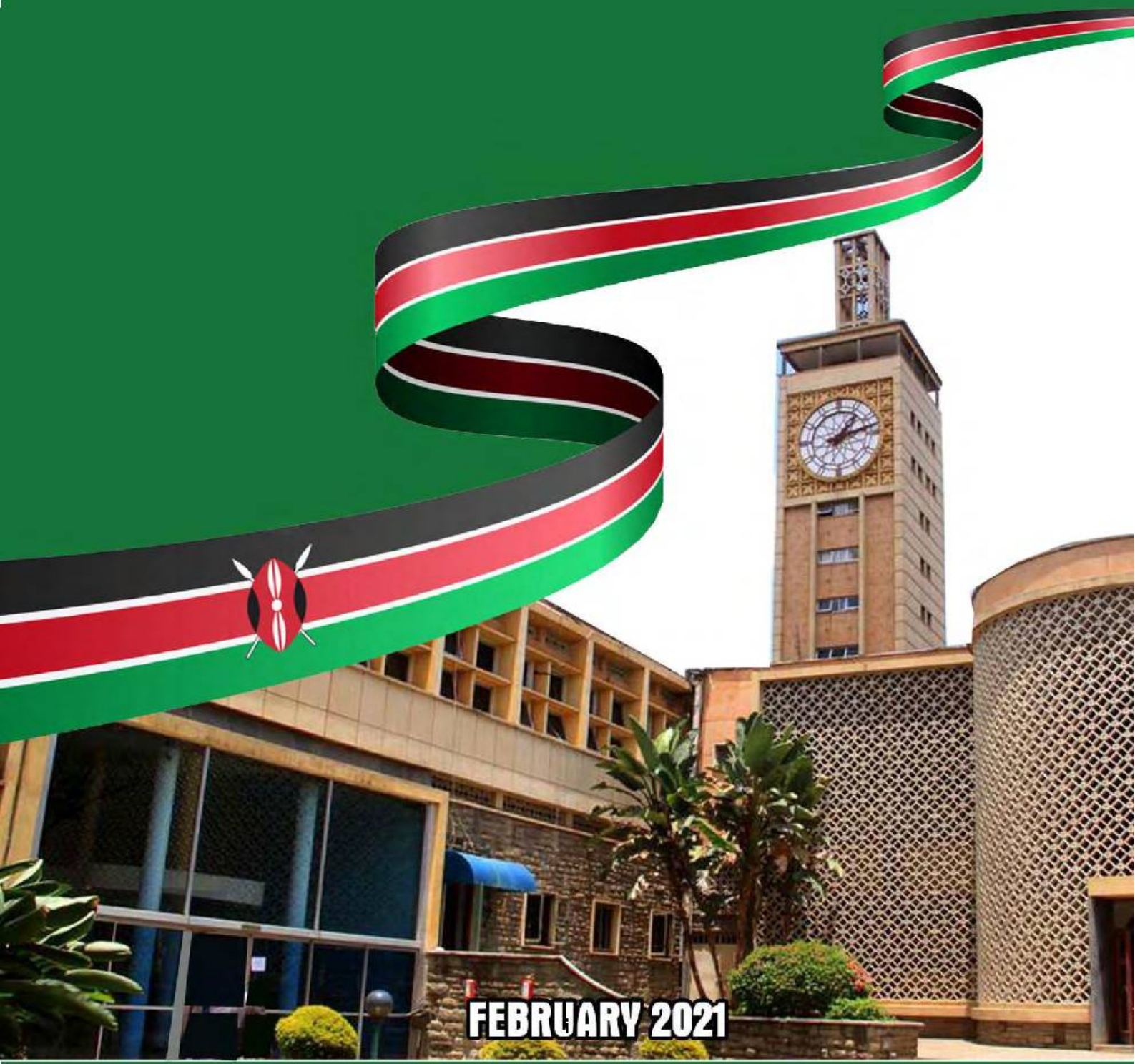

**PREFACE**

I have great pleasure in presenting this Report of the Fourth Session of the National Assembly of the Twelfth Parliament detailing the business transacted during the year 2020. The National Assembly facilitated the attainment of the strategic objectives of the Parliamentary Service Commission particularly under the Pillar on Effective Representation, Legislation and Oversight with its attendant strategic objectives to improve the process of representation, legislation and oversight as well as to strengthen the capacity of Members of Parliament to execute their constitutional mandate.

Activities of the National Assembly outlined in the Report include consideration and passage of Bills; adoption of Motions; addressing procedural questions; making resolutions on various issues; consideration of Questions from Members; Petitions from the public on various issues of concern; adoption of Committee Reports; vetting of nominees to state and public offices; communications from the Speaker and the consideration and adoption of national policies emanating from the Executive contained in Sessional Papers and Statutory Instruments, among others. The Report also highlights activities relating to consideration and passage of the national budget, and the ratification of agreements, conventions, treaties and protocols amidst the Corona Virus Disease - 2019 (Covid-19) pandemic, that necessitated the National Assembly to change the way it carried out its business.

Relating to the Covid-19 and attendant challenges, I am pleased that the National Assembly confronted the new circumstances innovatively by putting in place necessary procedural changes to enable business continuity. The changes included



ensuring social distancing, maintaining personal hygiene, especially hand washing and/or sanitizing, meeting virtually (for committees) and reduction of sitting days while lengthening sitting hours to enable completion of scheduled business. While the threat of the Covid-19 pandemic still remains, I note with appreciation that the House is well prepared to carry on with business.

This Report is meant to provide Members of Parliament, Parliamentary Staff, various stakeholders and the public with information on the work and activities of the National Assembly during the Fourth Session of the 12<sup>th</sup> Parliament February 2020 – 2021). It is my belief that you the reader will find it resourceful.

Lastly, I appreciate the Parliamentary Service Commission, the Office of the Speaker and Leadership Offices for their support. I also acknowledge the work and dedication of the Staff led by the Directors and Heads of Units who worked tirelessly for the success of the House and endured the challenges presented by the Covid-19 pandemic. I commend the Staff for adapting to the new normal by embracing new work practices to ensure the work of the House continued without interruption.

I also wish to extend special thanks to the Directorate of Legislative and Procedural Services for compiling these important materials and coordinating all activities relating to the production of this report.

I look forward to a productive Fifth Session and I wish Members fruitful deliberations, good health and God's blessings.

## FOREWORD BY THE SPEAKER

I am pleased to make my commentary on this report, which details the business transacted by the National Assembly during the Fourth Session of the Twelfth Parliament, covering the period between February 13, 2020 and February 08, 2021. As you may be aware, the core mandate of Parliament of passing laws, appropriation of resources, oversight and representation are essential for the implementation and attainment of the national goals. In carrying out their mandate, the Members who are the representatives of the people, have a constitutional obligation to ensure and guarantee participatory and equitable development in the country.



I am gratified that the National Assembly endeavoured to live up to this billing amidst the challenges presented by the global Covid-19 pandemic that started being experienced in the country in March, 2020. I am also glad that during the mid-term of the 12<sup>th</sup> Parliament, characterised by the unprecedented disruption to the operations of the House occasioned by Covid-19 pandemic, the National Assembly made new adaptations to its operations and altered its procedures and ways of carrying out business. I note with appreciation that during the threat of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Leadership of the National Assembly under stewardship, took several measures to mitigate the spread of the virus. Some of these measures included the limitation of the number of Members accessing the Chamber at any one time; the designation of holding-areas for Members; the adoption of virtual sittings for Committees where applicable, as well as creation of teams and working-from-home measures for Members of staff. Several voluntary testing sessions were conducted within Parliament in liaison with the Ministry of Health guidelines.

It is worth noting that though the measures taken to contain the spread of Covid-19 made it difficult for our legislature to operate optimally, the National Assembly still achieved and superceded its targets for the Fourth Session. We had, at times to accommodate the



departure from our rules of procedure, just like in many jurisdictions across the Commonwealth fraternity, where demand for physical presence is the norm to make resolutions. I commend the Leadership of the House for initiating mechanisms to enable the National Assembly and Members to discharge their constitutional responsibilities without being exposed to Covid-19.

The new environment also necessitated the progressive realignment of our rules of procedure to match the emerging realities posed by the Pandemic.

In this regard, I am grateful that the Procedure and House Rules Committee moved with speed to propose changes to the National Assembly Standing Orders to provide for virtual conduct of parliamentary business. Consequently, we were able to initially have a virtual Parliament, and progressively hybrid sittings, through institution of a robust business continuity plan for the National Assembly. This set us on the path as a trail-blazer Parliament in the sub-Saharan Africa, with many regional jurisdictions following suit.

As captured in this report, during the period under review, the National Assembly continued to play its role in facilitating the implementation of our national agenda by appropriating resources, while oversighting the Executive, the Judiciary and Independent Government Agencies. The House also complemented the Executive by expeditiously approving measures sought with regard to the National Emergency Response to the Coronavirus pandemic by approving the statutory instruments issued under the Public Health Act, and the State interventions to cushion Kenyans against the adverse economic effects of the Covid-19 Pandemic including legislation on tax breaks.

During the Session, the National Assembly also considered and duly approved nominees presented to the House by the Executive for consideration for appointment to various state and public offices including Members of Constitutional Commissions, Ambassadors & High Commissioners, among others.

Notably, the Session witnessed an increased number of Members' individual legislative proposals (commonly known as Private Members' Bills), Motions, Questions, Statements and Petitions. Instructively, the Session recorded increased vigour in the debates of the House with some Members creating a niche in their areas of specialization through debate in the House. This is a reflection of the Members' acknowledgment that they represent a citizenry with an insatiable interest for improved accountability and good governance. This is a key ingredient in ensuring that lawmakers remain to be the true crusaders of the will of the people.

I note with appreciation that the Parliament of Kenya continued embrace of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) recommended benchmarks for democratic legislatures which provide a framework for excellence in Commonwealth Parliamentary and Legislative Practice. It is gratifying that, a CPA Benchmark assessment undertaken towards the end of the Fourth Session and covering the Parliament of Kenya, South Africa, Malaysia, Belize, Uganda, Tanzania, St Lucia, Pakistan, Grenada, The Gambia, and Ghana. Kenya was ranked highly, with a score of over 80%, which was a good indicator of our compliance with democratic ideals and good performance of our Parliament.

Against the great strides made by the National Assembly during the Fourth Session, the Session was characterised by continuous jostling over the mandates of the two Houses, characteristic of bicameralism. Consequently, the High Court in Constitutional Petition No. 284 of 2019, as consolidated with Constitutional Petition No. 353 of 2019 (issued amongst other orders) made an order for cessation of consideration of all pending Bills in both Houses of Parliament until the requirement of Article 110(3) of the Constitution is first fulfilled. The Judgement also contained other related declaratory orders that had direct implication on the legislative work of the House towards the end of the Fourth Session. Towards this end, we have since proposed that the two Houses explore the idea of co-sponsorship of Bills as a means of easing the sibling rivalry that has characterized our bicameral Parliament for the last eight years.

Also, at the core of unresolved challenges carried over successive Sessions was the issue of the two-thirds gender rule and the role of Parliament in implementing it. It is common knowledge that the House has for the umpteenth time unsuccessfully attempted to pass legislation on the matter. The resultant action was the advisory by the Chief Justice to the President to dissolve Parliament for its failure to enact legislation on the gender quota. However, prior to this advisory, and in a bid to address this matter, the National Assembly had passed the Representation of Special Interest Groups Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2019, to implement Article 100 of the Constitution, which was pending before the Senate as at the end of the Session in December 2020. It is hoped that the ongoing debate on the need for constitutional reforms before the 2022 general elections will pave way for the matter to be addressed with finality.

During the Fourth Session, the clamour for some constitutional reforms started gathering momentum across the political divide. Incidentally, these developments coincided with the marking of the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010. This put the House at the centre of managing the architecture of the proposed constitutional amendments. The period also saw the introduction of two Referendum Bills, whose consideration was still ongoing by the time of the publication of this report. This agenda will comprise a section of business of the House in the 5<sup>th</sup> Session.

Sadly, during the 4<sup>th</sup> Session, the National Assembly lost three (3) Members, namely, the Members for *Msambweni*, *Matungu* and *Kabuchai* Constituencies. The three Members will be fondly remembered for their progressive contributions in the House and for their commitment and dedication in serving their respective constituents.

Finally, it is my hope that this report provides information that will aid Members of Parliament, Parliamentary staff, the public and all the stakeholders in comprehending and appreciating the work and the business of the National Assembly during the Fourth Session.

I wish to end by sincerely thanking the Staff of the National Assembly led by the Clerk, Mr. Michael Sialai, for their efforts and team work towards the successful completion of the Fourth Session.

## 1.0 CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

### 1.1. SITTINGS OF THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY



*The National Assembly during a Sitting*

The Fourth Session of the 12<sup>th</sup> Parliament commenced on Thursday, 13<sup>th</sup> February 2020. The National Assembly held eighty-six (86) sittings as per the approved Calendar of Regular Sessions, 2020 including special sittings and one (1) Joint Sitting of Parliament held on 12<sup>th</sup> November 2020 during His Excellency, the President's Address to Parliament pursuant to Article 132 of the Constitution.

Even though the Calendar of the House for the year 2020 was adopted on February 18, 2020, the House altered the calendar eight (8) times mainly to reduce the number sitting days in order to cushion the Members and staff of the National Assembly against the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic. This was -

- i. On Tuesday, March 17, 2020 - Arising from the Covid -19 pandemic in March 2020, that had spread across a number of countries with the potential of affecting a large percentage of the world's population, the House resolved to adjourn its Sittings from Wednesday, 18<sup>th</sup> March, 2020 until Tuesday, 14<sup>th</sup> April, 2020 to put up stringent

measures based on the Government Protocols and Health Guidelines and Measures that reduces the spread of the disease;

- ii. On 14<sup>th</sup> April, the House resolved to further alter its Calendar (Regular Sessions) for the Fourth Session (2020), as amended through the Resolution of the House of Tuesday, March 17, 2020 so as to-
  - a) adjourn the Sittings of the House from Wednesday, April 15, 2020;
  - b) hold other Sittings during the First Part of the Session as follows-
    - (i) Wednesday, April 22, 2020 at 10.00 a.m.;
    - (ii) Wednesday, April 29, 2020 at 10.00 a.m.;
    - (iii) Wednesday, May 6, 2020 at 10.00 a.m.; and,
  - c) resumed its sittings during the Second Part of the Session on Tuesday, June 2, 2020 at 2.30 pm as per the approved House Calendar.
- iii. On June 2, 2020, the House resolved to further alter its Calendar (Regular Sessions) for the Fourth Session (2020), as amended on Tuesday, April 14, 2020 as follows -
  - a) suspend its Sittings of Wednesdays (morning and afternoon) during the month of June, 2020 and the sitting of July 1, 2020;
  - b) hold Sittings during the month of June 2020 as follows-
    - (i) Morning and Afternoon Sittings on Tuesdays of June 9th, 16th, 23rd and 30th, 2020 commencing at 10.00 a.m. and 2.30 p.m. respectively;
    - (ii) Afternoon Sittings on Thursday, June 4th, 11th, 18th and 25th, 2020 at 2.30 p.m.;
  - c) hold an afternoon Sitting on Thursday, July 2, 2020 commencing at 2.30 p.m.
- iv. The House proceeded on a Short Recess in respect of the Second Part of the Session on Friday, July 03, 2020 and further altered the Calendar by varying the resumption date of the Short Recess from Tuesday, July 21, 2020 to Tuesday, July 28, 2020.
- v. On 28<sup>th</sup> July 2020, the House resolved to further alter its Calendar for the Fourth Session (Regular Sessions - 2020), as amended on June 2, 2020 and therefore to be proceeded as follows with respect to the Sittings of the House during the period July 30 to August 13, 2020 -
  - a) that, the House hold morning and afternoon Sittings on Thursday, July 30, 2020, commencing at 10.00 a.m. and at 2.30 p.m. respectively, thereafter, the rest of Sittings of the House of Tuesdays and Thursdays shall stand suspended; and,

b) that, with effect from Wednesday, August 5, 2020, the House hold its Sittings on Wednesdays only (Morning and Afternoon), commencing at 10.00 a.m. and at 2.30 p.m. respectively

vi. On 8<sup>th</sup> September, 2020, the House resolved to further alter its Calendar for the Fourth Session (Regular Sessions), as amended on July 28, 2020 and therefore be proceeded as follows with respect to the Sittings of the House during the period September 9 to October 15, 2020 –

(a) that, the House hold afternoon Sittings on Tuesdays commencing at 2.30 p.m., Morning and Afternoon Sittings on Thursdays commencing at 10.00 a.m. and at 2.30 p.m., respectively;

(b) that, with effect from Wednesday, September 9, 2020, the sittings of the House of Wednesdays (Morning and Afternoon) stand suspended; and,

(c) that, notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 40(3), on Thursday Mornings, business not sponsored by the Majority, the Minority Party or a Committee shall have precedence over all other business, in such order as the House Business Committee shall determine.

vii. On 3<sup>rd</sup> November, 2020, the House resolved to further alter its Calendar for the Fourth Session (Regular Sessions), as amended on September 8, 2020 and therefore ordered as follows with respect to the Sittings of the House during the period November 3 to December 3, 2020 –

a) that, the House hold –

(i) Afternoon Sittings on Tuesdays commencing at 2.30 p.m.; and

(ii) Morning and Afternoon Sittings on Thursdays commencing at 10.00 a.m. and at 2.30 p.m., respectively;

b) that, with effect from November 4, 2020, the sittings of the House of Wednesdays (Morning and Afternoon) stand suspended; and,

c) that, notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 40(3), on Thursday Mornings, business not sponsored by the Majority, the Minority Party or a Committee shall have precedence over all other business, in such order as t

viii. On 10<sup>th</sup> November, 2020, the House resolved to suspend the Morning Sitting of Thursday, November 12, 2020 at 10.00 am to allow fumigation of the Chamber and surrounding grounds in preparation for the State of the Nation Address by His Excellency the President during the afternoon of the same day.



