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#### CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

This report contains the Committee's proceedings during the approval hearing of the appointment of Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu, nominee for the position of Auditor-General as requested by H.E the President and communicated to the House by the Speaker on Tuesday, 23<sup>rd</sup> June, 2020.

In compliance with section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Wednesday, 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2020 (appendix three). The Clerk invited the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath (affidavit) on the suitability of the nominee in conformity with section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011.

By close of the submission deadline, the Committee had received several memoranda from civil society groups including Constitution and Reform Education Consortium (CRECO), National Taxpayers Association (NTA), Transparency International Kenya, Africa Centre for Open Governance (AFRICOG) and Centre for Enhancing Democracy and Good Governance challenging the process of appointment of the Auditor-General and the role of the Public Service Commission vis-à-vis the independence of the Office of the Auditor-General. The Committee was of the view that none of the memoranda was challenging the nominee directly but were offering an advisory opinion on the need for the Committee to scrutinize the integrity of the process of appointment and the need for Parliament to amend the law to provide for a smooth transition, whenever the Office of the Auditor-General falls vacant. They proposed a specific amendment to Section 12 of the Public Audit Act to provide specific timelines within which a substantive Auditor-General must be appointed. In addition, the Committee also determined that all the memoranda mentioned above were inadmissible because they did not meet the requirements of section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) which provides that a statement contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold an office should be written on oath. The Committee also received a memorandum from a civil society group called Kenyans for Justice which was filed after the deadline hence the Committee did not consider it in light of this.

For the approval hearing, the nominee appeared before the Committee on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2020 at 10.00 am where the Committee examined her suitability based on the criteria set out by the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011. The nominee was interviewed on her academic credentials, relevant experience, knowledge of sector issues, leadership and integrity. Based on her performance during the vetting exercise the Committee found that the nominee has wealth of experience to serve as the Auditor-General having worked in the Office of the Auditor-General, previously known as the Kenya National Audit Office for close to eighteen (18) years, having risen through the ranks to her current position as the Director of Audit. She met all the minimum qualifications required by Article 229(2) of the Constitution and Section 11 of the Public Audit Act, 2015. She demonstrated her extensive knowledge in auditing as well as public finance having worked at the Office of the Auditor-General for most of her career life. Her educational background was also in line with the requirements for the Office. In terms of the nominee's abilities, she demonstrated tenacity to hold this position in the way she responded to questions posed by the Members.

May I take this opportunity to thank all the Members of the Committee for their input and valuable contributions during the approval hearing and deliberations during the writing of the report. The Committee also takes this opportunity to thank the Offices of the Speaker and Clerk of the National Assembly for the logistical support accorded to it during the exercise.

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning, and pursuant to Articles 229(1) and 250(2) of the Constitution, section 11 of the Public Audit Act (No. 34 of 2015) and Section 8(1) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), it is my pleasant duty to table the Report of the Committee on the nomination of Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu for appointment to the position of Auditor-General for debate and adoption by the House. Based on the nominee's performance during the vetting exercise, the Committee urges the House to approve Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu for appointment to the position of Auditor-General.

    - To examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate. X.

#### CHAPTER TWO

#### 2 INTRODUCTION

#### 2.1 Message from H. E. the President

- 6. Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 42, the Speaker of the National Assembly on Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> June, 2020 communicated to the House a message from ILE, the President regarding the nominee to the position of Auditor General. The Speaker informed the House that ILE, the President was seeking the approval of the National Assembly on the said nomination before appointment.
- 7. In accordance with Standing Order 42(3)(c), the Speaker having read the Message from II.E the President referred the name of the nominee together with her curriculum vitae to the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning to conduct approval hearings. The Speaker advised the Committee to notify the nominee and the public of the time and place for holding the approval hearing; the Committee was also to conduct extensive public participation as provided for under Article 118 of the Constitution as well as the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) and report its findings to the House.

#### 2.2 Nomination and appointment process

- 8. Articles 229(1) and 250(2) of the Constitution read together with Section 11 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 provide for the process through which the position of Auditor General is recruited. The Constitution provides that the recruitment of officers to public office should be conducted in a competitive, transparent and fair process before nomination for appointment by H.E. the President with the approval of the National Assembly.
- The National Assembly having received the name of the nominee was obligated to conduct approval hearings and make a determination of the nominee's suitability or otherwise within fourteen days as provided for in Section 8(1) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval Act) (No. 33 of 2011).

#### 2.3 Report of the Committee for nomination of the Auditor-General

- 10. Pursuant to Article 229(1) of the Constitution and section 11(2) of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and through the Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXI No. 111 (Gazette Notice No. 8004) of 27th August, 2019, H.F. the President declared a vacancy in the position of Auditor-General. The notice also invited applications from suitably qualified persons for the position. An advertisement was also placed in the Daily Nation of 27th August, 2019.
- 11. In compliance with section 11(5) of the Act, the President through Kenya Gazette Notice No. 3834 of 20<sup>th</sup> November, 2019 constituted a Selection Panel for considering the applicants and selecting at least three persons qualified for appointment as Auditor-General.
- 12. The advertisement attracted seventy (70) applicants of whom fifty-nine (59) were men and eleven (11) were women. Upon reviewing the applications and applying the shortlisting criteria developed by the Panel, seventeen (17) applicants were shortlisted for interview. The seventeen comprised fifteen (15) men and two (2) women. The interviews were conducted from 22<sup>nd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> October, 2019.
- 13. From the interviews, the following emerged as the top three; Mr. David Kanja Muchoki who scored 75.6%, Mr. David Obwaya Gichana who scored 67% and Ms. Nancy Kabui Gathungu who scored 62.2%. Mr. Muchoki was however disqualified by virtue of his not being in good standing with Institute of Certified Public Accountants of Kenya (ICPAK) as well as not having a valid practicing certificate from the Institution. Section 11(5) of the Act requires the panel to select at least three persons for nomination and appointment

- as Auditor-General and based on its observations, the Panel was of the view that the remaining top three applicants did not meet the expectations of the position of Auditor-General Corresponding for appointment as Auditor-General.
- 14. Following the decision of the Panel that there was no suitable candidate to be appointed to the position, the vacancy was re-advertised in the Daily Nation and the Star Newspapers of 17th December, 2019 and in NTV, KBC Television, KBC English Service Radio Channel, Citizen Radio and on the Public Service Commission Website. The readvertisement attracted 64 applications. However, a court case was filed challenging interalia, the legality of the selection panel to consider the fresh applications and public participation. The Court in its decision issued on 12th March, 2020 found that the initial Selection Panel lacked the legal competence to act on or process the recruitment arising from the re-advertisement. The Court further found that the recruitment process was substantially in compliance with the tenets of public participation.
- 15. Pursuant to the Court ruling, H.E. the President constituted another selection panel vide Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXII No. 68 dated 17<sup>th</sup> April, 2020 for purposes of considering the applications for the re-advertised vacancy and selecting at least three (3) persons qualified for appointment as Auditor General. The Selection Panel was inaugurated by the Chairman of the Public Service Commission on Wednesday, 22<sup>nd</sup> April, 2020.
- 16. The Selection Panel shortlisted ten (10) applicants and the names were published in the Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXII No. 87 (Gazette Notice 3542) of 15th May, 2020. The names were also published in the Daily Nation of 19th May, 2020 and further uploaded on the Public Service Commission website. The interviews were held between 2th and 3th June, 2020 at the Public Service Commission and the following three (3) persons namely CPA Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu (scored 70.3%), CPA Silvester Ngei Kiini (scored 65.1%) and FCPA Benson Ochieng Okundi (scored 64.3%) were selected.

#### 2.4 Committee proceedings

17. The Committee held a total of three sittings to examine and review the nominee's certificates, testimonials, consider public views and hold a vetting meeting with the nominee.

#### CHAPTER THREE

#### 3 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

#### 3.1 Legal framework

- 18. Article 229 of the Constitution provides as follows—
  - 228. (1) There shall be an Auditor General who shall be nominated by the President and, with the approval of the National Assembly, appointed by the President.
    - (2) To be qualified to be the Auditor General, a person shall have extensive knowledge of public finance or at least ten years\* experience in auditing public finance management.
    - (3) The Auditor General holds office, subject to Article 251, for a term of eight years and shall not be eligible for re-appointment.
    - (4) Within six months after the end of each financial year, the Auditor General shall audit and report in respect of that financial year on:-
      - a) the accounts of the national and county governments;
      - b) the accounts of all funds and authorities of the national and county governments;
      - c) the accounts of all courts:
      - d) the accounts of every commission and independent office established by this Constitution;
      - e) the accounts of the National Assembly, the Senate and the county assemblies;
      - f) the accounts of political parties funded from public funds;
      - g) the public debt; and
      - the accounts of any other entity that legislation requires the Auditor General to audit.
    - (5) The Auditor General may audit and report on the accounts of any entity that is funded from public funds.
    - (6) An audit report shall confirm whether or not public money has been applied lawfully and in an effective way.
    - (7) Audit reports shall be submitted to Parliament or the relevant county assembly.
    - (8) Within three months after receiving an audit report, Purliament or the county assembly shall debate and consider the report and take appropriate action.
- Section 11 of the Public Audit Act No. 34 of 2015 provides for the procedure for nomination and appointment of the Auditor – General as follows —
  - 11(1) The office of the Auditor-General shall become vacant, if the Auditor General
    - (a) dies.
    - (b) by a notice in writing addresses to the President, resigns from office; or
    - (c) is removed from office under any of the circumstances specified in Article 251 or Chapter Six of the Constitution.
    - (2) Where a vacancy occurs under subsection (1), the President shall within seven days, by notice in the Gazette, in at least two newspapers of national circulation and in at least two national radio and television stations, declare vacancies in the office of the Auditor – General and invite applications.
    - (3) An application under subsection (2) shall be forwarded to the Public Service Commission within fourteen days of the notice and may be made by any:
      - a) qualified verson;
      - b) person, organization or group of persons proposing the nomination of any qualified person.

