THAT, aware that cases of unbecoming conduct among young people has been on the rise as exemplified by runaway drug abuse and addiction, drunkenness, sexual orgies and general irresponsibility; and deeply concerned that these incidents of loose morals have been worsened in the recent past by emerging radicalization of the youth leading to inclination towards terrorism and lawlessness, this House **urges** the National Government to consider deploying chaplains to all secondary schools and tertiary institutions in order to instill desired morals, social virtues, national values and a sense of responsibility, to address and root out moral decadence at an early age, and to supplement the work of guidance and counseling departments operating in these institutions.

16*. MOTION – FREE ISSUANCE OF KENYA POLICE MEDICAL EXAMINATION (P3) FORMS

(The Hon. Omar Mwinyi, M.P.)

THAT, aware that the Kenya Police Medical Examination (P3) form is a legal document that is produced in a court of law as evidence in cases which involve body injury; noting that victims are required to have the P3 form completed by a certified public medical officer; further aware that the victims are charged a fee for this service by the hospitals attending to this particular service; concerned that most citizens are financially challenged hence the medical fee charged by the hospitals, is in contravention of Article 48 of the Constitution on access to justice; deeply concerned that if the situation is left unchecked, it may lead to continued abuse of the poor, delayed justice and possible incidents of unrest; this House **urges** the Government to ensure that completion of P3 forms is offered free of charge at all public healthcare facilities.

17*. MOTION – SUPPORT FOR YOUTH INNOVATION BY THE GOVERNMENT

THAT, aware that there are many talents amongst the youth of this country; having noted that this talents have been severally displayed through various inventions and innovations by the youth in platforms such as the Science Congress and the Annual Youth Innovation Week; concerned, that most of these discoveries do not go beyond making sensational newspaper and electronic media stories; noting that most of these innovations are aimed at addressing the problems that afflict us as Kenyans on a daily basis; further concerned that there is inadequate enabling legislation and administrative measures to support these innovations; cognizant of the fact that the Kenya Vision 2030 seeks to make our country an industrialized middle-income economy in the next 14 years; aware of the

immense potential for wealth creation and job opportunities that such innovations would generate if well-developed and commercialized; also recognizing that our imports are well in excess of Kshs. 1.3 billion shillings, a gap that would be narrowed if we had our own local production, this House **urges** the Government to support youth innovation by creating an innovation fund and a national incubation system, among other measures.

18*. MOTION – ESTABLISHMENT OF A SELECT COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE MATTERS RELATING TO GMOs
(The Hon. (Dr.) Wilber Ottichilo, M.P.)

THAT, aware that the Government banned the importation of Genetically Modified Organisms (GMO) imports in 2012; further aware that the Ministry of Health which initiated the ban has consistently maintained that GMO foods are not safe for human and animal consumption; considering that no tangible evidence on the same has been provided; cognizant of the fact that local and international scientific institutions and stakeholders have consistently endorsed the use of GMO foods as a necessary measure for the present and future food security in the Country; concerned that the National Bio-Safety Authority (NBA) established under Bio-Safety Act was not involved in the decision to ban the use of GMO foods in the country; concerned that the Country continues to lose millions of shillings monthly in lost business opportunities related to GMO products; further concerned that research on bio-technology and bio-safety has stalled; this House **resolves** to establish a Select Committee to comprehensively investigate and inquire into all matters relating to GMOs, consider and review all related research findings and make recommendations and table its report within ninety (90) days and approves the following Members to constitute the Committee:-

19*. MOTION – RECRUITMENT OF SCHOOL BURSARS TO ENSURE PRUDENT UTILIZATION/MANAGEMENT OF FREE PRIMARY EDUCATION FUNDS

(The Hon. James Lusweti, M.P.)

THAT, aware that Free Primary Education is an important milestone to economic and social development in the country; further aware that since the introduction of Free Primary Education (FPE) in 2002, the Government has spent huge amount of money on the programme; noting that the recent Report by the Ministry of Education submitted to the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) indicated that the Government could be losing millions of capitation funds in public schools through inflated enrollment figures, fraudulent deals that include irregular allocation of funds, procurement of goods and questionable expenditure by Head teachers; concerned that the spirit of FPE was to provide a chance to every student in the country to acquire free education, giving effect to Article 43(1)(f) of the Constitution; noting that most Head teachers do not possess requisite

financial management skills to proficiently handle FPE funds; this House **urges** that the Government, through County Education Boards to recruit School Bursars to ensure prudent utilization/management of FPE funds disbursed to various schools in the country.

