8. **MOTION - DECLARATION OF ROAD TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS IN KENYA AS A NATIONAL DISASTER**  
(Sen. Veronica Maina, MP)

**AWARE THAT**, Article 43 guarantees the right to the highest attainable standard of health, including emergency medical treatment and Article 21(1) of the Constitution obligates the State and all State organs to observe, respect, protect, promote and fulfil the rights and fundamental freedoms contained in the Bill of Rights;

**NOTING THAT**, Article 238 of the Constitution provides that national security includes the protection of the people of Kenya and their property against internal and external threats, which encompasses safety on national transport networks;

**COGNIZANT THAT**, road traffic injuries are among the leading causes of death in Kenya and constitute the leading cause of mortality among adolescents and adults in their most economically productive years, surpassing many communicable and non-communicable diseases resulting in significant loss of human capital and productivity;

**NOTING THAT**, in 2025 more than 4,400 Kenyans lost their lives with over 17,000 injuries from road crashes, a 3% increase over the previous year, while nearly 400 people were killed in road traffic accidents in January 2026 alone, representing an 11% increase compared to the same period in the previous year, illustrating a continuing trend of preventable loss of life;

**CONCERNED THAT**, beyond loss of life, road traffic accidents result in long-term disability, psychological trauma, family disruption and significant economic loss, with estimates suggesting losses amounting to billions shillings annually to the national economy, while placing severe strain on health facilities and emergency services;

**FURTHER CONCERNED THAT**, despite the existence of the National Road Safety Action Plan (2024–2028) and other statutory measures, road carnage persists due to preliminary causes including over-speeding, impaired and distracted driving, non-compliance with traffic laws, inadequate driver training, unsafe road infrastructure, unroadworthy and overloaded vehicles, as well as systemic challenges arising from inadequate investment in road safety infrastructure, weak coordination among transport, enforcement, health and county authorities, and limited emergency medical response capacity;

**NOW THEREFORE, THE SENATE** resolves that:

- i.) Road traffic accidents in Kenya be declared a National Disaster, requiring urgent, coordinated and sustained multi-sectoral intervention across prevention, emergency response, rehabilitation and long-term systemic reform;
- ii.) The Ministry of Roads and Transport and the Ministry of Health in conjunction with the National Transport and Safety Authority, the National Police Service and the Council of Governors, urgently strengthen the implementation of the National Road Safety Action Plan (2024–2028), including enhanced enforcement of traffic laws, safer road design, public education, data-driven interventions and improved emergency response capacity;
- iii.) The Ministry of Health in collaboration with the County Governments to set aside adequate resources to support road safety interventions, emergency medical services, trauma care systems and post-crash rehabilitation services; and
- iv.) The National Treasury in collaboration with the Ministry of Roads and Transport establishes a Road Safety Disaster Response Fund to support road safety interventions, victims and families affected by the road accidents.

9. **MOTION - MAINSTREAMING A FRAMEWORK FOR CLEAN COOKING IN KENYA**

(Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP)

**THAT AWARE THAT**, Article 42 of the Constitution guarantees every person the right to a clean and healthy environment, which includes access to safe energy options;

**FURTHER AWARE THAT**, over 900 million Africans, including more than 90% of households in Kenya’s rural areas, still rely on traditional biomass (firewood, charcoal, animal waste) for cooking, resulting in high levels of indoor air pollution that cause premature deaths, particularly among women and children;

**CONCERNED THAT**, in Kenya, indoor air pollution has been linked to over 23,000 annual deaths, with women and girls bearing the disproportionate burden of time spent collecting firewood and cooking, limiting their education and economic opportunities;

**NOTING THAT**, traditional cooking methods contribute significantly to deforestation, greenhouse gas emissions, and climate vulnerability at the county level, undermining national commitments under the Energy Act, 2019, the Climate Change Act, 2016, and Kenya’s Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs);

**RECALLING THAT**, the Africa Clean Cooking Summit (Paris, 2023) mobilized USD 2.2 billion in commitments for clean cooking, and the International Energy Agency has recommended urgent financing and policy action to achieve universal access by 2040;

**ACKNOWLEDGING**, the efforts of some counties, development partners, and private sector actors in piloting clean cooking projects, but recognizing that these remain small-scale and fragmented;