- (4) The names of all the applicants under subsection (3) shall be published in the Gazette.
- Pip the Suppless of all recitive surgeen days of the expiry of the period prescribed under subsection (3), constitute a selection panel comprising a chairperson and one representative from
  - a) the Ministry for the time being responsible for matters relating to finance;
  - b) the Office of the Attorney General;
  - c) the Ministry for the time being responsible for matters relating to the public service;
  - d) the Institute of Certified Public Accountants of Kenya;
  - e) the Association of Professional Societies of East Africa; and
  - f) the Law Society of Kenya.

For the purpose of considering the applicants and selecting at least three persons qualified for appointment as Auditor – General.

Provided that for the purpose of selection and shortlisting of the said three persons, the selection panel shall hold its proceedings in public and submit to Parliament a report of the interview proceedings, which should include inter alia the scores of each candidate interviewed by individual members of the interviewing panel together with the criteria used in selecting the names forwarded.

- (6) The selection panel shall within seven days of the selection of candidates under subsection (5), forward the names of the selected candidates to the President for nomination.
- (7) The President shall, within seven days of the receipt of the names of the selected candidates under subsection (6), nominate one candidate for appointment as the Auditor – General and forward the name to the National Assembly.
- (8) The National Assembly shall consider the nomination and may approve or reject the nomination.
- (9) Where the National Assembly:
  - a) approves the nominee, the Speaker shall, within three days of the approval, forward the name of the approved nominee to the President for appointment;
  - rejects the nomination, the Speaker shall, within three days of the rejection, communicate the decision to the President, who shall submit a fresh nominee from amongst the candidates forwarded by the selection panel under subsection (6).
- (10) If the National Assembly rejects all or any subsequent nomince submitted by the President for approval under subsection (9), the provisions of subsections (1) to (7) shall, with the necessary modifications, apply.
- (11) The President shall, within seven days of receipt of the approved nominee from the National Assembly, by notice in the Gazette, appoint the Auditor-General approved by the National Assembly.
- (12) For the avoidance of doubt, the Public Service Commission shall only provide secretariat services for the selection panel convened under subsection (5).
- (13) Despite the foregoing provisions of this section, the President may, by notice in the Gazette, extend the period specified in respect of any matter under this section by a period not exceeding twenty-one days.

- 20. In light of this, H.E. the President has nominated Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu for appointment as the Auditor General and the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning has been assigned the role of conducting the vetting of the aforesaid nominee.
- 21. The following statutes/provisions were paramount to the Committee as it executed this mandate:-
  - The Public Audit Act (No. 34 of 2015);
  - (ii) The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011);
  - (iii) Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
  - (iv) Article 250 of the Constitution on composition, appointment and terms of office of Constitutional Commission and Independent offices;
  - (v) Article 229 of the Constitution on the Auditor General;
  - (vi) Article 232 of the Constitution on values and principles of public service;
  - (vii) Article 10 of the Constitution on the national values and principles of governance:
  - (viii) Article 77 on Restriction on activities of State Officers
  - (ix) The Leadership and Integrity Act (Cap. 182);
  - (x) The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act (No. 1A of 2015)
  - (xi) The Public Officer Ethics Act (Cap. 183)

#### The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011)

- 22. Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, Chapter 136 (PAPAA), provides for issues which the relevant House of Parliament (in this case, the National Assembly) is required to take into consideration in relation to any nomination. This includes:
  - a) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
  - b) any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
  - c) the suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which nomination is being made.
- 23. The specific qualifications for appointment as the Auditor General are prescribed under section 5 of the Public Audit Act, 2015, however the Schedule to the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act provides for the criteria to guide the Committee during an approval hearing. These are—
  - (i) Education, employment record;
  - (ii) Public office, political activities and affiliations;
  - (iii) Deferred income or future benefits:
  - (iv) Sources of income, tax status, statement of net worth;
  - (v) Potential conflicts of interest;
  - (vi) Pro bono or charity work:
  - (vii) Whether the nominee has been charged in a court of law or convicted;
  - (viii) Adverse mention in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or
- During the approval hearing, section 6 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (PAPAA) provides important points, as follows
  - An approval hearing shall focus on a candidate's academic credentials, professional training and experience, personal integrity and background (section 6(7) of the PAPAA).

- (ii) The criteria specified in the Schedule shall be used by a Committee during an approval hearing for the purposes of vetting a candidate (section 6(8) of the PDFPCBAPPressor Free Version
- (iii) Any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated (section 6(9) of the PAPAA).
- (iv) A candidate may, at any time, by notice in writing addressed to the Clerk, withdraw from the approval process and the candidate's nomination shall end (section 6(10), PAPAA).

#### Chapter 6 of the Constitution (Leadership and Integrity)

- 25. There are important provisions in Chapter 6 of the Constitution worth pointing out. Article 73 of the Constitution provides that the authority assigned to a State officer (a member of a Commission being a state officer under Article 260 of the Constitution) is a public trust to be exercised in a manner that is consistent with the Constitution, demonstrates respect for the people, brings honour to the nation and dignity to the office and promotes public confidence in the integrity of the office. Also, the State officer shall have the responsibility to serve the people, rather than the power to rule them.
- 26. The guiding principles of leadership and integrity are listed as selection based on personal integrity, competence and suitability, objectivity and impartiality in decision making, selfless service based solely on the public interest, accountability and discipline and commitment in service to the people.

#### Article 77 of the Constitution on Restriction on activities of State Officers

27. Article 77 of the Constitution provides that a full-time State officer shall not participate in any other gainful employment. Further clause (2) provides that any appointed State officer shall not hold office in a political party. Therefore, the Salaries and Remuneration Commission being a full-time Commission pursuant to section 4(3) of the SRC Act, the provisions of Article 77 apply.

#### Article 232 of the Constitution on Values and Principles of Public Service

28. Article 232 of the Constitution provides for the values and principles of public service which include high standards of professional ethics; efficient, effective and economic use of resources; responsive, prompt, effective, impartial and equitable provision of services; involvement of the people in the process of policy making; accountability for administrative acts; transparency and provision to the public of timely, accurate information; fair competition and merit as the basis of appointments and promotions; representation of Kenya's diverse communities; and affording adequate and equal opportunities for appointment, training and advancement, at all levels of the public service of men and women; the members of all ethnic groups; and persons with disabilities.

#### Article 10(2) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance

29. Article 10(2) of the Constitution provides for the national values and principles of governance which include patriotism, national unity, sharing and devolution of power, the rule of law, democracy and participation of the people; human dignity, equity, social justice, inclusiveness, equality, human rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalised; good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability; and sustainable development.

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#### The Leadership and Integrity Act

30. The Leadership and Integrity Act provides a number of obligations to a State officer. These are, among others: to respect and abide by the Constitution and the law, public trust, performance of duties in an honest and accountable manner, professionalism, financial integrity, not to engage in activities that amount to abuse of office, not misuse public resources, accepting gifts that may compromise the officer's duties, wrongful or unlawful acquisition of property, conflict of interest e.t.c.

#### The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act

31. Section 5 of the Public Service (Values and Principles) Act provides that a public officer shall maintain high standards of professional ethics, including, being honest; displaying high standards of integrity, transparency, accountability, respect to others, objectivity, patriotism, observance of rule of law. (Applies in future upon appointment)

#### The Public Officer Ethics Act

32. The Public Officer Ethics Act provides for obligations to be carried out by a public officer. These include professionalism, carrying out duties in accordance with the law, prohibition from unjust enrichment, avoiding conflict of interest, not using office as a venue for soliciting or collecting harambees; not acting for foreigners; care of property; political neutrality, not practicing nepotism or favouritism, giving impartial advice, conducting private affairs in a way that maintains public confidence, bar from sexual harassment, submission of declaration of income, assets and liabilities once every two years (section 26) (Applies in future after appointment)

#### 3.2 Qualifications for appointment of the Auditor-General

- 33. In conducting the Approval hearing, the Committee was guided by Article 229 of the Constitution, Sections 11 of the Public Audit Act (No. 34 of 2015) and the provisions of Section 3 and 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011.
- 34. Article 250(3) of the Constitution provides that to be appointed to a Commission or independent office, a person shall have the specific qualifications required by the Constitution or national legislation. Further Article 250(4) provides that appointments to commissions and independent offices shall take into account the national values referred to in Article 10 and the principle that the composition of the commissions and offices, taken as a whole, shall reflect the regional and ethnic diversity of the people of Kenya.
- 35. As regards qualifications for appointment as an Auditor-General, section 5 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 provides as follows—

#### Qualification for appointment as the Auditor -General

- A person shall be qualified for appointment as the Auditor-General if such a person;-
  - (a) is a citizen of Kenya;
  - (b) holds the respective qualifications for the office specified in Article 229(2) of the Constitution;
  - (c) holds a degree in finance, accounting or coonomics from a university recognized in Kenya and demonstrates a verifiable and logical progression in the attainment of his or her educational qualifications;
  - (d) meets the requirements of Chapter six of the Constitution; and
  - (e) is a practicing member of good standing of a professional body of accountants recognized by law.