The House adjourned for long recess on 4<sup>th</sup> December, 2020, to 8<sup>th</sup> February 2021, ending the Fourth Session. The Fifth Session resumed on 9<sup>th</sup> February 2021 at 2.30 pm.

### 1.2. ADMINISTRATION OF OATH

Article 74 of the Constitution requires that before assuming office, State Officers shall take and subscribe the oath or affirmation of office in the manner and form prescribed by the Third Schedule of the Constitution or under an Act of Parliament.

Consequently, one (1) Member of Parliament, Member for Msambweni, the Hon. Feisal Bader, MP was elected on 15<sup>th</sup> December 2020 as an Independent Member and was sworn-in on 22<sup>nd</sup> December, 2020. The by-election was occasioned by the demise of the Hon. Suleiman Dori, MP the then Member for Msambweni Constituency.

## **2.0 CHAPTER TWO: PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS & HOUSE BUSINESS**

## **2.2. MESSAGES**

A Message is a means of transmitting information between the two Houses of Parliament or between Parliament and the Executive.

In the Fourth Session, the National Assembly dealt with forty-one (41) Messages regarding various matters as provided for by the Standing Orders No. 41 and 42. These are -

### 2.3. PUBLIC PETITIONS

Article 119 of the Constitution accords every person a right to petition Parliament on any matter within its authority including seeking the enactment, amendment or repealing of legislation. There are two types of public petitions permissible in the National Assembly –

#### a) Ordinary Petition under Article 37 or Article 119 of the Constitution:

This is a written prayer to the House under Articles 37 or 119 of the Constitution by a member of the public requesting the House to consider any matter within its authority, as contemplated in Articles 94 and 95 of the Constitution. This may include a prayer for the House to enact, amend or repeal any legislation.

#### b) Petition for the removal of a Member of a Constitutional Commission or holder of an Independent Office pursuant to the provisions of Article 251 of the Constitution

Petitions under Article 251 of the Constitution seek for the removal of persons from office of member of a commission or holder of an independent office. Under Article 251(1) of the Constitution, such a petition ought to indicate the alleged ground, which the member of the commission or holder of an independent office is in breach of and may contain affidavits or other documents annexed to it. Every public petition for removal of a Member of a Constitutional Commission or holder of an independent office established under Chapter 15 of the Constitution stands committed to the relevant Departmental Committee. The Departmental Committee investigates the matter and reports to the House within fourteen days of committal (Standing Order 230) on whether the petition discloses ground for removal under Article 251(a) of the Constitution.

During the Fourth Session, forty-nine (49) Petitions were presented and referred to the relevant Departmental Committees for consideration. Pursuant to Standing Order 225 (2) (a), thirty-six (36) petitions (73%) were presented by Members of Parliament on behalf of petitioners, with the consent of the Speaker; while 13 petitions (27%) were reported to the House by the Speaker, having been submitted to the Clerk by the petitioners.

During the same Session, Departmental Committees considered fifty-one (51) Petitions (including six (6) petitions that were carried forward from the previous Session. Of these 51 petitions, twenty-six (26) (51%) were concluded and their reports tabled in the House.



The Petitions sought to address concerns mainly on irregularities in the allocation and transfer of land ownership, environmental conservation, insecurity, control of the sale of harmful chemical products such as pesticides in the Kenyan market, improvement of the welfare of workers in the public sector and social welfare of the elderly and disadvantaged. The table 1 below shows the number of Petitions considered by each Committee: -

#### **Highlight of some reports on the consideration of Petitions**

1. In response to prayers made in a *Petition by residents of Bumula Constituency regarding incessant incidences of insecurity in Bumula Constituency*, the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security among other things **recommended** the allocation of adequate police vehicles to Bumula Police Station to facilitate police patrols and enhance security in the area.
2. In response to prayers made in a *Petition by the Biodiversity Association and others regarding withdrawal of harmful pesticides from the Kenyan market*, the Departmental Committee on Health recommended, among other things, that the Pest Control Product Board (PCPB) must ensure that products banned in other jurisdictions are not in use in Kenya. The Committee **recommended** that all agrochemical companies should ensure proper use of their products through adequate labelling with the national languages and take responsibility where harm occurs due to lack of sufficient information.

3. In response to prayers made in a *Petition by employees of the Postal Corporation of Kenya (PCK) regarding payment of salary arrears to staff*, the Departmental Committee on Labour and Social Welfare **recommended**, among others, that the Ministry of ICT, Innovation and Youth should ensure implementation of the Report of the Taskforce on Revitalization of PCK, 2017 which recommended the restructuring of PCK to enable it focus on key business and carry out a staff rational programme to enhance the viability of the corporation.
4. In response to prayers made in a *Petition by residents of Golini in Kwale County regarding regularization of the allocation of land in Golini Settlement Scheme*, the Departmental Committee on Lands **recommended** that recommendations of the National Land Commission revoking the initial allocation of land in the scheme to pave way for the settlement of genuine beneficiaries should be implemented. The Committee also **recommended** that the Registrar of Lands, Ministry of Lands and Physical Planning should immediately place restrictions on Golini Settlement Scheme, L.R. No. 5003, pursuant to section 76 of the Lands Registration Act, 2012 to stop the continued irregular transfer of the land to third parties.

Status of Petitions is appended as *Annexure I* on the Petitions Tracker.

## 2.4 PAPERS LAID

A vast array of papers is usually laid on the Table of the House in any given Session. The practice of laying papers on the Table is the logical corollary of Parliaments' inherent right to information as well as enforcing executive accountability to it. In order to enforce the accountability of public undertakings, it has been made mandatory for government bodies to lay their annual reports and audited accounts on the table of the two Houses of Parliament (*Rajya Sabha: Practice and Procedure Series, 2005*).

In the course of enforcing executive accountability to it, the National Assembly receives papers submitted for laying on the Table of House. Such papers include

1. Reports submitted by His Excellency, the President in fulfilment of the provisions of Articles 132(1) (c) and 240(7) of the Constitution;
2. Reports of the Auditor-General and Financial Statements of the public entities submitted pursuant to Article 229 (7) of the Constitution;
3. Reports of the Auditor-General and Financial Statements of the public entities submitted pursuant to Article 229 (7) of the Constitution;
4. Annual Reports and Financial Statements including performance reports from various National Government institutions pursuant to Article 153(4)(b) of the Constitution;
5. Reports by National Government Constituencies Development Funds' Board pursuant to NGCD Act;
6. Reports by the House Committees on various activities under their mandate including reports on consideration of Bills pursuant to the enabling statutes and Standing Orders as a case may be;
7. Statutory Instruments submitted pursuant to section 11 of the Statutory Instruments Act and Sessional Papers. The Leader of the Majority Party or any other Member of the House Business Committee designated by him/her or a

Chairperson of a House Committee in the case of a Committee Report lays these papers.

8. The House also received sessional papers prepared by National Executive outlining some policy options and courses of action on particular thematic areas under their mandates for laying before the House.

During the Fourth Session seven hundred and eighty-two (782) Papers as shown in *Annexure 2* were laid on the Table of the House and summarized in table 2 below as follows -

## 2.5 STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS/REGULATIONS

A Statutory Instrument is any rule, order, regulation, direction, form, tariff of costs or fees, letters patent, commission, warrant, proclamation, by-law, resolution, guideline or other statutory instrument issued, made or established in the execution of a power conferred by or under an Act of Parliament under which that statutory instrument or subsidiary legislation is expressly authorized to be issued.

During the Fourth Session, the National Assembly received ninety-six (96) Statutory Instruments as shown in *Annexure 3*, summarized in the table 3 below as follows -

## **2.6 SESSIONAL PAPERS**

Sessional Papers, which are precursors to substantive legislation, are prepared by Government Ministries and Departments outlining policy options and courses of action on particular thematic areas. Sessional Papers usually require the approval of the House before their implementation.

The following five (5) Sessional Papers were received during the Session-

1. Sessional Paper 1 of 2020 on Wildlife Policy.
2. Sessional Paper 2 of 2020 on the Veterinary Policy from State Department for Livestock.
3. Sessional Paper 3 of 2020 on the Livestock Policy from State Department for Livestock.
4. Sessional Paper No. 04 of 2020 on the National Cooperative Policy from the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Cooperatives (to be referred to the Departmental Committee Agriculture and Livestock).
5. Sessional Paper on the Kenya Micro and Small Enterprises Policy from the Ministry of Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development.

## **2.7 MOTIONS**

A motion is a formal proposal by a Member of Parliament or a political party for deliberations by the House for certain actions/resolutions. Motions can be categorised into-

### **a) Procedural Motions**

These are motions introduced and passed in the House in accordance with its Standing Orders mainly to regulate the internal conduct of legislative business. Traditionally, these motions are moved at the beginning of every Session to impose limitation of time in respect of debate on Bills, Sessional Papers, Committee Reports, and Address by the President, but they can also be introduced in the course of a session or a sitting. Fifty-one (51) procedural motions were introduced during the Session.

### **b) Motions for Adjournment on Definite Matter of Urgent National Importance**

These are motions moved by the leave of the House in order to interrupt normal order of business at a given Sitting day to allow for a discussion on definite matter of urgent national importance. Three (3) motions of this nature were introduced in the Fourth Session to discuss the matter of locust invasion in the country; the matter of inability by NHIF to cover hospital bills for Covid-19 cases, and the matter of the election of Kenya to the Non-Permanent seat of the UN Security Council.

### **c) Motions for Alteration of Calendar of the National Assembly Regular Sessions**

These motions are moved to adjust the Calendar of the National Assembly Regular Sessions. They are mainly for extension or reduction of recess period, change of days for Sitting and suspension of Sittings days among others. The main aim of these motions is to allow the House to adjust its Calendar of Sittings to respond to emerging issues in legislative management. During the period under review Eight (8) motions for



alteration of Calendar, mainly to reduce the number Sitting days in order to mitigate against the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic.

**d) Special Motions**

These are motions introduced in the House to approve persons nominated for appointment to or removal from public offices in accordance with Article 132 of the Constitution and the requirements of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act. In the Fourth Session, thirteen (13) Special motions were introduced in the House.

**e) Motions for Adoption of House Committees' Reports**

These are motions introduced to enable the House adopt or note various Reports of House Committees on inquiries into or activities undertaken by the Committees on matters falling under their mandates. Seventy-three (73) motions of this nature were introduced in the House during the session.

**f) Substantive Motions**

These are motions introduced by Members to invite the House to address subjects of topical concern. These motions also avail an opportunity for Members to influence Government policy and or introduce new policy dimensions. In accordance with the Standing Orders of the House, the Sittings of Wednesday Morning are purely set for debating Private Members' Motions in order to allow adequate time for their consideration. Six (6) Private Member's Motions were introduced in the Session.

During the Fourth Session 154 Motions as shown in *Annexure 4* were introduced in the House out of which 131 Motions (85%) were passed and adopted. This is summarized as shown in Table 4 below.

## 2.8 PARLIAMENTARY QUESTIONS

A Parliamentary Question is an oversight tool put formally to a Government Ministry or Independent Constitutional Commissions or/and other Institutions by Members to seek information, press for action with a view to enhance accountability as provided for in Article 95(2) and 153(4) (b) of the Constitution and are operationalized pursuant to Standing Orders 42A to 42F.

Between February 13, 2020 - December 03, 2020 Members filed four hundred and eleven (411) Questions. The Departmental Committees considered two hundred and eighty-eight (288) Questions. The Questions raised were mostly on areas that impact directly on the lives of the citizens such as security, land, water, access to education, social welfare, provision of health services and infrastructure among others. This is summarized in table 5 below –

## 2.9 STATEMENTS

A Statement is a brief request or pronouncement presented to the House by a Member to convey or seek information on a particular matter. Statements to Committees are tools for legislative oversight of the House over the Executive on matters of concern within the mandate of a Committee.

Statements are operationalized pursuant to Standing Orders 43, 44 and 84 by Members and House Leadership either to request for information on oversight or to inform Members on various issues and in particular matters on House Business respectively. They are categorized into the following types –

- a) **General Statements:** raised by a Member regarding an issue(s) of topical concern in a maximum of three minutes;

- b) **House Business Committee (HBC) Statements:** informative Statement presented by a designated Member of the HBC, on the priority business for the current or subsequent week.
- c) **Statement by Assembly Party Leaders:** presented by the Leader of the Majority or Minority Party/Coalition of Parties
- d) **Statements to Committees:** inquisitive and question-like statements sought by a Member from the Executives through the relevant Committee Chairperson.

One hundred and seventy-one (171) Statements were issued or requested by the Leadership of the House, Chairpersons of the Departmental Committees and/or Members between February 13, 2020 – December 03, 2020 attached in *Annexure 5*.

Eighty-three (83) responses to the Statements were made by the Chairpersons of the Departmental Committees and the Leadership of the House as shown in *Annexure 6*.

Statements issued or requested and committed to Departmental Committees during the Session are summarized in the table 8 and 9 respectively as shown below -

## 2.10 BILLS

### 2.10.1 Introduction

A bill is a proposed law post-publication presented to the National Assembly for consideration and subsequent enactment. The primeval role of Parliament is to enact laws as provided for in Article 94(5) of the Constitution. With respect to Kenya's bicameral parliament, the Constitution assigns each House of Parliament respective legislative power. In the case of the National Assembly, the legislative authority is anchored in Article 95 (3) of the Constitution.

Over and above, the exclusively assigned legislative power, the Constitution also envisages shared legislative power on Bills requiring bicameral consideration. The shared legislative authority of the Houses of Parliament is exercised in accordance with the Constitution. Enactment of legislation in either House flows through a similar process and concurrence in the manner provided for in the Constitution, including mediation process.

### 2.10.2 A general overview on Bills

The outbreak of Covid-19 and its subsequent declaration of the disease as a global pandemic negatively impacted legislative business of parliaments all over the world, including the National Assembly of Kenya. In the midst of the unprecedented circumstances arising from Covid-19 restrictions, the National Assembly ingeniously crafted a legislative business continuity plan that ensured that the National Assembly continued to enact legislation, largely uninterrupted.

