Mr. Speaker Sir,

The Cancer Prevention and Control (Amendment) (No. 2) Bill, (National Assembly Bills No. 45 of 2022) was sponsored at the National Assembly by Hon. Abdul Rahim Dawood, MP. The Bill was passed by the National Assembly, with amendments, on 27th March, 2024 and was thereafter referred to the Senate for consideration in accordance with Article 110(4) of the Constitution.

The Cancer Prevention and Control (Amendment) (No. 2) Bill, (National Assembly Bills No. 45 of 2022) was introduced in the Senate by way of First Reading on 28th March, 2024 and thereafter stood committed to the Standing Committee on Health. The Bill seeks to amend the Cancer Prevention and Control Act (No. 15 of 2012) provide for oncology training of healthcare workers. It further provides for the promotion of the use of e-health and telemedicine for the prevention and management of cancer and also provides for the management of cancer patients through primary healthcare.

Mr. Speaker Sir,

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitutions and standing order 145 of the Senate Standing Orders, the Committee on Health invited interested members of the public to submit their presentation on the Bill by way of written memoranda to be received on or before 16th April, 2024. The invitation for submissions were made vide advertisements which appeared in the *Daily Nation* and the *Standard* newspapers on 3rd April, 2024.

However, at the close of the public participation period, no memorandum on the Bill had been received by the Committee. Nonetheless, the Committee held meetings to deliberate on the provisions of the proposed amendments and acquaint itself with the issues raised in the Bill

Mr. Speaker Sir,

During consideration of the Bill, the Committee observed that cancer is now the 3rd leading cause of deaths and second among non-communicable diseases in the country, accounting for about 7% of overall mortality rate. The illness affects Kenyans of all ages and socioeconomic backgrounds with the annual numbers estimated at about 41.000.

Unfortunately, most cancer cases are diagnosed at an advanced stage when treatment options are limited, the economic burden of out-of-pocket costs of health care in the country weighs heavily on households with some spending on average 15% of their budget on health care. Majority of households are vulnerable and are often forced to adopt coping strategies like borrowing or selling assets.

With the foregoing, the Committee will be proposing its amendments to various pieces of legislation in order to address the burden of disease to cancer patients and their families and provide safety nets to cushion families from huge hospital bills.

Mr. Speaker Sir,

I wish to sincerely thank the Members of the Committee for their insightful contributions during consideration of the Bill and development of this report. The Committee also thanks the Offices of the Speaker and Clerk of the Senate for the support extended to it in execution of its mandate.

CHAPTER ONE

1.1. Introduction

- 1. The Cancer Prevention and Control (Amendment) (No. 2) Bill, (National Assembly Bills No. 45 of 2022) was sponsored at the National Assembly by Hon. Abdul Rahim Dawood, MP. The Bill was passed by the National Assembly, on 27th March, 2024 and was thereafter referred to the Senate for consideration in accordance with Article 110 (4) of the Constitution.
- 2. The Bill was introduced in the Senate by way of First Reading on 28th March, 2024 thereafter stood committed to the Standing Committee on Health. A copy of the Bill has been attached to this report as *Annex ii*.
- 3. Pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution and standing order 145 of the Senate Standing Orders, 'a Committee to which a Bill is committed shall facilitate public participation and shall take into account the views and recommendations from the members of the public when preparing its report to the Senate'.
- 4. Consequently, the Committee on Health invited interested members of public to submit their presentations on the Bill by way of written memoranda to be received on or before Tuesday, 16th April, 2024.
- 5. The invitations for submissions were made vide advertisements which appeared in the *Daily Nation* and the *Standard* on Wednesday, 3rd April, 2024. A copy of the advertisement made has been attached to this report as *Annex iii*. However, at the close of the public participation period, no memorandum on the Bill has been received by the Committee.
- 6. The Committee held a meeting to review the proposed amendments and gave its views and recommendations. A copy of the minutes of the deliberations has been attached in the report as *Annex i*.

1.2. Overview of the Bill

- 7. The Bill seeks to amend the Cancer Prevention and Control Act (No. 15 of 2012) provide for oncology training of healthcare workers. It further provides for the promotion of the use of e-health and telemedicine for the prevention and management of cancer and also provides for the management of cancer patients through primary healthcare.
- 8. Clause 2 of the Bill amends section 2 of the Act to provide for the definition of the terms
 - a) "e-health" to mean the combined use of electronic communication and information technology in the health sector and;

- b) "telemedicine" to mean the provision of health care services and sharing of medical knowledge over distance using telecommunications and includes consultative, diagnostic and treatment services.
- 9. **Clause 3** of the Bill amends section 5 of the Act to include the following among the objects and purposes of the Act
 - a) to promote the use of e-health and telemedicine for the prevention and management of cancer;
 - b) to promote the management of persons with cancer as a component of primary healthcare; and;
 - c) to secure and regulate the use of e-health in cancer management and the provision of cancer diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation services and other medical care related to cancer.
- 10. **Clause 4** of the Bill amends section 31 of the Act to mandate the National Cancer Institute to collaborate with the national government, universities, colleges and the private sector to promote the training of oncology professionals.

CHAPTER TWO

2. OVERVIEW OF PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ON THE BILL

- 11. Pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution and Standing Order 145 (5) of the Senate Standing Orders, the Standing Committee on Health invited interested members of the public to submit submissions on the Bill.
- 12. The invitation for submissions were made vide advertisements which appeared in the Daily Nation and the Standard on 3rd April (*Annex iii*). The deadline for submission of views was 16th April, 2024. At the close of the public participation period, the Committee had not received any memoranda and or submissions on the Bill.
- 13. The Committee held a meeting on 27th May, 2024 and considered the Bill and gave its submissions which thereafter culminated into the Committee amendments as set out in the attachment to this report (Annex iv).