- 36. Article 73 of the Constitution provides that:-
  - (2) The guiding principles of leadership and integrity include:-
    - PDE Cotion in free and fair elections:
    - objectivity and impartiality in decision making, and in ensuring that decisions are not influenced by nepotism, favouritism, other improper motives or corrupt practices;
    - selfless service based solely on the public interest, demonstrated by:-
      - (i) honesty in the execution of public duties; and
      - the declaration of any personal interest that may conflict with public duties;
    - d) accountability to the public for decisions and for decisions and actions; and
    - c) discipline and commitment in service to the people.

#### 3.3 Message from H.E. the President

37. On Friday, 19th June, 2020, H.F. the President forwarded the name of Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu as the nominee for the position of Auditor-General to the Speaker for approval by the National Assembly pursuant to Article 229(1). The Speaker in his communication issued on Tuesday, 23th June, 2020 and pursuant to Standing Order No. 42 referred the matter to the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning to conduct approval hearings and report its findings to the House within fourteen (14) days.

#### 3.4 Notification to the nominee and Chapter 6 clearance requirements

- 38. The Clerk of the National Assembly vide a letter Ref: NA/DC/F&NP/2020/26 dated 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2020 wrote to Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu informing her of her nomination by H.E. the President and requested her to appear for vetting by the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning on Friday, 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2020 in Mini-Chamber, First Floor, County Hall, Parliament Buildings at 10:00 am. The Clerk further requested the nominee to bring with her clearance certificates from the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI).
- 39. The Clerk also wrote to the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) requesting for the status of the nominee in regards to tax compliance, higher education loan repayment status, leadership and integrity, affiliation to any political party and criminal records.
- 40. The above mentioned institutions responded to the letters from the National Assembly clearing the nominee vide the following letters:- Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) (letter Ref: KRA/5/1002/5(3105)), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) (letter Ref: HELB/RR/112009/48), Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) (letter Ref: EACC.7/10/5 VOL.IV(140)), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) (letter Ref: RPP/ORG/34/ Vol. IV (30)) and the Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) (letter Ref: CID/CRO/SEC/6/7/A/VOL.IX/10).

#### 3.5 Request for Memoranda and Notification to the public

- 41. Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011 provides that "any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated".
- 42. The Clerk of the National Assembly on Wednesday, 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2020 placed a notification in the print media informing the general public of the intention of the Committee to conduct approval hearings, as provided for by Article 118(1)(a)(b) and (2) of the Constitution and Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), which allows public participation in committee proceedings. The notification gave provision for the submission of memoranda, on the suitability or otherwise of the nominee by Tuesday, 30<sup>th</sup> June, 2020, at 5.00 pm.

#### 3.6 Submission of memoranda

- 43. The Committee received the following memoranda contesting the process of nominating the Auditor General:-
  - (i) From Constitution and Reform Education Consortium (CRECO), National Taxpayers Association (NTA). Transparency International Kenya, Africa Centre for Open Governance (AFRICOG) and Centre for Enhancing Democracy and Good Governance who raised the following issues regarding the appointment:-
    - a. they noted that concerns had been raised on the integrity of the recruitment process key among them being the level of competence among the shortlisted applicants both in the first and second round of interviews;
    - b. Parliament should put in place appropriate measures to address the transitional challenges that exist in the Public Audit Act, 2015 so that there is no void in the Office and to have a substantive handover between the person vacating the office and the incoming office holder;
    - c. after the enactment of the Public Audit Act, 2015, Transparency International Kenya, the African Centre for Open Governance and other partners challenged sections 12 and 17 of the Act in court and they were declared unconstitutional by the court. However, the Public Service Commission has remained active in the recruitment process of the nominee and this violates the judgement issued on the Public Petition No. 388/2016; and
    - d. the Office of the Auditor-General is critical in the fight against corruption and plays an integral role in public finance management. The absence of an independent, competent and substantive office holder therefore impedes the realization of transparency and accountability in public finance management.
  - (ii) From Kenyans for Justice contesting the appointment of Ms. Gathungu for the following reasons:
    - a. the nominee, Ms. Gathungu was the personal assistant of the former Auditor General during the period that he faced impropriety allegations that are contained in the Petition for the Removal of the Auditor-General which was submitted to the National Assembly for consideration;
    - the nominee does not have the annual practicing license for the year 2020
      as provided by the Accountants Act (No. 15 of 2008) and does not
      therefore meet the requirements of section 8(1) of the Public Audit Act,
      2015;

- c. the nominee has never conducted any financial audit in the Office of the Auditor-General since she was employed in the Office and is therefore not PDF Compression and the Constitution; and
  - d. when the nominee sought to head the Kenya National Audit Office (KENAO), the selection panel rejected her appointment citing that she lacked the diplomacy and tact to handle the duties of the office.
- 44. The memoranda were however inadmissible in the Committee because they did not meet the requirements of section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) which provides that a statement contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold an office should be written on oath. The memorandum by Kenyans for Justice was received by the Office of the Clerk of the National Assembly on 6<sup>th</sup> July, 2020 days after the expiry of the period for submission of memorandal and after the Committee had concluded the vetting exercise.

#### CHAPTER FOUR

#### 4 APPROVAL HEARING

- 45. The Committee conducted the approval hearing for the nominee to the position of Auditor General on Friday, 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2020. In conducting the vetting exercise, the Committee was guided by among other documents, the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), the Public Audit Act (No. 34 of 2015) and the National Assembly Standing Orders.
- 46. The Committee examined the nominee using the guidelines provided for in the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011). The Committee also considered the following in vetting the nominee:
  - a. Academic qualifications
  - Employment record and work experience
  - c. Professional association
  - d. Public office, political activities and affiliations
  - e. Potential conflict of interest
  - f. Suitability to the position
  - g. Tax compliance
  - h. Vision and leadership
  - i. Integrity
  - Expectations and Key priorities

#### 4.1 Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu - Nominee for the Position of Auditor - General

47. Ms. Gathungu was nominated for the position of Auditor – General by H.E. the President pursuant to Article 229(1) of the Constitution. She appeared before the Committee for vetting on Friday, 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2020. She was orally interviewed by the Committee and responded to questions during vetting as follows:-

#### 4.1.1 Personal Background

 She is a Kenyan citizen of identity card number 10474205 and was born in Kisumu County in 1969.

#### 4.1.2 Educational Background

- 49. Ms. Gathungu is currently pursuing a PhD Programme in Business Administration (Strategic Management) at the Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT). She attained a Masters Degree in Business Administration (Strategic Management) at the University of Nairobi in 2009 and graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce Degree (Accounting Option) from the University of Nairobi in 1992.
- 50. She did her Certified Public Accountants Part III and II at the Kenya School of Professional Studies in 1998 and 1995 respectively.
- 51. She is a Certified Information Systems Auditor (CISA) (2005) and has an Advanced Diploma in Information Technology from the Kenya School of Professional Studies (Nairobi) in 2002. She is computer literate having obtained a certificate in Computer Studies from Nyamachaki Women's Centre (Nyeri) in 1999.
- She sat for the Kenya Advanced Certificate of Education (K.A.C.E.) at Kenya High School in 1988 and did her Kenya Certificate of Education (K.C.E.) at Moi Girls High School Nairobi in 1986.

#### 4.1.3 Professional Associations & Affiliations

- 53. Ms. Gathungu is a member of the following institutions/committees:-
  - PDF Charlestes of Feetifed Public Accountants of Kenya;
  - (ii) the Association of Women Accountants of Kenya;
  - (iii) Information Systems Audit and Control Association:
  - (iv) Kenya Leadership and Integrity Forum (Chair of the watchdog agencies sector group);
  - Implementation Committee of the Report of the Taskforce on Legal Policy on Institutional Framework for Fighting Corruption in Kenya (represents the Office of the Auditor-General);
  - (vi) National Coordinating Committee on Leadership and Integrity (represents the Office of the Auditor-General); and
  - (vii) Monitoring Implementation of the Devolution Conference Resolutions Committee.

