CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

At its Sitting held on 25th September, 2025, the Standing Committee on Health deliberated on the state of provision of healthcare services at health facilities country-wide and resolved to conduct oversight visits to Kitui, Makueni and Machakos Counties to acquaint itself with the provision of healthcare services as part of its oversight function.

These oversight visits took place from 21st to 25th October, 2025 and they were designed to provide first hand insights into the state of healthcare infrastructure, service delivery and the challenges faced by healthcare providers and the communities they serve.

The Committee engagements involved site visits to key healthcare facilities, direct interactions with county leadership, healthcare workers and members of the public. Through these interactions, the Committee gathered critical evidence on the adequacy of healthcare personnel, the status of medical equipment and supplies, the effectiveness of emergency and referral systems and the implementation of digital health records.

The Committee also sought to acquaint itself with the information and understand the operationalization of health financing mechanisms including the Social Health Insurance Fund (SHIF) and the Facility Improvement Fund (FIF). The Committee further sought to assess the counties compliance with relevant health sector policies and regulations.

The Committee noted numerous significant and widespread factors that hinder the provision of healthcare services across the County. The Committee observed that there was widespread deterioration of physical structures structural deficiencies, poor maintenance and resulting safety risks were widespread in all the three counties. This was compounded by a systemic failure in environmental and biomedical waste management infrastructure in all the three counties visited. Another critical cross-cutting deficiency noted by the Committee was is the lack of safe disposal mechanisms, particularly functional incinerators.

Across the visited counties, expensive, specialized medical equipment, including those supplied under the Managed Equipment Services (MES) program, were frequently found to be defective or completely non-functional, hindering diagnostic and high-level care services. The Committee further observed a significant cross-cutting technological issue was the unreliability and inconsistent deployment of digital health management systems and access devices, forcing facilities back to inefficient manual processes.

The overarching objectives of the Committee recommendations are therefore to strengthen existing healthcare systems, enhance accountability mechanisms and ensure that investments in healthcare translate directly into tangible improvements in service delivery and ultimately, public health outcomes.

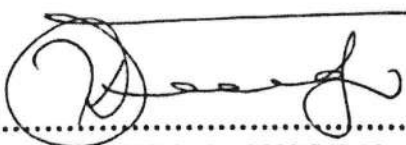
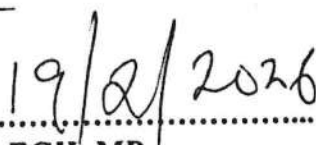

CHAPTER ONE

1. Introduction

1. The Standing Committee on Health is established pursuant to Standing Order 228 (3) and the Fourth Schedule of the Senate Standing Orders and is mandated to *consider all matters relating to medical services, public health and sanitation.*
2. At its meeting held on Thursday, 25th September, 2025, the Committee resolved to undertake County Oversight and Networking Engagements (CONE) in Kitui, Makueni and Machakos counties to acquaint itself with the provision of healthcare services in the counties as part of its oversight function.

1.1. Purpose and Objectives

3. The specific objectives of these engagements were to-
 - a) assess the state and quality of the infrastructure, facilities, hospital equipment and provision of emergency services;
 - b) assess the automation of healthcare provision systems for patient, drugs and commodity management;
 - c) assess the availability of requisite healthcare personnel, the gaps and challenges, if any, these counties face in regard to healthcare workers;
 - d) assess the availability of training and capacity building programs and avenues for healthcare workers in emergency healthcare, specialized services and referrals;
 - e) assess the availability of drug and medical supplies in healthcare facilities in the counties; and
 - f) obtain information on the Social Health Authority (SHA) reimbursements, facility accreditations and pending bills with the Kenya Medical Supplies Agency (KEMSA).

1.2. Scope of the Engagements

4. The Committee selected the following facilities for assessment-
 - a) Kitui Teaching County Referral Hospital in Kitui County;
 - b) Mukuyuni Level 4 Hospital and Makueni County Referral Hospital in Makueni County; and
 - c) Athi River Level 4 Hospital, Mwala level 4 Hospital and Machakos County Referral Hospital in Machakos County.

1.3. Methodology

5. The Committee conducted site visits to the identified facilities. During these visits, Members engaged with relevant county government officials, hospital management and other stakeholders, and gathered oral and written submissions. The Committee also conducted physical inspections of premises, reviewed documentation and observed working conditions and challenges first hand.
6. The findings, analyses, and recommendations set out in this Report are based on evidence collected during these engagements and aim to support the improvement of health sector governance, accountability and service delivery within the context of Kenya's devolved governance framework.

1.4. COUNTY PROFILES

1.4.1. Kitui County

7. Kitui County has a population of about 1,136,187 people according to 2019 population census and covers an area of approximately 30,496 square kilometers. The County is classified as an Arid and Semi-Arid Land (ASAL) characterized by low rainfall, vulnerability to climate shocks, and high poverty levels which are estimated at 63.1%, significantly above the national average.
8. In the FY 2024/25, the County was allocated Kshs. 14.31 billion, with Kshs. 4.75 billion allocated for development programs and Kshs. 9.55 billion for recurrent expenditures. Consequently, the County allocated Kshs. 4.465 billion, with Kshs 3.98 billion for recurrent expenditure and Kshs. 385 million for development expenditure to the healthcare provision.
9. Further, facilities were able to collect Kshs. 754 million as the Facility Improvement Financing (FIF) against an allocation target of Kshs. 904 million. The County health facilities also had unsettled claims by the Social Health Authority (SHA) of Kshs. 63.35 million, out of which Kshs. 28.69 million was attributed to SHA and Kshs. 27.95 million was attributed to the defunct National Health Insurance Fund (NHIF).

1.4.2. Makueni County

10. Makueni County covering an area of approximately 8,034.7 square kilometers with a projected population of over 0.9 million people. The County borders Kajiado County to the West, Taita Taveta to the South, Kitui to the East, and Machakos to the North. Its terrain includes key physical features such as the volcanic Chyulu Hills along the Southwest border, as well as the Mbooni and Kilungu hills.
11. In the FY 2024/25, the County was allocated Kshs. 11.58 billion, with Kshs. 3.68 billion allocated for development programs and Kshs. 7.90 for recurrent expenditures. The County Government allocated Kshs. 4.2 billion to healthcare provision out of which Kshs. 3.114 billion was allocated for recurrent and Kshs. 1.085 billion allocated for development.

12. Further, the County health facilities collected Kshs. 773.6 million as the Facility Improvement Financing that was retained and absorbed within the facilities.

