7. <u>NOTICE OF MOTION – REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ROADS</u> <u>AND TRANSPORTATION ON ITS VISITS TO MALABA INTERNATIONAL</u> <u>BORDER POINT AND THE KIBWEZI-ATHI-MUTOMO-KITUI ROAD PROJECT</u> (Chairperson, Standing Committee on Roads and Transportation)

THAT, the Senate adopts the report of the Standing Committee on Roads and Transportation on the visit to the Malaba International Border Point (OSBP) and the inspection visit and familiarization of the Kibwezi-Athi-Mutomo-Kitui Road Project in Kitui County laid on the Table of the Senate on Wednesday, 4th December, 2019.

8. STATEMENTS

(i) Statement Pursuant to Standing Order 47(1)

The Senator for Kitui County (Sen. Enock Kiio Wambua, MP) made a statement on locust invasion in parts of the country, particularly the lower Eastern region, including Kitui, Makueni and Machakos counties, the upper Eastern region including Embu County and the North Eastern region, in particular Wajir and Garissa counties.

Thereupon, the Senator observed that swarms of migratory locust had been identified as a serious threat to agricultural communities since biblical times. The Senator informed the House that the Horn of Africa was facing a locust invasion of an unprecedented scale and that Kenya was right at the centre of this calamity.

The Senator also informed the House that the desert locust was considered as one of the most dangerous of the flying pests by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) and the current invasion remained extremely serious because the locusts seemed to be invading more areas each passing day and that the devastation visited on vegetation thereby was so intense as it was estimated a small swarm covering one square kilometer could eat the same amount of food in one day as 35,000 people, making it a great risk to food security and social stability both at the national level and in the areas under invasion.

The Senator called upon the government to act fast and mobilize the required resources to scale up control and preventive measures, including the formation of a National Task Force to control and manage the situation.

Thereupon, the Deputy Speaker, pursuant to Standing Order 47(3), referred the matter to the Standing Committee on Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries and directed that the Committee invites the relevant Cabinet Secretary to a Committee of the Whole to address the Senate's concerns on Thursday, 20th February, 2020 at 9.00 a.m.
