# 4. MESSAGE FROM THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY ON PASSAGE OF THE COUNTY ALLOCATION OF REVENUE BILL (SENATE BILLS NO. 8 OF 2019)

The Deputy Speaker conveyed the following Message from the National Assembly: -

"Honourable Senators,

I wish to report to the Senate that, pursuant to Standing Order No.41 (3) and (4), I have received the following Message from the Speaker of the National Assembly regarding the passage, by the National Assembly, of the County Allocation of Revenue Bill (Senate Bills No. 8 of 2019).

"PURSUANT to the provisions of Standing Orders 41 (1) and 144 of the National Assembly Standing Orders, I hereby convey the following Message from the National Assembly:-

WHEREAS the County Allocation of Revenue Bill (Senate Bills No. 8 of 2019) was passed by the Senate on Tuesday, 17<sup>th</sup> September, 2019 <u>with amendments</u> and referred to the National Assembly for consideration;

AND WHEREAS the National Assembly passed the said Bill on Wednesday, 18<sup>th</sup> September, 2019 without amendments and in the form passed by the Senate;

NOW, THEREFORE, in accordance with the provisions of Article 110 of the Constitution and Standing Orders 41 (1) and 144 of the National Assembly Standing Orders, I hereby <u>convey</u> the said decision of the National Assembly to the Senate."

Honourable Senators,

The Speaker of the Senate is in the process of transmitting the Bill to His Excellency the President for Assent.

#### 5. **STATEMENTS**

# a) Statement pursuant to Standing Order 47(1)

The Senator for Vihiga County (Sen. George Khaniri, MP) issued a statement on an issue of general topical concern, namely the successive failure of County Governments to meet the own source revenue (OSR) targets.

Thereupon, the Senator observed that overall, counties had failed to collect the projected own source revenue since 2013. This situation, he noted, was blamed on several factors, among them over projection, administrative inefficiencies, gaps in policy and legislation, lack of support from the public and corruption.

The Senator also noted that effective collection of own source revenue, in addition to encouraging financial independence of counties, would provide more resources for development. Among the issues that Counties needed to consider in this regard were putting in place legislation concerning own source revenue, ensuring openness and transparency in usage of public funds, resolving the question of double taxation, and exploring additional tax opportunities in their jurisdictions, including through updating of the valuation rolls.

The Senator further underscored the role of the Senate, as the protector of devolution, and urged for the introduction of appropriate legislation to address the existing state of affairs and provide solutions thereto.

## b) Statements pursuant to Standing Order 48(1)

- (iv) The Senator for Vihiga County (Sen. George Khaniri, MP) sought a statement from the Standing Committee on Health on the rapid collapse of Kenya's healthcare system.
- (v) The Senator for Vihiga County (Sen. George Khaniri, MP) sought a statement from the Standing Committee on Devolution and Intergovernmental Relations on the status of asset registers in counties.
- (vi) The Senator for Kisumu County (Sen. Fred Outa, MP) sought a statement from the Standing Committee on National Security, Defence and Foreign Relations on the unrest at Kisumu County Assembly.
- (vii) The Senator for Tana River County (Sen. Golich Juma Wario, MP) sought a Statement from the Standing Committee on National Security, Defence and Foreign Relations on the rising cases of insecurity in Tana River County.

## c) Statement pursuant to Standing Order 51(1)(b)

The Chairperson of the Standing Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries issued a statement relating to a matter for which the Committee was responsible, namely the public and stakeholder engagement on the proposed Mung beans Bill.

# 6. MOTION - ESTABLISHMENT OF AD-HOC COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE MANAGED MEDICAL EQUIPMENT SERVICES (MES)

Order read;

Motion made and Question proposed;

THAT, AWARE THAT while Health is a devolved function, Article 4(3) of the Constitution states that 'the governments at the national and county levels are distinct and inter-dependent and shall conduct their mutual relations on the basis of consultation and cooperation';

FURTHER AWARE THAT, there is no existing comprehensive legal framework to guide the consultative and collaborative process between the Ministry of Health (MoH) and County Governments;

COGNIZANT THAT, when the Managed Equipment Services (MES) project was launched on 6th February, 2015, the Ministry of Health entered into arrangements with five foreign firms for the provision of specialized medical equipment worth Kshs. 38 Billion;

NOTING THAT, according to the Ministry of Health, the project is aimed at improving health infrastructure and enhancing the capacity of counties to provide specialized health care targeting non-communicable conditions such as cancer and renal conditions, as well as to promote diagnostic, radiological and critical care services:

CONCERNED THAT, the Council of Governors (COG) has voiced opposition to the project on the grounds that County governments were not involved in the tender-procurement process, the monies are debited annually from the accounts of the Counties directly by the Treasury, there was lack of proper consultation between the Ministry of Health and County governments, and, that leasing the medical equipment was ultimately more expensive than direct purchase;

CONCERNED FURTHER THAT, the extent to which county government structures or institutions were involved in the project has remained unclear, and the opposition raised by the COG reveals serious gaps in the consultative process between the MoH and county governments, including the terms of the contracts which end in 2022;

NOW THEREFORE in exercise of its oversight function, the Senate resolves to establish an adhoc committee to investigate and establish the facts surrounding the leasing of the Medical Equipment, in the now 119 beneficiary hospitals country wide, including-

- i) whether county governments were involved in prioritizing the medical equipment in accordance with their needs;
- ii) the details of the company from which the equipment was leased;
- iii) the viability and benefit of leasing versus outright purchase;
- iv) the availability of adequate numbers of health human resource to provide specialized health services as envisaged in this project;
- v) the operation, training and maintenance facilities in place for the equipment;
- vi) the terms and period of the lease of each piece of equipment, where the equipment was supplied, the lease amount, and who bears the cost of the residual value of the equipment at the end of the lease term;
- vii) the schedule of equipment supplied to each hospital, and the cost thereof, including proof that the monies disbursed were utilised for the intended purpose; and,
- viii) the results of the exercise, considering the terms of the contract end in 2022, when equipment has remained unused in some counties despite the county having paid annually for the installation, maintenance and utilisation of the same since 2015;

and submit a report to the House within 90 days;
