CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

Pursuant to Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution and Section 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011, on 4th May, 2022 H.E. the President forwarded to the Speaker of the National Assembly, a notification of appointment containing the names and Curricula Vitae of twenty two (22) Ambassadors/High Commissioners/Permanent Representatives nominees for consideration and subsequent approval by the National Assembly for appointment to the positions which they had been nominated.

On 15th April 2022, the House before embarking on its short recess had passed a procedural motion allowing the Speaker to refer messages received from among others, the President, to the relevant Committee for consideration without having to recall the House. The Speaker therefore directly referred the message to the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations for vetting and reporting to the House upon resumption.

The Committee held seven (7) sittings to consider the program, review the preparations and carry out the vetting. The twenty-one nominees appeared before the Committee on 16th, 17th and 18th May 2022 and were vetted in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, No. 33 of 2011, the Foreign Service Act, 2021 and the National Assembly Standing Orders on their suitability or otherwise for appointment as Ambassadors/High Commissioners/Permanent Representatives.

The Committee deliberated on the nominees duly filled Questionnaires in accordance with Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, Curriculum vitae, reports from relevant authorities, presentations made by the nominees including their oral submissions during vetting.

The Committee, in compliance with the Constitutional and other legal requirements and established procedures for vetting, invited views on the nominees from the public and ensured that its meetings were open to the public and covered by the media.


May I take this opportunity to thank all Members of the Committee for their input and valuable contributions during the deliberations and vetting exercise. I also take this opportunity on behalf of the Committee to thank the Offices of the Speaker and of the Clerk of the National Assembly for the logistical support accorded to it during the exercise. As a Committee, we also appreciate the role played by the media following its coverage of the proceedings, thus enhancing accountability, transparency and ensuring the participation of the public.

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations and pursuant to Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution, Section 20(2) of the Foreign Service Act No. 12 of 2021, Sections 3 and 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011, and the provisions of Standing Order 199(6), it is my pleasure and duty to present to the House for adoption, the Committee's report on the vetting of the following nominees for appointment as Ambassadors/High Commissioners/Permanent Representatives;

1.0 PREFACE

1.1 Establishment of the Committee

The Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations is established pursuant to Standing Order 216.

1.2 Mandate of the Committee

The Committee is mandated under Standing Order 216 (4) and (5) to inter alia-

- a) investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned ministries and departments;
- b) study the programme and policy objectives of ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation and effectiveness of the implementation;
- c) study and review all legislation referred to it;
- d) study, assess and analyze the relative success of the ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
- e) investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
- f) vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204 (Committee on Appointments);**
- g) examine treaties, agreements and conventions;
- h) make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
- i) consider reports of Commissions and independent offices submitted to the house pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
- j) examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.

In executing its mandate, the Committee oversees the following Ministries and Departments:

- i) Ministry of Defence;
- ii) Ministry of Foreign Affairs;
- iii) Ministry of East African Community and Regional Development; and
- iv) National Intelligence Service.

According to Schedule II of the Standing Orders, the Committee is mandated to consider the following subjects:

- i) Defence;
- ii) Intelligence;
- iii) Foreign Relations;
- iv) Diplomatic and Consular Services;
- v) International Boundaries including territorial waters and international Relations; and
- vi) Agreements, Treaties and Conventions.

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 Establishment of the Office of High Commissioner, Ambassador or Permanent Representative

1. The Office of Ambassador, High Commissioner or Permanent Representative is an office under the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The duties of the Office include:
 - i) advancement and protection of Kenya's interests in host countries and countries of accreditation through innovative diplomacy;
 - ii) promotion of Kenya's influence in international decision making;
 - iii) protection of Kenya's sovereignty and territorial integrity;
 - iv) promotion and strengthening of bilateral or multilateral co-operation; and
 - v) promotion of sub-regional, regional and international integration and cooperation;
2. Pursuant to the Foreign Service Act (No. 12 of 2021) the Head of a Mission shall —
 - (a) actively pursue the foreign policy objectives of the Republic in the host country;
 - (b) act as the personal representative of the Head of State in the host country;
 - (c) act as an official representative of the Republic at official functions in the host country;
 - (d) be responsible for the management and administration of the Mission and all members of the Foreign Service located at the Mission, including the locally engaged staff of the Mission;
 - (e) be accountable for any expenditure of the Mission and ensure that the budget of the Mission is administered in accordance with the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 (No. 18 of 2012) and all other applicable laws and regulations.

2.2 Nomination of High Commissioners, Ambassadors and Permanent Representatives

3. Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution confers upon the President the power to nominate, and subject to approval by the National Assembly, appoint Ambassadors, High Commissioners and Permanent Representatives. It provides that:

“The President shall nominate and, with the approval of the National Assembly, appoint and may dismiss High Commissioners, Ambassadors and Diplomatic and Consular Representatives”.

2.3 Notification of nomination

4. In accordance with the provisions of Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution and Section 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, H.E. the President vide a letter dated 4th May 2022, under reference number OP/CAB.9/178A (*Annexure 3*) forwarded to the National Assembly, for consideration and approval, the notification of nomination of the following twenty-two (22) persons for appointment as Ambassadors, High Commissioners and Permanent Representatives:

2.4 Committal to the Departmental Committee of the nominations

5. On 15th April 2022, the House passed a procedural motion allowing the Speaker to refer messages received from among others, the President, to the relevant Committee for consideration, without having to recall the House from recess. The Speaker therefore directly referred the message from H.E. the President to the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations for vetting and reporting to the House upon resumption (*Annexure 4*).

2.5 Notification to the public

6. Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011, provides that *"any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated"*.
7. The Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Friday, 6th May 2022 inviting the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath (affidavits) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominees in conformity with Section 6(9) of

the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011. The advertisement indicated that the submissions were to be received by Friday, 13th May 2022 at 5.00 pm (*Annexure 5*).

8. Pursuant to the provisions of Article 118(1)(b) of the Constitution, Section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act and Standing Order 45(3), the general public was on Friday, 6th May 2022 notified through an advert placed in the print media by the Clerk of the National Assembly of the intention of the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations to conduct the vetting of the nominees on 16th, 17th and 18th May 2022.

2.6 Notification to the nominees

9. Further to the notice of vetting carried in the print media, pursuant to Section 6(3) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011, notifying the nominees of the date, time and place for holding the approval hearings, the Clerk of the National Assembly wrote to the individual nominees vide letters dated 9th May 2022 inviting them for the same (*Annexure 6*).

2.7 Clearance requirements

10. On 9th May 2022, the Clerk of the National Assembly wrote to the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Directorate of Criminal Investigation (DCI), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) and the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) requesting for information (*Annexure 7*) with respect to the nominees on the following:
 - (a) matters touching on integrity;
 - (b) tax compliance;
 - (c) loan repayments; and
 - (d) political party affiliations.
11. All the agencies reported no outstanding issues on any of the nominees to be vetted (*Annexure 8*).

2.8 Constitutional and statutory requirements in parliamentary approval of public appointments

12. The Constitution and various statutes provide clear framework on conduct of parliamentary approval of public appointments. They are listed below:
 - (a) The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011);
 - (b) Chapter 6 of the Constitution (leadership and integrity); Article 10 of the Constitution (national values and principles of governance); Article 124(4) of the Constitution (parliamentary approval of public appointments); Article 118 of the Constitution (public access and participation); Article 232 of the Constitution (values and principles of public service);
 - (c) The Leadership and Integrity Act (Cap. 182);
 - (d) The Foreign Service Act (No. 12 of 2021);
 - (e) The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act (No. 1A of 2015)
 - (f) The Public Officer Ethics Act (Cap. 183)

The Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011)

13. Section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, Chapter 136, provides for issues which the National Assembly is supposed to consider in relation to any nomination. These are:
- (a) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
 - (b) any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
 - (c) the suitability of the nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which nomination is being made.
-
14. The procedure for appointment of Ambassadors and High Commissioners is outlined under the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and the Foreign Service Act, 2021.
15. Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution provides that nomination of Ambassadors and High Commissioners is a constitutional prerogative of the President. There is no further procedure prescribed in the Constitution. Section 20 of the Foreign Service Act makes a cross-reference to Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution on the nomination of Ambassadors and High Commissioners.
16. Section 6 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act provides direction on the conduct of approval hearing. These are:
- (a) An approval hearing shall focus on a candidate's academic credentials, professional training and experience, personal integrity and background (section 6(7));
 - (b) The criteria specified in the Schedule shall be used by a Committee during an approval hearing for the purposes of vetting a candidate (section 6(8));
 - (c) Any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated (section 6(9));
 - (d) A candidate may, at any time, by notice in writing addressed to the Clerk, withdraw from the approval process and the candidate's nomination shall end (section 6(10)).
17. The period for consideration of nomination is spelt out in the Act. Section 8(1) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act provides that the Committee shall consider the nomination and table its report to the House for debate and decision within twenty-eight (28) days from the date on which the notification of nomination was given.