1.4.3. Machakos County

13. Machakos County borders Nairobi, Kiambu, Embu, Kitui, Makueni, Kajiado, Murang'a and Kirinyaga Counties. The County has a population of about 1.42 million according to 2019 population census and features a semi-arid climate with hilly terrain and altitudes ranging from 1000 to 2100 meters above sea level.

14. The County has prioritized expanding and modernizing its healthcare infrastructure as part of broader infrastructure enhancement efforts. The County Annual Development Plans (2024/2025 and 2025/2026) highlight plans to improve access to quality health services through facility upgrades, construction of new health centers, and strengthening health systems to meet the population's needs effectively.

15. In the FY 2024/25, the County was allocated Kshs. 15.62 billion, with Kshs. 10.87 billion allocated for development programs and Kshs. 4.75 billion for recurrent expenditures. The County allocated Kshs. 5.155 billion to healthcare provision with Kshs. 4.547 billion being allocated for recurrent expenditure and Kshs. 607.6 million to the development expenditure.

16. Further, the County health facilities collected Kshs. 755.68 million against Kshs. 903.88 million. It is reported that the monies collected were retained by the facilities and spent at the facility. The facilities had claims to SHA amounting to Kshs. 340.7 million, of which Kshs. 229.52 million was attributed to SHA and Kshs. 111.18 million attributed to the defunct NHIF.

CHAPTER TWO

2. COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS AND STAKEHOLDER SUBMISSIONS

2.1 KITUI COUNTY

2.1.1 Meeting with the County Executive

17. The Committee paid a courtesy call to the Governor of Kitui County Government Dr. Julius Malombe, EGH on Wednesday, 22nd October, 2025. The Committee was accompanied by the counterpart Committee of the Kitui County Assembly. During the courtesy call the Governor presented a comprehensive overview of healthcare provision in the County. A copy of the written submission is annexed to this report.
18. The Committee was informed that the Department of Health and Sanitation was in charge of 326 health facilities, which included 3 level IV hospitals, 9 level 3B, 54 level 3A, and 260 level 2 healthcare facilities. The Department had employed a total of 1,940 healthcare workers across these facilities, encompassing a broad range of cadres such as clinical officers, dentists, medical officers, nurses, nutritionists, pharmaceutical technologists and physiotherapists.
19. The Governor informed the Committee that public healthcare facilities had become heavily strained as they served not only local residents but also an increasing number of patients from neighboring counties including Garissa, Machakos, Makeni and Embu.
20. The Committee was further informed that recently, the public healthcare facilities in the County experienced a significant influx of patients following a standoff between the private healthcare providers and the Social Health Authority (SHA). This crisis reportedly began when private and faith-based hospitals started requiring patients to pay cash for services.
21. The County Government had taken major steps to invest in its healthcare personnel with a strong emphasis on converting staff on fixed-term contracts especially those under the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) scheme. In the current FY 2025/2026, the County has set aside a budget of Kshs. 236million for recruiting additional health workers in order to strengthen the county's healthcare workforce and enhance service delivery.
22. As of 31st July 2025, Kitui County had successfully registered 365,613 persons, which amounted to 32.2% of the county's total target population of 1,136,187. On 2nd June 2025, the County launched an enhanced SHA registration strategy which successfully increased monthly SHA registration rate to an average of 36,025 persons, a rise from the previous monthly average of 29,497. The steady growth achieved through this strategy demonstrated the County's commitment and sustained momentum to expand SHA coverage.

23. To support SHA registration process, the County had received 213 SHA gadgets including tablets and power banks. However, despite this allocation, 101 public health facilities were still without SHA gadgets, limiting their ability to submit claims and access timely reimbursements. As of 30th September 2025, the County had submitted claims totaling Kshs. 643,360,501.31. Of this amount, Kshs. 355,949,011.86 had been reimbursed, while Kshs. 287,411,489.45 remained outstanding.
24. The Committee was informed that The County Government has deployed 2,470 Community Health Promoters (CHPs), distributed at a ratio of ten (10) CHPs per village across all 247 villages within the County. Each CHP is paid Kshs. 3,000 as a stipend of which Kshs. 2,000 is paid in their personal accounts and the remainder Kshs. 1,000 is deposited to the community unit's income generating activity account;
25. The Committee was informed that KEMSA remained the primary supplier of essential health products and technologies to the County. However, the County had also been affected by persistent drug supply challenges from KEMSA, experiencing order fill rates that typically range between 50% and 70%. Further, the County Government was actively upgrading its healthcare facility infrastructure and broader service delivery capacities and had procured a new laundry machine for hospital use.

2.1.2 Visit to Kitui County Teaching and Referral Hospital

26. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to the Kitui County Teaching and Referral Hospital (KCTRH) on 22nd October, 2025 and was received by Ms. Ruth Koki, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM) Department of Health and Sanitation, Dr. Benson Musyoka, Chief Officer; Medical Services, Mr. Aggrey Kamba; Chief Officer, Drugs and Medical Supplies, Ms. Lynn Kitwan; Chief Officer, Public Health and Sanitation.
27. During the visit, the Committee was informed that the Hospital gained recognition throughout the County and its environs as a preferred diagnostic, treatment and referral centre. In the preceding years, it witnessed expansive investments in the latest technology, systems, procedures, drugs, non-pharmaceuticals, health expertise and medical equipment that had enabled adequate provision of most of the specialized health services.
28. The Committee was informed that the facility offered a range of specialized department and units including the outpatient, inpatient, Intensive Care Unit (ICU), radiology, laboratory, maternity, renal unit, pharmacy, blood bank, Tuberculosis (TB) clinic and specialized clinics such as the dental unit. During the visit it was reported that the facility had a bed capacity of 320 beds. In FY 2022/2023, 2023/2024, and 2024/2025, the facility recorded a rise in total workload of 299,195, 358,340 and 409,440 patients, respectively. This implied that the facility had an average daily workload of 1,121 patients.

