

CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

The petition was conveyed to the house on Tuesday, March, 30th, 2021. This is in accordance with the provisions of Standing Order No. 225 (2) (a). The Petition relates to the compensation for the family of the late Nancy Kharwali following the court award in Nairobi CMCC No.2025 of 2013 filed by Mr. John Musotsi Wangusi, as the legal representative and administrator of the estate of Nancy Sarah Kharwali, against the Hon.Attorney General.

The Petition was referred to the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs for consideration and thereafter report to the House.

In considering the Petition, the Committee, during its sitting, held on Wednesday 21st July, 2021 met with the petitioner Mr. John Musotsi Wangusi. The meeting was aimed at inquiring into the issues raised in the Petition. The Committee wrote to the Solicitor General for comments on the Petition and received response.

May I take this opportunity to express gratitude to Committee Members for their resilience and devotion to duty which made the consideration of the Bill successful. May I also appreciate the Speaker and Clerk of National Assembly for always providing guidance and direction to Committees in the discharge of their mandate. Finally, I commend the secretariat for exemplary performance in providing technical and logistical support to the Committee.

1.0 PREFACE

1.1 Mandate of the Committee

CHAPTER TWO

2.0 CONSIDERATION OF THE PETITION BY THE COMMITTEE

6. The Committee commenced its consideration of the Petition by meeting with the Petitioner on 21st July, 2021. During the meeting, written and oral evidence was adduced as noted hereunder:-

2.1 Submissions by the Petitioner Mr. John Musotsi Wangusi

- 7. In his petition dated 29th July, 2021, Mr. John Musotsi Wangusi sought to draw the attention of the House to the following;
 - (i). THAT,Ms.Nancy Sarah Kharwali was shot and killed by police officers on 22nd April, 2012 while washing clothes on the balcony of her residence on the 5th floor of Elino House in Dandora Phase 4,Nairobi, during an attempt by the police to control a riotous mob nearby.
 - (ii). THAT, following the incident, the uncle to Ms. Kharwali and who also serves as the administrator *ad litem* of her estate, namely John Musotsi Wangusi, filed civil Case No.2025 of 2013 seeking compensation for the wrongful killing.
 - (iii). THAT, on 16th May, 2019,the Milimani Commercial Court ruled that the police officers were culpable of gross negligence and awarded the family of the late Ms. Nancy Kharwali compensation totaling Ksh.3,325,200 and later issued a decree on 17th July, 2019 with added interest that increased the total award to Ksh.3,618,857.20.
 - (iv). THAT, to date, the Attorney General has failed to honour and effect the payment despite numerous reminders by the deceased's family.
 - (v). THAT, the late Ms. Kharwali who was the sole breadwinner, left behind a son (Erick Otieno) and a mother (Elizabeth Naliaka) who is single, deaf and dumb, and who are now suffering from abject poverty and misery, with the young Erick being unable to join college due to lack of college fees.
 - (vi). THAT, efforts to have the matter resolved by the Office of the Attorney General have not borne any fruit.

(vii). The Petitioner prays that the National Assembly through the Departmental Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs investigates the matter in collaboration with the Office of the Attorney General, the urgent release of the compensation payment due to the family of the late Ms. Nancy Sarah Kharwali so as to mitigate their ongoing suffering.

2.2 Comments by the Office of the Attorney General and Department of Justice

- 8. The Office of the Attorney General and Department of Justice appeared before the Committee and made oral submissions on the petition during the committee sitting on 21st July 2021. Further, the Solicitor General made written submissions to the committee that;
 - (i). The plaintiff filed the suit against the Attorney General as the legal representative and administrator of the estate of Nancy Sarah Kharwali. The plaintiff sued the Hon.Attorney General on behalf of the National Police Service, seeking damages for a fatal shooting. The facts of the case were that on 22nd April, 2012, the deceased was in Dandora Area, when a police officer shot her without justified cause or provocation. The plaintiff alleged carelessness, negligence and use of excessive force by the National Police Service.
 - (ii). The Office of the Attorney General sought instructions from the National Police Service in order to defend the matter as appropriate. The matter subsequently proceeded by way of viva voce evidence, where the evidence of the plaintiff was subjected to cross-examination.
 - (iii). Judgement was delivered on 16th May 2019, with the court finding that the police officers were negligent by shooting at the plaintiff who was at the balcony of her house without paying attention and due regard to the occupants of the said houses and as a consequence, a stray bullet hit the deceased and killed her. The court held the Defendant 100% liable for the negligence of the police officers.
 - (iv). In terms of compensation, the court found that the deceased was aged 34 years and was working with the Kenya Bus Service as a conductor, earning Ksh.15,000/= per month. In assessing the quantum payable, the court applied a multiplier of 26 years and dependency ratio of 2/3 since the deceased had a family. The Plaintiff was thus awarded Ksh.180, 000/= for damages under the Law Reform Act, Ksh.3, 120,000/= for loss of dependency and Ksh.25, 200/= for special damages. This was in addition to costs of the suit and interest on the damages from the date of Judgement until payment in full.