**NOW THEREFORE**, the Senate resolves that the: -

- i.) Council of Governors develops county-level policies, frameworks, and budgets that mainstream clean cooking into devolved energy and health functions;
- ii.) National Treasury and Ministry of Energy prioritize clean cooking in financing frameworks, including results-based financing and blended finance models to de-risk private investment;
- iii.) County Governments incorporate clean cooking targets in their County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs) and ensure public institutions such as schools, health facilities, and prisons adopt clean cooking solutions;
- iv.) National Treasury and County Governments to fast-track letters of authorization to unlock carbon finance markets (Article 6.2 and CORSIA) for clean cooking projects;

v.) County Governments engage the private sector actors, and community organizations to expand clean cooking access, create local jobs, and reduce pressure on forest resources.

**THAT**, the Senate notes the Reports of the Kenya Delegation to the Sittings of the Pan-African Parliament (PAP) Committees and other Pan-African Parliament (PAP) Organs held at the Gallagher Convention Centre in Midrand, South Africa on 13<sup>th</sup> September to 20<sup>th</sup> September, 2024; and 28<sup>th</sup> October to 17<sup>th</sup> November, 2024, laid on the Table of the Senate on Tuesday, 2<sup>nd</sup> December, 2025.

11. **MOTION - PROVISION OF IFMIS REPORTS FOR COUNTY GOVERNMENTS TO THE SENATE**

(Sen. Andrew Omtatah Okoiti, MP)

**THAT, AWARE** that, Article 96 of the Constitution provides that the Senate represents the counties, and serves to protect their interests, determines the allocation of national revenue among counties, as provided in Article 217, and exercises oversight over national revenue allocated to the County Governments;

**FURTHER AWARE THAT**, in the case of *Senate v Council of Governors and 6 others* (Petition 24 and 27 of 2019 (consolidated) 2022) KESC 57(KLR), the Supreme Court affirmed that the Senate’s oversight authority extends to both nationally allocated and locally generated revenue;

**CONCERNED THAT**, that Senators are constrained by lack of access to real time to data from the IFMIS system for the respective counties they represent, thus affecting effective oversight of County Governments;

**FURTHER CONCERNED THAT**, in some instances data and information presented to the Senate by the Auditor-General and the Controller of Budget are received and considered late as a result of the backlog resulting into too much information not getting properly reviewed by Senators;

**NOTING THAT**, as a result of unchecked financial information and systems, County Governments have continued to accumulate pending bills resulting from unplanned expenditures, unaccounted for and inflated cost of projects;

**NOW THEREFORE**, the Senate resolves, that the Cabinet Secretary in charge of the National Treasury shall on a monthly basis forward to the Clerk of the Senate all IFMIS transactions and reports for each County Government for onward transmission to the respective Senator for information on accountability and transparency, in order to strengthen their constitutional oversight and promote good governance in the management of public finances.

QUESTIONS AND STATEMENTS

**QUESTIONS**

**Question No. 027 The Senator for Kisumu County (Sen. (Prof.) Tom Ojienda, SC, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Co-operatives and Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary outline the measures the Ministry has adopted to cushion small-scale traders against diminished profit margins caused by the rising cost of essential commodities?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary clarify whether the Ministry intends to expand access to affordable credit through the Hustler Fund, SACCOs or other credit guarantee schemes for informal traders in Kisumu, given that current interest rates remain as high as 23-24%?
- c) What safeguards exist to ensure that women and youth traders, who are the majority in Kisumu's informal markets, are equitably included in these credit support programmes?

**Question No. 035 Nominated Senator (Sen. Beth Syengo, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Co-operatives and Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development:**

- a) When will the Ministry ensure payment of outstanding terminal dues to the laid-off staff of the defunct Kenya Planters Co-operative Union (KPCU), numbering four hundred and two (402), who were separated from service between 2002 and 2010, and who are owed approximately Kshs. 400 million?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary state whether the Ministry has a comprehensive payment schedule for settlement of the said staff dues, indicating timelines, amounts payable and beneficiaries, and whether the schedule provides for interest accruing from the date the payments fell due, including timelines for payment of such interest?