29. The Committee was further informed that the facility has 31 consultants, 19 medical doctors, 70 Registered Clinical Officers, 185 nurses, 10 pharmacists, 7 radiographers, 18 nutritionists, 12 anesthetists, 7 physiotherapists and 4 occupational therapists. The hospital had recently constructed a new mortuary wing that could hold 60 more bodies. The hospital admitted patients beyond its capacity as most private hospitals had turned away patients following a standoff between the private healthcare Practitioners and the SHA.
30. During the tour of the facility, the Committee made the following observations-
- a) That each patient requires at least four different records to be kept, a responsibility that is reportedly overwhelming for the available staff, especially with the shortage of both health records and nursing personnel;
 - b) At the radiology unit, the X-ray machine had broken down for about three weeks and patients had been referred to private facilities outside the hospital. However, during the visit, the X-ray machine had been repaired and was operational;

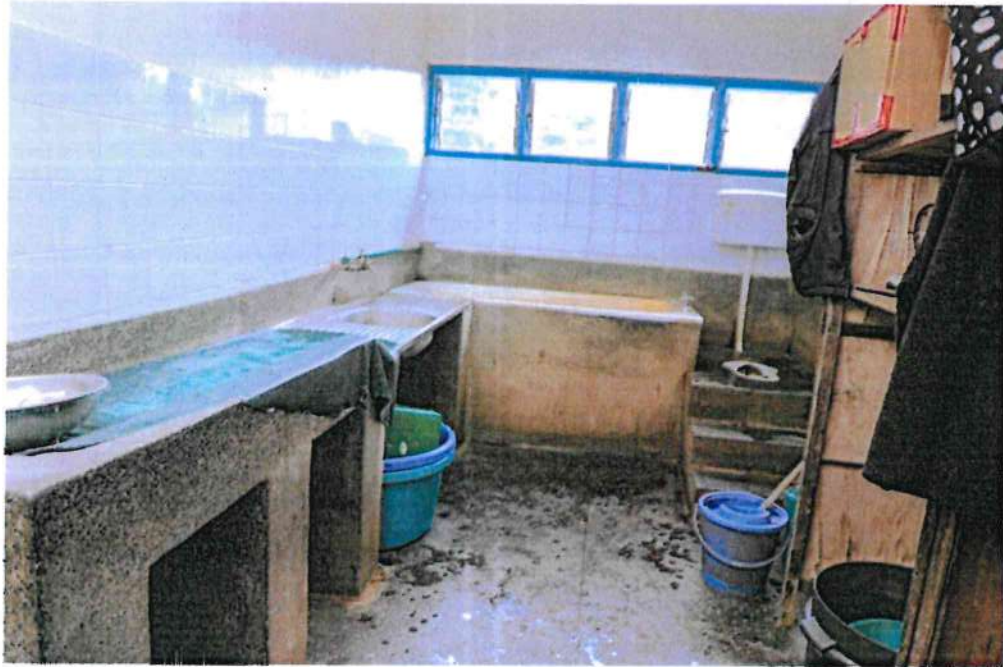

- c) However, the facility did not have a functional mammogram, a specialized X-ray device designed for breast imaging, primarily used to screen for and detect breast cancer in its early stages;

- d) The Renal Unit at the hospital had five functional dialysis machines offering at least ten (10) sessions per day. The Committee was informed that the County Government was in the process of procuring twenty (20) more dialysis machines to set up a new renal centre;
- e) The Male General Ward had admitted patients beyond its designated capacity leading to multiple incidents of patients sharing beds. The Committee observed that TB patients had been accommodated in a cubicle in the same ward which could heighten infection risks in addition to possibly violating infection prevention and control standards. The Committee was informed that the County Government had prioritized construction of sixteen (16) bed capacity isolation services wards for the highly infectious and multidrug-resistant patients who were isolated in improvised isolation rooms;

- f) The Hospital's TB Clinic was responsible for managing approximately 400 patients but critically lacked a dedicated TB-specific laboratory. Diagnostic and laboratory services for TB, such as sputum microscopy, GeneXpert molecular tests and cultures are typically conducted in general labs, which risked contamination and delays in diagnosis;
- g) The hospital faced challenges in proper drugs records management within its pharmacy characterized by inadequate capacity of records officers'. There were too few staff handling documentation for high patient volume and managing majority of the records manually without uniform standards. Some offices were congested with non-current records and lacked sufficient storage facilities, increasing vulnerability to physical loss and damage;
- h) Some departments and units in the hospital such as the TB Clinic, the blood bank and the maternity wards were severely understaffed leading to challenges in service delivery and overall functioning of the facility. However, the Committee observed that healthcare personnel had been assigned duties to work even at night in the radiology unit even when the machine was not working;

- i) The maternity wards were severely overcrowded, forcing some mothers to share single beds, a situation that substantially increases the risk of hospital-acquired infections and leads to considerable physical and psychological discomfort for both mothers and newborns. This congestion was associated with high patient load, especially given the county's expanded role in serving neighboring counties and the strain on regional healthcare delivery systems;
- j) The labor ward and delivery room were found to be open and directly accessible from the general wards, with only curtains used as partitions instead of solid doors. The Committee observed that this configuration caused significant privacy concerns. However, the Committee was informed that the County Government had prioritized the construction of a 276-bed capacity mother and child block to accommodate maternity, labor and pediatric units.

- k) The hospital faced significant challenges regarding proper drugs records management in its pharmacy. There were discrepancies between the physical drugs and the records at the Pharmacy;
- l) The hospital had a dysfunctional incinerator, resulting in the improper disposal of hazardous and toxic wastes, including biomedical wastes, which raises concerns about contamination and infection;
- m) The hospital mortuary stood out as well-maintained, clean and equipped with modern refrigeration systems, including newly installed refrigerators and upgraded cold rooms which provided hygienic, dignified storage for deceased and comfort for bereaved families. Nonetheless, the Committee was informed by the mortician in charge that they faced challenges related to workload and the lack of promotional opportunities;

- n) Kitui County Referral Hospital faces general several infrastructural maintenance challenges including window panes, broken tiles and failing ceilings in the wards all of which would negatively impact the quality and safety of patient care. The Committee observed that this would expose wards to dust, wind, rain and increased risk of theft or unauthorized entry;