CHAPTER THREE

3. COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS


3.1. COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

- 14. Following deliberations and analysis of the Bill, the Committee made the following observations
 - a. Cancer has immense socio-economic impact on individuals, families, communities and the healthcare system in the country and poses a significant physical and financial burden;
 - b. The two levels of the government should endeavor to provide primary care for cancer which involves activities towards prevention such as risk factor reduction and screening, health promotion activities including public awareness, community engagement and social mobilization; and
 - c. There is need to review the necessary legal framework in order to provide Cancer patients with accessible, affordable, quality and equitable healthcare without predisposing them to financial burden and to cushion their families from huge hospital bills.

3.2. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

15. The Committee recommends-

Clause 2 of the Bill be amended by deleting the proposed new definition of the word "e-health" and substituting therefor with the definition provided under section 2 of the **Digital Health Act**.

- CONSIDERATION OF THE PROPOSED COUNTY OVERSIGHT AND NETWORKING ENGAGEMENTS

The Committee was informed that the County Oversight and Networking Engagements to acquaint itself with the issues affecting healthcare provision in the counties, countrywide was scheduled to begin from Taita-Taveta County on 16th June, 2024 through to Kwale County and ending in Mombasa County. Members were urged to avail themselves for the exercise.

- 3. Following deliberations, the Committee **observed** that the Constitution, the Senate Standing Orders and the Parliamentary Powers and Privileges Act, 2017 provides for attendance of witnesses to Committees of Parliament and provides for sanctions and penalties in case on breaches or disobeys orders made these committees.
- 4. The Committee **observed** that section 19 (1) and (3) of the Parliamentary Powers and Privileges Act, 2017 provides that-
 - (1) Where a witness summoned does not appear, or appears but fails to satisfy the relevant House of Parliament or committee, the relevant House or Committee may impose upon the witness such fine, not exceeding five hundred thousand shillings, having regard to the witness' condition in life and all the circumstances of the case;
 - (3) Parliament or its committee may order the arrest of a person who fails to honour a summons.

- 5. The Committee further observed that section 27 of the Act provides that-
 - (1) A person commits an offence where the person—
 - (a) having been duly summoned in terms of section 18 fails, without sufficient cause to—
 - *(i) attend at the time and place specified in the summons;*
 - (2) A person who commits an offence under subsection (1) is liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding two hundred thousand shillings or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both.

THE CANCER PREVENTION AND CONTROL (AMENDMENT) (NO.2) BILL, 2022

A Bill for

AN ACT of Parliament to amend the Cancer Prevention and Control Act, and for connected purposes

ENACTED by the Parliament of Kenya, as follows—

1. This Act may be cited as the Cancer Prevention and Control (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 2022.

Short title.

2. The Cancer Prevention and Control Act, 2012 (in this Act referred to as "principal Act") is amended in section 2 by inserting the following new definitions in proper alphabetical order—

Amendment of section 2 of No. 15 of 2012.

"e-Health" means the combined use of electronic communication and information technology in the health sector;

"telemedicine" means the provision of health care services and sharing of medical knowledge over distance using telecommunications and includes consultative, diagnostic and treatment services;

3. The principal Act is amended in section 5 by inserting the following new paragraphs immediately after paragraph (b)—

Amendment of section 5 of No. 15 of 2012.

- "(ba) promote the use of e-health and telemedicine for the prevention and management of cancer:
- (bb) promote the management of persons with cancer as a component of primary healthcare;
- (bc) secure and regulate the use of e-health in cancer management and the provision of cancer diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation services and other medical care related to cancer;"
- 4. The principal Act is amended in section 31 by inserting the following new subsection immediately after subsection (2)—

Amendment of section 31 of No. 15 of 2012.

"(3) The Institute shall collaborate with the national government, universities, colleges and the private sector to promote the training of oncology professionals."

US flags corruption in the Judiciary, public contracts

The text for the bilateral trade deal being drafted includes anti-corruption clauses

he United States says in a new report that entrenched bribery and political inter-ference in Kenya's Judiciary and extortion in public con-tracts are barriers to investment

According to a review by the Office of the US Trade Representative despite years of governance, procurement and judicial reorms, corruption remains entrenched in pockets of the Ken-

an Judiciary and government. US Trade Representative Katherine Tai said this has under-mined investor confidence even as national and county govern-ment authorities continue to demand bribes from businesses.

Corruption remains a substantial barrier to doing business in Kenya. US firms continue to report challenges competing against foreign companies that are willing to ignore legal stand-ards or engage in bribery and other forms of corruption" Tai said in the report.

Corruption is widely reported to affect government procure-ment. Kenya has not implemented its anti-corruption laws effec-tively. US firms routinely report

direct requests for bribes from all levels of the government." The US said that despite efforts to increase efficiency and public confidence in the Judiciary, the backlog of cases and continued committee undermine the credicorruption undermine the credi-bility and effectiveness of the justice system.

"While judicial reforms are moving forward, bribes, extortion and political considerations influence cases. As such, foreign and local investors risk lengthy

political interference come on the backdrop of the Judiciary battling allegations of bribery and growing dalliance with President William Ruto's administra-

Suspicions of a growing bond between the two arms of government began on January 22 when Dr Ruto and Chief Justice Martha Koome met at State House. The talks were attended by National Assembly Speaker Moses Wetang'ula and his Senate colleague Amason Kingi.

The Judiciary, for instance, de-fended itself on Mach 21 against a statement by the President five days earlier which appeared to indicate that the Kenya Kwan-za administration struck a deal with it over the implementation of the controversial housing levy.

The enforcement of the levy at the rate of 1.5 per cent of workers' gross income, matched by employers', has been challenged in court even after lawmakers passed specific primary legislation for its rollout.