In the Fourth Session, the National Assembly considered one hundred and forty-six (146) Bills at various stages as tabulated in table 10 below –

*Chart 1: Proportion of origination of Bills in the 4<sup>th</sup> Session*

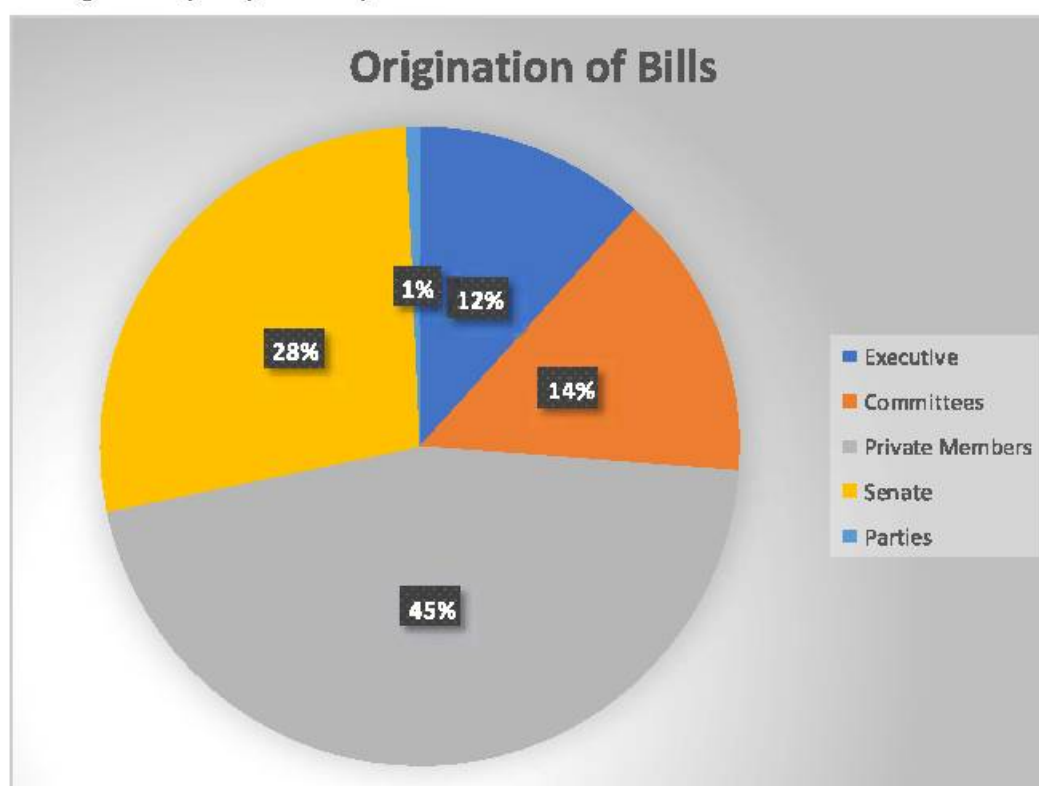
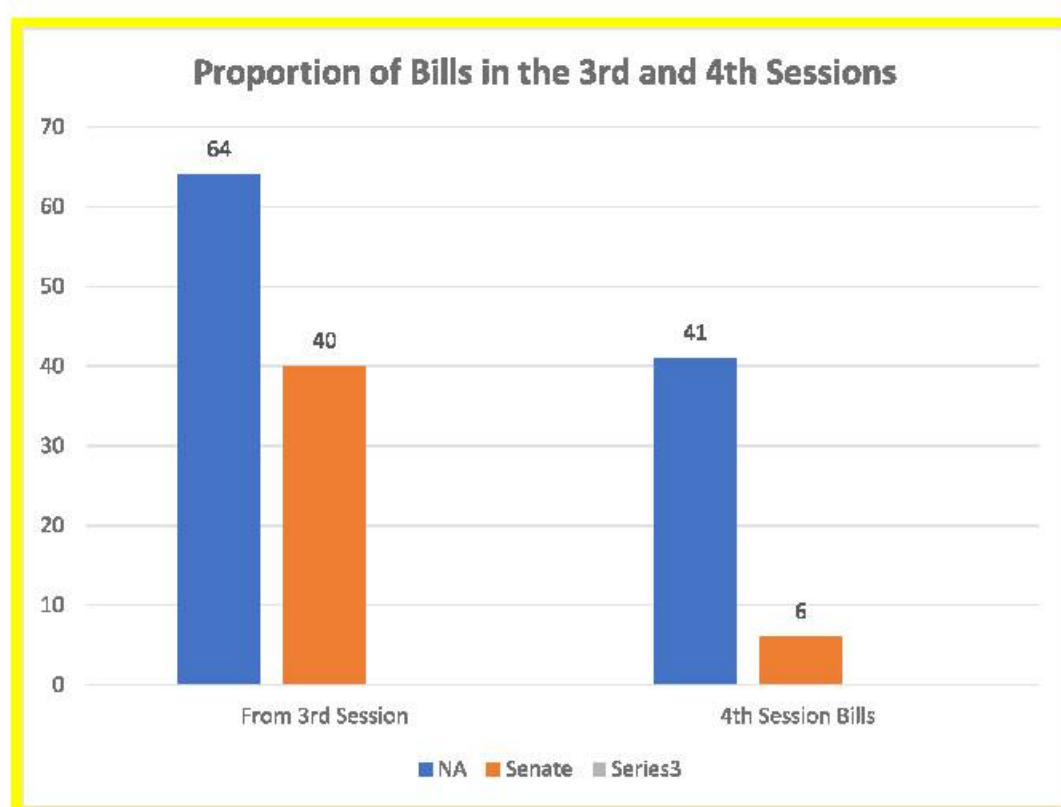


Chart 2: *Proportion of National Assembly to Senate Bills*

## 2.11 STATE OF THE NATION ADDRESS



*His Excellency the President addressing a Joint Sitting of Parliament*

The State of the Nation Address is an occasion where the President addresses the country on various issues in accordance with Article 132 of the Constitution, which mandates the President to report on measures taken and progress achieved in the realization of the National values as set out in Article 10, the State of Security as well as the progress made in fulfilling International Obligations.

In line with the same, the President delivered the Seventh (7<sup>th</sup>) State of the Nation Address in Parliament during a Joint-Sitting of the two Houses on Thursday, 12<sup>th</sup> November, 2020. During the Address, His Excellency the President submitted to Parliament the following three reports as required by the Constitution, Article 132 (1) (c):

- a) *The 7<sup>th</sup> Report on All Measures Taken and Progress Achieved in the Realization of National Values;*
- b) *The 7<sup>th</sup> Report on Progress made in fulfilling the International Obligations of the Republic; and*
- c) *The 7<sup>th</sup> Report on the State of Security.*

Further, and in recognition of the centrality of transparency, accountability, and good governance as the anchors of sustainable development; and while also conscious of the pivotal role played by Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises in driving growth and creating opportunities; His Excellency the President, submitted alongside the three Constitutionally required Reports the following other Reports:

- a) *The Report on Ease of Doing Business Milestones 2017-2020; and*
- b) *The Annual Report of the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions for the Financial Years 2017/2018, 2018/2019 and 2019/2020.*

### 3.0 CHAPTER THREE: PROCEDURAL DEVELOPMENTS

During the year under review, the following procedural developments and issues emerged –

#### 1. Covid-19 Pandemic



The outbreak of Covid-19 and its subsequent declaration of the disease as a global pandemic impacted legislative business of parliaments all over the world, including the National Assembly of Kenya. In the midst of the unprecedented circumstances arising from Covid-19 restrictions, the National Assembly ingeniously crafted a legislative business continuity plan that ensured that the National Assembly continued to operate largely uninterrupted.

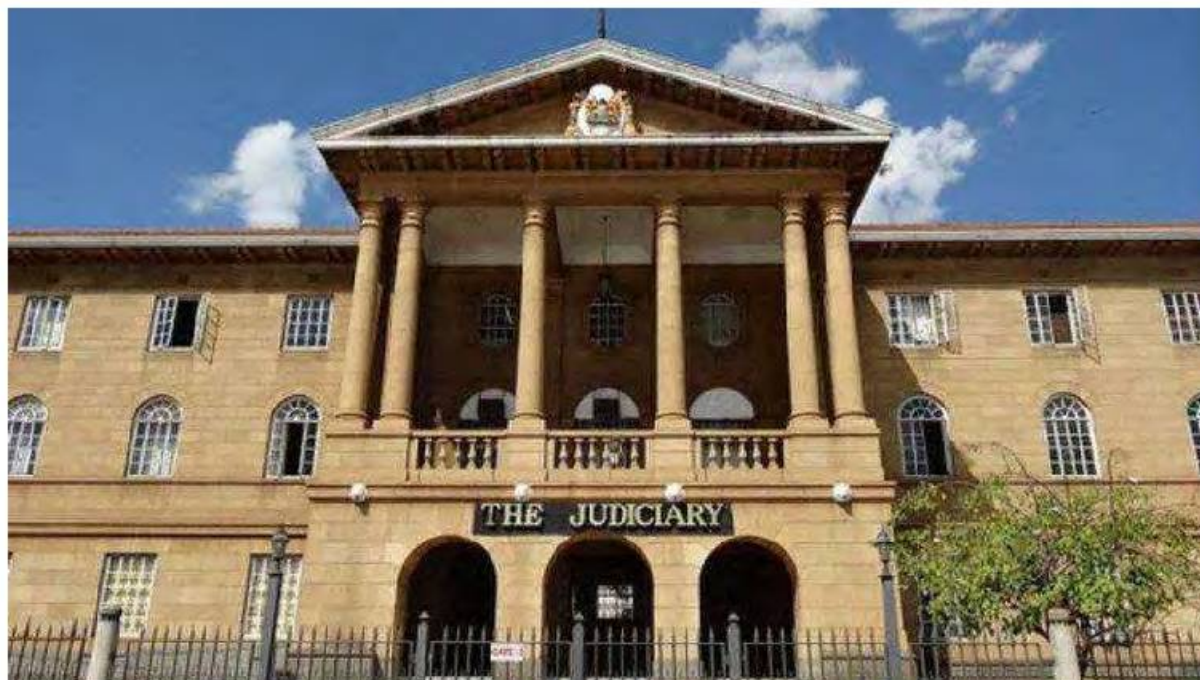
In view of the above, the Government of Kenya undertook a number of measures to curb the spread of the virus. The National Assembly also instituted a number of response measures and containment protocols under the guidance of the Ministry of Health, which the Speaker communicated through various guidelines. These included:

- (i) Provision of voluntary testing services for the Covid-19 virus for Members and staff of Parliament;
- (ii) Reduction of the number of seats for use in the Chamber, and the designation of other sitting areas around the precincts of Parliament to ensure social distancing during chamber sessions;
- (iii) Registration of Members for attendance of Chamber sessions weekly through the use of a bulk SMS service;
- (iv) Reduced sitting hours and days of the House, with emphasis on virtual sittings for Committees;
- (v) Increased usage of Chamber tablets and other electronic means to access Chamber and committee documents digitally;



- (vi) Suspension of physical committee sittings and engagement via virtual sittings between National Assembly Committees and the Executive;
- (vii) Amendment of the Standing Orders to provide for virtual sittings of the House and Committees.

## **2. High Court Judgement that affected legislation**



In October 2020, a three-judge bench of the High Court made a ruling on Constitutional Petition Number 284 of 2019, filed by the Speaker of the Senate & 3 others against the Speaker of the National Assembly & others, consolidated with Nairobi High Court Constitutional Petition Number 353 of 2019 filed by the Council of County Governors against the National Assembly & others. In Petition No. 284 of 2019, the Senate challenged the constitutionality of twenty-four (24) Acts of Parliament passed by the National Assembly (*attached as Annexure 8*) on grounds that the said statutes were enacted in violation of Articles 96, 109, 110, 111, 112 and 113 of the Constitution.

## **3. Exemption of Business from lapsing**

Standing Order 141 and 227(2) provide that Bills and Petitions have certain stages concluded before the end of two consecutive Sessions, and sixty (60) calendar days timeline for conclusion respectively. However, conscious of the fact that the proceedings of the House and its Committees were disrupted during this Session by unforeseen recess periods and reduced number of sitting days in an effort to mitigate the effects of Covid-19, the House passed a motion to exempt Bills and Petitions from certain provisions of the Standing Orders to enable the continuation of the said business in the next Session. This was the first time such an action was being taken to save certain business. However, Questions, Motions and Statements, which are traditionally sessional, lapsed at the end of the Session.



#### **4. Changes in the leadership of the Majority and Minority Parties and reconstitution of Committees**

During the session, the Majority and Minority Parties held Parliamentary Group meetings and made changes to their leadership. The most notable of these happened on June 2, 2020 Hon. Benjamin Washiali, MP was replaced by the Hon. Emmanuel Wangwe, MP, as the Majority Party Whip while Hon. Maoka Maore, MP replaced Hon. Cecily Mbarire, MP as the Deputy Whip. On June 22, 2020, the Hon. Aden Duale, MP was replaced by the Hon. (Dr.) Amos Kimunya, MP as the Leader of the Majority Party.

The Minority Party also made changes where the Hon. (Dr.) Eseli Simiyu, MP replaced Hon. Chris Wamalwa, MP as the Deputy Whip, Minority Party.

Changes were also made to the leadership and membership in Committees, which led to elections of several new Chairpersons and Vice-Chairpersons. This change was unprecedented, as it is not usually experienced in the middle of a Parliamentary term and session.

#### **5. Designation of seating for a ranking Member**

Notwithstanding provisions of Standing Order 259, and following the change of the Leader of the Majority Party from the Hon. Aden Duale, MP (who had served for 8 years) to the Hon. (Dr.) Amos Kimunya, MP, a special seat was designated in the Chamber for the former Leader of Majority Party (Hon. Aden Duale, MP), and was specified as Seatbof a Ranking Member.

#### **6. Motion for removal of a Cabinet Secretary**

During the Session, the Member for Nyali Constituency, the Hon. Mohamed Ali Mohamed, MP, presented a notice of motion to the Speaker seeking to remove the Cabinet Secretary for the Ministry of Transport, Infrastructure, Housing, Urban Development and Public Works in accordance with the provisions Article 152(6) of the Constitution and Standing

Orders 64(1A) and 66 for gross violation of Articles 10(1)(c) and 2(a) and 73 of the Constitution and gross misconduct contrary to Article 125 of the Constitution.

However, despite garnering the necessary threshold of Members supporting the Special motion, the motion was rendered inadmissible owing to a failure to comply with Standing Order 64(1A)(c) with regard to attaching the necessary evidence including annexures or sworn testimonies in respect of the allegations.

#### **7. Rejection of a Motion to reject appointment of Members to the Teachers Service Commission**

In April 2020, the House rejected a Special Motion that was proposing rejection of the appointment of two nominees as members of the Teachers Service Commission. The effect of this was that the status quo remained, meaning that the nominees remained before the House having been neither unequivocally approved nor rejected. The House subsequently passed a second positive Motion to approve the nominees.

#### **8. Unlocking Funds Transfer to County Governments for FY 2020/2021 and in the future**

Following the passage of the Division of Revenue Act, 2020, an impasse arose in the Senate before the passage of the County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2020 on the formula that would be used to allocate the funds to each County. Due to this delay, County Governments were unable to receive their disbursements for the 2020/2021 financial year between July and September 2020. As a result, the National Treasury requested the National Assembly to approve the release of fifty percent (50%) of the equitable share of the National Revenue that



was allocated to the County Governments in the Division of Revenue Act, 2020 to the forty-seven (47) County Governments.

A ruling by the Speaker determined that the envisioned "Vote-on-Account" procedure to allow disbursement of funds to County Governments pending the passage and assent of a County Allocation of Revenue Bill required legislative grounding in the Constitution or an Act of Parliament. Alternatives were proposed on how to ground this process in law. However, the Senate eventually resolved the stalemate and the County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2020 was eventually passed in October 2020, thus unlocking the funds transfer to the Counties.