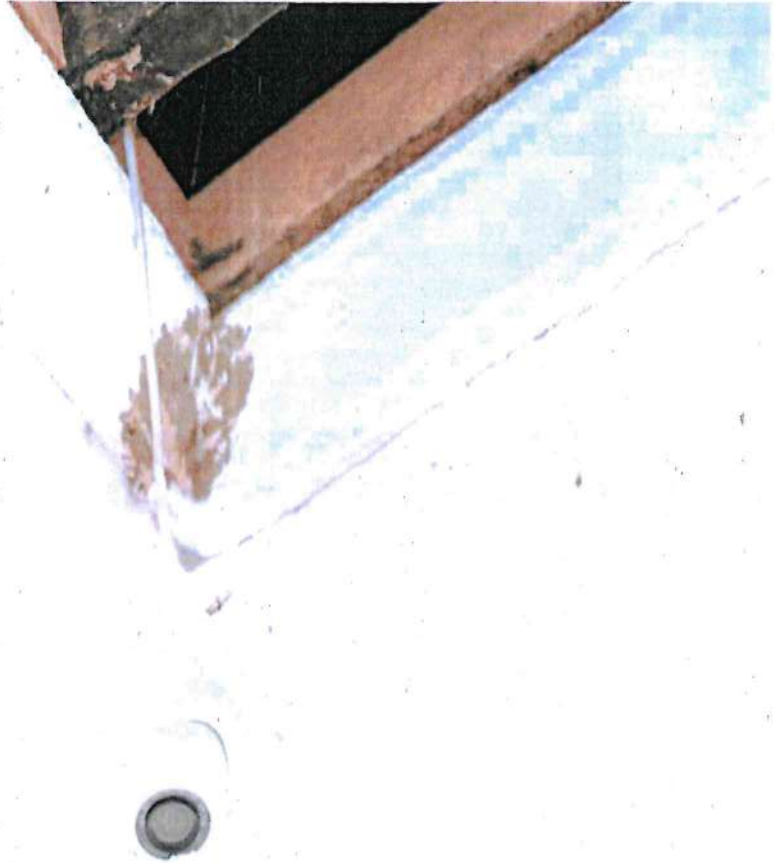

- o) The hospital's overall CCTV camera system was reported as malfunctioning which compromised the security and heightened risks related to both patient safety and asset protection. The Committee noted that functional security cameras are crucial for maintaining order, monitoring sensitive spaces like drug stores and mortuaries and providing evidence in case of security breaches or disputes;

- p) The hospital's blood bank was domiciled in a very small room with limited storage space and it faced operational challenges, with its main blood storage fridge reported to have been out of order since 2024;

- q) There were some healthcare workers who had worked for an inordinate long period without promotion such as the mortuary attendant who had reportedly worked for over twenty years without advancement;
- r) Some departments and units in the hospital such as the TB Clinic, the blood bank and the maternity wards were severely understaffed which led to challenges in service delivery and overall functioning of the facility. However, the Committee observed that healthcare personnel had been assigned duties to work at night in the radiology unit even when the machine was not working; and
- s) Expired drugs were found in the pharmacy. However, management informed the Committee that the drugs had been donated to the county government during a medical camp. Notably, there was no supporting documentation confirming the hospital's official acceptance of these drugs.

2.2 MAKUENI COUNTY

2.2.1 Mukuyuni Level 4 Hospital

31. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Mukuyuni Level 4 Hospital on Thursday, 23th October, 2025. The Committee was informed that Mukuyuni Sub County Hospital was a level-4 facility that had a bed capacity of eight (8) inpatient beds and offered a wide range of health services including Outpatient Curative Services, Inpatient Care, Emergency Services, Tuberculosis treatment, HIV Testing and Treatment, Maternal and Child Health Services, Family Planning, Mental Health Services, Dental Services among others. However, the only ambulance that had been assigned to the facility has been withdrawn and assigned to another facility, thus adversely affecting emergency response capacity at the facility.
32. During the tour the Committee observed that-
- a) There was absence of critical healthcare personnel and supervisors at the facility indicating a critical systemic failure that could possibly lead to poor staff performance, compromise patient safety and lead to general decline in service quality at the facility;
 - b) The hospital mortuary received three (3) coolers, that would have been used in preservations of the bodies, procured by the use of the National Governments Constituency Development Fund (NG-CDF) in 2013. However, the coolers had been left uninstalled since and were now lying unutilized in the facility;
 - c) The facility was inadequately staffed with critical areas such as the laboratory facing the greatest challenges. Further, some staff members such as the mortuary attendant informed the Committee that they had served for at least twelve (12) years without a promotion or career advancement;
 - d) There was poor record keeping of drugs notably characterized by the lack of clear and updated transfer records of drugs from the main pharmacy to the dispensing pharmacies which undermined effective drug inventory management and accountability, potentially leading to stock discrepancies;
 - e) The facility lacked an operational incinerator and was instead utilizing a deteriorated old combustion chamber with broken doors to dispose medical waste during the Committee visit. The Committee observed biomedical waste was brown around the surrounding areas, posing likely health risks to both staff and the community;
 - f) The maternity unit had six functional beds, however, they had what appeared like aged linen and old mosquito nets. Further, the Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) medical device for newborns was dysfunctional, potentially resulting in inadequate respiratory support for the neonates and possibly compromising the quality of care; and

- g) Community Health Promoters (CHPs) informed the Committee that they had not signed any formal agreement with the County Government and had not received their wages for the preceding seven months. Additionally, they lacked proper working gears/kits like gumboots and umbrellas to protect while working in rough terrains or adverse weather.

2.2.2 Makueni County Referral Hospital (MCRH)

33. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to the Makueni County Referral Hospital on Thursday 23th October, 2025 accompanied by Dr. Justine Kyambi, the County Secretary, Makueni County; Ms. Joyce Mutua, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM); Ms. Damaris Kavoi, the County Executive Committee Member -Finance and Dr. Geoffrey Muthoka in charge of Health Services and host officers from the Health Department in the County.

34. During the tour of the facility, the Committee made the following observations-

- a) The Radiology Department had one (1) x ray machine, one (1) CT scan, two (2) ultrasound, one (1) mammogram machine, one (1) OPG machine, Computer-Aided Risk Score for Mortality (CARM) machine in the Theatre, one (1) Laparoscopic tower in the Theatre, 4 Renal Dialysis machines and a Telemedicine for teaching and consultations;

- b) Whereas the County was in the process of constructing a new morgue it was noted that the existing facility had a limited capacity of 24 bodies had broken glass windows, exposed poorly installed electrical wires, dilapidated floors and weak refrigeration units;

- c) There was only one functional laundry machine, and the linen awaiting cleaning were not properly sorted, indicating inadequate hygiene practices. Additionally, the unit was operated by two casual workers who did not have signed contract agreements, raising concerns about staffing and compliance with employment regulations.