20*. MOTION – FORMULATION OF A POLICY TO GUARANTEE CAREER ADVANCEMENT, PROMOTIONS AND SECURITY OF TENURE FOR PUBLIC SERVANTS

THAT, aware that a sufficiently skilled and trained workforce is an essential pillar for attainment of Kenya's Vision 2030; further aware that the number of doctors, accountants, engineers, teachers, nurses, lecturers, scientists and other professionals in the public sector undertaking further studies of specialized skills within or outside the country is on the increase; deeply concerned that quite a number of professionals seemingly get demoralized by the fact that on returning from studies abroad or after undertaking further studies locally they are either deployed to lower positions, placed below supervisors whose skills they exceed or stagnate in the same position they were before furthering their skills; further concerned by the fact that most of them thereafter opt to leave the public service for the private sector, civil society or Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) or even migrate abroad in search of greener pastures leading to regrettable brain drain; this House **resolves** that the Government establishes a comprehensive policy to guarantee career advancement, promotions and security of tenure for public servants and officers who undertake to refine their skills through further studies.

I. THE MEDIATED VERSION OF THE FOREST CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT BILL, 2015

Contended Clauses: 9, 72, 75, and 77

(Excerpt of the mediated version of the Bill on the contended Clauses)

“RESOLUTIONS OF THE MEDIATION COMMITTEE”

The Mediation Committee held two sittings on 16th and 18th August, 2016 and unanimously resolved the contention on Clauses 9, 72, 75 and 77 as follows:-

CLAUSE 9

THAT, clause 9 (1) of the Bill be amended by inserting the following new sub-clause immediately after sub-clause (3)-

(3A) A person shall not be appointed to the Board if the person—

- (a) has been convicted of a criminal offence and imprisoned for a term exceeding six months without the option of a fine;
- (b) is a member of a governing body of a political party;
- (c) has previously been removed from public office for contravention of the provisions of the Constitution or any other written law;
- (d) is an un-discharged bankrupt; and
- (e) violates the Constitution or any other written law.

CLAUSE 72

THAT, clause 72 of the Bill be amended by deleting sub-clause (2) and substituting therefor the following new sub-clause—

“(2) Any register maintained under this section shall be open for inspection by the members of the public at the office of the Chief Conservator of Forests.”

CLAUSE 75

THAT, clause 75 remains as is in the Bill;

“(1) Where a provision of this Act requires a person to conserve or protect the environment, the relevant provisions of the Environmental Management and Co-ordination Act, 1999, shall also apply with respect to the manner in which the conservation or protection shall proceed.”

CLAUSE 77

THAT, clause 77 of the Bill be amended by inserting the following new paragraph immediately after paragraph (a)-

(aa) The land in section (a) shall not include government settlement schemes already registered before the commencement of this Act;

“RESOLUTIONS OF THE MEDIATION COMMITTEE”

The Mediation Committee held three sittings on 16th and 18th August, 2016 on morning and afternoon sessions and unanimously resolved the contention on New Clause 9(A), as follows:-

NEW CLAUSE 9(A)

THAT, the Bill be amended by inserting the following new clause immediately after clause 9
—

Procedure for approval by
the Parliament.

9A. (1) The process of approval of an agreement shall commence in the National Assembly.

(2) The National Assembly shall consider an agreement within thirty days of its submission to the National Assembly and shall forward its resolution to the Senate for consideration.

(3) If within thirty days of submission of an agreement to the National Assembly, the National Assembly has not forwarded its resolution on the agreement to the Senate, the Senate shall commence its consideration of the agreement and shall forward its resolution to the National Assembly.

(4) If both Houses —

(a) approve the ratification of an agreement; or

(b) do not approve the ratification of an agreement;

the Speaker of the National Assembly shall, within seven days of the decision, notify the relevant Cabinet Secretary.

- III. **THAT**, notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 97(4), each speech in a debate on **Bills NOT sponsored by a Committee, the Leader of the Majority Party or the Leader of the Minority Party** be limited as follows:- A maximum of three hours and thirty minutes, with not more than thirty (30) minutes for the Mover, in moving and ten (10) minutes in replying, a maximum of thirty (30) minutes for the Chairperson of the relevant Committee and a maximum of ten (10) minutes for any other Member speaking, except the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Minority Party, who shall be limited to a maximum of fifteen Minutes (15) each; and that priority in speaking be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Departmental Committee, in that Order.
- IV. **THAT**, notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 97(4), each speech in a debate on any **Motion**, including a Special motion be limited in the following manner:- A maximum of three hours with not more than twenty (20) minutes for the Mover and ten (10) minutes for each other Member speaking, except the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Minority Party, who shall be limited to a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes each, and that ten (10) minutes before the expiry of the time, the Mover shall be called upon to reply; and that priority in speaking be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Departmental Committee, in that Order.