#### **9. Procedure for the Revocation of the Appointment of a Member of the Parliamentary Service Commission (PSC), who is a Member of Parliament**

A question was raised on the applicable constitutional provisions with regard to removal of a Member of the Parliamentary Service Commission. Through a Speaker's ruling No 35 of 2020, the matter was clarified as follows:

- (i) the procedure for the removal of a member of the Parliamentary Service Commission is as provided for in section 10 of the Parliamentary Service Act, 2019 which is by a Motion proposed by a Member of Parliament on any of the grounds specified. The motion can be filed in either House of Parliament. However, for good order, a Motion for removal of a Commissioner ought to start from the House that the Commissioner serves as a Member;
- (ii) any other person may petition a Member of Parliament to initiate the process of removal of a Member of the Parliamentary Service Commission as envisaged under section 10 of the Parliamentary Service Act, 2019;
- (iii) for purposes of admissibility, a Notice of Motion for the revocation of the appointment of a member of the Parliamentary Service Commission must meet the thresholds set by the Courts, the Standing Orders and precedents of the House as to what constitutes gross violation of the Constitution or gross misconduct under the Constitution; and
- (iv) the removal process under section 10 of the Parliamentary Service Act must also be guided by the provisions of Article 47 of the Constitution and the Fair Administrative Action Act No. 4 of 2015.

#### **10. Declaration of conflict of interest by Members**

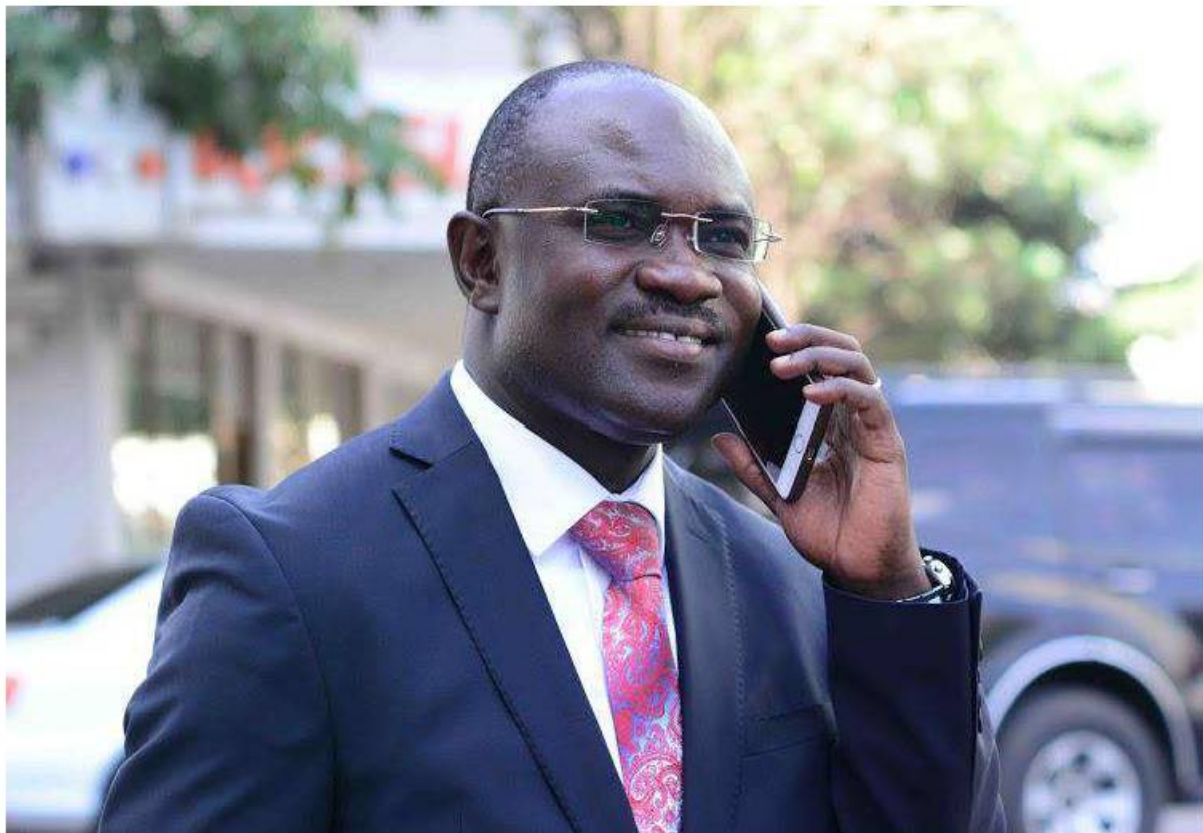
Section 4 of the Parliamentary Powers and Privileges Act, 2017 as well as Standing Order 90(1) provides for declaration of interest by Members on a matter before speaking on it. In line with this provision, a Question arose where a member of the Kenya National Union of Teachers (KNUT) currently serving in the Departmental Committee on Education and Research had allegedly forwarded minutes of a Committee meeting to the Teachers Service Commission (TSC) for implementation without any resolution of the House on the matter, contrary to the provisions of Standing Order 86.

In this regard, the Speaker ruled that there is need for adherence to Standing Order 86 which prohibits any Member, staff or other person from divulging contents of a Committee's or House proceedings to any other entities before they are tabled. He also emphasized on the need to adhere to conflict of interest guidelines.



**11. Entitlement of slots in Select Committees and Discharge of Independent Members and Members of small parties from Committees by Parliamentary Parties**

Following his discharge from the Departmental Committee on Health, the Member for Ugenya Constituency, the Hon. David Ochieng, MP, (*Movement for Democracy and Growth Party*), sought guidance from the Speaker on whether a Member belonging to a party other than a Parliamentary party may be discharged from a Committee of the House by any Parliamentary party. From the ensuing discussion, it emerged that the National Assembly Standing Orders, as well as the rules of procedure in other similar jurisdictions are silent on the issue of discharge of Independent Members and Members of other parties not in a coalition with any others from Committees.

However, the Speaker guided that there must be fairness and equity in access to slots in select committees for all Members irrespective of them belonging to a parliamentary party, political party other than a parliamentary party or independently elected. The issue of Committee membership was stipulated to the functioning of the House as it relates to the mode of inclusion and exclusion of a Member from the Committees of the House.

The Speaker upheld that the exercise of the discharge powers under Standing Order 176 ought to be exercised by a parliamentary party only on Members belonging to that Party, or a Member who formally affiliates with the Parliamentary party by way of a coalition agreement as contemplated under the Political Parties Act. Ultimately, the Speaker ruled that no parliamentary party is to exercise the discharge powers of a party under Standing



Orders 176 to remove a Member who is not a Member of the particular parliamentary party from any Committee of the House, even based on having granted the Member the nomination to the particular Committee.

Further, the Procedure and House Rules Committee was directed to devise a criterion for nomination of Members to Committees that guarantees Members who belong to Parties other than Parliamentary parties and Independent Members to their rightful share of the slots available for sharing in Committees, and that amendments to the Standing Orders be proposed to effect it. Subsequently, no Independent Member or a Member belonging to a party other than a parliamentary party can be discharged from a Committee until a clear criterion is in place, to ensure justice and fairness in the process.

## 12. House Leadership Retreat

During the Fourth Session, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Leadership Retreat of the National Assembly took place on 25<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> August 2020 at the *Ole Sereni Hotel, Nairobi County* under the theme *“Safeguarding the Welfare of Society Amidst the Pandemic’s New Normal.”* Participants in the retreat included the Speaker of the National Assembly and the Speaker’s Panel, Leaders of the Majority and Minority Parties and their Deputies, PSC Commissioners, the Majority and Minority Party Whips and their Deputies, Members of the House Business Committee and Chairpersons and Vice Chairpersons of all committees as well as senior parliamentary staff.

Guest presenters in the two-day retreat included Amb. Ukur Yatani, EGH, the Cabinet Secretary for National Treasury & Planning; Hon. Amina Abdalla, Member of the Salaries

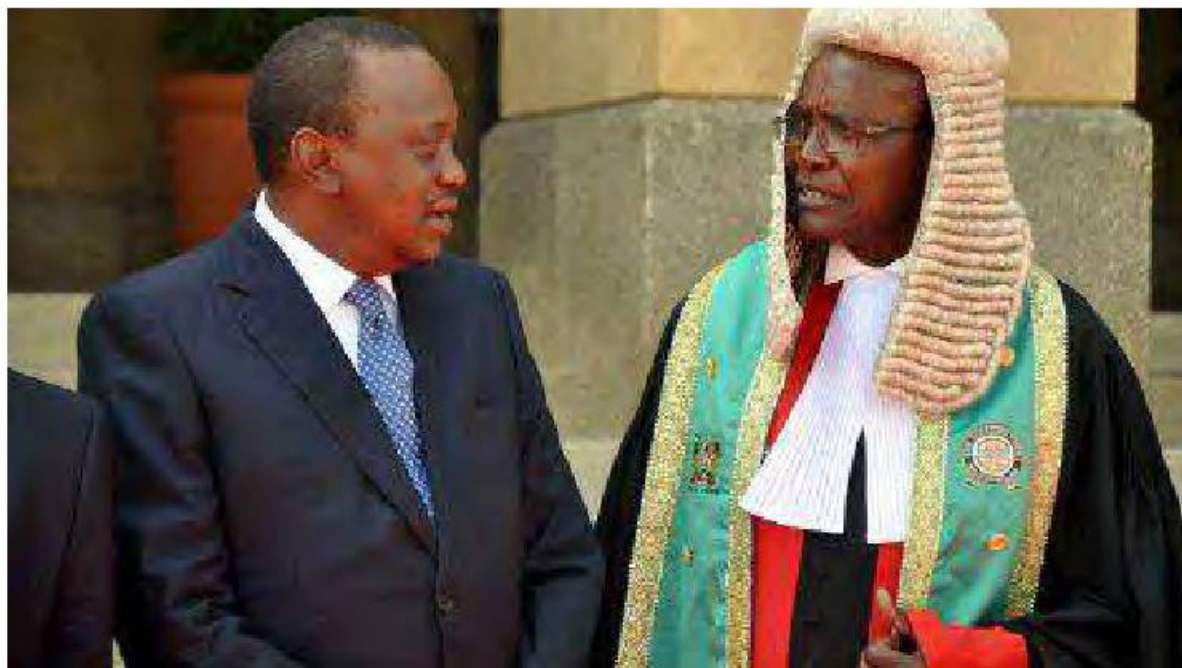
& Remuneration Commission and former Chairperson of the Departmental Committee on Environment & Natural Resources; and CPA Edwin Makori, Chief Executive Officer of the Institute of Certified Public Accountants of Kenya (ICPAK). The retreat was presided over by the Speaker of the National Assembly the Hon. Justin B.N. Muturi, EGH, MP.

After the two-day deliberations and discussions, the meeting resolved to implement key areas of discussions as shown and appended in ***Annexure 9***.



## 4.0 CHAPTER FOUR: EMERGING ISSUES/NEW DEVELOPMENTS

### 1. Advisory by the Chief Justice to the President on dissolution of Parliament

On 21<sup>st</sup> September, 2020, in keeping with the provisions of the Constitution, the Rt. Hon. Chief Justice (Hon. David K. Maraga, EGH) advised His Excellency the President of the Republic of Kenya to dissolve Parliament for failure to enact legislation to give effect to the principle that no more than two-thirds of one gender should hold elective and appointive posts. This is despite over four different attempts by Parliament to pass legislation to actualize these provisions, without success. The Parliamentary Service Commission, on the request of the Speakers of the two Houses of Parliament, engaged legal counsel and proceeded to the High Court to challenge the action taken by the Rt. Hon. Chief Justice.

Conservatory orders were subsequently issued by the High Court, and a five-judge bench was formed to hear and determine the five petitions filed against the Chief Justice advisory. The matter was pending as at the publication of this report.

### 2. Heightened debate on Constitutional amendments

Kenya has, in the recent past, been engaged in a robust national discourse on amendment of the Constitution, including matters of succession, the structure of governance, gender representation, and division of revenue between the National and County governments, among others. The ongoing process of desired constitutional reform, possibly through a referendum, as dubbed as - “*The Building Bridges Initiative*” Parliament was expected to be one of the key institutions in passing legislation to effect some of these recommendations as contained in *The Building Bridges Initiative report*, especially those that do not require a referendum.

### **3. Change in work schedules**

One feature that characterized the Covid-19 pandemic period was the need for social distancing as one measure to reduce the spread of the virus, as per the Ministry of Health protocols. This caused a re-engineering of the normal working hours and schedules, with the National Assembly Management instituting more flexible working arrangements. As a result, staff were required to work from home, particularly those aged over 58 and/or with underlying conditions were restricted from physically being in the office. Meetings were conducted virtually, and staff going to the office physically were on alternating schedules to reduce the employees in each working space or office.

### **4. Changing parameters in requests for Statements and Questions**

During the Fourth Session, there were increased incidences of Members asking Questions on behalf of their colleagues who were absent, with the permission of the Speaker. Further, some Members resorted to requesting for Statements from Committees in which they were members or without declaring certain conflicts of interest.

### **5. National Assembly 'Jerusalema' challenge**

Following a worldwide phenomenon, in October 2020, Members took part in a group dance dubbed 'the Jerusalema Challenge'. It was a dance, originally from South Africa, intended to foster solidarity, unity and strengthen partnership among the Members and citizens, especially in the period of the Covid-19 pandemic.



#### 6. Translation of the National Assembly Standing Orders into Kiswahili

Article 120 of the Constitution provides that the official languages of Parliament shall be Kiswahili, English and Kenyan Sign language, and that the business of Parliament may be conducted in either of these languages. This principle is replicated in the National Assembly Standing Orders. It is against this background that the National Assembly embarked on the translation of the Standing Orders into Kiswahili to among other objectives, realize the spirit and letter of Articles 7 & 120 of the Constitution of Kenya and to further enhance integration within the East African Community.

The exercise culminated in a State Launch of the Kiswahili and Bilingual versions of the National Assembly Standing Orders by H. E President Uhuru Kenyatta on 12<sup>th</sup> November, 2020 at the Parliamentary Gardens, immediately after the State of the Nation Address. It was expected that the translated Standing Orders would provide a reference tool for Members who would wish to debate in Kiswahili and reach the wider citizenry.

The Speaker directed that Members transact business of the House in Kiswahili during sittings on Thursdays. In the last part of the Session, Members extensively made use of the Bilingual version of the Standing Orders during debates and increasingly had Parliamentary Questions drafted in Kiswahili, a practice that was expected to take root in the Fifth Session.

## 5.0 CHAPTER FIVE: FOCUS ON SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS AND INDEPENDENT MEMBERS

### 5.1. WOMEN IN THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

During the period under review, there were seventy-six (76) Women Members of Parliament in the National Assembly. Out of this, forty-seven (47) were elected legislators from each of the 47 counties as provided for in Article 97(1)(b) of the Constitution, six (6) were nominated to represent special groups while twenty-three (23) represented single Member constituencies.

The Constitution under Article 100 classifies women as a special interest group alongside persons with Disabilities, Youth, ethnic and other minorities and marginalised communities. Article 27 (3) guarantees them equal treatment, including the right to equal opportunity, in the political sphere. Article 27 (6) provides that, *“to give full effect to the realization of the rights guaranteed under this Article, the State shall take legislative and other measures, including affirmative action programmes and policies designed to redress any disadvantage suffered by individuals or groups because of past discrimination”*.

In recognition of the place of Women in Parliamentary representation, four women legislators served as Chairpersons of Committees during the Fourth Session. They are: the Hon. Sabina Chege - *Departmental Committee on Health*; the Hon. (Dr.) Rachael Nyamai - *Departmental Committee on Lands*; the Hon. Gladys Wanga - *Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning* and the Hon. Florence Mutua - *Departmental Committee on Education and Research*.

The Hon. Roselinda Soipan and the Hon. Jessica Mbalu are Members of the *Chairperson's Panel as the First and Third Chairperson* of Committees of the Whole House respectively.

