8. **MOTION - MAINSTREAMING A FRAMEWORK FOR CLEAN COOKING IN KENYA**
(Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP)

THAT AWARE THAT, Article 42 of the Constitution guarantees every person the right to a clean and healthy environment, which includes access to safe energy options;

FURTHER AWARE THAT, over 900 million Africans, including more than 90% of households in Kenya's rural areas, still rely on traditional biomass (firewood, charcoal, animal waste) for cooking, resulting in high levels of indoor air pollution that cause premature deaths, particularly among women and children;

CONCERNED THAT, in Kenya, indoor air pollution has been linked to over 23,000 annual deaths, with women and girls bearing the disproportionate burden of time spent collecting firewood and cooking, limiting their education and economic opportunities;

NOTING THAT, traditional cooking methods contribute significantly to deforestation, greenhouse gas emissions, and climate vulnerability at the county level, undermining national commitments under the Energy Act, 2019, the Climate Change Act, 2016, and Kenya's Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs);

RECALLING THAT, the Africa Clean Cooking Summit (Paris, 2023) mobilized USD 2.2 billion in commitments for clean cooking, and the International Energy Agency has recommended urgent financing and policy action to achieve universal access by 2040;

ACKNOWLEDGING, the efforts of some counties, development partners, and private sector actors in piloting clean cooking projects, but recognizing that these remain small-scale and fragmented;

NOW THEREFORE, the Senate resolves that the: -

- i.) Council of Governors develops county-level policies, frameworks, and budgets that mainstream clean cooking into devolved energy and health functions;
- ii.) National Treasury and Ministry of Energy prioritize clean cooking in financing frameworks, including results-based financing and blended finance models to de-risk private investment;
- iii.) County Governments incorporate clean cooking targets in their County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs) and ensure public institutions such as schools, health facilities, and prisons adopt clean cooking solutions;
- iv.) National Treasury and County Governments to fast-track letters of authorization to unlock carbon finance markets (Article 6.2 and CORSIA) for clean cooking projects; and
- v.) County Governments engage the private sector actors, and community organizations to expand clean cooking access, create local jobs, and reduce pressure on forest resources.

9. **MOTION - PROVISION OF IFMIS REPORTS FOR COUNTY GOVERNMENTS TO THE SENATE**

(Sen. Andrew Omtatah Okoiti, MP)

THAT, AWARE that, Article 96 of the Constitution provides that the Senate represents the counties, and serves to protect their interests, determines the allocation of national revenue among counties, as provided in Article 217, and exercises oversight over national revenue allocated to the County Governments;

FURTHER AWARE THAT, in the case of *Senate v Council of Governors and 6 others* (Petition 24 and 27 of 2019 (consolidated) 2022) KESC 57(KLR), the Supreme Court affirmed that the Senate's oversight authority extends to both nationally allocated and locally generated revenue;

CONCERNED THAT, that Senators are constrained by lack of access to real time to data from the IFMIS system for the respective counties they represent, thus affecting effective oversight of County Governments;

FURTHER CONCERNED THAT, in some instances data and information presented to the Senate by the Auditor-General and the Controller of Budget are received and considered late as a result of the backlog resulting into too much information not getting properly reviewed by Senators;

NOTING THAT, as a result of unchecked financial information and systems, County Governments have continued to accumulate pending bills resulting from unplanned expenditures, unaccounted for and inflated cost of projects;

NOW THEREFORE, the Senate resolves, that the Cabinet Secretary in charge of the National Treasury shall on a monthly basis forward to the Clerk of the Senate all IFMIS transactions and reports for each County Government for onward transmission to the respective Senator for information on accountability and transparency, in order to strengthen their constitutional oversight and promote good governance in the management of public finances.

Question No. 028 The Senator for Kisumu County (Sen. (Prof.) Tom Ojienda, SC, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning:

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary outline the fiscal and other policy interventions by the Government to address the slowed growth in the agriculture, construction and services sectors and its ripple effect on employment levels and county-level fiscal performance, among others?
- b) Could the Cabinet Secretary also outline the safeguards in place to ensure that the Government's fiscal consolidation programme does not undermine the State's obligation under Article 43 of the Constitution, which guarantees specific economic and social rights to every person?

Question No. 029 The Senator for Kisumu County (Sen. (Prof.) Tom Ojienda, SC, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning:

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide information on Kenya's current stock of domestic and external debt, and disclose the debt-to-GDP (Gross Domestic Product) ratio?
- b) What measures are in place to ensure that funds raised through borrowing are utilised effectively and translate into tangible development outcomes across the country?
- c) Could the National Treasury consider developing a publicly accessible tracker that links each debt facility to its corresponding development outcomes?

Question No. 032 Nominated Senator (Sen. Catherine Mumma, CBS, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning:

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a status update on the adoption of the Electronic Government Procurement System (e-GP Kenya) across national and county government entities, and indicate –
 - (i) the number of entities at each level that have fully or partially adopted e-GP Kenya, as well as those that are yet to migrate to the system;
 - (ii) the total number and value of contracts processed through e-GP Kenya since its rollout; and
 - (iii) the number of entities that have fully complied with the legal requirement to publish contracts and other procurement-related information?
- b) How much has the Government saved so far by transitioning to e-GP Kenya, and has there been quantifiable improvement in the efficiency of procurement processes since the transition?
- c) What steps has the Government taken to address the factors undermining the success of e-GP Kenya, among them, the limited capacity and resistance among procurement officers as well as the lack of adequate Information, Communication and Technology (ICT) infrastructure and internet connectivity, particularly in the rural areas?
- d) What measures has the Ministry put in place to mitigate against service delivery interruption during the transition period, particularly in health facilities, schools and other entities offering critical services?
- e) What measures has the Ministry put in place to guarantee that the system attains the intended objectives, particularly in enhancing transparency, accountability, value for money and access to procurement opportunities for entities owned by the youth, women and persons living with disability?

Question No. 050 Nominated Senator (Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning:

- a) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a status report on the implementation of the Kenya Vision 2030 development blueprint, and outline the factors that have contributed to delayed achievement of targets in certain sectors?
- b) What corrective actions is the Government taking to accelerate the delivery of targets in the underperforming sectors and ensure that the remaining period to 2030 yields measurable and equitable development outcomes, in line with the blueprint?
- c) Has the Government commenced the formulation of a post-2030 national development framework and, if so, could the Cabinet Secretary disclose the status of the process and indicate when and how Parliament will be involved?
- d) Could the Cabinet Secretary also state the policy and institutional interventions that the Government is considering to strengthen long-term national planning, monitoring and evaluation, fiscal alignment and accountability in the implementation of national development plans?

Question No. 051 Nominated Senator (Sen. Hamida Kibwana, MP) to ask the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning:

- a) Does the National Treasury maintain a tracking system on the resolution of concerns by the Auditor-General regarding the application of public funds by the National Government and, if so, could the Cabinet Secretary provide an update on the resolution status of reported audit concerns?
- b) What enforcement framework exists to ensure that the audit concerns are resolved promptly by the relevant Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs)?
- c) Could the Cabinet Secretary indicate whether recurrent qualified and adverse audit findings lead to mandatory corrective action plans, budgetary consequences and decisive action against responsible officers, among other sanctions?

- d) What reforms is the Ministry considering, including lessons from jurisdictions with stronger public finance follow-through systems, to ensure that audit work translates into timely corrective action?