Constitutional Provisions

18. The Constitution, in addition, sets out certain requirements regarding the appointment of persons to public office which include:

Chapter Six on Leadership and Integrity

19. The Committee, in determining the suitability of the nominees, took into consideration the provisions on leadership and integrity as outlined under Chapter Six of the Constitution. In particular, the Committee took cognizance of the following provisions-
- i. Article 73(2) of the Constitution that provides that the guiding principles of leadership and integrity include-
 - (a) selection on the basis of personal integrity, competence and suitability, or election in free and fair elections;
 - (b) objectivity and impartiality in decision making, and in ensuring that decisions are not influenced by nepotism, favoritism, other improper motives or corrupt practices;
 - (c) selfless service based solely on the public interest, demonstrated by —
 - (i) honesty in the execution of public duties; and
 - (ii) the declaration of any personal interest that may conflict with public duties;
 - (d) accountability to the public for decisions and actions; and
 - (e) discipline and commitment in service to the people.
 - ii. Article 75(1) of the Constitution that requires a State officer, whether in public or private life, to behave in a manner that avoids conflict between personal interest and public official duties and Article 75(3) of the Constitution that prohibits a State Officer who has been removed from office under that Article from holding any other State Office.
 - iii. Article 77(1) of the Constitution that prohibits a full time State officer from participating in any other gainful employment.
 - iv. Article 77(2) of the Constitution that prohibits an appointed State officer from holding office in a political party.
 - v. Article 78 (1) of the Constitution that disqualifies persons who are not Kenyan citizens and persons holding dual citizenship from appointment as State Officers.

Article 10(2) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance

20. Article 10(2) of the Constitution provides for the national values and principles of governance which include patriotism, national unity, sharing and devolution of power, the rule of law, democracy and participation of the people; human dignity, equity, social justice, inclusiveness, equality, human rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalised; good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability; and sustainable development.

Article 118 of the Constitution

Article 118 of the Constitution obligates Parliament to conduct its business in an open manner, and that its sittings and those of its committees shall be in public; and that Parliament shall facilitate public participation and involvement in the legislative and other business of Parliament and its committees. It also provides that Parliament may not exclude the public, or any media, from any sitting unless in exceptional circumstances the relevant Speaker has determined that there are justifiable reasons for the exclusion.

Article 124(4) of the Constitution on parliamentary approval of public appointments

21. Article 124(4) of the Constitution provides that when a House of Parliament considers any appointment for which its approval is required under the Constitution or an Act of Parliament, the appointment shall be considered by a committee of the relevant House; the committee's recommendation shall be tabled in the House for approval; and the proceedings of the committee and the House shall be in public.

Article 232 of the Constitution on Values and Principles of Public Service

22. Article 232 of the Constitution provides for the values and principles of public service which include ~~high standards of professional ethics; efficient, effective and economic use of~~ resources; responsive, prompt, effective, impartial and equitable provision of services; involvement of the people in the process of policy making; accountability for administrative acts; transparency and provision to the public of timely, accurate information; fair competition and merit as the basis of appointments and promotions; representation of Kenya's diverse communities; and affording adequate and equal opportunities for appointment, training and advancement, at all levels of the public service of men and women; the members of all ethnic groups; and persons with disabilities.

The Leadership and Integrity Act

23. The Leadership and Integrity Act provides a number of obligations to a State officer. These are, among others: to respect and abide by the Constitution and the law, public trust, performance of duties in an honest and accountable manner, professionalism, financial integrity, not to engage in activities that amount to abuse of office, not to misuse public resources, accepting gifts that may compromise the officer's duties, wrongful or unlawful acquisition of property, and conflict of interest.

The Foreign Service Act (No. 12 of 2021);

24. Section 20 of the Foreign Service Act provides for the appointment of high commissioners, ambassadors and diplomatic and consular representatives. It provides as follows:

20. Appointment

(1) The Office of a high commissioner, ambassador, diplomatic or consular representative shall be a State office for purposes of Article 260 of the Constitution.

(2) Pursuant to Article 132 (2) (e) of the Constitution, the President shall nominate and, subject to the approval of the National Assembly, appoint high commissioners, ambassadors and diplomatic or consular representatives.

(3) A nomination under sub section (2) shall reflect—

(a) a fair balance between career diplomats and other appointees; and

(b) the gender, regional and other diversities of the people of Kenya.

(4) A person nominated for appointment under subsection (2) shall be—

(a) a citizen of Kenya; and

(b) of a reputable character and standing.

25. Section 21 of the Foreign Service Act provides for the duties of the Head of Mission. The Act defines Head of Mission to mean an ambassador, high commissioner, permanent representative, a consul-general or an officer acting in that capacity. It provides for the duties of the Head of Mission as follows:

21. Duties of the Head of Mission

(1) The Head of a Mission shall —

(a) actively pursue the foreign policy objectives of the Republic in the host country;

(b) act as the personal representative of the Head of State in the host country;

(c) act as an official representative of the Republic at official functions in the host country;

(d) be responsible for the management and administration of the Mission and all members of the Foreign Service located at the Mission, including the locally engaged staff of the Mission;

(e) be accountable for any expenditure of the Mission and ensure that the budget of the Mission is administered in accordance with the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 (No. 18 of 2012) and all other applicable laws and regulations.

(2) A Mission may have more than one person designated to serve as ambassador or high commissioner.

(3) Where a Mission has more than one ambassador or high commissioner, the ambassador or high commissioner designated as ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary shall be the Head of Mission.

The Public Service (Values and Principles) Act

26. Section 5 of the Public Service (Values and Principles) Act provides that a public officer shall maintain high standards of professional ethics, including, being honest; displaying high standards of integrity, transparency, accountability, respect to others, objectivity, patriotism, and observance of rule of law.

The Public Officer Ethics Act

27. The Public Officer Ethics Act provides for obligations to be carried out by a public officer. These include professionalism, carrying out duties in accordance with the law, prohibition from unjust enrichment, avoiding conflict of interest, not using office as a venue for soliciting or collecting harambees; not acting for foreigners; care of property; political neutrality, not practicing nepotism or favouritism, giving impartial advice, conducting private affairs in a way that maintains public confidence, bar from sexual harassment, and submission of declaration of income, assets and liabilities once every two years.

Suitability of a nominee for the appointment proposed having regard to whether a nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is being made

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28. The Committee observed that suitability of the nominee should be evaluated holistically taking into account the nominee's academic credentials, professional training, experience, background and personal qualities as well as the performance of the nominee during the approval hearing.
29. The Committee's observations and resolutions as per the specific nominees are contained in the respective parts relating to those nominees in this report.

2.9 Memoranda from members of the public

30. Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approvals) Act, provides that *any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold office to which the candidate has been nominated.*
31. The Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Friday 6th May 2022 inviting the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath (affidavits) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominees in conformity with Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act.
32. By close of business on Friday 13th May 2022 at 5.00 p.m., the Committee had received two memoranda, although not by way of written statements on oath (affidavits) as provided by Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act and stipulated in the advertisement in the print media inviting representations from the public on the suitability of nominees. These were:
- (a) Memorandum by S.O. Owino & Associates on behalf of Abdi Dara objecting the approval of Maj. Gen. (Rtd) Andrew Ikenye for appointment as High Commissioner representing the Republic of Kenya in Nigeria (*Appendix II VOL. II*);
 - (b) Memorandum by Max Otieno (submitted via email) by Max Otieno objecting the approval of Mr. Michael Sialai, CBS for appointment as a High Commissioner representing the Republic of Kenya in Namibia (*Appendix III VOL. II*).