## 5.2 INDEPENDENT MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT

Articles 85 and 99 (1) (c) of the Constitution provides for eligibility of persons to vie as independent candidates for the position of Members of Parliament. Independent Members are individuals not affiliated to any political party. They do not belong to or represent a political party. Independents are generally able to vote according to their beliefs and the perceived will of their electorate, whereas Members who belong to political parties are expected to follow the party line on most votes. During the period under review, there were 15 Independent Members of the National Assembly as indicated in table 13 below –

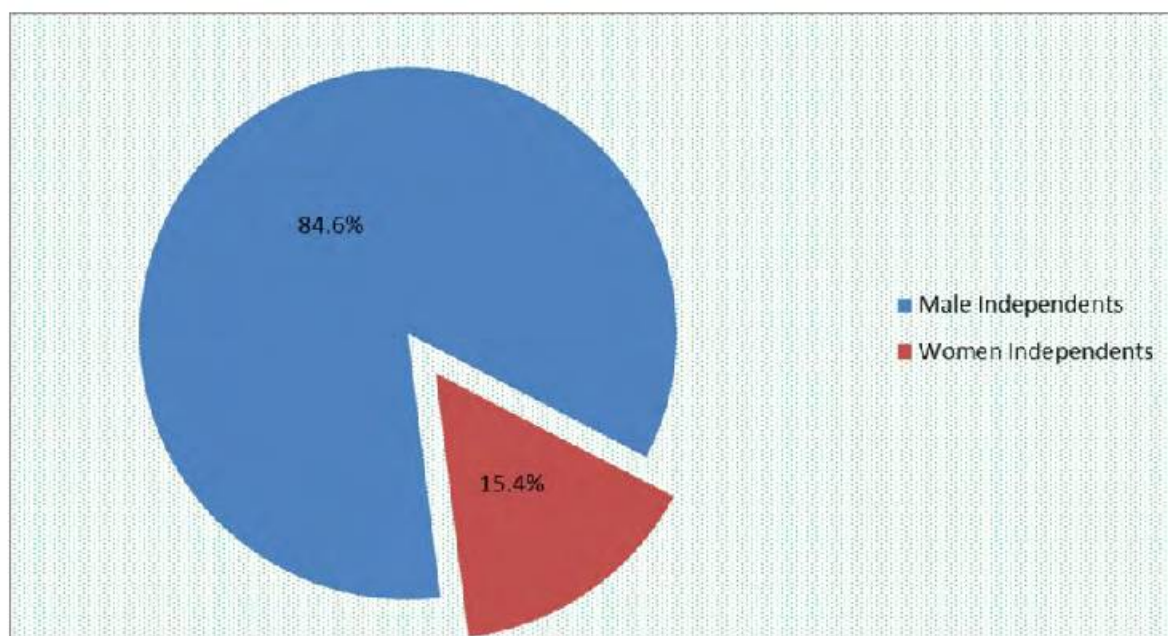

The Hon. Feisal Abdallah Bader who was sworn in on December 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2020, following a by-election, only attended one sitting.

### **5.3 MEMBERS WITH DISABILITY**

Pursuant to Article 97 (1) (c) of the Constitution, there are two Members nominated to represent people with disability. The two Members are the Hon. Dennitah Ghati (ODM Party) and the Hon. David Sankok (Jubilee Party).

In the period under review, the Hon. Dennitah Ghati sponsored a motion urging the National Government to provide assistive devices and required medical items and requirements free of charge to Persons with Disabilities at the Constituency level through government hospitals or any other government body and to put in place mechanisms for replacement of worn-out devices to enable them live a dignified life, be more productive and to coexist with other people in the society which is currently before the House.

In the same period, the Hon. Dennitah Ghati, HSC, MP was nominated as the Regional Champion for the Commonwealth Parliamentarians with Disabilities (CPwD) Network during a special meeting of the Executive Committee of the CPA Africa Region on 30<sup>th</sup> November, 2020. The meeting had been apprised on the operationalization of the Commonwealth Parliamentarians with Disabilities (CPwD) Network, thus necessitating the identification of regional champions for the network. The Hon. Dennitah Ghati was proposed and approved by the meeting as the Regional Champion for CPwD Network.

The Nominated Member, the Hon. David Ole Sankok, MP, through Questions asked the Cabinet Secretary for Health to give the status of availability in the country of drugs used to manage epilepsy and cerebral palsy conditions such as phenytoin, Phenobarbital among others; what steps the Ministry was taking to ensure constant availability of the said essential drugs so as to stop further deaths of children with these categories of disabilities/conditions; and, whether there were drugs classified as essential for lifesaving that may be in short supply in the country, and if affirmative, what urgent measures were in place to ensure they are available within the reach.

The Hon. David Ole Sankok, further presented two (2) petitions - on behalf of children with special needs from Kibos Primary and Secondary School regarding relocation of Kibos School for children; and, Hemophilia Patients of Kenya regarding Management of Hemophilia and other bleeding disorders among patients in Kenya.

Hon. David Ole Sankok, also requested a statement from the Chairperson, Departmental Committee on Labour and Social Welfare regarding affirmative action for persons living with disability.



#### **5.4 MEMBER REPRESENTING YOUTH**

The Hon. Gideon Keter, MP is the Member representing Youth since the inception of the 12<sup>th</sup> Parliament. In the Fourth Session, the Hon. Keter sponsored the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) (Amendment) Bill, 2020, which among other objects, seeks to lower interest paid by students who access HELB Loans, and a 5- year delay of the repayment period.

## 6.2 THE PAN AFRICAN PARLIAMENT (PAP)

The Pan African Parliament, which has its seat in Midrand South Africa is the legislative body of the African Union and held its first inaugural session in March 2004. The Pan-African Parliament exercises oversight, and has advisory and consultative powers, lasting for the first five years.

Each Member State of the African Union sends a delegation of five Parliamentarians to the parliament at least one whom must be a woman. The composition of the delegation should reflect the political diversity of the Member State's legislature. The term of a Member of the Pan-African Parliament shall begin once he or she has taken oath of office or made a solemn declaration during a plenary session of the Pan-African Parliament. A Member of the Pan-African Parliament shall vote in their personal and independent capacity and shall not be bound by any instructions or orders from any authority.

The Parliament of Kenya is represented in the affairs of the Pan-African Parliament by – **Hon. Janet Ongeru** who serves as the Chairperson Eastern, Regional Caucus, **Sen. (Dr.) Ali Abdullahi Ibrahim** who serves as the Rapporteur for the Committee on Cooperation, International Relations and Conflict Resolutions while **Sen. Stewart Madzayo**, **Hon. Beatrice Kones** and **Hon. Jude Njomo** are Members of the Pan-African Parliament who



are designated by the Parliament of Kenya to serve in various committees of the Pan-African Parliament as shown in table 15 –

### 6.3 THE AFRICAN, CARIBBEAN, PACIFIC-EUROPEAN UNION JOINT PARLIAMENTARY ASSEMBLY (ACP-EU – JPA)

The ACP-EU Joint Parliamentary Assembly is one of the organs of joint institutions established under the Cotonou Agreement. The Assembly was created out of a common desire to bring together the representatives of the African, Caribbean and Pacific states that have signed the Cotonou Agreement and the European Parliament.

The ACP-EU brings together more than 320 MPs from the 79 ACP Countries and Members of the European parliament, drawn from the 27 member states of the EU.

### 6.4 THE INTER-PARLIAMENTARY UNION (IPU)

The IPU is the international organization of Parliaments and was established under Article 1 of the Statutes of the Inter-Parliamentary Union in 1889.

The Union is the focal point for world-wide parliamentary dialogue and works for peace and co-operation among peoples and for the firm establishment of representative democracy.



During the period under review, the Department coordinated and facilitated participation of Members and staff in the activities of the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU) including Conferences, Meetings, Surveys and Interviews.

In furtherance of its mandate of empowering parliaments and parliamentarians to promote peace, democracy and sustainable development in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Inter-Parliamentary Union undertook scheduled Conferences, Meetings and Interviews *virtually*.



#### **6.5 THE FORUM OF PARLIAMENTS OF MEMBER STATES OF THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE GREAT LAKES REGION (FP-ICGLR)**

The Forum of Parliaments of Member States of the International Conference on the Great Lakes Region (FP-ICGLR) was established in 2008 to provide a platform for exchange of experiences, conflict resolution and dialogue between Parliaments of the Member States of the ICGLR. These Member States are Angola, Burundi, Central African Republic, Republic of Congo, the democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Rwanda, Sudan, South Sudan, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia.

## 8.0 CHAPTER EIGHT: HIGHLIGHTS ON DIRECTORATES AND DEPARTMENTS IN THE NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

### Introduction

To streamline the operations of the National Assembly Service, the Parliamentary Service Commission has established Directorates and Departments. There are five Directorates and two departments that render services to the National Assembly Service, namely; Speakers Office, Legislative and Procedural Services, Committee Services, Parliamentary Budget office, Hansard and Serjeant-at-Arms. This Chapter will highlight on the various activities undertaken by each Directorate/ Department during the Fourth Session.

### 8.1 THE DIRECTORATE OF SPEAKER'S OFFICE

The Directorate of the Speaker's Office in the National Assembly comprises of staff from the Presidium, the Leadership Offices, the Media Relations Department and the Public Communication Department. The overall objective of the Directorate is aligned to the strategic objective number 8 of the Parliamentary Service Strategic Plan (2019 -2030) - *which is to strengthen the capacity of staff to facilitate Members in discharging their constitutional duties in an effective and efficient manner.*

The Directorate has the unique distinction of having a very extensive mandate and composition for effective operation and smooth running of the day-to-day activities of the House, and



further considering that the Speaker serves as the Chairperson of the Parliamentary Service Commission and in other capacities on International and Regional Parliamentary Organizations.

In the session under review, the Directorate of the Speaker's office worked closely with the Clerk's Office, Directorates and Departments of the National Assembly in fulfilling its functions. Notably, following the declaration by the World Health Organization of Covid-19 as a global pandemic in March 2020, and together with the Clerk's Office, the Directorate coordinated with the Ministry of Health to develop protocols that ensured seamless running of the House while ensuring the observance of strict guidelines issued by the government in the fight against the pandemic.

The Directorate of the Speaker's Office during the period under review played a vital role in propagating the Strategic Pillars, Objectives and Strategies of Parliament. One key Strategic Pillar has been the promotion of Excellence in Service Delivery. In line with this, the Directorate has embraced a wholesome and tactical approach to enhance capacity of staff from all cadres.

Further, amidst the challenges occasioned by the pandemic, the Speaker's Office was on the forefront in the advancement of Parliamentary Diplomacy through participation in virtual conferences and via several physical meetings between the Speaker of the National Assembly and foreign envoys. In this regard, the Directorate undertook the following activities: -

- a) Facilitated the Speaker's attendance in various virtual conferences and seminars;
- b) Was involved in hosting several diplomatic courtesies; and,
- c) Co-ordinated and attended various Speakers' conferences virtually.

In his capacity as the Chairperson of the Executive Committee of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA), Africa Region, the Speaker of the National Assembly attended the following CPA virtual meetings:

- a) *Special Board Meeting of the Commonwealth Investment Company Limited (30<sup>th</sup> October 2020); and*
- b) *Special Meeting of the Executive Committee of the CPA Africa Region (30<sup>th</sup> November 2020).*

The Special Board Meeting of the Commonwealth Investment Company Limited was chaired by the Hon. Job Ndugai, MP, Speaker of the Parliament of Tanzania and Chairperson of the Board. The Speaker participated alongside Kitui Central legislator, the Hon. (Dr.) Makalu Mulu, who is also the CPA Africa, Regional Representative.

During the Special Executive Committee Meeting held virtually and which was chaired by the **Hon. Justin B.N. Muturi, EGH, MP** – Speaker of the National Assembly & Chairperson of the Executive Committee of the CPA Africa Region., the Speaker participated alongside with the Hon. Dr. Makali Mulu, MP – Regional Representative (Eastern Africa); and the Hon. Charles Njagagua, MP – CPA Kenya Branch Representative.

In the same meeting, the Hon. Justin B.N. Muturi, EGH, MP was approved as the CPA Africa Representative on the CPA Working Group on Governance. This followed a request

from the CPA Headquarters regarding the reconstitution of the Working Group on the Legal Status of the CPA resulting from a resolution of the General Assembly during the 64<sup>th</sup> Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference (2019). Having considered the matter, and noting the earlier engagement of the Hon. Justin B.N. Muturi, EGH, MP as the CPA Africa representative on the same matter, the meeting resolved that he continues to represent the Region in future deliberations of the Working Group.

### Media Relations Department -

The Directorate through the **Media Relations Department** undertook the following activities: -

- a) Use of social media (*Facebook, Twitter, and WhatsApp*) to disseminate information to the public about the business of the House;
- b) Facilitated the external media during the coverage of 120 Committee sittings and field visits including highlights on House social media pages;
- c) Daily briefs, monitoring and analysis in regard to security matters;
- d) Accredited all journalists covering Parliamentary activities;
- e) Professionally organized and managed 60 press conferences;
- f) Facilitated the live coverage of The State of the Nation Address by His Excellency the President on November 12<sup>th</sup> 2020;
- g) Contributed articles for the National Assembly bi-monthly publication e-Newsletter;





### Public Communications Department -

The department derives its mandate from Parliamentary Service Commission Strategic Plan 2019 – 2030 on Strategic Pillars I, II and III, which provides for *Effective Representation in Legislative and Oversight, Excellence in Service Delivery and Public Trust* respectively.

The Directorate through the Public Communications Department undertook the following activities: -



- a) Outreach and Public Education - Up to the point where the first Covid -19 case was announced in the country on March 13, 2020 leading to the suspension of the programme, the department had recorded around 25 educational institutions undertaking the programme reaching around 600 learners;
- b) Protocol and Ushering Services for the State of the Nation Address Held on 12<sup>th</sup> November, 2020;
- c) Protocol Services for National Covid-19 Conference, September 29 2020. Meeting at KICC;
- d) Protocol Services for Mashujaa Day 2020, Kisii County;
- e) Protocol Services for 2020 Jamhuri Day Nyayo Stadium;
- f) Workshop to Rationalise Department work plans and functions in light of moving to the National Assembly;
- g) Protocol services in funerals of departed Members of the National Assembly - The department actively participated in funeral services of the departed Members from Matungu and Kabuchai Constituencies;
- h) Prepared four outreach and public education publications - the directorate developed education materials that are awaiting validation and approval. They include booklets, fliers and electronic publications that will be shared with learning institutions and other delegations;
- i) Facilitated trainings in protocol and communication to National Assembly Leadership staff and induction for new Centre for Parliamentary Studies and Training (CPST) Staff;
- j) Undertook and facilitated a familiarization tour for Department of Defence (DOD) officers newly assigned protocol duties at the Mausoleum and how events related to different occasions are carried out; and,
- k) Facilitated protocol services to Leadership offices hosting dignitaries especially Heads of Foreign Missions.

## 8.2 THE OFFICE OF THE CLERK

The Constitution provides for the office of the Clerk – *there shall be a Clerk for each House of Parliament, appointed by the Parliamentary Service Commission with the approval of the relevant House. The offices of the Clerks and offices of members of the staff of the Clerks shall be offices in the Parliamentary Service.*

The Office of the Clerk in executing its mandate offers services to the Office of the Speaker, House Leadership Offices and all the Parliamentary Committees of the National Assembly. The Clerk further executes the work in the Chamber, and as House Accounting Officer and Administration on overall management of staff of the National Assembly. The Office of the Clerk coordinates the following Directorates and Departments – namely the Speakers Office, Legislative and Procedural Services, Committee Services, Parliamentary Budget office, Hansard and Serjeant-at-Arms.

## 8.3 THE DIRECTORATE OF LEGISLATIVE AND PROCEDURAL SERVICES

The Directorate continues to play a key role in marshalling business for the National Assembly. It offers legislative and procedural advice to the Speaker and Members during plenary sessions of the House as well as continuously, disseminate legislative information to the public.