#### 4.1.4 Work experience/career progression

- 54. Ms. Nancy Gathungu has worked in the Office of the Auditor-General previously known as Kenya National Audit Office in various capacities. She is currently the Director of Audit, a position she has held since February 2014.
- 55. She has also held other positions in the Office including; Financial Auditor from (1993 to 1997), Assistant Director of Audit (August 2006 to September 2010) and Deputy Director of Audit (September 2010 to January 2014). She also worked at Kenyatta National Hospital as a Chief Internal Auditor (December 2004 to July 2006) and as a Senior Internal Auditor (July 2000 to December 2004). Additionally, she worked for the Ministry of Education as the Provincial Schools Auditor for Central Province (1997 to June 2000).

#### 4.1.5 Potential Conflict of interest

56. The Committee questioned her on whether her current assignments in trainings would in any way pose a challenge of conflict of interest. She responded that she will step back from her duties of training but will continue engaging professionally with auditors in order to improve their auditing skills. She also stated that she was not aware of any potential conflict of interest as a result of familial relations however, if that may be the case, she will declare the interest as required by the law.

#### 4.1.6 Clearance Requirements

 The Committee confirmed that the nominee had been cleared by KRA, ORPP, DCI, EACC and HELB having obtained clearance certificates to that effect.

#### 4.1.7 Gender and Regional Balance

58. The Committee noted that the executive team of the Office of the Auditor-General comprises of seven members out of which live are male and if appointed as the Auditor-General, Ms. Gathungu will be the second female in the team. The face of Kenya is fairly represented in the membership of the executive team.

#### 4.1.8 Other issues under consideration

59. To examine suitability or otherwise of the nominee, the Committee posed several questions in the following thematic areas:-

# Charged in a court of law or adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission

60. She informed the Committee that she had never been charged in any court and neither had she been adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission.

#### Political activities and affiliations

 She had never been involved in any political activities and has never been affiliated to any political party.

#### What motivated her to apply for the position of the Auditor General

62. She stated that her track record and professional experience is a testament that she is suitable to work as the Auditor-General. She has the willingness and ability to execute the mandate of the Office as required by the Constitution.

#### Leadership and Integrity

63. She informed the meeting that her integrity and ethical conduct had never been brought to question in the past. In terms of leadership, she represents the Office of the Auditor-General in the National Coordinating Committee on Leadership and Integrity and is the Chairperson of the watchdog agencies sector group in the Kenya Leadership and Integrity Forum. Further, she is a menter and trainer on Leadership and Integrity in the Office of the Auditor-General. All these positions have given a good understanding of the need to enforce integrity at the Office.

#### How she will deal with cases of corruption in the Office of the Auditor-General

64. She will ensure that the provisions of the Public Officer Ethics Act (No. 4 of 2003) are fully operationalized in the Office in order to minimize cases of corruption in the Office.

#### Partnerships that have been developed by the Office of the Auditor General to enhance the process of tracking public resources to achieve the intended output and impact to the citizenry

65. She stated that the Office receives requests to provide capacity building support to other Supreme Audit Institutions in the region and across Africa and works very closely with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) as well as other institutions. They also partner with Parliament and county governments in order to ensure that they produce good quality reports especially with Audit Committees of Parliament.

# How she will improve service delivery at the Office if she is appointed as the Auditor-General

- 66. If appointed as the Auditor-General, she will increase engagement with audit teams in order to identify the challenges that they experience and develop ways of mitigating them so as to improve the quality of auditing. All the audit queries that are raised in audit reports relating to governance, compliance, financial accounting e.t.c. will be categorized in order to find solutions for them.
- 67. Additionally, she will work closely with public offices in order to ensure that recommendations in audit reports from Parliament and the Office of the Auditor General are implemented. She will also encourage the use of e-procurement platforms in order to reduce cases of embezzlement of public funds.

## How she will ensure that there is a good relationship between the Office and Parliament

68. Shp plated that she has been influencing the work of Parliamentary Committees at the Office and that she is ready and willing to learn how to better interact with Parliament in order to increase efficiency of oversight. Further, she stated that the Office will endeavour to provide feedback for utilisation of funds allocated through budgetary allocation. To this end, she committed that if appointed, she will ensure that the Office submits reports to Parliament on the utilization of the funds allocated for continuous oversight.

# Strategies that she will put in place to ensure that accountability is promoted in the public sector

69. She will ensure that measures are put in place so that the provision of the Public Audit Act, 2015 on the implementation of the recommendations of audit reports is adhered to by auditors in public institutions. She will also ensure that the reports generated by the Office are credible and that the funds allocated in the budget correspond with the implemented projects. Additionally, she will ensure that performance audit reports correspond to service performance in the public sector.

# How she will ensure that the Office of the Auditor General submits timely financial reports on accounts of entities

70. She stated that she will ensure that the Office produces timely report on accounts within specified times in order to enhance proper oversight and accountability. She observed that the entities to be audited have increased tremendously over the years thereby delaying the production of timely audit reports and hence putting pressure on the personnel. She however noted that due to financial constraints the possibility of hiring more staff may not be an option. As such, she will develop ways of optimizing performance with the current establishment in order to produce the reports in a timely manner.

#### How she will nurture talents of the young and inexperienced officers

71. She stated that she will ensure that the officers who join the Office as young graduate trainees are mentored by giving them an opportunity to work on a rotational basis in different departments in order to gain experience in different areas of public audit. This will ensure that the officers are all rounded hence become more efficient when they take up leadership roles in the Office.

#### What should be done in order to prevent a vacuum in the Office of the Auditor-General when the term comes to an end

72. She stated that the Public Audit Act, 2015 needs to be amended in order to address this challenge. To fast track this process, a committee/task/force in the Office of the Auditor-General had been set up to look at areas in the Act that need to be amended.

#### Her opinion on performance contracting

73. She stated that performance contracting is a very important tool in assessing performance of public officers. There is therefore need to sensitise public officers on its importance in order to remove the negative perception and casualness associated to the tool.

#### Her net worth

 She stated that her not worth is about KSh. 30.89 million comprising of assets worth KSh. 40.42 million and liabilities worth KSh. 9.33 million.

#### CHAPTER FIVE

## 5 OBSERPOFICATION TO SELECTION

- 75. The Committee observations were guided by section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) in terms of issues for consideration as follows:-
  - (i) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
  - (ii) any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
  - (iii) the suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is made.
- 76. The Committee having considered the nominee's curriculum vitae and heard oral submissions during the vetting exercise made the following observations and findings. That the candidate, Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu:-
  - is a Kenyan citizen born in 1969 in Kisumu County and the position being that of a State Officer she didn't possess dual citizenship.
  - (ii) met the educational requirement as she was pursuing a PhD in Business Administration (Strategic Management), she has a Masters of Business Administration in Strategic Management and a Bachelor of Commerce (Accounting).
  - (iii) had met the minimum experience required as she had a wealth of experience of close to twenty-seven (27) years having worked in finance departments in different public institutions. Of the 27 years of her career life, she has worked for the Office of the Auditor-General for eighteen (18) years. In that regard, she meets the minimum qualification of ten (10) years of experience in auditing or public finance management.
  - (iv) was ranked at first position by the Selection Panel that interviewed her with a score of 70.3%.
  - (v) was cleared by the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) on Tax Compliance, the Higher Educations Loans Board (HELB) on the payment of her education loan, Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) on integrity, Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) on her criminal status and Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) on membership to a political party.
- 77. The Committee noted that the process of nominating the Auditor-General complied with the decision of the Court and the relevant laws, in that a new Selection Panel was appointed and the Selection Panel interviewed and recommend three persons to H.E. the President.
- 78. The Committee also determined that all the memoranda that were received regarding this approval hearing were inadmissible because they did not meet the requirements of section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) which provides that a statement contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold an office should be written on oath.

- 79. Further, the Committee found that the memorandum submitted by Kenyans for Justice was received by the Office of the Clerk of the National Assembly on 6<sup>th</sup> July, 2020 days after the expiry of the period for submission of memoranda and after the Committee had conducted the vetting exercise and therefore inadmissible.
- 80. The Committee further noted that there is need to amend the Public Audit Act, 2015 in view of the Court's decision in Petition No. 388 of 2016 which repealed some provisions of the attendant Act. These amendments will also be necessary to remove the lacuna that exists in the law with regards to filling a vacancy in the Office of the Auditor-General.

#### CHAPTER SIX

81. Having considered the suitability, capacity and integrity of the nominee, and pursuant to Article 250(2) of the Constitution, Sections 5 and 11 of the Public Audit Act (No. 34 of 2015) and Section 8(2) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011), the Committee recommends that the National Assembly APPROVES the nomination and subsequent appointment of Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu as the Auditor General.