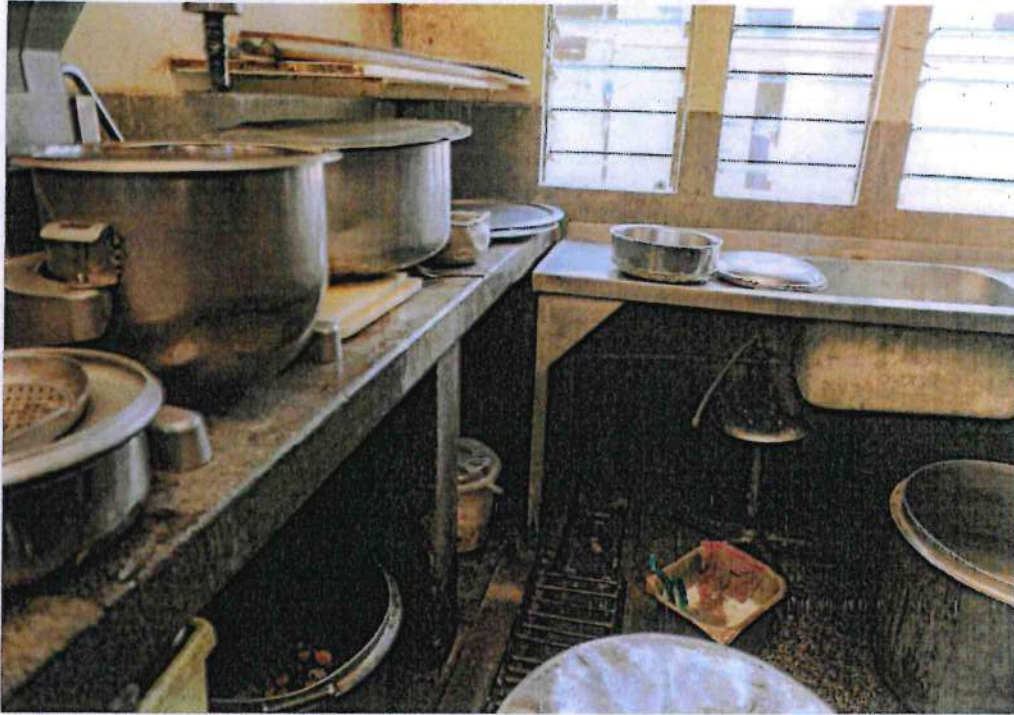


Picture 15 and 16: Members of the Committee at the laundry unit where there was only one functional laundry machine operated by casual labourers

- d) The Mother and Child Unit was spacious, clean, and well-ventilated, with adequate bed capacity. However, the Committee observed that the unit faced challenges such as insufficient supply of mosquito nets and linen. It was also reported that the Unit was also understaffed and faced a severe shortage of nursing personnel;
- e) The kitchen infrastructure was significantly deteriorated, with notable issues such as cracked flooring, poor drainage systems, rusty sinks, chipped walls, damaged work surfaces, and old, soiled food preparation equipment, which posed a risk of food contamination and compromised both safety and hygiene standards;

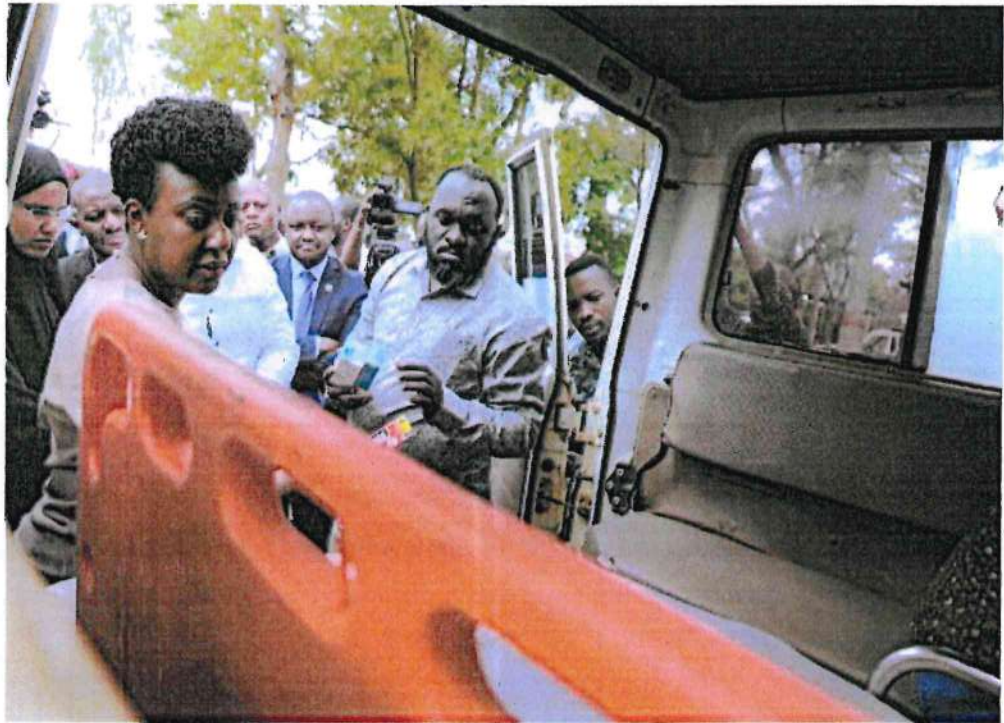


Picture 17: The Makueni County Referral Hospital kitchen was dilapidated as characterized by cracked flooring and unfunctional cold room.