During the Fourth Session, the Directorate facilitated Administration of Oaths, drafting of Communications, Messages, Petitions, Questions, Statements, Motions, Preparation of Order Papers and Responses to inquiries and requests the office of the Speaker, Leadership Offices, Members, Clerks Offices, other Directorates and Departments; and the Public. Further, the directorate offers secretariat service to committees chaired by the Speaker, which are the House Business Committee, the Procedure and House Rules Committee, the Chairpersons' Panel and the Powers and Privileges Committee.

**Summary of Committees serviced by the Secretariat from the Directorate: -**

**1. House Business Committee**

By practice, the House Business Committee meets every Tuesday at the rise of the House on a sitting day to plan for the House for the week. However, during the substantial part of the Fourth Session the Committee sat mainly on Wednesdays and Thursdays a departure from the common practice that has been occasioned by compliance to the government's protocols on management of the Covid-19 Pandemic.

During the period under review, the Committee held thirty-four (34) sittings to plan the programme of business of the National Assembly. Out of the 34 sittings conducted by the Committee, 18 were done virtually through *Zoom* as a way of cushioning Members and staff against the threat of the Covid-19 Pandemic.

It is also instructive to note that new Members were appointed to while others were discharged from the Committee. This was occasioned by the change in leadership of the Jubilee Party in the House, bringing in the Hon. (Dr.) Amos Kimunya and the Hon. Emmanuel Wangwe to replace the Hon. Aden Duale and the Hon. Benjamin Washiali as the Leader and the Chief Whip of the Majority Party respectively. The Hon. Mohamed Abdikhaim Osman was newly appointed as a member.

**2. Procedure and House Rules Committee**

The Procedure and House Rules Committee is established under Standing Order 208 and is mandated to, among other matters, "consider and report on all matters relating to the Standing Orders". The Committee is also charged with the task of proposing amendments to the Standing Orders for consideration by the House. Further, the Committee may, from time to time, propose rules for the orderly and effective conduct of business of Committees.

During the Fourth Session, the Committee undertook the following activities:-

**a) Issuance of Guidelines for Virtual Proceedings of the House**

In carrying out its mandate, the Procedure & House Rules Committee proposed the amendment of the Standing Orders to allow for the virtual proceedings of the House and its Committees. This saw the introduction of a **New Part XXIXA on the *Conduct of Proceedings in Exceptional Circumstances*** to provide for virtual participation of Members in cases where an event or occurrence precludes the National Assembly from conducting a physical sitting including during an epidemic, pandemic, extreme natural phenomena, pestilence or an act of terrorism. The proposed amendments were contained in the Fourth Report of the Procedure & House Rules Committee. The report was adopted by the House on 4<sup>th</sup> May 2020.

Consequent to the amendment of the Standing Orders, the Sub-Committee on *Guidelines for Virtual Proceedings of the House* was established to consider the guidelines for the implementation of virtual proceedings of the House. Sub-Committee is set to finalize its consideration and report to the Committee with recommendations on the appropriate regulations/guidelines for virtual proceedings of the House and its Committee.

**b) Establishment of a Committee to exclusively handle Petitions**

Towards end of the Third Session, the Committee had considered a proposal to establish a Committee to exclusively handle Petitions to the National Assembly. The proposal was based on study visits by the Committee to the German Bundestag in March, 2019 and the UK Parliament in May, 2019.

Following the proposal, the Committee established a Sub-Committee to look into the proposal further and report back to the Committee on the following areas:

- (i) Justification of the establishment of the proposed Committee on Petitions;
- (ii) The proposed mandate of the Committee;
- (iii) Membership of the Committee;
- (iv) Timelines of the processing of Petitions; and
- (v) Standing Orders to be amended.

**3. Committee of Powers and Privileges**

The Committee of Powers and Privileges is established pursuant to Section 15 of the Parliamentary Powers and Privileges Act 2017. The Committee comprises of the Speaker as Chairperson and fourteen other Members. The Committee is broadly responsible for handling matters concerning powers, privileges and immunities of the House, committees, members and staff. In particular, the Committee is mandated to, either of its own motion or as a result of a complaint made by any person, inquire into the conduct of a member alleged to constitute breach of privilege, and report to the House its findings together with such recommendations as it considers appropriate.

Further, the National Assembly Standing Orders assigns to the Committee the duty to inquire into allegations of absence by Members from parliamentary proceedings exceeding eight sittings within a session; enforce the Codes of Conduct made pursuant to the requirements of Chapter Six of the Constitution through the Leadership and Integrity Act, the Public Officer Ethics Act and the Parliamentary Power and Privileges Act, and to recommend necessary sanctions following due process.

**8.4 THE DIRECTORATE OF DEPARTMENTAL COMMITTEES**

**Introduction**

The Directorate of Departmental Committees plays a significant role in facilitating the realization of a number of strategic objectives of the Parliamentary Service Commission Strategic Plan, 2019 - 2030.

In the period under review, the Directorate of Departmental Committees played a critical role in the operations of the National Assembly. Notably, the Directorate facilitated the attainment of the strategic objectives of the Parliamentary Service Commission



particularly in enhancing Strategic Pillar No. I on Effective Representation, Legislation and Oversight with its attendant strategic objectives to improve the process of representation, legislation and oversight and strengthen the capacity of Members of Parliament to execute their constitutional mandate.

In addition, the Directorate facilitated the realization of Strategic Pillar No. II on Excellence in Service Delivery by strengthening the capacity of staff to facilitate Members in discharging their constitutional duties in an effective and efficient manner and facilitating the involvement of the public in legislation and oversight through public participation and stakeholder engagement contributing to enhanced public trust in the institution of Parliament.

Committees play a critical role in the operations of the National Assembly without which the operations of the House could slow down from the sheer volume of activities that would have to be considered at Plenary. Committees as agents of the House have enabled it to organize its work in such a way that it is able to perform numerous activities simultaneously and expeditiously.

Departmental Committees facilitate the National Assembly in the realization of its mandate to legislate; monitor and review legislation; administration and expenditure; gather information; and publicize issues; scrutinize governance activities, policies and programmes, assess whether they meet the intended objectives of legislation, policy frameworks and development plans.

Committees also conduct investigations on matters falling within their remit; vet and approve executive nominations and provide a platform for public participation in the execution of specified business, among others.

Departmental Committees derive their mandate from Standing Order 216 (5). In the aforementioned provisions, Departmental Committees have powers to investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and Departments. Similarly, they study the programme and policy objectives of Ministries and Departments and the effectiveness of their implementation and review all the legislation referred to them.

Further, Departmental Committees are mandated to study, access and analyze the relative success of Ministries and Departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives; investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and Departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House and vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve.

Lastly, Departmental Committees examine treaties, agreements and conventions; make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation; consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 264 of the Constitution; and examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within their mandates.

During the period under review, the fifteen (15) Departmental Committees undertook various activities in line with the mandate provided for in the aforementioned Standing Order. A summary of the activities undertaken by the Committees is as provided below: -

### Committees and Legislation

Article 95(3) of the Constitution mandates the National Assembly to enact legislation. Committees assist the House in the in-depth consideration of Bills and Legislative Proposals by incorporating public participation in the legislative process as well as consider and make recommendations for approval of ratification of treaties/protocols.

### Bills and Legislative Proposals

During the period under review, Committees considered ninety-eight (98) Bills and tabled sixty-three (63) reports on Bills. This represents sixty-four percent (64 %) of the Bills considered. The Committees considered Fifty-three (53) Legislative Proposals and submitted forty-one (41) reports to the Speaker in line with provisions of S.O. 114 (7). This represents seventy-seven percent (77%) of the Legislative Proposals considered. The table below summarises the number of Bills and Legislative Proposals considered by Departmental Committees. This is shown in table 18 below -

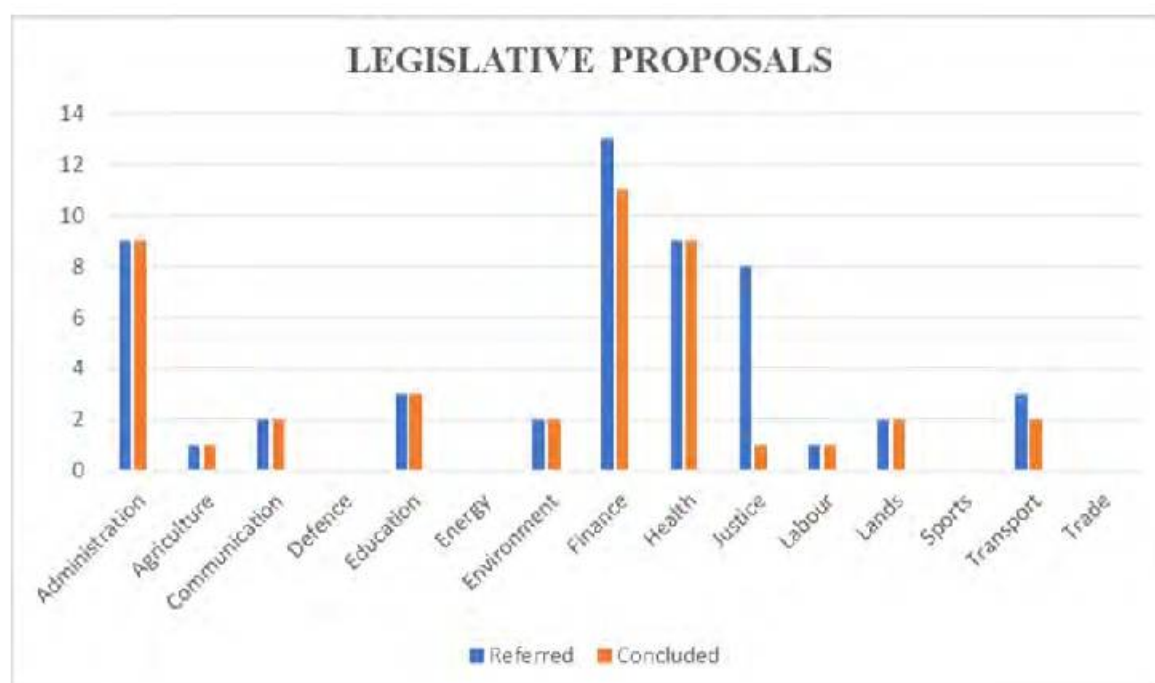
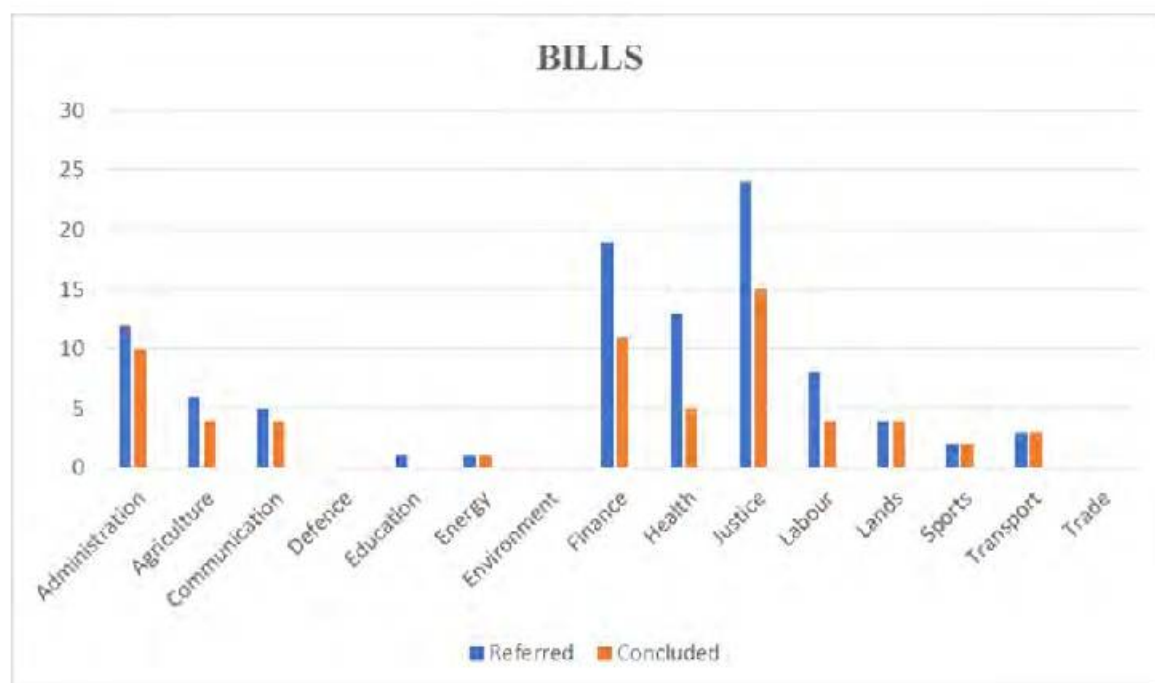

### **Highlight of some Bills**

1. The Tea Bill (Senate Bill No. 36 of 2018) will reform the tea sector and help the smallholder farmers in the country realize more revenue from their crops.
2. The Public Finance Management (Amendment) (No. 2) Bill, 2020 provided for guarantees by the Cabinet Secretary in charge of Finance for loans advanced to micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs). This will make it possible for MSMEs to access credit, which has been difficult as loaning institutions ask for security which most of them do not have. Resultantly, growth will be experienced in the sector and to the country's economy at large.
3. The Tax Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2020 provided tax reliefs for Kenyans whose livelihoods were affected by the measures put in place by the Government to curb the spread of the Corona Virus Disease in the country.

During the period, the Court Ruling on the Petition No. 353 of 2019 by the Senate regarding the consideration of Bills between the two Houses of Parliament significantly affected the review of Bills by Departmental Committees.

### **Treaties/Protocols and**

The Directorate of Departmental Committees considered and made recommendations for the approval of six (6) treaties for ratification in the Fourth Session. The Departmental Committee on Defense and Foreign Relations considered three (3) Treaties, the Departmental Committee on Transport, Public Works and Housing considered two (2) Treaties and the Departmental Committee on Finance and National planning considered one (1) Treaty.

### **Oversight and Representation**

Article 95(2) of the Constitution in regard to Oversight and Representation mandates the National Assembly to deliberate on and resolve issues of concern to the people. In fulfilment of this mandate, Departmental Committees facilitated the consideration of various business.

**In Review of the National Government Budget and Related Processes, the following were considered and deliberated: -**

#### **a) Consideration of the Budget Policy Statement (BPS) and Medium-Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF)**

Section 25 (2) of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 obligates the Cabinet Secretary for National Treasury to submit the Budget Policy Statement to Parliament for approval by 15<sup>th</sup> February of each year. Standing Order 232 (5) provides that upon being laid before the House, the BPS shall stand committed to each Departmental Committee to consider and make recommendations to the Budget and Appropriations Committee (BAC). In this regard, the 2020 BPS was laid on the Table of the House on Thursday, 13<sup>th</sup> February 2020 and committed to each Departmental Committee to scrutinize and make recommendations to the BAC.

In considering the BPS, Committees held consultative meetings with Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs). To this end, Committees reviewed expenditure ceilings for MDAs, set out fiscal responsibility principles and financial objectives over the medium



term and total resources allocated to each programme and project in every sector. In addition, the Committees analyzed the list of proposed projects for the period under review.

This process culminated into the production of fifteen (15) reports by the respective committees to the Budget & Appropriations Committee.

**b) Consideration of the Budget Estimates for the 2020/2021 FY and Medium-Term Expenditure Framework**

Section 39 of the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 requires the National Assembly to consider the Budget Estimates and Medium-Term Expenditure Framework for all Ministries, Departments and Agencies, Judicial Service Commission and Parliamentary Service Commission. Standing Order 235 provides that upon being laid before the House, the Budget Estimates shall stand committed to each Departmental Committee to consider and make recommendations to the BAC. In this regard, the Budget Estimates for the FY 2020/2021 was laid on the floor of the House on Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> April 2020 and committed to each Departmental Committee to scrutinize and make recommendations to the BAC.

In considering the Budget Estimates for the FY 2020/2021, Committees held consultative meetings with Ministries, Departments and Agencies. To this end, Committees reviewed Budget Estimates for MDAs, set out financial and non-financial policies and total resources allocated to each programme and project in every sector. This process culminated into the production of fifteen (15) reports by the respective Committees to the Budget & Appropriations Committee.

