



## 3 IMPACT OF THE BUSINESS TRANSACTED BY THE COMMITTEE

Some of the impacts that the Committee's work had to the country include:

The Committee processed two key legislations namely; the Warehouse Receipt Systems Bill
and the Irrigation Bill which were assented to. The two laws have improved the livelihood of
Kenyan farmers and the country.

The Committee widely engaged the public and stakeholders in the conduct of its business leading to the major policy directions such as the halt to maize importation and increase of prices in the purchase of maize by the Government.

- The Committee considered estimates of assigned State Departments as required by relevant law and Standing Order of the National Assembly and prioritized the Big Four Agenda such as allocations for The Blue Economy Conference hosted at the KICC and MV Doria Patrol Vessel.
- 4. The Committee carried out inspection visits to projects that are being implemented by various Semi-Autonomous Government Agencies within the State Departments hence ensuring prudence use of the public resources and funds.
- The Committee participated in the 124<sup>th</sup> Session of the International Coffee Council 25<sup>th</sup>-29<sup>th</sup>
  March, 2019 successfully lobbying for a declaration of Kshs 3 Billion Coffee Cherry Fund.
- The Committee is leading the adoption of BT Cotton thereby ensuring revival of the Cotton Industry in the Country.
- Parliament through the Implementation Committee should follow up on implementation of treaties, agreements and obligations agreed to during the signing of Maputo declaration that was ratified in Malabo in 2014.

#### PART FOUR

# 4 REASONS WHY THE COMMITTEE HAD SOME PENDING BUSINESS AT THE END OF THE $12^{TH}$ PARLIAMENT

The Committee experienced the following challenges which made it difficult for it to optimally discharge its mandate:

- The COVID-19 pandemic affected the frequency of meetings and it made it difficult to meet stakeholders to prosecute matters before the Committee. This affected the Committee's efficiency in the execution of its mandate.
- The Court Ruling on the Petition by the Senate regarding consideration of Bills between the two Houses of Parliament halted consideration of Bills in the National Assembly for a while. This increased the backlog of Bills in the Committee.
- Unavailability of Government officials when invited for meetings to consider business before the Committee. This made it difficult for the Committee to discharge its mandate effectively.
- Some Members whose business was referred to the Committee were not available when invited for Committee meetings to consider their Questions, Legislative Proposals, Statements or Petitions.

 Inadequate committee meeting rooms and furniture occasionally led to delays in starting meetings and at times cancellation of meetings.

## The Committee unanimously adopted its report with the following key achievements and Challenges

Some of the impacts that the Committee's work had to the country include:

- The Committee processed two key legislations namely; the Warehouse Receipt Systems Bill and the Irrigation Bill which were assented to. The two laws have improved the livelihood of Kenya farmers and the country.
- The Committee widely engaged the public and stakeholders in the conduct of its business leading to the major policy directions such as the halt to maize importation and increase of prices in the purchase of maize by the Government.
- The Committee considered estimates of assigned State Departments as required by relevant law and Standing Order of the National Assembly and prioritized the Big Four Agenda such as allocations for The Blue Economy Conference hosted at the KICC and MV Doria Patrol Vessel.
- 4. The Committee carried out inspection visits to projects that are being implemented by various Semi-Autonomous Government Agencies within the State Departments hence ensuring prudence use of the public resources and funds.
- The Committee participated in the 124th Session of the International Coffee Council 25th-29th March, 2019 successfully lobbying for a declaration of Kshs 3 Billion Coffee Cherry Fund.
- The Committee is leading the adoption of BT Cotton thereby ensuring revival of the Cotton Industry in the Country.

# REASONS WHY THE COMMITTEE HAD SOME PENDING BUSINESS AT THE END OF THE $12^{\mathrm{TH}}$ PARLIAMENT

The Committee experienced the following challenges which made it difficult for it to optimally discharge its mandate:

- The COVID-19 pandemic affected the frequency of meetings and it made it difficult to meet stakeholders to
  prosecute matters before the Committee. This affected the Committee's efficiency in the execution of its mandate.
- The Court Ruling on the Petition by the Senate regarding consideration of Bills between the two Houses of Parliament halted consideration of Bills in the National Assembly for a while. This increased the backlog of Bills in the Committee.
- Unavailability of Government officials when invited for meetings to consider business before the Committee. This
  made it difficult for the Committee to discharge its mandate effectively.
- Some Members whose business was referred to the Committee were not available when invited for Committee meetings to consider their Questions, Legislative Proposals, Statements or Petitions.
- Inadequate committee meeting rooms and furniture occasionally led to delays in starting meetings and at times cancellation of meetings.