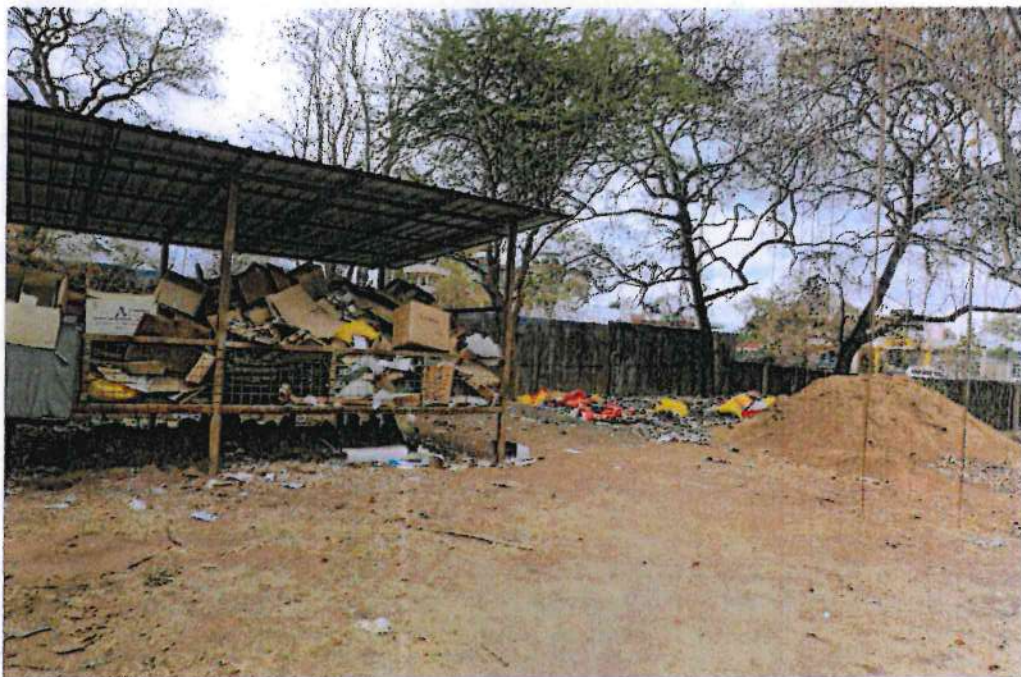
- f) The hospital had several ambulances, however, most of them were grounded, with only one operational. Additionally, it was noted that the ambulances' interiors included broken old beds with rugged, worn-out covers;
- g) The hospital compound near the parking lot was dotted with abandoned, unused and broken-down motor vehicles posing significant health, safety and environmental concerns. The Committee observed that the derelict vehicles and machinery were an eye sore and a source of pollution and hazard to both staff and the public since they were parked along the hospital busy paths and walk ways;

- h) While the hospital had removed the asbestos roofing, they had been disposed in an open field and piled along the fence to the wards exposing the patients, their families and healthcare personnel to significant health problems related to asbestos fibres;
- i) Patients informed the Committee that they had been directed to purchase prescription drugs from external pharmacy stores located along the hospital road indicating inadequate supply of essential drugs and medicine at the hospital;
- j) At the Pharmacy, there were no bin cards and record keeping was poorly done making it unreliable to track drug movement and thereby increasing risks of pilferage, waste and loss of medicine through expiry and mismanagement. There were discrepancies between bin card entries and physical counts for instance there were excess stock of *Tradmin*, a brand of the prescription drug, on the shelves as opposed in the recorded stocks; and
- k) There was no functional incinerator at the facility and both medical and non-medical waste was being disposed in an open field next to residential and commercial buildings and during the visit some recently used bandages and blood-stained linen were found strewn all over the said field posing serious health risks to human health and the environment. The Committee observed that this violated the regulatory standards for safe waste management and promoted spread of dangerous pathogens to nearby residents.

2.2.3 Meeting with the County Executive

35. The Committee held a de-briefing meeting with the Governor, Makueni County to present its preliminary report and informed the Governor that during the oversight visit to the healthcare facilities in the County, the following observations had been made-

- a) There were expired drugs and reliance of manual and paper-based record keeping systems in the hospital pharmacy which slowed down pharmacy workflows and increased the risks;
- b) The employees exhibited high level of positive attitude and motivation towards work. However, there were some extreme cases where the personnel demonstrated some lethargy and lackluster attitude such as the radiology unit. Further there were complaints that some healthcare personnel had not been promoted for inordinate long periods. It was observed also that some time some cadres were being remunerated below the recommended minimum wage bill;

- c) The Makueni Hospital Mammogram machine to support early breast cancer detection was operational. However, low utilization was reported suggesting barriers including limited community awareness. The Committee observed that there were also dedicated desks for gender-based violence and mental health which is a significant step in strengthening care for survivors of violence and individuals with psychiatric needs;
- d) There was presence of old, stalled and non-operational ambulances at the Makueni Referral Hospital while there was no functional ambulance in the facilities visited representing a critical gap in emergency medical response capacity and directly threatening patient safety and ability to deliver urgent medical care. Further, the mortuary refrigerators purchased for Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital in 2013 required installation to ensure the effective functioning of the cooling system;
- e) The two hospitals visited experienced general low drug stock levels, which compelled patients to procure medications out of pocket. However, the hospital wards were generally clean, uncongested and had clean beds;
- f) The Makueni County Referral Hospital lacked a functional incinerator and hazardous medical wastes including sharps, contaminated materials, pharmaceuticals were found disposed improperly exposing patients, staff and the neighboring community to infectious agents and toxic substances; and
- g) Patients had informed the Committee that they faced challenges of long delayed CT scan imaging reports due to shortage of Radiologists forcing patients to wait for their reports to be sent to Kenyatta National Hospital (KNH) for analysis. Further, the Committee had observed general shortage of nurses across all the departments and units in the facilities visited.

36. The Governor informed the Committee that-

- a) All healthcare workers hired by the Makueni County Public Service Board hold positions on Permanent and Pensionable terms, ensuring job security and access to retirement benefits as mandated by county public service employment regulations;
- b) The County Government will address concerns that some employees were receiving a minimum wage bill and ensure that casual workers employed by healthcare facilities receive fair and adequate remuneration in line with Kenyan labour laws and government guidelines;
- c) Further, the County Government will address the attitude of Human Resources for Health (HRH) staff and strengthen supervision to ensure consistent, accurate record keeping, thereby improving administration, accountability and service delivery in healthcare facilities;

- d) Makueni County had a huge pending disbursement from the Social Health Authority (SHA) due to high number of rejected claims, a problem that was disrupting financial flows at the healthcare facilities and affected timely payment for health services;
- e) The County had achieved a significant reduction in maternal mortality caused by hemorrhage during childbirth by introducing heat-stable *carbetocin* to prevent and treat postpartum hemorrhage, the leading cause of maternal deaths in the Country;
- f) The County Government faced severe resources drain resulting from serving a large influx of patients from other parts of the Country arising from its proximity to Mombasa- Nairobi Highway and attendant socio-economic activities;
- g) The County Government of Makueni has allocated funds in its budget specifically to clear all outstanding arrears and delayed payments owed to Community Health Promoters (CHPs), aiming to strengthen grassroots health outreach; and
- h) The County was actively transitioning from a manual paper-based system to a digital health information system, aiming to improve efficiency in record-keeping, service delivery and resource management across its healthcare facilities.

