision 2030, this House urges the Government to spearhead the establishment of a national unified identification system that harmonizes all personal bio data.

E. *MOTION – (Hon. Sunjeev Kaur Birdi) (Departmental Committee on Environment and Natural Resources)

THAT, aware that every year floods and drought wreak havoc in various parts of the country; observing that flood seasons are often followed by times of drought, leading to loss of lives and lack of water for many; concerned that from 1995 to present, just over 500 small-scale sand dams have been constructed as water reservoirs, further concerned that as a result, there has been unplanned and rampant digging of multiple boreholes, leading to fast and widespread depletion of water tables; noting that such depletion leads to falling of trees and adversely affects the entire ecosystem yet could be prevented by harvesting flood waters for later use; deeply concerned that the ecosystem has a big impact on the environment as a whole, this House urges the Government to build multi-dams and ensure they are located equitably around the country while complementing the existing dams, and establish other measures for water harvesting especially during rainy or flood seasons for sustainability.

F. *MOTION - (The Hon. Abdullahi Mohamed Diriye) (Departmental Committee on Education, Research and Technology)

THAT, aware that since the inception and implementation of the Free Primary Education programme in January 2003, enrollment has increased from 5.9 million in 2003 to 8.7 million pupils currently (an increase of 47.46%) in public primary schools; further aware that in order to reduce the cost of burden of primary education to parents, the government established the FPE annual capitation per child at Ksh. 1020.00 for primary schools; taking into account the need to meet the constitutional right of every Kenyan child to free and compulsory basic education; deeply concerned that the capitation grant has remained constant at Ksh. 1020.00 since 2003 despite the inflationary levels having risen, thus undermining the purchasing power for schools; this House urges the Government to increase the capitation grant per child from Ksh. 1020.00 to Ksh. 1200.00 for primary schools.

G. *MOTION – (The Hon. Mishi Juma) (Departmental Committee on Labour and Social Welfare)

THAT, aware that over 300,000 children live and work on the streets in the country, with over 50 percent of them concentrated in and around Nairobi; concerned that the number of street children is increasing rapidly owing to poverty, HIV/Aids and the collapsing family structure; noting that street children are not only denied access to the mainstream social services, but also to their basic needs; deeply concerned that these children also face police harassment, and sexual molestation, this House resolves that the Government creates community and family re-integration programmes to divert the children from the streets.

H. *MOTION - (The Hon. Chris Wamalwa) (Departmental Committee on Education, Research and Technology)

THAT, aware that the Senate passed a Motion that every County should have a public university; further aware that this country traditionally recognizes its heroes and heroines for their contribution towards development in various capacities, and in cognizance of the role played by H.E. the late Hon. Michael Wamalwa Kijana who hailed from Kitale in Trans Nzoia County, this House resolves that the Government renames and upgrades Kitale Technical Institute to be Wamalwa Kijana University of Science and Technology.

I. *MOTION – (The Hon. Aghostinho Neto Oyugi) (Departmental Committee on Environment and Natural Resources)

THAT, aware that water hyacinth has invaded several water bodies in Kenya including Lake Victoria and Lake Naivasha; concerned with the negative impact of this weed on the agricultural sector and water conveyance systems; noting that so far, water hyacinth has displaced native plant species, harmed fish and wildlife and reduced food web productivity, this House urges the Government to establish an Aquatic Noxious

Weed Fund to help in the eradication of all aquatic noxious weeds including the water hyacinth in Kenya.

J. *MOTION - (Mr. James Gakuya)

THAT, aware that there is heavy traffic on Jogoo and Landhies Roads due to congestion; deeply concerned that these snarl-ups are an inconvenience to road users and a source of atmospheric pollution from hazardous motor vehicle carbon emissions; further aware that there are approximately 50 acres of land on which the former Muthurwa Railway Estate stands and that this land is adequate for purposes of modernization and expansion of the existing roads and infrastructure to ease the congestion and traffic jams; this House urges the Government to urgently acquire the land from the Railway Pensioners Scheme for the expansion and modernization of the Jogoo and Landhies roads.

K. *MOTION - (Mr. Benjamin Jomo Washiali)

THAT, aware that millions of Kenyans suffer serious jigger infestation that has greatly impacted their livelihoods; deeply concerned that severe jigger infestation has forced children to drop out of school through persistent absenteeism and rendered parents incapable of providing for their families yet the Government has given the problem little to no attention; further concerned that despite ongoing efforts by non-governmental organizations to mitigate the situation there still remains a lot to be done; this House resolves that the Government establishes a department in the relevant ministry to address the jigger menace by ensuring sufficient funding and to complement the efforts of other stakeholders in addressing this matter.