#### Observations/Findings

The Committee having considered the nominee's curriculum vitae and heard oral submissions during the vetting exercise made the following observations and findings. That the candidate, Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu:-

- is a Kenyan citizen born in 1969 in Kisumu County and therefore as a State Officer she didn't possess dual citizenship.
- met the educational requirement as she was pursuing a PhD in Business Administration (Strategic Management), she has a Masters of Business Administration in Strategic Management and a Bachelor of Conunerce (Accounting).
- had met the minimum experience required as she had a wealth of experience of close to twenty-seven (27) years having worked in finance departments in public institutions. Of the 27 years of her career life, she has worked for the Office of the Auditor-General/Kenya National Audit Office for eighteen (18) years.
- was ranked at first position by the selection panel that interviewed her with a score of 70.3%.
- was cleared by the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) on Tax Compliance, the Higher Educations Loans Board (HELB) on the payment of her education loan, Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) on integrity, Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) on her criminal status and Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) on membership to a political party.

#### Recommendation

The Committee recommended that the National Assembly APPROVES the nomination and subsequent appointment of Ms. Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu as the Auditor General.

An oath was administered to the nominee then she submitted original copies of her testimonials and compliance certificates from Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) and Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) to the Committee for verification.

She responded to Member's questions as follows:-

#### Charged in a court of law or adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission

She informed the Committee that she had never been charged in any court and neither had she been adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of a Parliamentary Committee or Commission.

#### 2. Personal Background

She is a Kenyan citizen of identity card number 10474205 and was born in Kisumu County in 1969.

#### 3. Educational background

Ms. Gathungu is pursuing a PhD Programme in Business Administration (Strategic Management) at the Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT). She attained a Masters Degree in Business Administration (Strategic Management) at the University of Nairobi in 2009, became a Certified Information Systems Auditor (CISA) at the Vision Institute of Professionals (Nairobi) in 2005, obtained an Advanced Diploma in Information Technology from the Kenya School of Professional Studies (Nairobi) in 2002, obtained a certificate in Computer Studies from Nyamachaki Women's Centre (Nyeri) in 1999, did her Certified Public Accountants Part III and II at the Kenya School of Professional Studies in 1998 and 1995 respectively, attained a Bachelor of Commerce Degree (Accounting Option) from the University of Nairobi in 1992, sat for the Kenya Advanced Certificate of Education (K.A.C.E.) at Kenya High School Nairobi in 1986.

#### 4. Work experience/employment record

Ms. Nancy Gathungu has worked in the Office of the Auditor General/Kenya National Audit Office in various capacities. She has held the following positions in the Office: Financial Auditor from 1993 to 1997, Assistant Director of Audit from August 2006 to September 2010, Deputy Director of Audit from September 2010 to January 2014 and she is currently the Director of Audit, a position she has held since February 2014. She also worked at Kenyatta National Hospital as a Chief Internal Auditor from December 2004 to July 2006 and as a Senior Internal Auditor from July 2000 to December 2004. Additionally, she worked for the Ministry of Education as the Provincial Schools Auditor for Central Province from 1997 to June 2000.

#### 5. Membership to professional associations

Ms. Gathungu is a member of the following institutions/committees:-

i. the Institute of Certified Public Accountants of Kenya:

- vi. National Coordinating Committee on Leadership and Integrity (represents the Office of the Auditor General); and

#### 6. Political activities and affiliations

She had never been involved in any political activities and has never been affiliated to any political party.

## 7. What motivated her to apply for the position of the Auditor General

She stated that her track record and professional experience is a testament that she is suitable to work as the Auditor-General. She has the willingness and ability to execute the mandate of the Office as required by the Constitution.

## 8. Leadership and Integrity

She informed the meeting that her integrity and ethical conduct had never been brought to question in the past. In terms of leadership, she represents the Office of the Auditor-General in the National Coordinating Committee on Leadership and Integrity and is the Chairperson of the watchdog agencies sector group in the Kenya Leadership and Integrity Forum. Further, she is a mentor and trainer on Leadership and Integrity in the Office of the Auditor-General. All these positions have given a good understanding of the need to enforce integrity at the Office.

# How she will deal with cases of corruption in the Office of the Auditor General She will ensure that the provisions of the Public Officer Ethics Act (No. 4 of 2003) are fully operationalized in the Office in order to minimize cases of corruption in the Office.

## 10. Partnerships that have been developed by the Office of the Auditor General to enhance the process of tracking public resources to achieve the intended output and impact to the citizenry

She stated that the Office is usually called upon to provide support to other Supreme Audit Institutions in the region and across Africa and works very closely with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) as well as other institutions. They also partner with Parliament and county governments in order to ensure that they produce good quality reports especially with Audit Committees of Parliament.

# 11. How she will improve service delivery at the Office if she is appointed as the Auditor-General

If appointed as the Auditor-General, she will increase engagement with audit teams in order to identify the challenges that they experience and develop ways of mitigating them so as to improve the quality of auditing. All the audit queries that are raised in audit reports relating to governance, compliance, financial accounting e.t.c. will be categorized

Additionally, she will work closely with public offices in order to ensure that recommendations in audit reports from Parliament and the Office of the Auditor General are implemented. She will also encourage the use of exprocurement platforms in order to reduce cases of embezzlement of public funds.

# 12. How she will ensure that there is a good relationship between the Office and Parliament

She stated that she has been influencing the work of Parliamentary Committees at the Office and that she is ready and willing to learn how to better interact with Parliament in order to increase efficiency of oversight. Further, she stated that the Office will endeavour to provide feedback for utilisation of funds allocated through budgetary allocation. To this end, she committed that if appointed, she will ensure that the Office submits reports to Parliament on the utilization of the funds allocated for continuous oversight.

## Strategies that she will put in place to ensure that accountability is promoted in the public sector

She will ensure that measures are put in place so that the provision of the Public Audit Act, 2015 on the implementation of the recommendations of audit reports is adhered to by auditors in public institutions. She will also ensure that the reports generated by the Office are credible and that the funds allocated in the budget correspond with the implemented projects. Additionally, she will ensure that performance audit reports correspond to service performance in the public sector.

# 14. How she will ensure that the Office of the Auditor-General submits timely financial reports on accounts of entities

She stated that she will ensure that the Office produces timely report on accounts within specified times in order to enhance proper oversight and accountability. She observed that the entities to be audited have increased tremendously over the years thereby delaying the production of timely audit reports and hence putting pressure on the personnel. She however noted that due to financial constraints the possibility of hiring more staff may not be an option. As such, she will develop ways of optimizing performance with the current establishment in order to produce the reports in a timely manner.

## 15. How she will nurture talents of the youthful and inexperienced officers

She stated that she will ensure that the officers who join the Office as young graduate trainees are mentored by giving them an opportunity to work on a rotational basis in different departments in order to gain experience in different areas of public audit. This will ensure that the officers are all rounded hence become more efficient when they take up leadership roles in the Office.

# 16. What should be done in order to prevent a vacuum in the Office of the Auditor-General when the term comes to an end

She stated that the Public Audit Act, 2015 needs to be amended in order to address this challenge. To fast track this process, a committee/taskforce in the Office of the Auditor-General had been set up to look at areas in the Act that need to be amended.

## 17. Her opinion on performance contracting

She stated that performance contracting is a very important tool in assessing performance of public officers. There is therefore need to sensitise public officers on its importance in PDP Compressor of regular pressor of the regu

## 18. Her net worth

She stated that her not worth is about KSh. 30.89 million comprising of assets worth KSh. 40.42 million and liabilities worth KSh. 9.33 million.







The Constitution and Reform Education Consortium (CRECO) is a coalition of 23 Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) working on democracy, governance, legal and human rights issues.  There have been concerns raised on the integrity of the recruitment process, key among these being the level of competency among the shortlisted applicants both in the first and second round of interviews. The first recruitment panel had concluded that they were unable to find a suitable candidate from the pool of applicants, yet the second panel proceeded to recommend to the President three suitable candidates as required by law,



from the same pool of initial applicants. As such, it is important that Parliament undertakes to scrutinize the process leading up to this nomination, including what changed in the first and second selection processes and ensure that all the information on the process and outcome of the selection process is published.

- 2. Parliament equally needs to take appropriate measures to address the transitional challenges which exist within the Public Audit Act, and which have created a void in this critical office including a lack of substantive handover between the person vacating office and the incoming office holder. Unless this lacuna is fixed, the governance challenges witnessed over the last ten months as a result of poor transition in this office will recur in future. We specifically propose an amendment to Section 12 of the Public Audit Act, to give specific timelines within which a substantive Auditor General would be appointed.
- 3. After the enactment of the Public Audit Act, 2015, Transparency International Kenya and the African Centre for Open Governance and other partners challenged some provisions in the Act which were found to be unconstitutional. Sections 12 and 17 of the Public Audit Act on the proposed role of the Public Service Commission in hiring and redesigning of the Office of the Auditor General were declared unconstitutional. The Court in its judgment reiterated that the Office of the Auditor General is an independent office and any involvement by PSC would affect the independence of the OAG as envisioned in the Constitution. Unfortunately, the Public Service Commission has remained active in the recruitment process of the current Auditor General in violation of the Public Audit Petition No. 388/2016 judgement.
- 4. The Office of the Auditor General is critical in the fight against corruption, and plays an integral role in public finance management. In the absence of an independent, competent and substantive holder of office, transparency and accountability in public finance management will not be effectively realised.