2.3 MACHAKOS COUNTY

2.3.1 Oversight visit to Athi River Level 4 Hospital

37. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to the Athi-River Level 4 Hospital in Mavoko Sub-County on Friday 24th October, 2025. The Committee was received by Mr. Benjamin Mwangela, the Mavoko Sub-County Public Health Officer; Dr. Catherine Kilonzo, the Mavoko Sub-County Medical Officer of Health; Dr. Jemimah Ndila, the Hospital Administrator alongside Ms. Mary Mutua, the Outpatient Department Head in charge of clinical officers; Mr. Mark Ndambuki, the Sub-County Nutritionist.
38. During the visit, the Committee was informed that Athi River Level 4 Hospital is a public primary referral hospital serving Athi River, Mavoko and surrounding areas. The facility provides a wide range of inpatient and outpatient services, including general consultations, diagnostic services, maternity care and pediatrics. However, the facility had a relatively small inpatient bed capacity of twenty (20) beds.
39. The Committee was further informed that there are plans to expand the facility through infrastructural improvements at the hospital construction of a new Mother and Child Unit, X-ray unit and a theatre block to enhance healthcare delivery and expand diagnostic and surgical capacity. Further, the management had conducted staff promotions in May, 2025 and organized training sessions to enhance workforce capacity and skills.
40. During the visit the Committee observed that-
- a) The online health management system, AFYA 1, was not functional and had reportedly collapsed for over two weeks forcing operations to revert to slow and inefficient manual, paper-based records. The Committee observed that this had severely impacted patient registration, pharmacy inventory, laboratory results and general data retrieval contributing to delays and long queues;
 - b) The hospital faced significant challenges including insufficient procedure beds with old rusty beds, unclean linen and lack of working surfaces and equipment. Beds used at the maternity wards appeared old and were rusty, with worn-out mattresses and linen. Additionally, the beds lacked mosquito nets, posing significant risks for patient safety and increasing vulnerability to mosquito-borne diseases;
 - c) The laboratory at the facility is currently understaffed and has been facing persistent shortage of essential reagents. It was reported that the laboratory had six (6) staff members against an establishment of eleven (11) staff members which was associated with overwhelming workloads and disruption of diagnostic services;

- d) There was no functional laundry unit to ensure patients always had access to clean linen at the facility risking infections, general hygiene and compromised patient comfort and dignity;
- e) The hospital kitchen was extremely small and lacked running water supply. Water bottles used to fetch water were found strewn all over the floor. Further, the kitchen was inadequately equipped and lacked modern equipment and essential tools necessary for efficient operation;
- f) The facility faced challenges related to poor physical infrastructure conditions including cracked floors, faded and peeling wall paints, loose electrical sockets and exposed electric cables and damaged ceilings that expose patients and staff to uncomfortable and potentially unsafe conditions;

- g) The facility faced significant sanitation and cleanliness challenges with the lack of reliable water supply and poor maintenance of hygiene standards. It was reported that for the past six (6) months, there has been no running water in the maternity wards and patients had to rely on buckets and basins for their basic cleaning needs;

- h) There were old, rusty beds at the facility, with worn-out mattresses and linen. Additionally, the beds lacked mosquito nets, posing significant risks for patient safety and increasing vulnerability to mosquito-borne diseases such as malaria;

- i) There was no functional laundry unit to ensure patients always had access to clean linen at the facility risking infections, general hygiene and compromised patient comfort and dignity; and
- j) There was poor waste disposal at the facility due to lack of a functional incinerator, which posed significant health risks to both the hospital environment and the surrounding community.

2.3.2 Oversight Visit to Mwala Level 4 Sub-County Hospital

41. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Mwala Level 4 Hospital on Friday, 24th October, 2025 and was received by Dr. Emmanuel Wambua the hospital's Medical Superintendent and Ms. Eunice Manuna, the Nursing Service Manager. The Committee was informed that Mwala Level 4 Hospital has modern infrastructure which includes a 16-bed maternity wing, 10-bed general ward, pediatric ward and a fully equipped laboratory and surgical theater.
42. The Committee was further informed that the Health Records Unit was operated by four (4) contracted employees two of whom were contracted by the facility while the other two were contracted under partnership with the service provider. The four were supported by students on attachment and industrial attachment at the facility. Nonetheless, the facility experienced challenges related to understaffing, which adversely affected service delivery and compromised the quality of care.

43. The Committee was also informed that Mwala Level 4 Hospital has been identified as having asbestos roofing, which has been flagged as a major public health hazard due to the well-documented cancer risks associated with asbestos exposure. However, plans had been mooted to ensure safe removal and disposal of asbestos before the end of the 2024/2025 Financial Year.

44. During the oversight visit, the Committee observed that-

- a) The Health Record Management System was experiencing a failure over two weeks before the visit, forcing staff to revert to manual, paper-based recording for all patient data and administrative tasks. This system downtime had resulted in service delays, increased risk of record errors and omissions and greater administrative burdens for healthcare personnel;
- b) At the pharmacy, expired drugs and certain hazardous medicines were found on the shelves; with some medicines not securely stored in the refrigerators as required by their respective manufacturers. Additionally, there was a faulty refrigerator;
- c) Mwala Level 4 Hospital currently lacks a functional incinerator, resulting in significant challenges for proper biomedical waste management. As a result, biomedical wastes including sharps, syringes and other possible infectious materials are being temporarily stored in old, rusty containers on-site, awaiting periodic collection and disposal by the County Government;

- d) The laboratory equipment, including the Full hemogram Machine, Centrifuge, Liver Function Machine, and Tuberculosis (TB) machine, were observed to be in good working condition. The Committee observed that this allows the hospital to maintain essential diagnostic services for a broad range of conditions supporting effective patient management; and
- e) The kitchen was found to be small, poorly equipped and inadequately ventilated, lacking critical fixtures such as smoke extractors and essential cooking equipment. It was observed that charcoal was used for food preparation presenting significant health risks from smoke and carbon monoxide exposure, fire hazards and poor air quality, which could negatively impact patients and staff.