**c) Consideration of the Supplementary Budget Estimates for the FY 2019/2020 and Medium-Term Expenditure Framework**

During the Session, Departmental Committees reviewed the Supplementary Budget Estimates for the FY 2019/2020 for MDAs and submitted reports containing the recommendations of the committees for incorporation in to the Budget & Appropriations Committee report.

**Vetting of Nominees**

Article 132(2) requires the National Assembly to vet and approve nominees to various State offices including, Cabinet Secretaries; Secretary to the Cabinet; Principal Secretaries; High Commissioners, Ambassadors and Diplomatic and Consular representatives; and any other State or Public Officers whom the Constitution requires or empowers the President to appoint or dismiss.

Pursuant to this mandate, Departmental Committees facilitated twenty-four (24) approval hearings in the Fourth Session. The Departmental Committee on Defense and Foreign Relations vetted fourteen (14) nominees to the positions of Ambassadors and High Commissioners; the Departmental Committee on Education, Research and Technology vetted four (4) nominees, two for the position of Principal Secretary and two for the position of Teacher Service Commissioner; Communication, Information and Innovation vetted one nominee for the position of Data Commissioner; Finance and National Planning vetted one nominee for the position of Auditor General; Justice and Legal Affairs vetted one nominee for the position of Registrar of Political Parties and two other nominees for the position of Assistant Registrar of Political Parties, Transport, Public Works and Housing vetted one

nominee for the position of the Principal Secretary for State Department of Transport. The Department on Trade Industry and Cooperatives vetted one nominee for the position of Principal Secretary for Trade & Enterprise Development.

### Committee Inquiries

Departmental Committees do most of their work via inquiries into subjects within their remit. Standing Order 216 (5) mandates Departmental Committees to *investigate, inquire into and report on all matters that fall within their purview*. Committees execute inquiries either at the instigation of the House or on their own volition.

Inquiries provide a platform for Committees to single out areas or subjects within their remit, embark on detailed investigations, and report to the House. In essence, the recommendations made by Committees have far-reaching implications in terms of influencing policy directions and public discourse on such subjects where inquiries have been undertaken.

During the period under review, five (5) Departmental Committees undertook and reported inquiries on various subject areas either on *suo motto* (own motion) basis or upon referral by the House as shown in table 19 below –

### Questions and Statements

Parliamentary Questions and Statements remain important tools of oversight that enhance Government accountability to the citizens. Article 95(2) of the Constitution of Kenya mandates the National Assembly to deliberate on and resolve issues of concern to the people. Similarly, Article 153(4) (b) requires Cabinet Secretaries to provide Parliament with full and regular reports concerning matters under their control. The National Assembly has operationalized these provisions through Standing Orders 42 and 43, which provide for the general rules on Questions and Statements, respectively.



During the Fourth Session, Departmental Committees considered two hundred and eighty-eight (288) Questions and eighty-eight (88) Statements. The Questions and Statements raised were mostly on areas that impact directly on the lives of the citizens such as security, land, water, access to education, social welfare, provision of health services and infrastructure among others. 248 Questions were processed and responded to before Departmental Committees. This translates to 86 per cent of the Questions. Similarly, 80 responses to requests for Statements by Members were processed to conclusion. This translates to 87 per cent of the requests.

The Table below provides a summary of the number of Questions and Statements referred to Departmental Committees for processing during the period under review.

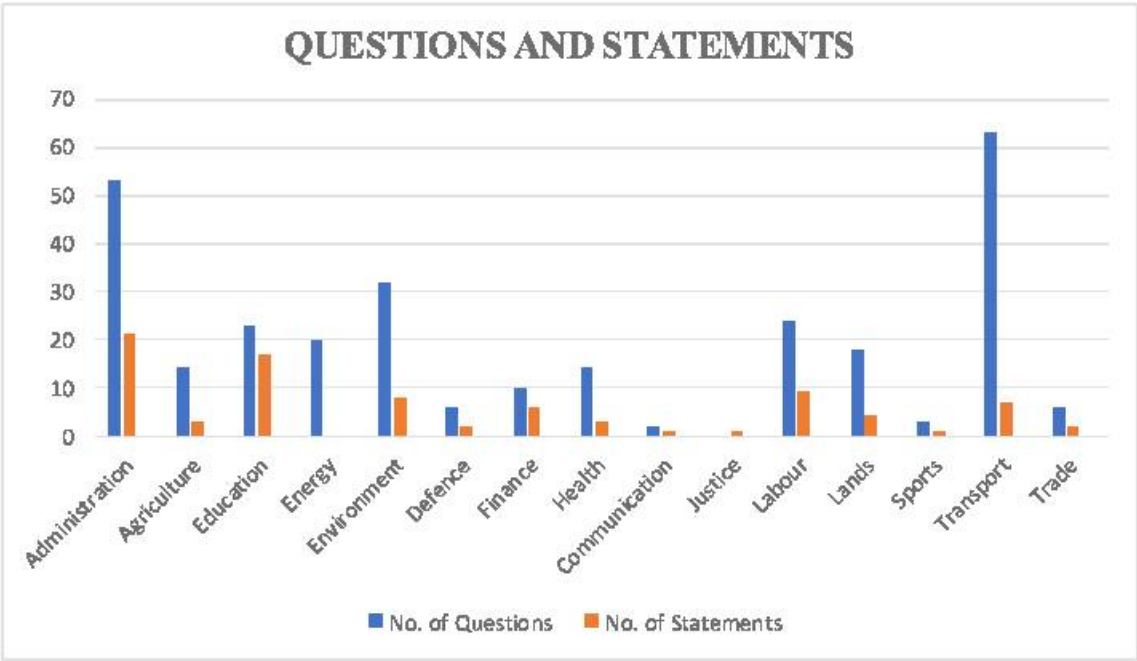

**Petitions**

Articles 37 and 119 of the Constitution of Kenya provide for the right of citizens to petition Public Authorities including Parliament to consider matters within their jurisdictions. Further, Standing Order 227 provides for the consideration of Petitions by the National Assembly. During the Session, Departmental Committees considered fifty-five (55) Petitions and tabled twenty-two (22) reports percent (40%) for considerations by the House.

The Petitions sought to address concerns mainly on irregularities in the allocation and transfer of land ownership, environmental conservation, insecurity, control of the sale of harmful chemical products such as pesticides in the Kenyan market, improvement of the welfare of workers in the public sector and social welfare of the elderly and disadvantaged. The table below shows the number of Petitions considered by each Departmental Committee as shown in table 22

#### 5.0 CHALLENGES EXPERIENCED BY DEPARTMENTAL COMMITTEES DURING THE PERIOD UNDER REVIEW

In the period under review, Committees achieved various milestones as presented above, however they faced a myriad of challenges including but not limited to: -

1. Measures put in place to curb the spread of COVID-19 including Ministry of Health Protocols and subsequent Speaker's Guidelines limited conduct of physical meetings and fact-finding visits;
2. Inadequate Committee meeting venues;



3. Technological inadequacies in audio – visual equipment, poor internet connectivity in Parliament, non- existent support hardware and inadequate capacity by Members of Parliament to participate in virtual Committee meetings;
4. Change of leadership and membership of Committees towards the end of the Fourth Session affected the smooth operations and strategic direction of Committees;
5. Unavailability of Cabinet Secretaries to respond to matters raised or referred to them contributed to slow implementation of Committees' work-plans;
6. Exchequer delays sometimes resulted in cancellation of planned activities, which interfered with the execution, and completion of Committees' planned activities.

## **8.5 THE DIRECTORATE OF AUDIT, APPROPRIATION & OTHER SELECT COMMITTEES**



### **Introduction**

The Directorate of Audit, Appropriation and other Select Committees of the National Assembly was established in October, 2020 as part of the restructuring of Committee operations initiated by the Parliamentary Service Commission aimed at improving service delivery. The Directorate coordinates, supervises the operations of all Committees and offers support to Members of Parliament who are members of Committees under the directorate in areas such as procedural advice, human resource, custody of records, liaising with Ministries and Government institutions, ensuring public participation, capacity building and administrative support.

The Committees under this directorate have specialized mandate in areas that include-

- a) examination of the audited financial statements of the three arms of the National Government and their respective agencies.
- b) scrutiny and approval of the annual estimates of income and expenditure of the National government and Medium-Term Expenditure Framework.
- c) Vetting and Approval of nominees by the President for positions of the Cabinet Secretaries and other executive nominations.
- d) Nomination of Members of the National Assembly to serve in Committees in

- consultation with Parliamentary parties.
- e) overseeing the implementation of the Constitution as well as the resolutions of the National Assembly.
- f) Consideration of statutory instruments submitted to Parliament.
- g) Promoting measures in relation to policy in pursuit of national cohesion and the integration process in the wider East African region and its environs.
- h) Overseeing the operations of all the services extended to the Members of the committees in the national Assembly including the operations of all Committees.
- i) Monitoring the implementation of the National Government Constituencies Development Fund

### Operations in the Period January – December 2020

Below is a summary of the business under the Directorate of Audit, Appropriation and other Select Committees during this period.

#### 1.1 Committee Sittings and stakeholder engagements

During this period, the Committees under this Directorate held a total of Five hundred and four (504) sittings within and outside the precincts of Parliament with a total of 141 stakeholder engagements as tabulated in table 25 below -

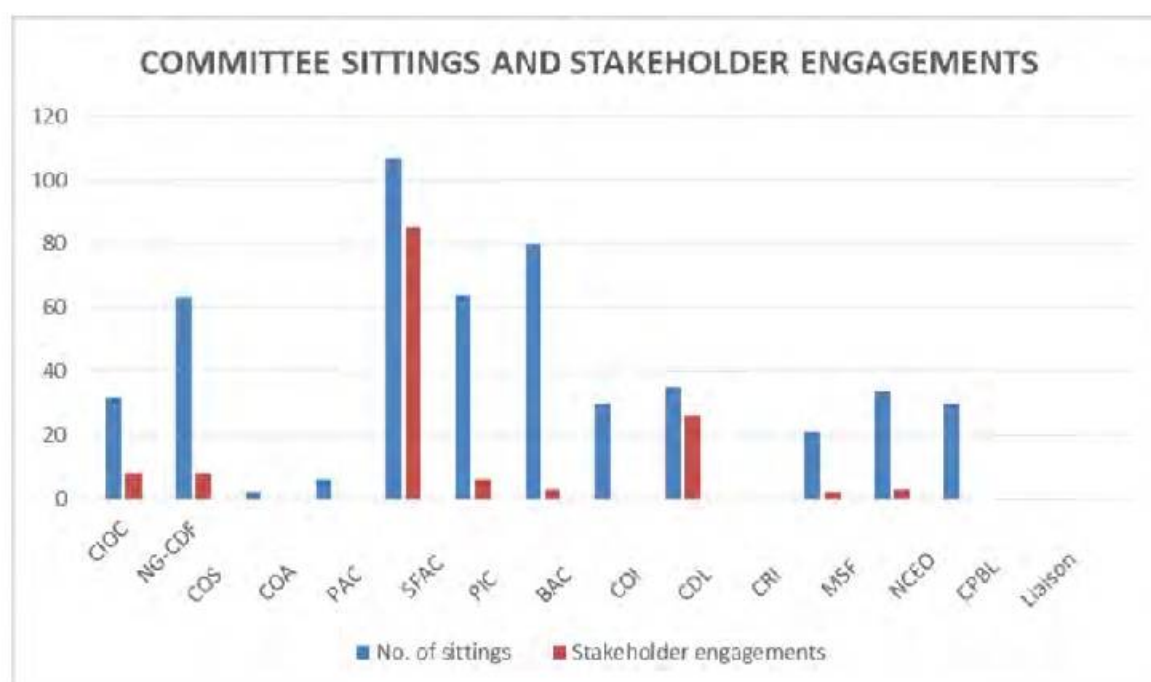

### 1.5 Vetting of Cabinet Secretaries

The Directorate of Audit, Appropriation and Other Select Committees facilitated four (4) approval hearings in the Fourth Session. The Committee on Appointments chaired by Hon. Speaker vetted two (2) nominees to the position of Cabinet Secretaries whereas the Select Committee on National Government Constituencies Development Fund vetted two (2) nominees for approval to the position of Chief Executive Officer of the NG-CDF Board.

### 1.6 Examination of the reports on the Audited Financial Statements

The Directorate processed fourteen (14) reports on the audited financial statements from the Special Funds Accounts Committee while the Public Investments Committee tabled three (3) reports. The Public Accounts Committee is also up to date with regards to the



examination of the Report of the Auditor General on the Audited Accounts of National Government with the latest report being that of 2017/2018.

### **1.7 Scrutiny and processing of Budget estimates on Expenditure during the period under review**

During the period, January - December, 2020, the Budget and Appropriation Committee processed:

- a) The Budget and Appropriations Committee report on the 2020 Budget Policy Statement;
- b) The Budget and Appropriations Committee Report on the Division of Revenue Bill, National Assembly Bill No.3 of 2020;
- c) The Budget and Appropriations Committee Report on the Senate Amendments to Division of Revenue Bill, 2020;
- d) The Budget and Appropriations Committee report on the second Supplementary Estimates for the Financial Year 2019/20;
- e) The Budget and Appropriations Committee report on the 2020/21 Budget Estimates;
- f) The Budget and Appropriations Committee report on the Third Supplementary Estimates for the Financial Year 2019/20;
- g) The Budget and Appropriations Committee report on the Third Basis Formula on Revenue Allocation; and
- h) The Budget and Appropriations Committee report on the County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2020.



## **2. Directorate's Key Achievements during the Period under Review**

1. During examination of audited financial statements for NG-CDF for various constituencies, the Committee found out that most projects were not implemented

fully as planned under various financial years. This was attributed to late disbursement of funds by the National Treasury to Constituencies, with some receiving the cash a few days to the closure of the financial year. The Committee recommended that the National Treasury speeds up quarterly disbursements of funds to the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Board for timely release to constituencies for effective implementation of various projects.

2. Development of a Protocol/Guide for conduct of virtual meetings to enable Committees to hold effective meetings during the Covid-19 pandemic.
3. Development of a Protocol/Guide for conduct of Local field visits/workshops of Committees during the pandemic which enabled Committees to continue undertaking their oversight responsibilities during the Covid-19 pandemic with minimum disruptions.
4. Appointment of the Auditor, Office of the Auditor General by the Public Accounts Committee.
5. Approval of the external auditor to audit the office of the Auditor General for the years 2014/15, 2015/2016, 2016/2017 and 2017/2018.

### **3. Challenges faced by the Directorate in executing its mandate**

1. The number of committee meetings have significantly dropped due to Covid-19 situation, hence restricting the number of attendees, availability of fewer committee venues and fewer field visits thus hampering the committee's oversight role.
2. Virtual meetings seemed unsuitable for engaging the accounting officers in responding to audit queries, also the frequent outage of internet connectivity did not allow for clear deliberations.
3. Public Investment Committee was unable to complete clear the backlogs due to failure by a number of Accounting Officers in submitting documents and also the very many parastatals.
4. Members of the committees need to be trained on the usage of their devices while conducting virtual meetings, since some of them are incapacitated on how to attend virtual meetings hence lack of quorum.
5. Public participation has not been fully undertaken especially the one that requires committee members to conduct field visits due to Covid-19 pandemic.
6. Failure of Cabinet Secretaries to attend meetings has led to delays in achieving committee objectives as stipulated in the committee work-plans.
7. Changes in Committees Membership during the fourth Sessions disrupted Committee operations and thus hampering effective discharge of their mandate.
8. Members of the Committee having membership in other Select Committee thus making it difficult to raise quorum especially when those other committees have extended their Sitting Schedules.

## 8.6 THE DIRECTORATE OF LEGAL SERVICES

### Introduction

The Directorate of Legal Services of the Kenya National Assembly (DLS) was established in 2012 by the Parliamentary Service Commission following the restructuring of offices within the Parliamentary service, with a view to providing in-house legal services to the National Assembly.

