3. <u>COMMUNICATION FROM THE CHAIR ON MARSHALLING OF BUSINESS</u> <u>IN THE SENATE</u>

The Speaker conveyed the following communication from the Chair-

"Honourable Senators,

As you will recall from my Communication yesterday, I indicated that sixth Session will be a short one owing to the fact that this is an election year. Critical Business still remains to be dispensed with. In this regard, the Senate Business Committee, at its inaugural meeting held yesterday, Tuesday, 8th February, 2022, considered the Legislative Business pending before the Senate and took note the high number of Bills and Petitions that are yet to be concluded. The Committee expressed concern that certain Motions and Bills on the Order Paper keep recurring, owing to the unavailability of sponsors to prosecute them.

Honourable Senators,

Resultantly the Senate Business Committee resolved that where sponsors of Business are not available to move such Business, it shall be dropped from the Weekly Programme pursuant to Standing Order 59 (3). For avoidance of doubt, Standing Order 59 (3) states -

Where no Senator moves a Motion at the time specified by or under these Standing Orders, such Motion shall not be published again in the Order Paper during the same Session except with the leave of the Speaker.

Honourable Senators,

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I take this opportunity to urge each Senator with Business to be proactive in tracking the same and attend Plenary whenever such Business is scheduled.

9. STATEMENTS

a) <u>Pursuant to Standing Order 47 (1)</u>

Nominated Senator (Sen. (Dr.) Gertrude Musuruve, MP) made a statement concerning the International Day of Women and Girls in Science.

In the Statement, the Senator informed the Senate that the world marks the International Day of Women and Girls in Science annually on the 11th February, following a resolution of the United Nations on 22nd December, 2015, to recognize the critical role women and girls play in science and technology.

The Senator noted that women and girls in science-oriented disciplines (STEM) were few but that in the past few decades, their representation in the workforce in STEM fields had significantly improved. She further observed that several colleges and universities were taking steps to minimize the gender gap between men and women in the engineering field by recruiting more women into their programs. She highlighted that this was laudable, citing programmes such as the Young Scientists of Kenya (YSK) initiative that accords young individuals an opportunity to demonstrate innovation and showcase their scientific talents.

The Senator concluded by calling upon the national and county governments to strengthen such programmes that promote the participation of women and girls in STEM disciplines and called upon universities to continue encouraging women to enroll in graduate programs that offer STEM related courses.