Memorandum by the firm of Messrs. S.O. Owino & Associates on behalf of Abdi Dara

33. In the memorandum, the firm of Messrs. S.O Owino states on behalf of his client, Mr. Abdi Dara, that Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) Andrew Ikenye is currently the Chairman of National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority (NWHSA), a parastatal under the Ministry of Water and Irrigation. The firm elaborates on three grounds for objection of the nominee's approval: contempt of court order in Court Petition No. 116 of 2020 (Employment & Labour Relations Court in Nairobi), failure to recruit a substantive Chief Executive Officer of the Authority despite a directive from the Head of Public Service, and failure to convene a full board meeting of the Authority in disregard of the advisory of the Chairman of the Governance Risk & Audit Committee.

The Committee deliberated on the Memorandum and observed that: -

- i. It was not a Statement made on Oath (*Affidavit*) as stipulated in Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011;
- ii. Matters raised in the Memorandum are still active in court. Evidence presented before the Committee indicated that the issues raised by Mr. Abdi Dara were still under determination before the Court of Appeal. Deliberations on the same would therefore be tantamount to contravention of Standing Order No. 89 of the National Assembly.

The Memorandum was therefore rendered inadmissible before the Committee.

Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) Andrew Ikenye also provided a Response to the Committee over the allegations contained in the Memorandum by Messrs. S.O. Owino Advocates on behalf of Mr. Abdi Dara. He averred that the matters raised had not fully been determined by the courts and were therefore pending before the courts (*Appendix IV VOL. II*).

Memorandum by Max Otieno

34. Mr. Max Otieno alleges that he had petitioned the National Assembly by submitting the Petition to the Clerk of the National Assembly, Mr. Michael Sialai, CBS. He contends that Mr. Sialai directed that the Petition be sent to the Senate which in his opinion he was opposed to since his Petition dealt with constitutionality of several finality clauses and other issues related to delegation of discretionary powers by a principal or authority mandated by Parliament to perform certain functions delegating the same to an agent without clear terms of contract.

The Committee deliberated on the Memorandum and observed that: -

- i. It was not a Statement made on Oath (*Affidavit*) as stipulated in Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011;
- ii. Articles 95 and 96 provide for the separate mandates of the National Assembly and the Senate respectively. Further, the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution provides for the distribution of functions between the national government and the county governments. It was on this basis that when the nominee received Petition by Mr. Max Otieno, he referred the Petition to the Senate since it fell within its ambit.

The Memorandum was therefore inadmissible before the Committee.

2.10 Withdrawal from the approval process

35. Section 6(10) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approvals) Act, provides that *a candidate may, at any time, by notice in writing addressed to the Clerk, withdraw from the approval process and the candidates' nomination shall thereupon lapse.*
36. Pursuant to Section 6(10) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs vide a letter Ref. No. MFA.CON.HRM/1 dated 16th May 2022 notified the Clerk of the National Assembly of the withdrawal from the approval process of Dr. Caroline Wanjiru Karugu, nominee for the position of Ambassador of the Republic of Kenya to Denmark (*Annexure 9*).

3.0 APPROVAL HEARINGS/ VETTING OF NOMINEES

The Committee held a pre-vetting sitting on Thursday, 12th May 2022 to deliberate on the approval hearings and the Committee agreed that in conducting the approval hearings, the Committee would examine the nominees against the following criteria as set out in the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act-

- i. Academic qualifications;
 - ii. Employment record;
 - iii. Professional affiliations;
 - iv. Potential conflict of interest;
 - v. Knowledge of the relevant subject;
 - vi. Overall suitability for the position;
 - vii. Integrity;
 - viii. Vision and leadership; and
 - ix. Expectations and key priorities.
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37. Twenty-one (21) nominees physically appeared before the Committee on 16th 17th and 18th May 2022. Dr. Caroline Wanjiru Karugu, nominee for the position of an ambassador of the Republic of Kenya to Denmark did not appear before the Committee. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs through a letter Ref. No. MFA.CON.HRM/1dated 16th May, 2022 had notified the Clerk of her withdrawal from the approval process (*Appendix 9*).

3.1 MR CLEMENT NZOMO KITEME, EBS, NOMINEE AMBASSADOR TO THE REPUBLIC OF ANGOLA

38. Mr. Clement Nzomo Kiteme appeared before the Committee on Monday 16th May 2022 at 9.00 am and was interviewed pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Foreign Service Act, 2021 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The nominee responded to several questions during the vetting as follows:

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

39. The nominee is a Kenyan Citizen of identification card (ID) number, 7412523 and was born in Kitui County in 1959.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

40. He holds a Master in Business Administration from the Eastern and Southern African Management Institute (ESAMI) and a Bachelor of Education (Arts) in Political Science from the University of Nairobi. He also has a diploma in National Security from Galilee International Management Institute, Israel.

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41. He has several professional trainings including in Corporate Governance, Strategic Leadership, Managing for Change and Results Based Management.

Employment records and Work Experience

42. He started his career as an untrained teacher at Katheka Secondary School. He moved from teaching and was appointed as an Assistant Secretary for the Ministry of Environment, Natural Resources Lands and Housing.
43. He was later appointed as a District Officer, rose through the ranks to become District Commissioner and he is the current Secretary of Administration in the Presidency and Cabinet Affairs Office. He is the head of Cabinet Secretariat, a de facto Deputy Secretary to the Cabinet.
44. He is a Member of the Board of Trustees of the National Fund of Disabled, Kenya from the year 2006 to date and a Joint Secretary to the Coffee Sub-Sector Reforms Implementation Standing Committee in the Executive Office of the President from 2017 to date. He has worked for 40 years.

Honours and Awards

45. He was awarded Elder of the Order of the Burning Spear (E.B.S) in 2015 and Moran of the Order of the Burning Spear (MBS) in 2010. He was awarded Head of State Plaque of Service to the National Fund of Disabled, Kenya and a certificate of exemplary service during the 40th Independence Anniversary Celebration.

Statement of Net Worth

46. His financial net worth is KShs. 100 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

47. He has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

48. Mr Kiteme stated that among his greatest achievements in his career as a civil servant was when he was bestowed with the responsibility of affixing the Kenyan Seal to the 2010 Constitution after its promulgation. In addition, he has headed the Cabinet Secretariat from 2007 until his nomination as Ambassador.
49. The nominee committed to address visa challenges experienced by Kenyans through pursuit of a Memorandum of Understanding with the Government of the Republic of Angola for visa waivers between the two countries.
50. He further intends to strengthen bilateral relations through promotion of capital flow by encouraging enterprises to invest and increase exports to Angola. He stated that through Angola, Kenyan exports will access the Southern African Development Community (SADC) market which is an important economic block to the interests of Kenya.
51. The nominee informed the Members that he brings a wealth of experience having worked for 35 years in the civil service. He stated that he is hardworking, dedicated to his work and patriotic to his country.

Committee observations on suitability of Mr. Clement Nzomo Kiteme to serve as Ambassador, Republic of Angola

52. The Committee having considered the nominee's filled Questionnaire pursuant to Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, his curriculum vitae and having heard his oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following observations on his suitability for appointment as Ambassador, THAT-

- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, he is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
- b) he holds a Master's in Business Administration from the Eastern and Southern African Management Institute (ESAMI) and Bachelor of Education (Arts) degree in Political Science from the University of Nairobi. He also has a diploma in National Security from Galilee International Management Institute, Israel;
- c) he is a career civil servant with 40 years experience having started his career as an untrained teacher, became an Assistant Secretary; District officer and progressively rose through the ranks to the position of Secretary of Administration in the Presidency and Cabinet Affairs Office and head of Cabinet Secretariat; he has worked for 40 years;
- d) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
- e) he has never been charged in a Court of Law in the last three years;
- f) as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution, he has no potential conflict of interest;
- g) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution in that he does not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
- h) the nominee does not hold office in any political party hence satisfies the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
- i) he has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (*conflict of interest*), 76 (*financial probity*), 77(*restriction of State officers*) and 78(2) (*dual citizenship*) of the Constitution.