**Question No. 036 Nominated Senator (Sen. Beth Syengo, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Co-operatives and Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary state when the Ministry will pay outstanding proceeds due to coffee farmers for coffee sold through the defunct Kenya Planters Co-operative Union (KPCU) in the Coffee Pool Year 2008/2009, amounting to approximately Kshs. 60 million?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary also indicate whether the Ministry has a payment schedule for the affected farmers, provide timelines, amounts payable and beneficiaries, and also indicate whether the schedule provides for interest accruing from the date the proceeds fell due, including timelines for payment of such interest?

**Question No. 039 The Senator for Nyandarua County (Sen. John Methu, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Co-operatives and Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) Development:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a justification for the suspension of SACCO societies' registration in the country, and state whether public participation was conducted before the decision was taken?
- b) When will the registration resume?
- c) What measures has the Ministry put in place to mitigate against the adverse impact of the suspension on financial inclusion, savings mobilisation and access to affordable credit, especially among the youth who have already organised themselves under proposed societies such as the Rise Up SACCO Society in Githurai 45, but are unable to obtain formal registration due to the suspension?

**Question No. 013 The Senator for Nairobi City County (Sen. Edwin Sifuna, CBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Health:**

- a) Why has the Government not paid last expense compensation to Mr. Norbert Bulungu, father of the late Miss Shekinah Pendo Vudavila, a student at Naivasha Girls Secondary School who died on 17<sup>th</sup> October, 2023, despite the claim having been lodged?
- b) When will the claim be settled?

- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary also state when the rest of the pending claims under the defunct EduAfya Medical Scheme will be settled, once and for all?

**Question No. 014 The Senator for Makueni County (Sen. Daniel Maanzo, EBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Health:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a breakdown of the management and utilization of the Tobacco Control Fund, specifically outlining how funds have been received and allocated as stipulated by Section 7 of the Tobacco Control Act 2007?
- b) What measures are in place to ensure transparency and accountability in the administration of the Tobacco Control Fund?
- c) How is the Ministry addressing the current influx of oral nicotine pouches, e-cigarettes and such other tobacco products amongst the youth and children?
- d) What steps has the Ministry taken to ensure compliance with the Tobacco Control Regulations, particularly regarding the solatium contribution from tobacco manufacturers and importers, following the judgement of the High Court in Constitutional Petition No. 143 of 2025?
- e) How is tobacco control being coordinated within the Ministry and across the other Government institutions, particularly in the context of devolution?

**Question No. 025 The Senator for Kisumu County (Sen. (Prof.) Tom Ojienda, SC, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Health:**

Could the Cabinet Secretary outline the measures in place to ensure that the Social Health Authority (SHA) processes and settles claims submitted by low-tier hospitals in rural areas and small private hospitals promptly, and with similar priority given to the settlement of claims from national and county referral hospitals?

**Question No. 031 Nominated Senator (Sen. Catherine Mumma, CBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Health:**

- a) What is the rationale for the 18-year age restriction on access to hearing aids under the Social Health Insurance (SHI) assistive devices benefit package?

- b) When will the discriminatory age restriction be removed so as to allow adults with hearing impairments to access hearing aids under the SHI assistive devices benefit package?
- c) What is the Ministry doing to address the high cost of hearing aids in Kenya, and could the Cabinet Secretary state whether there are plans to procure and distribute hearing aids through the Kenya Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA) or other Government procurement channels to make them affordable?
- d) Could the Cabinet Secretary outline the long-term strategies in place to enhance access to quality healthcare by persons with hearing impairments, and provide details on Government's plan to train and recruit additional audiologists, establish hearing care centres in every county and integrate ear and hearing care into primary health services to facilitate early screening, among other interventions?

**Question No. 048 Nominated Senator (Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Health:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary state the measures in place to operationalize the Kenya Climate Change and Health Strategy across national referral facilities and county health systems?
- b) What steps has the Ministry taken to ensure that hospitals, clinics, laboratories, medicine supply chains and emergency public-health services remain functional during flooding, heat events, disease outbreaks and other climate-related shocks?
- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary state whether the Ministry has conducted a national assessment of the vulnerability of health facilities and public-health systems to flooding, extreme heat, vector-borne diseases, water contamination and power disruption, and if so, what were the findings?
- d) What budgetary, policy and infrastructure measures is the Ministry adopting to strengthen climate-health preparedness in line with practices used in countries that have integrated climate resilience into health planning, such as Bangladesh and the Netherlands?