Parliament must ensure that the process leading up to the nomination of an individual to the position of the Auditor General is above board and espouses integrity, as this will bolster public confidence in the abilities and independence of the successful candidate. We therefore invite Parliament to among others, consider the cases and rulings previously made in this process, as part of their vetting process to up hold the rule of law.


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#### ADVISORY NOTE ON THE RECRUITMENT OF THE AUDITOR GENERAL

Transparency International–Kenya (TI-Kenya) is a not-for-profit organization founded in 1999 in Kenya with the aim of developing a transparent and corruption-free society through good governance and social justice initiatives. TI-Kenya is one of the autonomous chapters of the global Transparency International movement that are all bound by a common vision of a corruption-free world. The vision of TI-Kenya is that of a transparent, accountable and corruption-free Kenya and the mission is to transform the society and institutions by supporting the development of high integrity leadership in all sectors and at all levels.

#### Underscoring the need for Integrity in the process

- The mandate of the Office of the Auditor General (OAG) as stipulated in the Constitution of Kenya and the Public Audit Act, 2015 is to carry out audits of all entities funded by the Government and report to Parliament and the relevant County Assemblies. Further, the Constitution requires the OAG to confirm whether or not public money has been applied lawfully and in an effective way. This requires the OAG to go beyond accounts' certification and compliance to look into issues that address the economy, efficiency and effectiveness with which public resources have been applied and utilized, including the impact on the lives of citizens.

Attaining this Constitutional requirement on the independence of the office, includes, but is not limited to the entire-process of recuiting the holder of the Office of the Auditor General.

The Court in its judgment reiterated that the Office of the Auditor General is an independent office and any involvement by PSC would affect the independence of the OAG as anvisioned in the Constitution Unfortunately, the Public Service Commission has remained active in the recruitment process of the current Auditor General in violation of the Public Audit Petition No. 388/2016 judgment. PSC actions have therefore been in contempt.
  - The Office of the Auditor General is critical in the fight against corruption, and plays an integral role in public finance management. In the absence of an independent, competent and substantive holder of office, the effectiveness and lawfulness of public expenditure cannot be assured. Earlier this year, we witnessed a number of violations among key public institutions, which could be attributed to the void left within this independent office. For instance, the Central Bank of Kenya failed to submit the 2018/19 financial accounts, citing the absence of a signature by the Auditor General. This is a gross violation of the legal framework upon which public finance is managed, and could be a smoking gun for worse revelations in the days and months to come.

Parliament must ensure that the process leading up to the nomination of an individual to the position of the Auditor General is above board and espouses integrity, as this will balster public confidence in the abilities of the successful condidate. We therefore invite Parliament to among others, consider the cases and rulings previously mode in this process, as part of their vetting process to uphold the rule of law.

We further arge the relevant Committee to make the proposed changes to the Act to good against similar scenarios in the future.



in the matter of approval by the national Assembly of person nominated for appointment to the position of the Auditor-General

Following a recent communication by State House on the nomination of Nancy Gathungu as the successful candidate for the position of Auditor General of the Republic of Kenya, we wish to make the following observations which touch on the integrity of the recruitment process for this critical position, which fell vacant in August 2019, following the end of the tenure of its previous office holder, Mr. Edward Ouko:

- There have been concerns raised on the integrity of the recruitment process, key among these being the level of competency among the shortlisted applicants both in the first and second round of interviews. The first recruitment panel had concluded that they were unable to find a suitable candidate from the pool of applicants, which included Ms. Gathungu, yet the second panel proceeded to recommend to the President three suitable candidates as required by law, from the same pool of initial applicants. As such, it is important that Parliament undertakes to scrutinize the process leading up to this nomination, including what changed in the first and second selection processes and ensure that all the information on the process and outcome of the selection process is published.
- in scrutinising the process, Parliament should also be able to reassure the public that it has respected the judgment of the Court on Petition No. 244 of 2019, delivered on March 12, 2020. The Court directed that the Attorney General present the report of the Selection Committee to Parliament. It is not in the public domain if this was done. If it has not been done, then every effort should be made to see that it is done before proceeding.
- 3. Also of relevance to ascertaining the integrity of the process before proceeding with the nomination, is the declaration by the Court to the effect that the Selection Panel appointed through Gazette Notice No. 8896 lacked the legal competence and validity to consider any applications for the re-advertised vacancy for the position of the Auditor-General before the extension of its the life or to constitution afresh. Partiament should be able to allay public concerns on this issue.
- Parliament equally needs to take appropriate measures to address the transitional challenges which exist within the Public Audit Act, and which have created a void in this critical office, including a lack of substantive handover between the person vacating office and the incoming office holder. Unless this facuna is fixed, the governance challenges witnessed over the last ten months as a result of poor transition in this office will recur in future. We specifically propose an amendment to

the Public Audit Act on the proposed role of the Public Service Commission in hiring and redesigning of the Office of the Auditor General were declared unconstitutional. The Court in its judgment reiterated that the Office of the Auditor General is an independent office and any involvement by PSC would affect the independence of the OAG as previous in the Constitution. Unfortunately, the Public Service Commission has remained active in the recruitment process of the current Auditor General in violation of the Public Audit Petition No. 388/2016 judgement.



The Court in its judgment reiterated that the Office of the Auditor General is an independent office and any involvement by PSC would affect the independence of the OAG as envisioned in the Constitution. Unfortunately, the Public Service Commission has remained active in the recruitment process of the current Auditor General in violation of the Public Audit Fetition NO. 388/2016 judgment.
- 4. The Office of the Auditor General is critical in the fight against corruption, and plays an integral role in public finance management. In the absence of an independent, competent and substantive holder of office, transparency and accountability in public finance management can not be effectively realised.




We, the undersigned, are patriotic Kenyans and wish to bring to your attention salient facts concerning the Naminee for Auditor-General, Ms Nancy Janet Kabui Gethungu, which in our opinion make her unspitable for the post.

We humbly appeal to your committee to carry out thorough investigations on the same.

- That the Nominee, Ms Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu, was the Personal Assistant of the former Auditor-General Mr. Edward Ouke during the period in which the former Auditor-General faced impropriety allegations which are contained in the petition for the Removal of Auditor-General that has not been concluded by the National Assembly.
  - a). The Office of the Auditor-General violated Article 254 (1) of the Constitution which provides that as soon as practicable after the end of each. Financial Year, each commission and each holder of an independent office, SHALL submit a report to the President and to Parliament. Although the Office later submitted years later, the nominee was part of the gross violation of the Constitution.
  - b). Contrary to Article 201 (d) of the Constitution, the Office of the Auditor-General irregularly
    assigned the external audit firm other extra work to review internal control systems which
    ordinarily formed part of the external audit assignment. The external auditor was consequently
    paid an extra Kshs. 7,000,000.00
  - c). Contrary to Article 201 (d) of the Constitution, the project for partitioning the Head Office was initiated in 2012 where the consultants were paid Kshs. 25,000,000,000 but no partitioning was done therefore public funds were lost.

d) Contrary to Article 201 (d) of the Constitution, the Office of the Auditor General irregularly produced the audit vault software at a cost of Kans. 100,678,689,900. Του (syne,is STILL) pendyn





court where two officials of the Office of the Auditor General have been charged and many other issues.

Given that these irregularities occurred at a time when Ms Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu was the Personal Assistant to the Auditor-General, and that she was fully aware of them and failed to raise an issue, can the general public then trust her with the affairs of handling public funds? The answer is definitely a Big NO.

- 2. That according to Section 5 (1) of the Public Audit Act 2005, a person shall be deemed as qualified for appointment as the Auditor General if such person is a practicing member of good standing of a professional body of accountants recognised by law. However, the nominae DOES NOT meet this criteria as shalls not a practicing member of good standing due to the following:
- 5) Section 18 (1) of the Accountants Act provides that NO person shall practice as an accountant unless he or she is the holder of a practicing certificate and a license to practice that are in force. The Annual license is issued under Section 22 of the Accountants Act after meeting certain criteria. The Nominee DOES NOT hold the Annual Practicing License for the year 2020 as required by the Accountants Act and therefore she IS NOT of good standing with the professional body as a practicing member.
- 3. That the nominea has not conducted any financial audit in the Office of the Auditor-General since she was employed in that office in 2006. If the CORE mandate of the Office of the Auditor-General under Article 229 of the Constitution is to audit the accounts of public entities, county governments and notional government, how can she be entrusted with the SOLE DUTY to AUDIT and REPORT within six months after the end of each Financial Year.
- 4. From the above it is clear the nominee does not qualify for the position.
  We hambly remind you that when the nominee first sought to head the Kenye National Audit.
  Office (KENAO), the selection panel headed by seasoned accountant Sammy Gryango returned a verdict that she lacked the diplomacy and tact to handle the duties ahead. We are convinced your committee will reach a similar verdict once you do due diligence.