3.2 MS. MARY WANGUI MUGWANJA, NOMINEE AMBASSADOR TO THE REPUBLIC OF AUSTRIA

53. Ms. Mary Wangui Mugwanja appeared before the Committee on Monday 16th May 2022 at 10.00 am and was interviewed pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Foreign Service Act, 2021, and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The nominee responded to several questions during the vetting as follows:

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

54. The nominee is a Kenyan Citizen of identification card (ID) number, 8485014 and was born in Nyandarua County in 1966.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

55. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Leadership and Management and Certificate in Leadership and Management, both from Strathmore University. She also has a Diploma in Secretarial Duties from Kiambu Institute of Science and Technology.
56. She has undertaken short training in Strategy in Action; Situational Leadership; Performance Development Leadership; Coaching and Feedback; and Seven Habits of Highly Effective People.

Employment Records and Work Experience

57. She started her career as a Secretary/ Bank Clerk at Barclays Bank. She progressed in the banking career to become a Personal Banker, Branch Manager, Senior Manager, Business Development Manager all within the Barclays Bank. She moved to Equity Bank in the position of Manager for business growth and development. She has worked for 32 years.
58. She moved from banking and was appointed in November 2017 by the County Government of Nyandarua as a County Executive Committee Member (CECM) in charge of Finance and Economic Development. Her current position before this appointment is CECM in charge of Transport, Energy and Public Works.
59. In her position as CECM, she led her department in preparation of strategic plan, timely procurement and awarding of contracts, supervision of ongoing development projects, preparation of County Energy Plan, construction of bus parks and Boda Boda sheds, achievement of unqualified audit report for financial year 2017/18, formulation of Nyandarua Investment and Development Act, 2020, among other achievements.
60. Through her leadership as CECM for finance, the County Government of Nyandarua was Rated No.1 by World Bank under the Assessment for Financial Prudence in managing their Donor Funds for Kenya Devolution Support Programme (KDSP) in FYs 2017/2018, 2018/2019 and 2019/2020. This led the World Bank to award the County Government a grant of Kshs. 906 million.

Honours and Awards

61. None.

Statement of Net Worth

62. Her financial net worth is Ksh 70 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

63. She has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, she would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

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64. Ms. Mary Mugwanja stated that she is a dedicated finance professional who started her career in the banking industry as an officer and rose through the ranks to position of Senior Manager. She was an experienced banker whose role involved management of relationships by dealing directly with customers and various stakeholders.
65. She stated that she intends to use people skills gained to understand what Kenyan businesses, traders and the country in general need in order to promote their interests while in Austria through economic and commercial diplomacy. Moreover, the nominee was aware of the existence of various UN bodies in Austria and would do her best by utilizing the knowledge and experience of the technical staff employed by the Mission to improve and promote multilateral relations with Kenya.
66. Despite not being a career diplomat, the candidate understands that leadership is about appreciating everyone potential and how to get the best out of them. The nominee committed to be a fair leader and will leverage the leadership experience gained as a Senior Banking Professional and County Executive Committee Member in Nyandarua County to execute her duties.
67. Finally, the candidate demonstrated quick adaptability to new roles. For example, she was able to deliver when she moved from the private sector to public sector by focusing on success so as not to disappoint the appointing authority. She even took a 50% pay cut to serve the public and tried to live within her means and the scarce resources at her disposal to ensure that she gets the work done.
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Committee observations on suitability of Ms. Mary Wangui Mugwanja to serve as Ambassador, Republic of Austria

68. The Committee having considered the nominee's filled Questionnaire pursuant to Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, her curriculum vitae and having heard her oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following observations on her suitability for appointment as Ambassador, THAT-
- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, she is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
 - b) she holds a Bachelor of Science in Leadership and Management and certificate in Leadership and Management both from Strathmore University. She also has a Diploma in Secretarial Duties from Kiambu Institute of Science and Technology.
 - c) she is experienced having worked for 32 years in the Private Sector where she exited as a Senior Manager and was appointed in Public Sector as a County Executive Committee Member (CECM); she has worked for 32 years;
 - d) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
 - e) she has never been charged in a Court of Law in the last three years;
 - f) as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution, she has no potential conflict of interest;
 - g) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution in that she does not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
 - h) the nominee does not hold office in any political party hence satisfies the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
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- i) she has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (conflict of interest), 76 (financial probity), 77(restriction of State Officers) and 78(2) (dual citizenship) of the Constitution.

3.3 PROF. ELIJAH BITANGE NDEMO, CBS, NOMINEE AMBASSADOR TO THE KINGDOM OF BELGIUM

69. Prof. Elijah Bitange Ndemo appeared before the Committee on Monday 16th May 2022 at 11.00 am and was interviewed pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Foreign Service Act, 2021 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The nominee responded to several questions during the vetting as follows:

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

70. The nominee is a Kenyan Citizen of identification card (ID) number, 0382824 and was born in Kisii County in 1959.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

71. He holds a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) from the University of Sheffield, England, a Master of Management Information from University of St. Thomas, Minnesota and a Bachelor of Science in Finance from University of Minnesota.

Employment records and Work Experience

72. He started his career as a financial systems analyst, later he moved to the University of Nairobi as a tutorial fellow. He progressed in his lecturing career to become a Senior Lecture, Chairman Department of Economics, Associate Professor and he is currently a Professor of Entrepreneurship at the University of Nairobi.

73. He was appointed as a Permanent Secretary, Ministry of information and Communication a position he served for eight years (8) from year 2005 to 2013.

74. He was appointed as Chairman, Kenya Government Taskforce on Distributed Ledgers & Artificial Intelligence in year 2018 a position he holds to date. He is a Member of the Board of Directors of Safaricom from year 2017 to date. He is a senior advisor to United Nations Global Pulse and United Nations Capital Development Fund.

75. In his academic profession he has made over 5,000 publications through articles, reports, books, editorial pieces and edited books. He has done journal reviews, academic collaborations, supervised PhD and masters students, made key note addresses, is a lead consultant for various projects and is a columnist with weekly articles in the Daily Nation and business daily.

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76. He is a member of several professional associations including: the Institute of Management Accountants (USA); Fellow Kenya Institute of Management; Senate of the University of Nairobi and other private members clubs.
77. He was instrumental in: fast-tracking the implementation of the M-PESA; linking Kenya to the rest of the World through the undersea cable which led to lowering the cost of telephony; lobbied Government to subsidize broadband and purchase of computers to all universities; and creation of more than 250 digital villages across the country and ICT ecosystem in Konza.
78. He has attended over thirty-eight (38) conferences on diverse topical issues including on software engineering, entrepreneurship, pension funds and investments, research, information technology, health care, youth among others.
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Honours and Awards

79. He has been awarded Chief of Burning Spear (CBS), Special Commendation Award for Best Research paper from the Developing World Volunteer of year award Government of the State of Minnesota, President's student leadership award, USA and student leadership award, University of Minnesota.

Statement of Net Worth

80. His financial net worth is Ksh. 190 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

81. He has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

82. Prof. Ndemo stated that he has written over 5,000 articles addressing various topical issues that are important to our country. When he was the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Information and Communication, he oversaw the laying of fibre optic undersea cable which reduced the cost of internet and increased internet penetration in the country.
83. The nominee stated that among the economic pursuits he will prioritize were fostering multilateral engagement through the African, Caribbean and Pacific States and the European Union and specifically exploitation of our vast resources in the blue economy. Further, he will seek to address phytosanitary challenges that limit our exports to Belgium.
84. In addition, he stated that Belgium is quite advanced in the use of Artificial intelligence in the health and banking sector. He stated that Kenya is lagging behind in this sector of Artificial intelligence and will greatly benefit through his engagements with Belgium and the larger European Union.
85. On the issue of interpersonal skills, he stated that he is a team player and has done a lot of collaborative research.
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86. On the nominee's culpability or otherwise in the sale of Malili Ranch Ltd land, the nominee stated that the High Court, in Miscellaneous Civil Application 192 of 2016, had declared the initiation, maintenance and prosecution of the petitioner in the Chief Magistrate's Court (Anti-Corruption Court) vide criminal case No. 19 of 2014 was an abuse of the criminal justice system and in contravention of the applicant's constitutional rights and freedoms and security of the person and the right to secure the protection of the law. The court further held that the case amounted to selective and therefore discriminatory prosecution and a gross abuse of the process of court and was oppressive, malicious and an abuse of the process of court. The Court therefore issued Orders of Prohibition prohibiting the continuance of the Chief Magistrate's Court (ACC) at Milimani vide criminal case No. 19 of 2015 in the manner intended against the nominee (*Appendix V VOL. II*).
87. The nominee informed the Committee that if his nomination is approved by the House, he will resign from boards and stop consultancies. However, he will continue to supervise the ongoing students and give public lectures.