- (v). The Plaintiff obtained a Certificate of Stated Costs dated 17th July, 2019 for the sum of Kshs.216, 805/=, being costs of the suit. The Plaintiff also obtained a Certificate of Order against the Government dated 17th July, 2019 in the sum of Kshs.3,402,045.20/=.
- (vi). Following the Judgement, the Attorney General filed an application for stay of execution and for leave to appeal out of time on 5th August, 2019. The application was dismissed on 29th October 2019.
- (vii). That in the circumstances, and in order to bring the matter to a close, the Solicitor General has written to the Principal Secretary, State Department for Interior and Citizen Services to settle the decretal amount in the sum of Kshs.4,458,120.30/=.

CHAPTER THREE

3.0 COMMITTEE'S OBSERVATIONS

- 9. The Committee observed the following in the consideration of the Petition, that-
 - (i). Ms.Nancy Sarah Kharwali was shot and killed by police officers on 22nd April, 2012 while washing clothes on the balcony of her residence on the 5th floor of Elino House in Dandora Phase 4,Nairobi, during an attempt by the police to control a riotous mob nearby.
 - (ii). THAT, following the incident, the petitioner, Mr. John Musotsi Wangusi, who is an uncle to Ms. Kharwali and also serves as the administrator *ad litem* of her estate, filed Civil Case No.2025 of 2013 seeking compensation for the wrongful killing.
 - (iii). THAT, on 16th May, 2019,the Milimani Commercial Court ruled that the police officers were culpable of gross negligence and awarded the family of the late Ms. Nancy Kharwali compensation totaling Ksh.3,325,200 and later issued a decree on 17th July, 2019 with added interest that increased the total award to Ksh.3,618,857.20.
 - (iv). THAT, to date, the Attorney General has failed to honour and effect the payment despite numerous reminders by the deceased's family.
 - (v). That the Solicitor General has written a letter to the Principal Secretary, State Department for Interior and Citizen Services to settle the decretal amount in the sum of Kshs.4,458,120.30/=.

CHAPTER FOUR

4.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

In response to the prayers by the petitioner, the Committee recommends that;

- (a) The Principal Secretary, State Department for Interior and Citizen Services settles the decretal amount in the sum of **Kshs.4,458,120.30**/= as decreed by the Court in Civil Case No.2025 of 2013 *John Musotsi Wangusi versus Attorney General*, within sixty (60) days from the date of Tabling this Report in the National Assembly;
- (b) If the Principal Secretary, State Department for Interior and Citizen Services fails to pay the decretal sum as recommended by the Committee under paragraph (a) of these recommendations, the issue should be brought to the attention of the Committee on Implementation for necessary action.







- 3. JOHN MUSOTSI L. WANGUSI (Suing as the Administrator Ad Litem of the estate of the Late Nancy Sarah Kharwali) VS. THE HON. ATTORNEY GENERAL

The Plaintiff, by way of a Plaint dated 17th April 2013 and filed on the same day, sued the Attorney General seeking damages for fatal shooting. The Plaintiff instituted the suit as the legal representative and administrator of the estate of Nancy Sarah Kharwali, while the Attorney General was sued in his representative capacity for and on behalf of the National Police Service in accordance with the provisions of the Government Proceedings Act.

The facts of the case were that on 22nd April 2012, the deceased was in Dandora Area when a police officer allegedly shot her without justified cause of provocation. The Plaintiff prayed for damages with interest and for easts of the suit.

The Attorney General entered appearance and filed a statement of defence in the matter. The Ministry was notified of the claim vide the letters dated 23rd November 2012, 11th September 2013 and 15th August 2017.

Judgement was delivered on 16th May 2019, with the court finding that the police officers were negligent by shooting at the Plaintiff who was at the balcony of her house without paying attention and due regard to the occupants of the said houses and as a consequence, a stray bullet hit the deceased and killed her. The court held the Defendant 100% liable for the negligence of the police officers.

In terms of the compensation, the court found that the deceased was aged 34 years and was working with the Kenya Bus Service as a conductor, earning Kshs. 15,000/= per month. In assessing the quantum payable, the court applied a multiplier of 26 years and dependency ratio of 2/3 since the deceased had a family. The Plaintiff was thus awarded Kshs. 180,000/=

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for damages under the Law Reform Act, Kshs. 3,120,000/= for loss of dependency and Kshs. 25,200/= for special damages. This was in addition to costs of the suit and interest on the damages from the date of judgement until payment in full.

The Plaintiff obtained a Certificate of Stated Costs dated 17^{th} July 2019 for the sum of Kshs. 216,805/=, being costs of the Suit. The Plaintiff also obtained a Certificate of Order against the Government dated 17^{th} July 2019 in the sum of Kshs. 3,402,045.20/=.

Following the judgment, we filed an application for stay of execution and for leave to appeal out of time on 5th August 2019. The application was dismissed on 29th October 2019.
