- 1. The Senate assembled at thirty minutes past Two O'clock.
- 2. The proceedings were opened with Prayer said by the Speaker.

3. QUORUM OF THE SENATE

The Speaker, having counted the Honourable Senators present at the commencement of the Sitting and confirming that there was no Quorum, directed that the Bell be rung for ten minutes, pursuant to Standing Order 40;

And there being a Quorum before the expiry of the ten minutes;

The Speaker invited the Clerk to call the Orders of the day.

4. **COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CHAIR**

The Speaker conveyed the following Communications from the Chair: -

a) The Address to Parliament by His Excellency the President, Pursuant to Article 132 (1) (b) and (c) of the Constitution

"Honourable Senators,

Article 132 (1) (b), mandates the President to address a special sitting of Parliament once every year. Article 132 (1) (c) also requires the President, once every year to-

- i) Report, in an address to the nation, on all the measures taken and progress achieved in the realization of the national values referred to in Article 10;
- ii) Publish in the Gazette, the details of the measures and progress under sub-paragraph (i); and
- iii) Submit a report to the National Assembly on the progress made in fulfilling the international obligations of the Republic.

Further, Article 240(7) of the Constitution requires the National Security Council to "report annually to Parliament on the state of the security of Kenya." Ordinarily, this report is submitted to Parliament during the address by the President referred to under Article 132(1)(b), and tabled in the Houses of Parliament.

Honourable Senators,

Vide letter Ref. No. EOP/CAB.26/4A VOL. VII/ (1), dated 3rd September 2025, the Chief of Staff and Head of the Public Service, informed the Speakers of the Houses of Parliament of the intention of His Excellency the President to deliver his Address to Parliament in accordance with Article 132(1) (b) and (c) of the Constitution. The Chief of Staff and Head of Public Service further requested the Speakers' concurrence to schedule the State of the Nation Address on Thursday, 6th November, 2025 or Thursday, 20th November, 2025, at 2:30 p.m.

Honourable Senators,

Subsequently, and following consultations, the Speakers of the Houses of Parliament acceded to the request of His Excellency the President and scheduled the Address for Thursday, 20th November, 2025. A team has been appointed by the Clerks to co-ordinate the event. Further details will be communicated through the Office of the Clerk.

I therefore take this opportunity, to inform you that His Excellency the President, will deliver his State of the Nation Address to Parliament during a Joint Sitting of the Houses of Parliament on Thursday, 20th November, 2025, at 2:30 p.m. in the National Assembly Chamber.

I thank you."

6. QUESTIONS AND STATEMENTS

Requests for Statements pursuant to Standing Order 53 (1)

- i) The Senator for Tharaka Nithi County (Sen. Mwenda Gataya, MP) sought a Statement from the Standing Committee on Health regarding unlawful detention of new mothers in public hospitals over unpaid medical bills.
- ii) The Senator for Busia County (Sen. Andrew Omtatah, MP) sought a Statement from the Standing Committee on Trade, Industrialization and

Tourism regarding the inspection and enforcement of weighing scales and weight measures in businesses across the country.

- iii) The Senator for Busia County (Sen. 7. SUSPENSION OF A SENATOR FOR DISORDERLY CONDUCT PURSUANT TO STANDING ORDER 121 (2) (b)

Rising on a Point of Order, the Senator for Nandi County (Sen. Samson Cherarkey, MP) sought the intervention of the Speaker to direct Sen. (Dr.) Boni Khalwale, MP, to substantiate his utterances made in the course of his contribution to the Statements sought in the House.

And, upon the failure by the Senator for Kakamega County (Sen. (Dr.) Boni Khalwale, MP) to substantiate or withdraw the allegation pursuant to Standing Orders 105 (2) and 121 (2) (b), the Speaker ordered the Senator to withdraw from the precincts of the Senate for the remainder of the day's sitting for disorderly conduct.