THE REPORT OF THE PANEL ON THE SELECTION OF NOMINEES FOR APPOINTMENT AS AUDITOR: GENERAL

JUNE, 2020

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The office of the Auditor-General fell vacant on 27\* August, 2019 following the expiry of term of the then holder. Pursuant to Section 11 (2) of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and vide Kenya Gezette Vol., CXXI - No 111 (Gezette Notice No 8004) dated 27\* August, 2019, H. E. The President dedared a vacancy in the office of Auditor General and simultaneously invited applications from qualified persons.

The position of the Auditor-General was advantised in accordance with the law and the recruitment process commerced. This initial recruitment was however not successful thereby necessitating the re-advertisement of the position. Consequently, the vacancy in the office of the Auditor-General was re-advertised on 17th December. 2019 as required by law, with 30th December, 2019 being the deadline for submission of applications.

On 17\* April, 2020, IH.E. The President through Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXII-No 68 appointed a Selection Panel for purposes of considering the applications for the readvertised vacancy and selecting at least three persons qualified for appointment as Auditor – General.

The Selection Panel was inaugurated on 22<sup>rd</sup> April, 2020 and commenced the recruitment exercise. The Panel developed a shortlisting criteria which was subsequently used to shortlist suitable applicants. Ten applicants out of the 64 were shortlisted for the Interview. The Selection Panel subsequently published the names of all applicants, those shortlisted and their Interview schedules in the Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXII dated 15<sup>th</sup> May, 2020 (Gazette Notice No. 3542). The names of the shortlisted candidates were also published in the Dally Nation of 19<sup>th</sup> May, 2020. The interviews were conducted on the 2<sup>rd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> June, 2020 at the Public Service Commission.

Upon conclusion of the interviews, the Panel selected the following three persons who are qualified for appointment as Auditor-General:

- CPA Nancy Janet Kabui Gathungu
- 2. CPA Silverstor Ngel Kiini
- 3. FCPA Benson Ochleng Okundi

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#### 1.0 Preamble

Pursuant to Article 229 (I) of the Constitution, the Office of the Auditor – General is treated as an Independent Office. The holder of the Office is nominated by the President, and with the approval of the National Assembly, appointed by the President. The minimum qualifications for a person to be considered for appointment to that position are set out in Article 229 (2). Article 250 (3) of the Constitution and Section 5(1) of The Public Audit Act, 2015. Article 229 (3) stipulates that the Auditor – General shall hold office for a term of eight (6) years and shall not be eligible for re-appointment.

#### 1.1 Qualifications for Appointment

Article 229 (2) of the Constitution and Section 5 (1) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, provides that for a person to be qualified for appointment as Auditor - General, one should:

- (a) be a citizen of Kenya:
- (b) have extensive knowledge of public finance, or at least ten (10) years' experience in auditing or public financial management;
- (c) hold a degree in finance, accounting or economics from a university recognized in Kerrya;
- (d) meet the requirements of chapter six; and
- (a) be a prectiding member in good standing of a professional body of accountants recognized by law.

A person is not eligible for appointment as the Auditor - General if such person-

- lat is a member of Parliament or County Assembly.
- (b) is an official of a governing body of a political party;
- (c) is an undischarged bankrupt;
- (d) has been removed from office for contravention of any law.

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#### 1.2 Dodg PDF Compressor Free Version

The office of the Auditor – General feil vacant on the 27th August, 2019 following the expiry of term of the holder. Consequently, and in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 11 (2) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, H.E. The President of the Republic of Kenya and Commander - In - Chief of the Defense Forces vide Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXI - No 111 (Gezette Notice No 8004) dated 27th August 2019 declared a vacancy in the position of the Auditor - General (Annex 1). The President vide the same Gazette Notice invited applications from suitably qualified persons for the position of the Auditor - General.

#### 1.3 Re-advertisement of the Office of Auditor-General.

The vacancy in the office of the Auditor-General was re-advertised in the Daily Nation and The Star of 17th December, 2019 (Annex 2). It was further advertised in NTV, KBC Television, KBC English Channel and the Citizen Radio (Annex 2A and 2B sespectively). This advert was also uploaded on the Public Service Commission website <a href="https://www.publicervipe.go.ke">www.publicervipe.go.ke</a> and prospective applicants given the opportunity to apply by 5.00pm of 30th December, 2019.

The prospective applicants were required to submit their applications to The Secretary/ Chief Executive Officer, Public Service Commission of P. O. Box 30095-00100 Natrobi, or electronically to <u>auditor-general@publicservice.go.ke</u> by 5.00pm on the 30<sup>th</sup> December, 2019.

The re-advertised vacancy in the office of the Auditor - General attracted 64 applicants from the public and private sectors. (Annex 2C).

Upon re-advertising the vacancy in the office of the Auditor-General, a court case was filed challenging, *inter alla*, the legality of the Selection Panel to consider the fresh applications and public participation. The Court in its decision dated 12° March. 2020, found that the initial Selection Fanel lecked the legal competence to act on or process the requirement arising from the re-advertisement. The Court further found that the redultment process was substantially in compliance with the tensts of public participation.

#### 1.4 Selection Panel

H.E The President pursuant to Section 11 (5) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, constituted the Selection Panel vide Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXII-No 68 dated 17\* April, 2020 for purposes.

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of considering the applications for the re-advertised vacancy and selecting at least three persons qualified for appointment as Auditor – General. (Annex 3).

The Selection Panel was inaugurated by the Chairman, Public Service Commission on Wednesday, 22<sup>-4</sup> April, 2020 and proceeded to hold its first meeting on the same day.

#### 2.0 The Shortlisting Criteria

The Selection Panel, drawing from Article 229 of the Constitution and the Public Audit Act, 2015 developed and approved the offerta to be applied in shortlisting applicants for the re-advertised position of the office Auditor-General.

A person qualifier for appointment as Auditor-General if he/she-

- a) is a Citizen of Kenya;
- b) has extensive knowledge of public finance, or at least ten (10) years' experience in auditing or public finance management;
- holds a degree in finance, accounting or economics from a university recognized in Kenya;
- d) is a practicing member in good standing of professional body of accountants recognized by law and
- e) meets the requirements of Chapter Six of the Constitution.

In order to independently satisfy itself that the applicants met the requirements of Chapter Six of the Constitution, the Selection Penel sought dicarances, for shortlisted candidates from the following institutions:

- (i) Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission;
- (II) Directorate of Criminal Investigations:
- (iii) Higher Education Loans Board:
- (v) Commission for University Education:
- (v) Kenya Revenue Authority; and
- (vi) Institute of Certified Public Accountants of Kenya (ICPAK).

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# 2.1 Shortlishing of Compressor Free Version

Using the criteria set out in Part 2.0 above, the Sciection Panel embarked on the shortlisting exercise and ten (10) applicants were shortlisted.

The Selection Panel subsequently published the names of all applicants, those shortlisted and their interview dates in the Kerrya Gazette Vol. CXXII-No. 87 (Gazette Notice 3542) of 15th May 2020. (Annex 4). The same information was also upleaded on the Public Service Commission website <a href="https://www.publicgevice.go.ke">www.publicgevice.go.ke</a>.

The names of those shortlisted and their interview dates were also published in the Daily Nation of 19th May, 2020 and further uploaded on the Public Service Commission Website. (Annex 5.) Members of the public were invited to make submissions in writing to the Selection Panel. This was to satisfy the requirement of public participation as provided for by law and in keeping with the decision of the Court in the earlier patition.

The shortlisted candidates were informed of their interview dates by small, telephone calls and print media while administrative arrangements were made to facilitate their travel for interviews (Annex 6),

Following the outbreak of the novel COVID -19 pandemic and the Public Health Regulations introduced to curb the spread of the disease including social distancing and restricted gatherings, it was not possible to allow actual physical presence of members of the public into the Interviews (Akmex 7).

#### 3.0 The Interview Process

An interview tool was developed for use during the interview by the Selection Panel (Annex B).

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# 3.1 The Interviews

The ton (10) shortlisted candidates were interviewed on the  $2^{-s}$  and  $3^{-s}$  June. 2020 at the Public Service Commission. The following is the performance and ranking of the ten (10) applicants;

The Penel was (unched by the Public Service Commission on 1st October, 2019. The position of Abrillar General attracted seventy (70) applicants of whom fifty nine (59) were men and eleven (11) women. Upon reviewing applications and applying the shortlisting criteria developed by the Panel, seventeen (17) applicants were shortlisted for interview. The seventeen (17) comprised fifteen (15) men and two (2) women. The interviews were conducted from 22st to 25th October, 2019 at the Commission House.

The Panel adopted a score of 70% as the pass mark. Applicants who not this threshold were to be subjected to psychometric test before identifying the three to be selected for appointment as Auditor – General.

After concluding the interviews, the applicants' marks were aggregated and averaged. This formed the basis of their ranking. Table A in the following page shows the ranking of the applicants.

From the rapidity shown in Table A. Three West Muchold emerged as the secure of 75.6%, followed by Mr. David Obwaya. Giohana and Ms. Nancy Kabul Gathungu with mean scores of 67% and 62.2% respectively. Mr. Muchoki was however, disqualified by virtue of his not being in good standing with ICPAK as well as not having a valid practicing certificate from the institution.