Committee observations on suitability of Prof. Elijah Bitange Ndemo to serve as Ambassador, Republic of Belgium

88. The Committee having considered the nominee's filled Questionnaire pursuant to Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, his curriculum vitae and having heard his oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following observations on his suitability for appointment as Ambassador, THAT-
- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, he is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
 - b) he is a (PhD) holder from the University of Sheffield, England, has a Master of Management Information from University of St. Thomas, Minnesota and a Bachelor of Science in Finance from University of Minnesota;
 - c) he has over 30 years of experience gained in Government, business, finance, technology, Higher Education and the Private Sector. A reputable scholar having risen through the ladder from a tutorial fellow to a Professor of Entrepreneurship. He is widely published in refereed academic journals. He was Permanent Secretary, Ministry of information and communication a position he served for eight years (8) from year 2005 to 2013;
 - d) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
 - e) he has never been charged in a Court of Law in the last three years; on the case of Malili Ranch Ltd, Miscellaneous Civil Application 192 of 2016 absolved the nominee from culpability by declaring, among others, that the initiation, maintenance and prosecution of the petitioner in the Chief Magistrate's Court (Anti-Corruption Court) vide criminal case No. 19 of 2014 was an abuse of the criminal justice system and in contravention of the applicant's constitutional rights and freedoms and security of the person and the right to secure the protection of the law;
 - f) as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution, he has no potential conflict of interest;

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- g) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution in that he does not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
 - h) the nominee does not hold office in any political party hence satisfies the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
 - i) he has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (conflict of interest), 76(financial probity), 77(restriction of State Officers) and 78(2) (dual citizenship) of the Constitution.

3.4 MS. MARY MUTHONI GICHOHI, NOMINEE AMBASSADOR TO THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA

89. Ms. Mary Muthoni Gichohi appeared before the Committee on Monday 16th May 2022 at 12.00 pm and was interviewed pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Foreign Service Act, 2021 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The nominee responded to several questions during the vetting as follows:

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

90. The nominee is a Kenyan Citizen of identification card (ID) number, 3561850 and was born in Murang'a County in 1963.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

91. She holds a Bachelor of Laws degree from the University of Nairobi and a Diploma in Law from the Kenya School of Law.

92. She has undertaken professional training in Judicial Reasoning and Philosophy; Mediation; Corporate Governance; Strategic Impact Litigation; Lobbying and Advocacy; and Alternative Dispute Resolution.

93. She is an Advocate of the High Court, a Certified Public Secretary, an Accredited Mediator and a consultant and Trainer on Women's Legal Rights.

Employment records and Work Experience

94. She started her career as a State Counsel in the Office of Attorney General. She progressed in her legal career to become Company Secretary for Industrial Promotion Building Limited. Thereafter she was appointed as Chairperson for Integral Credit Limited. She has worked for 34 years.

95. She has served as Secretary General to the Federation of Women Lawyers, Director Ecobank Foundation and Chairperson Thika Greens Group. Before this appointment, she was the Chairperson for Retirement Benefits Appeals Tribunal. She is also the proprietor of MGA Law & Company Advocates.

96. In her position as Chairperson for Retirement Benefits Appeals Tribunal, they have heard and delivered timely and well-balanced rulings and Judgements in cases filed by over 2,000

Members of various Retirement Benefits Schemes. She has undertaken measures that have streamlined and expedited tribunal proceedings and provided procedural guidance to Appellants without legal representation.

97. She is a Member of Law Society of Kenya, Chartered Institute of Arbitrators, East African Law Society, International Bar Association, Institute of Certified Secretaries, Federation of Women Lawyers and Institute of Directors Kenya.

Honours and Awards

In addition, the candidate promised to ensure sensitization of the farmers in regards to the standards and protocols, global value chains and ethical practices. Moreover, the candidate would utilize parliamentary diplomacy in addressing the issues of trade by working with the relevant committee.
102. The candidate will ensure equity in distribution and award of scholarship to the deserving individuals and the scholarships should be relevant to Kenya's priorities, for instance, promotion of SMEs that employ majority of the Kenyans.
103. The candidate is a hard-working individual as demonstrated by her ability to grow Thika Greens Limited from a start-up to a full-grown business worth billions of shillings. She also engages in private legal practice and is a board member in a number of local businesses and companies. Her background in business makes her a suitable candidate because she understands the issues facing traders or businesses and their aspirations.

104. Finally, the nominee committed that Kenya's interest will be her priority and will not allow her personal businesses interest override the county's priority by resigning and delegating the positions held to other relevant people.

While serving as an Ambassador to the State of Qatar from September 2010 to December 2018 he was instrumental in cementing a strong relationship that resulted in an exponential increase of Kenyans employed in the country; from near zero to the more than 32000 Kenyans by the time he left. In addition, Foreign Direct Investment to Kenya from Qatar reached over \$700M from a zero baseline and bilateral trade has grown to include key horticultural and floriculture products and other products including tea, coffee, meat and meat products, cut flowers, Macadamia nuts, fruit juices, beans, pulses, avocados, mangoes among others.

175. On the issue prudent financial management, the nominee stated that in the foreign service they were trained by the Kenya School of management and having been head of chancery he was responsible for handling mission budgets.

176. He finally stated that he will prioritize implementation of existing Memorandums of Understanding with Mozambique.

Committee observations on suitability of Mr. Paul Kamweru Ndung'u to serve as Ambassador, Republic of Mozambique

177. The Committee having considered the nominee's filled Questionnaire pursuant to Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, his curriculum vitae and having heard his oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following observations on his suitability for appointment as Ambassador, THAT-

- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, he is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
- b) he holds a Master of Arts in International Studies from the University of Nairobi and a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and Literature from Makerere University. He also has an advanced certificate in Conflict Management from USIU and a Diploma in Development from Berlin, Germany.
- c) he is a career civil servant with 32 years' experience having started his career as untrained teacher, grown through the ranks in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to become the Director Asia, Australasia & Pacific Islands before this appointment; he has worked for 32 years;
- d) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
- e) he has never been charged in a Court of Law in the last three years;

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- f) as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution, he has no potential conflict of interest;
 - g) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution in that he does not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
 - h) the nominee does not hold office in any political party hence satisfies the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
 - i) he has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (*conflict of interest*), 76(*financial probity*), 77(*restriction of State officers*) and 78(2) (*dual citizenship*) of the Constitution.

178. Mr. Michael Sialai, CBS appeared before the Committee on Tuesday 17th May 2022 at 11.00 am and was interviewed pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Foreign Service Act, 2021 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The nominee responded to several questions during the vetting as follows:

179. The nominee is a Kenyan Citizen of identity card (ID) number, 6003586 and was born in Kericho County in 1961.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

180. He holds a Master of Arts in History and a Bachelor of Education (Arts) in History and Kiswahili, both from Kenyatta University. He also has a diploma in Security Studies from Galilee International Management institute, Israel.

181. He has undertaken several professional courses including: Senior Management in Leadership for Results Programme from Eastern and Southern African Management Institute (ESAMI), Swaziland; attended a Seminar on Transformative Leadership from the International Leadership Foundation, Kenya; attended an attachment programme in the Parliament of Australia; and Parliamentary staff training course by the Common Wealth Parliamentary Association UK.

Employment Records and Work Experience

182. He started his career as a graduate teacher at Kimulot Secondary School. He progressed to become an Assistant Lecture at Kericho Teachers Training College.

183. He moved from lecturing and was appointed as a First clerk Assistant of the National Assembly and rose through the ranks to the position of Deputy Clerk. He was appointed in 2017 as the Clerk of the National Assembly, a position he held until his current nomination. He has worked for 33 years.

184. In his position as the Clerk the National Assembly, he is the administrative head and accounting officer responsible for policy and organizational matters and is the Principal Advisor to the Speaker, Presiding Officers, Honourable Members and Cabinet Secretaries on parliamentary procedures, practices, conventions and traditions. He has strengthened and streamlined the accounting and audit functions leading to unqualified Audit reports for three successive years i.e. 2018/19, 2019/20 and 2020/21.