The main purpose for which the DLS was established is to provide efficient and timely legal and legislative services to the National Assembly, its Committees, the Speaker, the Parliamentary Service Commission, private Members of Parliament and the Clerk of the National Assembly. Provision of legal services to the National Assembly by the DLS contributes a great deal to the realization of the following Parliamentary Service Commission (PSC) strategic objectives as set out in the PSC Strategic Plan 2019-2030.

During the period under review, the DLS received and processed 289 requests for drafting services from Members of Parliament. The DLS rendered professional legislative drafting support to the Members by researching, analyzing and drafting preliminary and final versions of these legislative proposals.

In addition to drafting private Members' Bills, the DLS received and processed 19 Government Bills which were published under the name of the Leader of the Majority Party and Chairpersons of specific Committees in the National Assembly. The DLS also scrutinized and processed 11 vellum copies of Bills passed by the National Assembly and the Bills were either transmitted to the Senate or assented to by the President thus becoming Acts of the Parliament of Kenya during the period under review. The DLS also processed 142 Petitions by members of the Public and Members of the National Assembly and drafted over 600 Committee Stage Amendments for Members and the Committees of the House.

The DLS also offered legal advice to the 33 Committees of the House on all legal matters arising in the Committees as shown in table 29 below –

**Milestones Achieved by the Directorate during the Fourth Session.**

The DLS undertook the following activities:

**a) Strengthening the Capacity of Members and Committees to make Laws**

At the advent of the Corona Virus (COVID-19) pandemic and in the wake of its adverse effects to the physical operation of the House, the Directorate assisted the Procedure and House Rules Committee to formulate amendments to the National Assembly Standing Orders to provide for virtual and hybrid sittings of the House. Subsequently the Directorate assisted the Procedure and House Rules Committee to draft comprehensive guidelines on the conduct of virtual and hybrid proceedings of the House.

**b) Strengthening the office of the Speaker and other parliamentary offices**

The DLS rendered legal advice to the Speaker of the National Assembly on a number of legal and legislative issues that arose in Committees of the House, in the Chamber and in Parliament's interaction with other institutions outside Parliament.

The DLS also enhanced the performance by the office of the Leader of the Majority Party in the House by preparing legal opinions on proposed government legislative proposals, preparing moving notes for Bills sponsored by the Leader of Majority, redrafting Bills from the Office of the Attorney General before signature by the Leader of the Majority Party and fast tracking the publication of Bills that required to be published urgently.

**c) Strengthening the Office of the Clerk**

The DLS strengthened the Office of the Clerk of the National Assembly through rendering on legal advice on a host of procedural and substantive issues. The DLS advised the Clerk on whether Petitions lodged before Parliament complied with the Petitions to Parliament (Procedure) Act, 2013 and the relevant Standing Orders. The DLS also rendered legal advice to various Departmental Committees on various issues that arose in the Committees.

The DLS also represented the Clerk at meetings of interest groups and consultative bodies and provided information and explanations on existing or proposed legislation and solicited feedback on the same.

**d) Publications by the Directorate**

The Directorate developed and maintained an updated Legislative Proposals Tracker. Pursuant to the Communication issued by the Speaker on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 2020 the Tracker has been uploaded on the parliamentary website and provides a running account of the extensive preparatory work done by Members of Parliament in the discharge of their legislative mandate prior to the publication of Bills. It also apprises Members of the progress made in the processing of their legislative proposals in a timely fashion.

**e) Training and Professional Development**

During the period under review, the DLS was unable to meet its training goals owing to the various restrictions imposed by the effects of the Corona Virus (COVID-19) pandemic.

On a positive note, Legal counsel were able to physically and virtually attend Continuous Professional Development seminars under the auspices of the Law Society of Kenya. The seminars enabled Counsel to keep abreast with new developments in law and to satisfy the

requirements for renewal of their practicing certificates for the coming year. However, unlike other Directorates, certain functions of the Directorate of Legal Services, such as legislative drafting, requires specialised training in order to equip an individual officer with the requisite skills. The functions of the DLS also require that its staff keep abreast with the latest knowledge and information in matters concerning the workings of Parliament. In this respect training and comparative exposure to the workings of other jurisdictions are invaluable. The DLS thus places particular emphasis on training, continuing legal education and professional development of its staff.

**f) Parliamentary Pupillage and Internship Programme**

During the year under review, the DLS hosted nine twelve (12) pupils under the Parliamentary Pupillage Programme and counselled and mentored three (3) interns. The Legal Counsel offered the pupils and interns instructions on the proper practice of an advocate, as required for them to be admitted as Advocates.

## **8.7 THE HANSARD DEPARTMENT**

### **Introduction**



The publishing of *Hansard* Report in Kenya is based on the Westminster model and its mandate is provided under Standing No. 248 of the National Assembly Standing Orders which that-

- (1) There shall be published within forty-eight hours, a verbatim report of all proceedings of the House, unless the Speaker is satisfied that this is rendered impossible by some emergency.
- (2) Every Member shall have an opportunity to correct the draft verbatim report of his or her contribution, but not to alter the substance of what the Member actually said.
- (3) Where there is doubt as to the content of the verbatim record of the House, the Speaker shall make a determination."



The National Assembly *Hansard* follows the principles laid down in 1907 by the House of Commons Select Committee on Parliamentary Debates that defined *Hansard* as follows:

*"It is a full report, in the first person, of all speakers alike, a full report being defined as one which, though not strictly verbatim, is substantially the verbatim report, with repetitions and redundancies omitted and with obvious mistakes corrected, but which on the other hand leaves out nothing that adds to the meaning of the speech or illustrates the argument."*

### Activities undertaken

During the period under review, the Department produced eighty six (86) Hansard Reports for plenary sessions transcribed, edited, and copies uploaded onto Parliament website as shown in table 30 below –

Secondly, the Department recorded one thousand and seventy five (1075) Committee proceedings, which are at various stages of transcription with twenty five(25) Committee reports transcribed and edited. The Department also performed the following tasks:

- Facilitated virtual meetings for Committees through use of various platforms such as Zoom, WebEx and Microsoft Teams;
- Carried out routine maintenance and troubleshooting of conference systems, mixers and amplifiers;
- Installed a secondary signal cable from the Chamber Control Room to the National Assembly recording room in order to improve on quality of audio recordings;
- Installed a digital mixer in the Control Room;
- Prepared specifications for digital conference systems to be installed in Ukulima House; and prepared technical report on the suitability of committee rooms hired for use within Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC).

## 8.8 THE PARLIAMENTARY BUDGET OFFICE (PBO)

### Introduction

The primary mandate of Parliament is legislation, representation, oversight, and budget making. In that regard, the Parliamentary Budget Office (PBO) continues to discharge its mandate of providing professional services in respect of budget, finance, and economic information to the committees of Parliament as stipulated in Section 10 of the PFM Act, 2012 and other sections particularly under Part II of the PFM detailing the role of specific committees. In-line with its mandate and provisions of the respective Standing Orders, the



Office also provides support to the Speakers through money Bill determination and costing analysis of various legislative proposals including motions and draft Member's Bills in line with Article 114 of the Constitution 2010 and other legal bases.

The Directorate of Parliamentary Budget Office is headed by a Director and has staff strength of twenty-five (25) technical officers and four (4) support staff. It is structured into three functional Departments namely:

- (i) Budget Analysis and Sectoral Expenditure (BASE) Department;
- (ii) Macroeconomic Analysis and Statistics (MAS) Department; and,
- (iii) Tax and Inter-fiscal Relations (TIFR) Department,

### **Activities undertaken in PBO**

The directorate in the course of the Session undertook the following activities: -

#### **a) Processing of Legislative proposals**

- (i) Money Bill Determination - Determination/certification of draft Bills as per Article 114 of the Constitution on money Bill matters. Fifty-eight (58) draft bills were submitted for determination, thirty-four (34) Bills (63%) were certified as Money Bills while Twenty (20) Bills (37%) were certified as Non-Money Bills, four (4) legislative proposals were under processing.
- (ii) Costing of legislative proposals - Fifty-five (55) draft bills were referred to the directorate for costing and presentation to Budget and Appropriation Committee.
- (iii) Analysis of Petitions, Regulations and Bills - The Department also undertook other key mandates such as analyzing petitions, Bills (Clause by Clause review) and sessional papers.

#### **b) Technical support to Oversight Committees.**

- (i) The directorate provided technical back-stopping to the Public Accounts Committee where thirty-six (36) analytical reports on various issues in the audit reports relating to financial statement for various MDAs were provided. The Audit Reports were in respect of the Financial Year ended 30<sup>th</sup> June 2018.
- (ii) The directorate also provided technical back-stopping to Public Investment Committee by providing twenty-five (25) analytical reports on various issues in the audit reports on the financial statement for various State Corporations as well as support to Special Funds Accounts Committee.
- (iii) Technical support was also offered to the County Public Accounts and Investment Committee (CPAIC). Forty-Seven (47) briefs towards the legislative processing of statutory county executive audit reports submitted to Senate; Five (5) briefs on the County Assembly in respect of legislative processing of statutory county assembly audit reports submitted to Senate.

#### **c) Unpacking and briefing on the 2020 Budget Policy Statement**

The analytical review reports of the Budget Policy Statement (BPS) 2020 and the medium term were presented to Departmental and Standing Committees of Parliament that provided critical input to the report of the Budget & Appropriation Committee as well as Finance and Budget Committee.

- d) **Review and analysis of the 2020 Medium Term Debt Strategy and dissemination -**  
The analysis report was presented to Budget and Appropriation Committee
- e) **Analysis and review of the Supplementary Budget Estimates:** - The directorate provided an analytical review of changes in revenues and expenditure estimates as was proposed in the Supplementary Budget I, II and III of 2019/20.
- f) **Unpacking of Budget Proposals for 2020/2021** and presenting the same to Budget and Appropriation Committee
- g) **Review of the Budget Proposals for 2020/2021:** The Directorate provided analysis and review of the estimates of revenues and expenditures for 2020/2021 and the Medium Term and presented the same to the Departmental Committees.
- h) **Analysis of the proposed revenue measures and tax policy changes:** - The Office analyzed the various proposed revenue measures and tax policy changes. The Directorate analyzed Finance Bill 2020 and briefed the Committee on Finance and Planning of the National Assembly. The Directorate also specifically contributed a section
- i) **Analysis of the Budget Review and Outlook Paper (BROP)**
- j) **Budget oversight - Preparation of Budget Implementation Oversight (BIO) Briefs:** - The Directorate provided an analytical brief to the 14 Departmental Committees of the National Assembly. The briefs formed the basis of budget oversight for the 2020/21 budget.
- (i) **Analysis of Quarterly Budget Performance.** To appraise the National Assembly on the status of budget implementation in every Quarter, the Directorate prepared a total of 42 briefs on-budget performance for Quarters 1, 2, and 3.
- k) **Review and technical support on the third basis on county revenue sharing for the period 2021/22 - 2024/25**
- l) **Review and briefing on the following bills**
  - (i) Division Revenue Bill, 2020
  - (ii) County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2020
  - (ii) Preparation of Division of Revenue Bill 2020, Appropriation Bill and Supplementary Appropriation Bills.
- m) **Carried out Budget, Economic and Fiscal Performance Analysis** - The activity involves in year tracking of fiscal policy objectives and the interpretation of the short-term trend of macro-economic variables and provides an update of important social/political trends in the country for use in briefs to committees of Parliament.

### **3. PBO Publications**

The directorate published the following documents during the year -

- a) The Directorate published 2020 budget watch on the 2020/21 budget and the medium term which includes; *Post Budget Analysis from a Macro- Economic Analysis Perspective*.
  - b) Budget options during the pandemic on the impact of taxation measures introduced to address the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic
4. **Capacity Building for the PBO County Assemblies:** - The Office was mandated by the Parliamentary Service Commission to develop capacity building programs relevant to the County Assembly Staff. In line with this mandate, the Directorate participated in capacity building for PBO and county assembly staff on budget documentations in collaboration with CPST
5. **Capacity Building and attachments for PBO Staff:** - A further 6 staff were trained on Training of Trainers by CPST in collaboration with UNIDO. However, the staff from the directorate were not given due consideration for any attachment due to the prevailing Covid-19 pandemic.

#### 8.9 THE SERJEANT-AT-ARMS DEPARTMENT

The Serjeant-at-Arms (SAA) Department undertook its mandate of maintaining order in the chamber and within parliamentary precincts, as well as overseeing the maintenance of buildings and other facilities.

## ANNEX 9

### RESOLUTIONS OF THE HOUSE LEADERSHIP RETREAT HELD ON 25<sup>TH</sup> & 26<sup>TH</sup> AUGUST 2020 AT THE OLE SERENI HOTEL, NAIROBI COUNTY

#### Key areas of discussions included –

- a) **Effectively leading elected Officials in a Political Environment:** *Role of Chairpersons of Parliamentary Committees;*
- b) **Business Continuity Amidst the Pandemic -** *Plans for full Hybrid and Virtual Sittings of the House;*
- c) **Implementing the Constitution of Kenya -** *Effective marshaling and prioritizing of legislative issues for Chapter 15 Commissions and Independent Offices & Commentary on the realization of the Two-Thirds Gender threshold under the Constitution;*
- d) **Business resourcing, accountability and oversight during and post-Covid-19 Pandemic; and**
- e) **Plans to safeguard the Economy of the nation in the midst of the Covid-19 Pandemic:** *Sustaining national revenue; Expectations of the Executive on the Legislature; Economic and Social Interventions; and managing the national debt portfolio and the wage bill.*

#### Key Outcomes

- a) Chairpersons and Vice-Chairpersons should focus on independently discharging their roles in enabling Committees to oversight the Executive in the context of the mandate of the National Assembly as espoused in the Constitution.
- b) Plans be rolled out to continuously build the capacity of the Leadership of the House, particularly the newly elected Chairpersons and Vice-Chairpersons and Party Leadership.
- c) Committees to be encouraged to devise creative avenues for undertaking public participation and engaging stakeholder and/or experts in Committee work during the Covid-19 Pandemic period.
- d) The Liaison Committee to develop guidelines for processing requests from Committees to sit outside the precincts of Parliament or undertake field visits during the Covid-19 Pandemic period.
- e) The National Assembly should develop an internal and secure system for supporting virtual sittings of the House and committee meetings. The system should preferably be hosted internally. When developing a local system for virtual sittings, the National Assembly should benchmark with other jurisdictions (such as Brazil) which have successfully deployed technological systems for virtual or hybrid sittings.
- f) Members participating in or attending parliamentary sessions virtually must do so in the Members' offices within the precincts of Parliament so as to safeguard constitutionality of attendance, legality of decisions made and for accountability.
- g) The Parliamentary Broadcasting and Library Committee should develop a mechanism or guidelines for virtual participation by the media in House business to ensure access to information by the public.
- h) Each Committee of the House should develop an annual Work Plan that is aligned to the Strategic Plan of Parliament and the national development programme and submit it to the Liaison Committee.

- i) The National Assembly, in conjunction with other accountability bodies, to develop a robust framework for real-time audit, timely implementation of audit recommendations and facilitative frameworks for effective audit committees during the Covid-19 Pandemic period.
- j) The National Assembly should explore mechanisms of strengthening inter-linkages between accountability organs, such as PAC, PIC, ODPP, DCI, EACC, KRA, Kenya Police, FRC and professional bodies, so as to develop coordinated approaches in accountability and oversight of public funds.
- k) Parliament ought to review its own Strategic Plan 2019-2030 to align it to the new normal which has significantly changed the environment of delivering on its critical mandate.
- l) The National Treasury to submit to the National Assembly a quarterly report on exchequer releases to facilitate adequate oversight of government agencies on their expenditures.
- m) Departmental Committees ought to utilize Annual Budget Implementation Reports from the Controller of Budget and regularly follow-up on utilization of funds allocated to various government agencies in the budget each year to ensure prudent use of public funds.
- n) The National Treasury should endeavor to restructure Kenya's external debts which have a short maturity period and high interest, in order to ensure sustainability in debt repayment as part of efforts to secure the economy from the adverse effects of the pandemic.