**Question No. 011 The Senator for Kisumu County (Sen. (Prof.) Tom Ojienda, SC, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary explain the circumstances under which police officers were deployed to Witima Anglican Church in Othaya, Nyeri County on 25<sup>th</sup> January, 2026, and disclose the identities of the persons who authorised and commanded the operation?
- b) What steps did the authorising and commanding officers take to ensure the deployment and conduct of the officers on the scene was consistent with the National Police Service (NPS) standards and constitutional provisions?
- c) Are there internal controls or supervisory review mechanisms that are triggered prior to the deployment of police officers to sensitive civilian settings, such as places of worship, and if so, could the Cabinet Secretary indicate whether they were triggered in this case?
- d) What measures have been put in place to ensure that similar deployments in the future are properly approved, documented and supervised in a manner consistent with the professionalism, discipline and neutrality expected of the NPS?

**Question No. 012 Nominated Senator (Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a status update on the investigations into the murder of Advocate Kyalo Mbobu who was shot dead on Tuesday, 9<sup>th</sup> September, 2025, including whether any suspects have been apprehended or questioned?
- b) What challenges have investigators faced in resolving the case, especially in regard to the Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) footage and other forensic evidence?
- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary outline the steps taken since the murder of the advocate to ensure continuous functionality and rapid access by security agencies to public CCTV footage as a deterrence and investigative tool, and provide details on the current extent of public CCTV surveillance coverage in Nairobi and other major urban centres?

- d) What measures has the Ministry put in place to strengthen community-based intelligence, anonymous reporting channels and witness protection to improve detection and disruption of violent criminal networks perpetrating targeted killings?
- e) Could the Cabinet Secretary also outline the broader security and criminal justice reforms being implemented to address the rising concern over targeted killings, general insecurity and the lack of swift justice in high-profile murder cases?

**Question No. 015 The Senator for Makueni County (Sen. Daniel Maanzo, EBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary explain the circumstances surrounding the abduction and subsequent death of Mr. Emmanuel Mumo Ndivo, a resident of Lukenya Village, Masongaleni Ward, Kibwezi East Constituency, who was last seen alive on the night of 24<sup>th</sup> August, 2025 in Nairobi?
- b) Were the police, at any point, involved in the detention, custody or handling of the late Mr. Ndivo between the time of his abduction and his eventual transfer to the Nairobi City County Funeral Home?
- c) What official records or documentation exist regarding the circumstances under which the late Mr. Ndivo was found and taken to the mortuary, and why was his family not immediately informed by the relevant authorities?

**Question No. 016 The Senator for Makueni County (Sen. Daniel Maanzo, EBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide data on the number of individuals that have reported missing since 2022, indicating those that have been found alive or dead, and the number still unaccounted for?
- b) Have the police or other security agencies established who was involved in the disappearances, and if so, could the Cabinet Secretary provide details on the actions that have been taken to bring the individuals to book?
- c) What measures is the Government implementing to address the increasing cases of abductions in the country, and to specifically ensure accountability in respect of enforced disappearances?

- d) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide details on the psychological and other support mechanisms available to abduction victims, and indicate whether financial compensation has been provided to any victims or their families?

**Question No. 018 The Senator for Makueni County (Sen. Daniel Maanzo, EBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) What are the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. Sammy Kyengo, a construction worker who was reported missing on 6<sup>th</sup> September, 2025 and later found dead at the Talanta Stadium construction site in Nairobi City County on 13<sup>th</sup> September, 2025?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide an update on the current status of investigations into the incident, including any preliminary findings on the cause of death?
- c) Have the police identified and arrested any suspects and, if not, could the Cabinet Secretary outline the steps being taken to speedily identify, apprehend and prosecute the culprits?
- d) What forms of support has the Government provided to the late Mr. Kyengo's family?