185. He is the Honorary Secretary for the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association and Honorary Treasurer, Inter-Parliamentary Union, Kenya Branches.

Honours and Awards

186. He was awarded the Elder of the Order of the Burning Spear (EBS) in 2016 and Chief of the Order of the Burning Spear (CBS) in 2021. He was also awarded the Third Best Overall Employee of the year by the Parliamentary Service Commission in 2015.

Statement of Net Worth

187. His financial net worth is Kshs. 151 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

188. He has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

189. The nominee has served in Parliament since 1996 from position of First Clerk Assistant to position of Clerk of the National Assembly. This has given him exposure to policy making and legislation that will assist in carrying responsibility of High Commissioner to Republic of Namibia.

190. The nominee committed that he shall ensure that actualization of three agreements signed between Kenya and Namibia in 2018 in regards to Youth, Tourism and Political Consultation whose actualization was hindered by the Covid-19 pandemic. The candidate noted that Namibia has a well-established fishing industry and will engage with the relevant stakeholders on what can be borrowed to improve the Kenya's Fishing Industry. Namibia has substantial number of Kenyans working in the country and the nominee pledged that he shall strive to improve their welfare.

191. The nominee noted that there is a lot of bureaucracy facing foreign investors. To address the challenge, the nominee intends to use the Defence and Foreign Relations (DFR) Committee to ensure that the barriers are eliminated. This will be achieved by coming up with a mechanism that will encourage the DFR committee initiate forums/roundtable meetings with the Kenyan Diplomats to understand what they are doing, challenges faced and on what can be done to improve to protect and promote Kenya's interests.

192. On memorandum by Mr. Max Otieno contesting the nominee's suitability, the nominee stated that Articles 95 and 96 provide for the separate mandates of the National Assembly

and the Senate respectively. Further, the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution provides for the distribution of functions between the national government and the county governments. It was based on this that when he received Petition by Mr. Max Otieno, he referred it to the Senate since it fell within its ambit.

193. Finally, the nominee committed that he shall endeavor to enhance ties with Namibia on education, trade, tourism, cultural exchange among others if his nomination is approved.

Committee observations on suitability of Mr. Michael Sialai to serve as High Commissioner, Republic of Namibia

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194. The Committee having considered the nominee's filled Questionnaire pursuant to Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, his curriculum vitae and having heard his oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following observations on his suitability for appointment as High Commissioner, THAT-

- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, he is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
 - b) he holds a Master of Arts in History and a Bachelor of Education (Arts) in History and Kiswahili, both from Kenyatta University. He has a diploma in Security Studies from Galilee International Management institute, Israel.
 - c) he is a career civil servant with 33 years experience having started his career as a teacher, became a lecturer, moved to Parliament of Kenya and rose through the ranks in the National Assembly to become the Clerk of the National Assembly;
 - d) the memorandum by Mr. Max Otieno is inadmissible because it does not comply with the requirements of section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approvals) Act which provides that evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold office to which the candidate has been nominated should be by written statement on oath (affidavit). Further, the memorandum was received past the stipulated deadline;
 - e) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
 - f) he has never been charged in a Court of Law in the last three years;
 - g) as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution, he has no potential conflict of interest;
 - h) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution in that he does not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;

The nominee responded to several questions during the vetting as follows;

196. The nominee is a Kenyan Citizen of identification card (ID) number, 0403100 and was born in Baringo County in 1959.

197. He holds a Master of Arts in International Relations from American University of London and a Bachelor of Science in Military Studies and Diplomacy from Trinity College Delaware, USA. He also has a Post Graduate Diploma in Defence and Strategic Studies from National Defence University, China.

198. He has undertaken several Military courses including: Computer Security Awareness; Managing Defence in a Democracy; Advanced intelligence Analysis; Intelligence and Military Strategy; Instructional Technology; and Military Cadet Course.

Employment records and Work Experience

199. He is a decorated Soldier having risen through the Military ranks. He has served as a Chief of staff for Peace Keeping Force in the Republic of Chad, a United Nations Military Observer in Yugoslavia, Commandant Defence Forces Memorial Hospital, Army Chief of Operations and Deputy Commandant National Defence College. He has worked for 38 years.

200. After retiring from the military he was appointed as the Chairman for National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority.

Honours and Awards

201. He was awarded Chief of the Order of the Burning Spear (CBS) and Elder of the Order of the Burning Spear (EBS). He has also been awarded several Military Medals.

Statement of Net Worth

202. His financial net worth is Kshs 150 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

203. He has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

204. Maj. Gen (Rtd) Ikenye informed the Committee that he had experience as a diplomat having served in Cairo as a defence attaché. Further, he has worked in the National Defence College which also deals with diplomacy. He stated that Nigeria shares similarities with Kenya and especially from a Military perspective the insecurity the Countries face.
205. Further, he stated that Kenya can learn a lot from Nigeria towards its devolution path since Nigeria has been a successful federal state.
206. He stated that on economic relations with Nigeria he would prioritize implementation of joint trade cooperation signed in 2014 and other memorandums that have not been implemented. In addition, he noted that although Kenya has a positive balance of trade in relation to Nigeria our manufacturing sector should be revamped.
207. On the memorandum by the firm of Messrs. S.O. Owino & Associates on behalf of Abdi Dara contesting his suitability for the position of ambassador to the Republic of Nigeria, the nominee stated that the allegations did not have merit. Through the firm of Messrs. Muchemi & Co. Advocates, in a letter dated 16th May, 2020 Ref. No. MM/2022/LIT./NW01/1416, the nominee responded to the allegations as follows:
- (a) On contempt of court order in *Nairobi Employment & Labour Relations Court, Petition No. 116 of 2020*, on 29th September, 2020, Hon. Lady Justice Hellen Wasilwa delivered a Judgement in the matter and issued an order requiring the Cabinet Secretary responsible for Water, Sanitation and Irrigation to appoint the Chief Executive of National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority from the second topmost candidate or the third topmost candidate as the case may be within seven days;
 - (b) Aggrieved with the said Judgment, the National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority sought stay to file an appeal at the Court of Appeal. The Court granted stay for 14 days. The National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority subsequently filed an appeal in record time;
 - (c) Upon the expiry of the Stay Order, the National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority filed an Application dated 16th October, 2020 in *Nairobi Petition No. E014 of 2020* seeking extension of the Order of Stay granted on 29th September, 2020 which had lapsed;
 - (d) The said Application was heard and on 10th December, 2020, Honourable Justice Mbaaruru extended the Order of Stay until ruling by the Court of Appeal on *Nairobi Civil Application No. 96 of 2020 (E366) Board Chairman National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority & Anor Vs Abdi Mohamed Abdullahi & 2 Others* is delivered. The matter is still pending before the Court of Appeal with stay orders still in force;
 - (e) On the allegation of failure to implement government directives, the particular allegation relates to *Nakuru Judicial Review Application No. E005 of 2021: Republic Versus Chairman, Board of Directors, National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority (1st Respondent), the Board of Directors, National Water*

Harvesting and Storage Authority (2nd Respondent), Sharon Obonyo (Interested Party) and David Ngure (Ex-parte applicant), the case is still pending determination on 16th June, 2022, before Employment and Labour Relations Court in Nakuru and that allegation of contempt of court orders is unfounded and brought in bad faith;

- (f) On failure to convene a full board meeting of the Authority, on the 27th November, 2021, the Cabinet Secretary Ministry of Water Sanitation and Irrigation responded vide a letter Ref. MWSI/016A Vol. X (9) giving concurrence for the extension of the Acting Chief Executive Officer, CS Sharon Obonyo for a term of six (6) months with effect from 27th September, 2021 or until a substantive Chief Executive Officer is recruited. She further guided that the Authority FastTrack's the appointment of a substantive Chief Executive Officer.

- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, he is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;

213. Her financial net worth is KSh. 50 million.

214. She has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

215. The nominee has worked both in public and private sector with vast experience in various aspects of corporate governance. The candidate worked with UNHCR both locally and internationally. This exposed to workings of government and diplomacy where she was involved in an assignment involving Ethiopia, Sudan and UNHCR. The experience gained will enable her discharge diplomatic duties that involve a lot of government relations dealings.
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216. The candidate pledged that she shall seek to understand TB and NTB that inhibits Kenya's trade with Netherlands. The nominee committed she shall strive to enhance the

volumes of Kenya's export to Netherlands to improved further the favorable balance of trade Kenya has with Netherlands.