Though Section 11(5) of the Act requires the Panel to select at least three persons for nomination and appointment as Auditor — Coneral, and based on its observations, the Panel is of the view that the remaining top three applicants as shown in Table B do not meet the expectations of the position of Auditor - General.

In view of the foregoing, therefore, the Pane) determined that it is unable to select at least three persons qualified for appointment as Auditor - General.

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#### 1.0 Preamble

Pursuant to Article 229 (1) of the Constitution, the Office of the Auditor—General is created as an independent Office and the holder of the Office shall be nominated by the President, and with the approval of the National Assembly becappointed by the President. Article 229 (2) and Article 250 (3) read together with Section 5(1) of the Public Audit Act, 2016 spell out the minimum qualifications for a person to be considered for appointment. Article 229 (3) further stipulates that the Auditor—General shall hold Office for a term of eight (8) years and shall not be eligible for re-appointment.

#### 1.1 Declaration of Vacancy

The Office of the Auditor – General fell vacant on 27th August, 2019 following the capity of term of the first halder. Consequently, and in Exercise of the powers conferred by Section 11 (2) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, the President of the Republic of Kenya and Commander - In - Chief of the Defence Forces vide Kenya Gazette Vol. CXXI - No 111 (Gazette Notice No 8004) dated 27th August 2019 declared vacancy in the Office of the Auditor - General (Annex 1). The President vide the same Gazette Notice invited applications from suitably qualified persons for the position.

The vacancy of the Office of the Auditor - General was also advertised in the Deily Nation and The Standard of Friday, 30th August, 2019 (Annex 2A and 2B). Further, the position was advertised in the Nation Media Television (NTV), Konya Dreadcasting Corporation Television, KBC (English Service) and Citizen Radio. (Annex 3) The advertisement was also upleaded on the Public Service Commission website.

The President shall constitute a Selection Panel for the purposes of considering the applicants and selecting at least three persons qualified for appointment as Auditor - General in accordance with Section 11 (5) of the Public Audit Act, 2015.

#### 1.2 Mode of Application

The prospective applicants were required to submit their applications to the Secretary, Public Service Commission of P. O. Box 30095-00100 Nairobi. They were also advised to apply online via small to <u>sudiforgeneral Zeriblicservice.go.ke</u> so as to teach by 5.00pm of Monday, 9th October,

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# 2.0 Qualifications for Appointment PDF Compressor Free Version

As per Article 239 (2) of the Constitution and Section 5 (1) of the Public Audit Act, 2015, to be qualified for appointment as Auditor - General, a person is required to --

- (a) he a citizen of Kenya;
- (b) have extensive knowledge of public finance, or at least ten (10) years' experience in auditing or public financial management;
- (c) hold a degree in finance, accounting or economics from a university recognized in Kenya;
- (d) most the requirements of chapter six; and
- (c) be a practicing member in good standing of a professional body of accountants recognized by law.

A person is not eligible for appointment as the Auditor - General if such person-

- (a) is a member of Parliament or County Assembly;
- (b) is an official of a governing body of a political party;
- (c) is an undischarged bankrupt;
- (d) has been removed from office for contravention of any law.

# 3.0 Advertisement and Response for Position of Auditor - General

The position altracted 76 applicants - 59 men and 11 women from all over the country as shown in (Annex 4).

#### 4.0 Constitution of the Selection Panel

In compliance with Section 11 (5) the Public Audit Act, 2015 and vide Kenya Gazette Vol., CXXI — No 125 (Gazette Notice No 8896) dated 20th September, 2019, H.E. The President appointed the Panel for Selection of Nominees for Appointment as Auditor – General (Annex 5). The Panel comprised of

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### 6.1 Shortlisting Criteria

The Panel, as guided by the Constitution and the Public Audit Act, 2015, "filsenssed and agreed on a short-lating criteria on provided for Section 5(1) of the constitution Audit Act, 2015 (Annex 6).

All other criteria subject to due diligence were considered at the interview stage.

#### 6.2 Shortilsted Applicants

On applying the agreed shortlisting criteria, 17 candidates (15 men, 2 women) were shortlisted and scheduled for the interview as shown in (Annex 7).

### 5.3 Publication in Kenya Gazette and Print Media

Kenya Cazette Vol. CXXI - No 34 [Gazette Notice No. 9532] dated Friday, 11th October, 2019 (Annex 7A) listed all applicants. Those shortlisted and their interview schedules were also published in the People Daily of Tuesday, 15th October, 2019 (Annex 7B) and further upleaded on the Public Service Commission website www.publicservice.go.ice. The applicants were also reached out through formal invitation letters for interview, phone calls and qualifing.

The shortlisted applicants were required to present their original identity cards, academic and professional curtificates as well as clearances from HELB, EACC, KRA, CRB and ICPAK during the interviews.

#### 6.4. Public Participation

The Panel invited, through the publication of the shortlist incinorantia on any of the shortlisted applicants. By the close of the Memorandum submission window, none-had been received. No member of public turned up to witness the interview.

#### 7.0 Preparation of Interview Tools

The Office of the Auditor - General plays a central role in the management of public finance in Kenya and therefore the Panel set out to recruit the best applicant for the Office. Such as a person should be professionally qualified, of

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high integrity and have a broad approxiation of the principles of independence and interdependence of the three arms of Occurrences.

The questionnaire was therefore designed to assess the breadth of leadership of the candidates. In addition, it sought to know and assess the applicant's vision of the Office of the Auditor - General and any innovative ideas towards enhanced service delivery. The Questionnaire also tested the applicants' interpersonal skills, decisiveness, independence, diplomacy, high integrity among staff to drive a high performance culture. The Questionnaire was structured into eight (8) sections as follows-

This Questionnaire is attached as Annex 8 and shows the weights assigned to the various questions including the Panelists administering them.

#### 8.0 The Interviews

The interviews were conducted from 22<sup>nd</sup> October – 25<sup>th</sup> October, 2019 at Commission House. The Panel adopted a score of 70% as pass mark. Applicants who met this threshold were to be subjected to psychometric test before selecting the three to qualify for appointment.

During the interviews, the Panel verified the original scademic and professional certificates and other testimonials required including clearances from HELS, FACC CRR KRA and ICRAK

EACC, CRE, KRA and ICPAK

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#### 9.0 The Panel Observations and Recommendations PDF Compressor Free Version

Upon the concluding the interviews, the Panel observed that only one person, Mr. David Kanja; met the threshold of 70% pass mark. However, he was disqualified by virtue of his not being in good standing with ICPAK as well as not having a valid practicing certificate from the institution.

The rest of the applicants interviewed did not meet the required threshold of 70% pass mark, and as such the Panel is unable to recommend them for appointment to the Office of the Auditor General. On this basis, the Panel's conclusion is that it has not found suitable applicants to select as required by law. The scoring for each of the applicant is as tabulated in the following matrix.

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#### 10.0 Emerging Issues

During the Auditor - "General's recruitment process, the Panel made some observations as follows:

#### 10.1 Harmonization of the applicable laws

The Pane) observed that the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Audit Act and the Accountants Act, as regards the qualification of the Auditor General, were not become also as the Constitution vide Article 229 (2) states that

To be qualified to be the Auditor General, a person shall have extensive innovilaign of public finance or at least ten years' experience in auditing or public finance management.

Article 250 (3) further supulates requirement for appointment into a Commission or an Independent Office such as the one of the Auditor – General' and states that-

To be appointed, a person shall have the specific qualifications required by this Constitution or national legislation.

The Accountants Act goes shead in Section 18 and requires that the Auditor General be a "practicing member in good standing" with the Accountant's institution, ICPAK. Section 19 of the Accountant's Act exempts public different from the requirement of holding a practicing certificate. Based on this understanding, the Public Audit Act should have recognized this.

These multiple provisions need to be harmonized, so that the implication that statute is imposing more onerous qualifications over what is alkowed in the Constitution is rectified.

#### 10.2 Additional Recommendation

The Panel also recommends that the requirements for one to become the Auditor General should include the specific requirements that one must have extensive External Audit experience at a senior level.

The Constitution should also be amended to require the applicant to have extensive experience both in auditing AND in public fusing management, rather their either of them. Extensive experience in both is necessary in the effective execution of the Auditor - General's mandate.

The Public Audit Act also did not take into account circumstances in which the Selection Papel may not have suitable applicants to recommend for appointment.

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The Range Procumptes so Tree Version Act should allow the Panel of recommend for re-adjusticement

# 10.3. Removal of Gap in the Auditor - General's Office

The Panel observed that a gap exists in this Office in the absence of the substantive holder or an acting holder requiring the review of the relevant law to provide for

- i) Declaration for the upcoming vacuum in the Office by the President at least raree months prior to the expiration of the term of the Augusta General. The President should further proceed to appoint a Selection Panel to nominate three Candidates for the position of the Auditor General.
- ii) The President to appoint an acting Auditor General to hold Office for not more than 90 days in the event that the term of Office for the substantive holder ends before the Selection Panel completes the selection process.
- ii) The acting appointment may be renewed only once.
