8. STATEMENTS

a) Statements pursuant to standing order 46 (2) (a)

(i) The Senator for Vihiga County (Sen. George Khaniri) made a statement regarding the under-utilization of development funds at the counties, massive corruption and alleged diversion of public funds to personal accounts by some county officials.

The in the Statement, the Senator informed the House that since establishment of county assemblies following the General Elections of March, 2013, great strides had been made towards improving service delivery to Kenyans. The Senator noted that the Second Senate had rolled numerous programmes towards capacity development of County Assemblies members and the secretariat.

The Senator stated that it was disturbing to receive reports that counties were mismanaging the monies allocated to them for development. The Senator was concerned that majority of citizens in counties continue enduring poor sanitation, poor road infrastructure, below standards health services and increasing poverty levels yet county governments were receiving billions of shillings every financial year for development.

The Senator noted that the fight against corruption had gathered momentum and urged all Kenyans and institutions mandated to safeguard Kenya against corruption to play their rightful role.

(ii) Nominated Senator (Sen. Mary Seneta), made a statement regarding the death of eleven rhinos that were trans-located from Lake Nakuru and Nairobi National Parks to Tsavo East National Park.

In the statement, the Senator observed that black rhinos were some of the most endangered wild animals in Kenya. The Senator stated that statistics showed that there were only about 700 black rhinos in the country and that the number kept on decreasing by the day.

She was concerned that in the recent past, eleven black rhinos had died after they were trans-located from Lake Nakuru and Nairobi National Parks to Tsavo East National Park. She noted with concern the failure by the National Government to brief Kenyans on the actual cause of the deaths and how such occurrence would be prevented in future.

The Senator, called upon the Standing Committee on Land, Environment and Natural Resources to carry out an inquiry with a view to establishing the cause of the death of the rhinos and the matter of delay of compensation to victims of human-wildlife conflict.

(iii) Nominated Senator (Sen. Mercy Chebeni) made a statement regarding the International Youth Day celebrations scheduled for 10th August, 2018 at the National Assembly Chambers.

In the statement, the Senator informed the House that the International Youth Day, is a day to celebrate the youth in society. The theme of 2018 International Youth Day would be "SAFE SPACES FOR YOUTH".

She noted that the theme resonated well with the government's commitment to ensure the youth were accorded a platform to engage in meaningful discussions with stakeholders.

She appealed to all Senators to sponsor at least two (2) youths (male and female) from their respective counties to join other youth in celebrating the event.

23. MOTION - FLOOD SITUATION IN THE COUNTRY

THAT, aware that several days of heavy rains recently have caused severe flooding in many parts of the country, resulting in multiple deaths and devastating damage to property and infrastructure;

NOTING with concern that, whenever Kenya experiences periods of severe drought, torrential rains usually follow;

CONCERNED that year in year out, the challenge of floods continues to recur, leading to loss of human and animal life, displacement of people and wanton destruction of property;

COGNIZANT that the number of Kenyans needing emergency food aid as a result of displacement caused by the current floods continues to rise by the day, and that the floods have also washed away many bridges and destroyed roads in many parts of Kenya;

ALSO CONCERNED that no effective measures, such as improved storm water harvesting, proper drainage infrastructure and preventing the destruction of riparian reserves and natural water courses, to mitigate and/or provide a lasting solution to the menace of flooding, have been taken;

NOW THEREFORE, the Senate calls upon the National Government to develop a lasting framework to permanently address the challenge of effects of floods by, among other things-

- 1. developing and enforcing regulations for preventing the obstruction of riparian reserves and natural water courses; and
- 2. preventing and regulating the construction of informal settlements and ensuring prevention of construction on low lying areas and flood plains.

And further that the relevant government agency to execute this task submits a report to the Senate within three months of the adoption of this Motion.