217. The nominee observed that Kenya has done little in protecting its products once they reach Netherlands. For example, once Kenyan flowers reach the Netherlands are rebranded differently and then re-exported to other markets. The nominee pledged that she shall endeavor to address the issue by gathering more information on the standards guiding international trade and rules of origin and then come up with a strategy on how to deal with the challenge.
218. Finally, the nominee promised that she shall try to understand the progress Netherlands has made in safeguarding women career progression by granting them a longer/relaxed maternity leave that enables them return to work with a peace of mind. This will enable her see what can be borrowed from Netherlands to help Kenya improve the welfare of women in regards to maternity and safeguard their career progression once they proceed to maternity leave.

246. 259. The nominee stated that Qatar is a consumer economy with a promising export market that Kenya should take advantage of especially in regards to fresh agricultural produce. He pledged to have a sit down with Kenya businesses and investors to open export opportunities.

260. The nominee further committed to follow-up on the implementation of the bilateral labor agreement signed between Kenya and Qatar and will strive MOUs to guarantee job opportunities for Kenyans. He also committed that he will ensure that Kenyans who want to work in Qatar pass through registered and government recognized employment agencies and have Kenyans registered before going to Qatar to address the plight of Kenyans while in Qatar.

261. Finally, in regards to World Cup 2022, the nominee pledged to make a follow-up on the opportunities promised by Qatar to recruit a number of Kenyan Police and NYS for security and crowd control during the tournament. He will so have a sit down with the Qatar Ambassador in Kenta to see how to facilitate Kenyans who would love to go and watch the World Cup and follow-up on the establishment of a Qatar Visa Centre in Nairobi.

287. He also stated that Somalia signed a trade agreement with Ethiopia for importation of Miraa from Ethiopia and for them to export fish to Ethiopia. 288. With the new regime in place, there is an opportunity for the new Somalia government to solve the border dispute with Kenya through the AU mechanism which is better than what ICJ did.

He holds a Ph.D., in Political Science and International Relations, University of Delaware, USA, Master of Arts, in Political Science and International Relations, University of Delaware, Master of Arts, Political Science and Public Administration, University of Nairobi and Bachelor of Arts, Government/Political Science, University of Nairobi.

Employment records and Work Experience

321. He works as a Lecturer, University of Nairobi in the Department of Political Science and Public Administration. Other teaching experience include: Adjunct Assistant Professor, Towson University, Maryland, United States of America, Adjunct Assistant Professor, Temple University, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, USA, Adjunct Instructor, University of Delaware, Newark, Delaware, USA and Teaching Assistant, University of Delaware, Newark, Delaware USA. He has worked for 31 years.

322. He has also worked as an Assistant Secretary Ministry of Water Development and as a District Officer.

323. He has done a number of collaborative and consultancy work with: Human Rights Commission; Center for Multi-Party Democracy (CMD)–Kenya; Differ-Sweden; Constitutional Implementation Commission (CIC); Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs; Fredrich Ebert Stiftung Foundation; Centre for Governance and Democracy (CGD); Management Systems International (MSI); USAID; UNDP; CLARION; Towson University (USA); Temple University (USA); University of Delaware (USA); Office of the president; Ministry of Water.
324. He is a Member of Several Professional Associations including: International Association for Media and Communication Research; American Political Science Association; African Studies Association; and Fulbright Alumni Association - Kenya.

Honours and Awards

325. Excellence in Teaching Award at University of Delaware (U.S.A), Fulbright Scholarship and University of Nairobi M.A. merit Scholarship.

Statement of Net Worth

326. His financial net worth is KSh. 75 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

327. He has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

328. As a Professor with the University of Nairobi, the nominee stated that resilience, commitment and persistence forms the basis of his continued quest for excellence and will apply the same in promoting and protecting Kenya's interest as a Permanent Representative to UNESCO.
329. The candidate stated that UNESCO is still an important institution that was formed to foster and promote global peace and security through education and cultural exchange by appreciating the diversity and cultures of the global populous.
330. The nominee further stated that UNESCO has played a key role in recognition and preservation of Fort Jesus, a pre-historical site at the Kenyan Coast and Isukuti dance culture. The organization is also doing geographical mapping of Baringo as the country's first UNESCO Global Geopark due to presence of two lakes and plenty of waterfalls, hills, rives and caves which is a requirement UNESCO takes into consideration when gazetting geoparks. The recognition of Baringo as a Geopark will lead to promote geo tourism due to influx of visitors that visits the third geoprak in Africa after Morocco's M'Goun and Tanzania's Ngorongoro.
331. The nominee is a Trade Unionist whose sentiments in the past have been controversial. For example, in 2020, the Professor was captured in a video stating that they were barred from accessing a room at the University of Nairobi Towers by Chinese students and protested

against the Chinese takeover of lecture halls and termed the incident as “Chinese colonialism”. The institution director of corporate affairs came to the defence of the institution claiming the Professor’s sentiments were his personal views and were misleading and ill-intentioned. Such sentiments can jeopardize the relations between Kenya and China and the candidate stated the matter was addressed and is very apologetic and did not intend to harm the Chinese. As a diplomat he stated that he shall engage in a diplomatic manner to address issues to promote and protect the interests of Kenya.

332. Finally, the nominee stated that as a country, we have not done enough in promoting our culture both locally and internationally. It is only the Maasai culture that is known outside there and the nominee committed that he shall endeavor to promote Kenya culture via UNESCO if approved by the House and Committee.

333. 337. He has Diplomas in Advance Intelligence and National and International Security. He also has Certificates in Ceasefire Mediation and Management, Consequence Management and Legal aspects of Terrorism, Senior Mission Leadership among many other professional qualifications.

Employment records and Work Experience

338. Major General (Rtd) Charles Gituai has had a successful Military career having risen through the ranks notably as Deputy Force Commandant, Commandant and Major General. He has worked for 44 years.

339. During his service, he has worked as Defense Advisor in India, General Officer Commanding Western Command, Deputy Force Commander (AMISOM), Deputy Chief of Staff, United Nations Mission to Sierra Leone (UNAMSIL), where he was also the Kenyan Contingent Commander. Joint Chief of Staff, Eastern Africa Standby Force, (EASF) in under Auspices of African Union.

340. Upon retirement he joined Sahan Africa limited a peace and security consultancy institute, where he did consultancy work on Peace and Security in Nairobi, Rwanda and Bamako, Mali.

341. he was nominated by His Excellency President Kenyatta and endorsed by the IGAD heads of State and Government summit meeting in July 2020, and assumed the role of the Interim Chairperson of the Reconstituted Joint Monitoring and Evaluation Commission, (RJMEC) to oversee the implementation of the Revitalized Agreement on the Resolution to the Conflict in the Republic of South Sudan (R-ARCSS) where he was deployed before this appointment.

Honours and Awards

342. Awarded Chief of the Order of Burning Spear (CBS) and Elder of the Order of the Burning Spear (EBS).

Statement of Net Worth

343. His financial net worth is KSh. 100 million.

Potential Conflict of Interest

344. He has no arrangements that are likely to present potential conflict of interest, and should it arise, he would abide by the law.

Leadership and suitability

345. Maj. Gen. (Rtd) Gituai stated that he is already deployed in South Sudan under the reconstituted joint monitoring and evaluation commission as the chair that seeks to resolve conflict in the Republic of South Sudan.

346. He stated that Kenya as a member of the IGAD is a major beneficiary of the institution since three of its organs the livestock, climate and centre for nutrition and health are based in Kenya.

347. He stated that he will still continue to operate in South Sudan in the joint monitoring and evaluation commission which is under the IGAD. He stated that the Kenyan Ambassador to Djibouti is accredited to IGAD.

348. He stated that through the efforts of joint monitoring and evaluation commission they had managed to establish a unity government and parliament in the South Sudan.

349. He has international experience having worked as Defense Advisor in India, General Officer Commanding Western Command, Deputy Force Commander (AMISOM), Deputy Chief of Staff, United Nations Mission to Sierra Leone (UNAMSIL).