**Question No. 020 Nominated Senator (Sen. Shakila Abdalla, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary clarify the basis for deploying Kenya Defence Forces personnel in Kiunga Ward, Lamu East, and outline their scope, mandate and duration?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary clarify the measures in place to prevent human rights violations and enforced disappearances in Kiunga Ward, and outline the accountability mechanisms for monitoring the conduct of security personnel, and indicate whether independent investigations will be initiated into reported cases of bombings, abductions, harassment and intimidation by masked officers?
- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary outline the measures being taken to restore normalcy and rebuild community trust in Kiunga Ward, and detail the immediate and long-term interventions to protect livelihoods, stabilize the area and prevent further displacement?

**Question No. 021 The Senator for Marsabit County (Sen. Mohamed Chute, CBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) What were the reasons for the closure of the Administration Police (AP) Camp at Kurkum in Marsabit County, and could the Cabinet Secretary clarify whether there are plans to re-open the camp, and if so, indicate the number of officers proposed to be deployed to the camp?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary also disclose the criteria the Government uses to allocate infrastructural development funding to police stations and security posts across the country, and indicate whether installations situated in border and conflict-prone areas are accorded priority?
- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a detailed assessment of the condition of housing, office infrastructure and basic operational resources in police stations and security posts in Marsabit and Turkana counties, and indicate whether there are mechanisms in place to ensure proper and timely maintenance of these facilities?
- d) How much money has the Government set aside in the 2025/2026 financial year for infrastructural rehabilitation in police stations and security posts in Marsabit and Turkana counties and, specifically, Illeret Police Post in Marsabit County?

**Question No. 022 The Senator for Tharaka Nithi County (Sen. Mwenda Gataya, CBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) When will the Government establish additional and evenly distributed national identification card registration and collection centres across Tharaka Nithi County and other counties where residents have to travel long distances to access these services?
- b) Could the Government also consider deploying mobile registration and collection stations to address the accessibility challenges faced by youths seeking the services in the affected counties?

**Question No. 023 The Senator for Kilifi County (Sen. Justice (Rtd.) Stewart Madzayo, EGH, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) What is the Ministry’s current strategy for maritime security, and how is Kilifi County classified within the national maritime risk framework?
- b) Why has Kilifi County, despite its long coastline and strategic position, not been prioritized in the deployment of Kenya Coast Guard Services?
- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a report on the status, capacity and distribution of coast guard assets along Kenya’s coastline, and clarify the criteria used in their allocation?
- d) What immediate and long-term measures is the Ministry putting in place to ensure equitable deployment of maritime security infrastructure and personnel across all coastal counties?

**Question No. 030 Nominated Senator (Sen. Catherine Mumma, CBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary disclose the male to female ratio among individuals serving in each county as village elders, assistant chiefs, chiefs, deputy county commissioners, county commissioners and regional commissioners?
- b) What is the male to female ratio among police officers serving in the various ranks within the National Police Service in each county?
- c) What policies and internal operational frameworks has the Ministry established to integrate gender considerations into its operations, specifically with regard to –
  - i. ensuring compliance with the two-thirds gender principle in appointive positions across all ranks of the National Police Service; and
  - ii. protecting government officers from all forms of gender-based violence, while fostering service delivery culture that upholds gender equity?
- d) Could the Cabinet Secretary also provide details on the scope and effectiveness of all Government programmes and initiatives to address Gender-Based Violence (GBV) and femicide generally, and explain the mechanisms in place for the successful implementation of the programmes and initiatives?

**Question No. 052 Nominated Senator (Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for Interior and National Administration:**

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a status update on the implementation of the National Disaster Risk Management Strategy 2025–2030?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary state whether the Government has in place approved drainage master plans, flood-risk maps and emergency preparedness plans and, if so, provide details on the institutions and stakeholders involved in their development, as well as dates when such plans were prepared and last reviewed?
- c) What systems and coordination mechanisms exist to ensure the timely translation of adverse weather and flood-risk warnings into actionable measures, including pre-emptive evacuation of at-risk households and closure of flood-prone roads, among other mitigating interventions?
- d) Could the Cabinet Secretary also indicate whether a framework exists to facilitate the relocation of persons from designated flood-risk areas and, if so, clarify whether the framework provides for financial support to the affected population and, where applicable, to the host communities receiving them?

**A. BILLS AT SECOND READING**