L. *MOTION – (The Hon. Joseph Gitari) (Departmental Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Cooperatives)

THAT, aware that the country produces only about a third of its annual rice demand of 300,000 tonnes with a bulk of the shipments to fill the deficit imported from Pakistan according to a research done by the Ministry of Agriculture on National Rice development strategy; further aware that locally produced rice is of high quality compared to imported rice and is preferred by consumers; and further appreciating that with improved water harvesting and innovative management technologies, the current irrigation potential of about 540,000 hectares irrigable can be increased by a further 800,000 hectares to 1.3 million hectares, this House urges the Government to consider increasing the acreage of both the irrigated and rain-fed rice production by 800,000 ha in order to promote increased production of rice which will ensure food security and save the much needed foreign exchange.

M. *MOTION - (The Hon. Francis Chachu Ganya)

(Departmental Committee on Health)

THAT, aware that good health to the people is crucial for the development of their livelihood; noting that North Horr constituency with an area of 38,572 square kilometers and a diameter of 800 kms lacks a single referral hospital; further noting that residents of the constituency have to travel for over 600 kilometers to access the services of the nearest government hospital in Marsabit town; concerned that the impact of lack of access to health care impedes people's ability to reach their full potential and negatively affect their quality of life which in turn affects the economy of the country; convinced that unless health care is made available to the people their development and livelihood will continue to be affected immensely, this House urges the Government to establish health centres and hospitals where such facilities are lacking in all the 290 constituencies across the country.

N. *MOTION – (The Hon. Hassan Dukicha) (Departmental Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Cooperatives)

THAT, aware that the National Irrigation Board of Kenya (NIB) has utilized only 5,000 hectares for crop production in Hola Irrigation Scheme; further aware that there is a lot of land available in Galole which can be put into use; noting that River Tana passes through Galole; cognizant that food production is critical in ensuring food security in the country, this House urges the Government through the National Irrigation Board to expand the acreage of land from the current 5,000 hectares to 25,000 hectares to enhance food production in Galole, Tana River Country and in the country at large.

O. *MOTION - (The Hon. Mustafa Idd) (Departmental Committee on Lands)

THAT, aware that the land tenure in the coast region has historically been a contentious issue; further aware that huge tracts of land are owned by absentee landlords and many households in areas such as Vipingo, Kikambala, Mtwapa, Majengo and Shariani in Kilifi county are living as squatters on the land; concerned that this issue hinders sustainable development, since the poor are likely to engage in unsustainable resource-use practices in an effort to meet immediate survival needs, this House urges the Government through the National Land Commission to register, adjudicate and issue title deeds to all squatters residing on the lands owned by government, all absentee landlords, ancestral and all other community land that has not been adjudicated.

P. *MOTION - (The Hon. John Waluke) (Departmental Committee on Roads, Public Works and Housing)

THAT, aware that Railway commuter transport system is not only the cheapest mode of transport but also the most reliable and safest; noting that up to the late 1980s the country used to have a daily passenger train service between Malaba border and Nairobi that greatly reduced the cost of transporting passengers and goods as well as contributing to social vibrancy and economic competitiveness of the region; and further

aware that the absence of the Malaba to Nairobi Passenger Train service has greatly affected the vibrancy of the local economy; this House urges the government to reintroduce the daily passenger train service between Malaba and Nairobi to serve as an alternative means of transport for passengers in the region.

Q. *MOTION - (The Hon. Abdullahi Mohamed Diriye) (Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security)

THAT, aware that it is the right of every Kenyan attaining 18 years to register and be issued with a National Identity Card (ID); and further aware that a National Identity Card represents 'proof' of Kenyan citizenship without which an individual cannot have access to basic services and the right to vote; noting that many Kenyans who live around refugee camps and the greater North Eastern region face great difficulty in obtaining ID cards due to the complex procedures and the fact that some of them have even registered as refugees thus further compounding the challenge; this House urges that the Government extends amnesty to Kenyans living in the region who have wrongly registered as refugees and face this challenge to allow them access IDs.

R. *MOTION - (The Hon. Mishi Juma) (Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security)

THAT, aware that there is an alarming increase in the number of persons requiring rehabilitation from alcohol, hard drugs and other substances abuse resulting from the influx of cheap alcohol and drugs in almost every corner of human settlement in the country; deeply concerned that the drug and alcohol menace has contributed to broken families, increase in crime, moral decadence and apathy amongst our young people; noting that there is need for urgent interventions in terms of rehabilitation services which then require that there be rehabilitation centres; cognizant of the fact that the existing rehabilitation centres and private entities are few, this House urges the Government to establish at least one fully fledged rehabilitation centre, to be used for rehabilitation and training of drugs and alcohol addicted persons in every county in the country.