Committee observations on suitability of Maj. General Charles Tai Gituai (Rtd.) to serve as Ambassador/Permanent Representative to the Inter-Government Authority for Development (IGAD)

350. The Committee having considered the nominee's filled Questionnaire pursuant to Section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, his curriculum vitae and having heard his oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following observations on his suitability for appointment as Ambassador/Permanent Representative, THAT-

- a) in accordance with Article 78(1) (2) of the Constitution, he is a Kenyan citizen and does not hold dual citizenship;
- b) he holds a Master of Arts in International Studies from University of Nairobi and Masters in Public Administration from Annamalai University, New Delhi. He also

- has a post graduate diploma in International Law and Diplomacy from the institute of International Law and Diplomacy, New Delhi, India
- c) he is a retired Kenyan professional military officer with a wide and diverse experience of service in the Kenya Defense Forces both locally and internationally; he has worked for 44 years;
- d) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on leadership and integrity;
- e) he has never been charged in a Court of Law in the last three years;
- f) as stipulated in Article 75(1) of the Constitution, he has no potential conflict of interest;
- g) the nominee satisfies the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution in that he does not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
- h) the nominee does not hold office in any political party hence satisfies the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
- i) he has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (conflict of interest), 76(financial probity), 77 (restriction of State Officers) and 78(2) (dual citizenship) of the Constitution

4.0 GENERAL COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

351. The Committee having vetted twenty-one (21) nominees (one nominee having been withdrawn from the approval process) made the following general observations, THAT-

Salim Salim (Djibouti), Maj. Gen. A.G. Matiiri (Egypt), ~~Amb. Galma Boru (Indonesia), Mr. Paul Ndung'u (Mozambique), Mr. Michael Sialai (Namibia),~~ Maj. Gen. (Rtd) Andrew Ikenye (Nigeria), Ms. Margaret Shava (Netherlands), Ms. Amina Abdalla (Oman), Amb. Nyambura Kamau (Pakistan), Mr. Boniface N. Mwilu (Qatar), Amb. Michael Oyugi (Spain), Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) Thomas Chepkuto (Somalia), Mr. Leonard Boiyo (Turkey), Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) George Owinow (Uganda), Prof. Richard Bosire (UNESCO) and Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) Charles Gituai (IGAD) are Kenyan citizens and do not hold dual citizenship;
- ii) Pursuant to Section 6(10) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs notified the Clerk of the National Assembly of withdrawal from the approval process of Dr. Caroline Wanjiru Karugu, nominee for the position of Ambassador of the Republic of Kenya to Denmark;
- iii) All the nominees presented their academic credentials and professional certificates and demonstrated their experience in accordance with the provisions of Section 6(7) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011;
- iv) None of the nominees has been charged in a Court of Law or mentioned adversely in a Parliamentary Committee report or Commission of inquiry in the last three years;
- v) All the nominees satisfy the requirements of Article 77(1) in that they do not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
- vi) All the nominees do not hold office in any registered political party hence satisfy the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
- vii) In regard to Prof. Bitange Ndemo's culpability or otherwise in the sale of Malili Ranch Ltd land, Miscellaneous Civil Application 192 of 2016 had declared the initiation, maintenance and prosecution of the nominee in the Chief Magistrate's Court (Anti-Corruption Court) vide criminal case No. 19 of 2014 was an abuse of the criminal justice system and in contravention of the applicant's constitutional rights and freedoms and security of the person and the right to secure the protection of the law. The court further held that the case amounted to selective and therefore discriminatory prosecution and a gross abuse of the process of court and was oppressive and malicious. The Court therefore issued Orders of Prohibition prohibiting the continuance of the Chief Magistrate's Court (ACC) at Milimani vide criminal case No. 19 of 2015 in the manner intended against the nominee.
- viii) None of the nominees has been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (*conflict of interest*),

The Committee having vetted twenty-one (21) nominees (one nominee having been withdrawn from the approval process) made the following general observations, THAT-

- i) The twenty-one nominees, namely Mr. Clement Nzomo Kiteme (Angola), Ms. Mary Mugwanja (Austria), Prof. Bitange Ndemo (Belgium), Ms. Muthoni Gichohi (China), Amb. Gathoga Chege (Cuba), Amb. Salim Salim (Djibouti), Maj. Gen. A.G. Matiiri (Egypt), Amb. Galma Boru (Indonesia), Mr. Paul Ndung'u (Mozambique), Mr. Michael Sialai (Namibia), Maj. Gen. (Rtd) Andrew Ikenye (Nigeria), Ms. Margaret Shava (Netherlands), Ms. Amina Abdalla (Oman), Amb. Nyambura Kamau (Pakistan), Mr. Boniface N. Mwilu (Qatar), Amb. Michael Oyugi (Spain), Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) Thomas Chepkuto (Somalia), Mr. Leonard Boiyo (Turkey), Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) George Owinow (Uganda), Prof. Richard Bosire (UNESCO) and Maj. Gen. (Rtd.) Charles Gituai (IGAD) are Kenyan citizens and do not hold dual citizenship;
- ii) Pursuant to Section 6(10) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs notified the Clerk of the National Assembly of withdrawal from the approval process of Dr. Caroline Wanjiru Karugu, nominee for the position of Ambassador of the Republic of Kenya to Denmark;
- iii) All the nominees presented their academic credentials and professional certificates and demonstrated their experience in accordance with the provisions of Section 6(7) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act No. 33 of 2011;
- iv) None of the nominees has been charged in a Court of Law or mentioned adversely in a Parliamentary Committee report or Commission of inquiry in the last three years;
- v) All the nominees satisfy the requirements of Article 77(1) in that they do not intend to participate in any other gainful employment;
- vi) All the nominees do not hold office in any registered political party hence satisfy the provisions of Article 77(2) of the Constitution;
- vii) In regard to Prof. Bitange Ndemo's culpability or otherwise in the sale of Malili Ranch Ltd land, Miscellaneous Civil Application 192 of 2016 had declared the initiation, maintenance and prosecution of the nominee in the Chief Magistrate's Court (Anti-Corruption Court) vide criminal case No. 19 of 2014 was an abuse of the criminal justice system and in contravention of the applicant's constitutional rights and freedoms and security of the person and the right to secure the protection of the law. The court further held that the case amounted to selective and therefore discriminatory prosecution and a gross abuse of the process of court and was oppressive and malicious. The Court therefore issued Orders of Prohibition prohibiting

the continuance of the Chief Magistrate's Court (ACC) at Milimani vide criminal case No. 19 of 2015 in the manner intended against the nominee.

- viii) None of the nominees has been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (*conflict of interest*), 76(*financial probity*), 77(*restriction of State officers*) and 78(2) (*dual citizenship*) of the Constitution;
- ix) That, by the deadline of receipt of Memoranda from members of the public, the Clerk of the National Assembly had received two Memorandum contesting the suitability of Maj. Gen. (Rtd) Andrew Ikenye and Mr. Michael Sialai, CBS, respectively.
- x) The two Memoranda were rendered inadmissible before the Committee since they did not comply with the requirements of Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act which provides that evidence contesting the suitability of a nominee to hold office to which he/she has been nominated should be by written Statement on Oath (*affidavit*).

Committee Recommendations

Having considered the suitability, capacity and integrity of the nominees, and pursuant to Article 132(2)(e) of the Constitution, Section 20(2) of the Foreign Service Act (No. 12 of 2021), Sections 3 and 8 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) and Standing Order 216(5)(f), the Committee recommends that the National Assembly **APPROVES** the nomination and subsequent appointment by His Excellency the President, of;

1. Mr. Clement Nzomo Kiteme for appointment as Ambassador to Luanda, Angola;
2. Ms. Mary Mugwanja for appointment as Ambassador to Vienna, Austria;
3. Prof. Bitange Ndemo for appointment as Ambassador to Brussels, Belgium;
4. Ms. Muthoni Gichohi for appointment as Ambassador to Beijing, China;
5. Amb. Gathoga Chege for appointment as Ambassador to Havana, Cuba;
6. Amb. Salim Salim for appointment as Ambassador to Djibouti, Djibouti;
7. Maj. Gen. A.G. Matiiri for appointment as Ambassador to Cairo, Egypt;
8. Amb. Galma Boru for appointment as Ambassador to Jakarta, Indonesia;