Thereupon, the Senator withdrew from the Chamber.

8. SUSPENSION OF A SENATOR FOR DISORDERLY CONDUCT PURSUANT TO STANDING ORDER 121 (2) (b)

Pursuant to Standing Order 121 (2) (b), the Temporary Speaker (Sen. Veronica Maina, MP) ordered the Senator for Kiambu County (Sen. Karungo wa Thang'wa, MP), to withdraw from the precincts of the Senate for the remainder of the day's sitting for disorderly conduct.

Thereupon, the Senator withdrew from the Chamber.

9. MOTION - INSTALLATION OF CCTV CAMERAS IN ALL POLICE STATIONS, CELLS AND POLICE REPORTING DESKS

(Sen. Karen Nyamu, MP)

AWARE THAT Article 51 provides that a person who is detained, held in custody or imprisoned under the law, retains all the rights and fundamental freedoms in the Bill of Rights, except to the extent that any particular right or a fundamental freedom is clearly incompatible with the fact that the person is detained, held in custody or imprisoned;

FURTHER AWARE THAT the National taskforce on improvement of the terms and conditions of service and other reforms for members of the National Police Service and Kenya Prison Service recommended adequate Government funding for the National Police Service to modernize its facilities, equipment and gear, and enhance its logistical and technological capabilities for National Police Service officers in order to enable the Service discharge its mandate efficiently and effectively;

COGNIZANT THAT the Bill of Rights provides for protection of human rights, prevention of abuse and upholding of the rule of law within detention facilities and police stations;

CONCERNED THAT there has been increasing reports of human rights violations, abuse, unexplained injuries, and deaths in custody, as well as security breaches and escapes from police cells across the country;

FURTHER CONCERNED THAT despite the recommendations by the Justice Maraga task force, little or no efforts have been made to ensure modernization of police cells by installation of Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) cameras and police reporting desks thereby affecting public trust and accountability on what happens to persons in police custody;

NOW THEREFORE, the Senate resolves that the National Government, through the Ministry of Interior and National Administration:

- 1. installs functional and tamper-proof CCTV cameras in all police stations, cells and police reporting desks across the country;
- 2. ensures that all CCTV systems are monitored in real-time and that footage is securely stored and made accessible during investigations, judicial processes; and
- 3. provides the necessary resources, technical support, and training to law enforcement officers for the effective operation and maintenance of CCTV systems and continuous digitization of Occurrence Book platforms.

16. MOTION - ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONAL TEACHING AND REFERRAL HOSPITALS IN KENYA

Order read;

Motion made and Question Proposed;

THAT, AWARE THAT Article 43 (1) (a) of the Constitution of Kenya provides that every person has the right to the highest attainable standard of health, including reproductive health care;

NOTING THAT in Kenya, we have five National Teaching and Referral hospitals with Kenyatta University Research and Teaching Hospital in Kiambu County and Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Eldoret, Uasin Gishu County being the only ones outside Nairobi County;

CONCERNED THAT the bed capacity, medical equipment and human capital in these National Teaching and Referral hospitals are not sufficient to absorb all the patients seeking specialized treatment;

FURTHER CONCERNED THAT many Kenyans with critical health conditions travel long distances in order to access specialized services in Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Eldoret or Nairobi where the other four National Teaching and Referral hospitals are located, leading to high cost of travel, augmented disease and in some cases deaths along the way;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Senate urges-

- 1. The Ministry of Health to:
 - i) Establish National Teaching and Referral hospitals in the Coast, Eastern, North Eastern, Nyanza and Western regions; and
 - ii) Fully equip the National Teaching and Referral Hospitals with modern medical equipment, medical supplies and personnel; and
- 2. The County Governments to allocate more funds to their respective health dockets to adequately facilitate their County Level 5 and Level 6 hospitals in order to enhance provision of critical health services to reduce the demand for such services from the National Teaching and Referral Hospitals.