2.3.3 Oversight visit to the Machakos County Referral Hospital

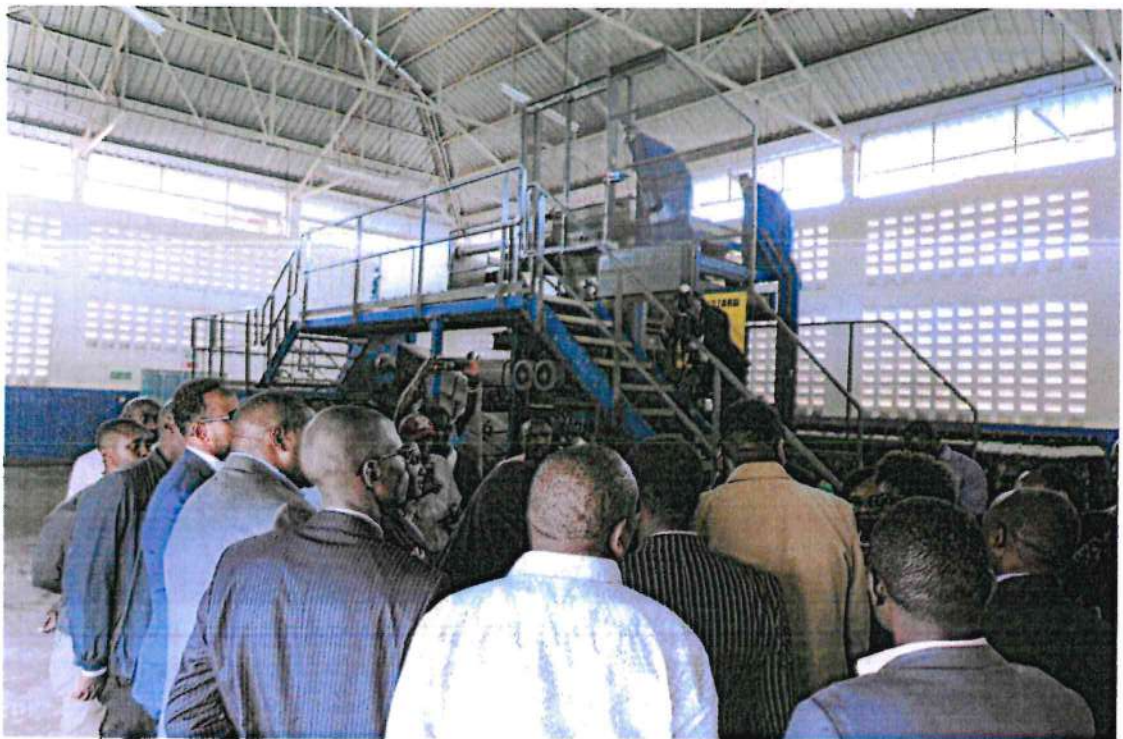
45. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Machakos County Teaching and Referral Hospital on Friday 24th October, 2025 and was received by Dr. Muya Ndambuki, the County Secretary Machakos County; Mr. Justus Kasivu, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM) Health; Ms. Winfred Nzuki, the Hospital's Chief Executive Officer; and Dr. Daniel Katua, the Medical Superintendent besides a host of officers from the Health Department in the County.

46. During the oversight visit, the Committee was informed that Machakos Level 5 Hospital is the largest government health facility and main referral hospital in Machakos County serving as the primary center for advanced care in the region and neighboring counties. The hospital provides curative, palliative, rehabilitative and specialized referrals, including surgery, maternity and outpatient services. The hospital had a bed capacity of 541 beds, including 123 maternity beds. Additionally, the Newborn Unit accommodated a total of 75 cots and 10 Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) beds.

47. The Committee was informed that the facility had employed a total of forty-nine (49) consultants, with forty-seven (47) on Permanent and Pensionable (PNP) terms and two (2) locums, alongside twenty-four (24) medical officers comprising eighteen (18) PNP and six (6) locums. There were seventy-nine (79) registered clinical officers, including 21 general and forty (40) specialist officers on PNP terms, two (2) under Universal Health Coverage (UHC), fifteen (15) general officers under the Center for International Health, Education and Biosecurity Kenya (CIHEB) and one (1) locum. Nursing staff totaled three hundred and fifty-five (355), made up of three hundred and thirty-three (333) general and specialist nurses on PNP terms, fourteen (14) under UHC, two (2) general nurses under CIHEB and six (6) locums.
48. The pharmacy department had 14 pharmacists, all employed on PNP terms. Radiography services were supported by 14 radiographers, of whom 8 were on PNP terms, three (3) under UHC and three (3) locums. Nutrition services included seven (7) nutritionists all on PNP terms and 1 locum psychologist. The hospital also employed 10 anesthetists (clinical officers) on PNP terms, 15 physiotherapy staff with thirteen (13) on PNP terms and two (2) locums, and 8 occupational therapists, including seven (7) on PNP terms and one (1) under UHC.
49. During the tour, the Committee observed that-
- a) The hospital was equipped with a high-resolution CCTV camera system that comprehensively monitors all departments within the facility. The Committee was informed that the installation includes wireless surveillance cameras and a modern control centre, which has significantly enhanced security for patients, staff and visitors by deterring and detecting incidents such as theft and other unauthorized activities;
 - b) The hospital has an ICT laboratory dedicated to staff training, where healthcare workers and administrative personnel acquire essential skills for operating the hospital's integrated digital systems. The Committee was informed that the facility supports ongoing professional development, boosting staff capacity to manage electronic health records, digital financial operations and other automated services that improve overall hospital efficiency and service delivery;
 - c) The hospital is equipped with a modern incinerator designed for the safe and efficient disposal of biomedical and clinical waste. The Committee was informed that the incinerator is part of the hospital's advanced medical facilities for managing toxic and infectious materials. However, it was noted that the incinerator needed repairs, specifically its entrance door to ensure continued optimal operation and security;

- d) During the visit, the AFYA 1 Health Management System utilized in the County was reported as not working, hindering its intended support for service delivery and operational efficiency. This outage contributed to challenges in patient processing, record management and general hospital administration and resulted in delays and need for manual interventions;
- e) The hospital has two well-established mental health wards that separately accommodate male and female patients, supporting both inpatient psychiatric care and specialized mental health interventions. This arrangement enables the hospital to provide gender-sensitive treatment and a safer environment for individuals with acute psychiatric conditions, ensuring proper supervision and tailored psychosocial support for each group;
- f) However, it was observed that the wards were equipped with old, rusty hospital beds and worn-out linen, which reflected a lack of proper maintenance and timely replacement of these essential items. These conditions also pointed to persistent infrastructural and supply challenges within the unit, affecting both patient comfort and the overall quality of care;

- g) The hospital laundry unit was equipped with only one functional washing machine, significantly limiting its capacity to process the substantial volume of linens and medical garments generated daily. The Committee noted that this hampered efficient laundry operations and contributed to delays in supplying clean linen to the inpatient wards;

- h) At the medical wards, some patients informed the Committee that they had been compelled to buy drugs out of pocket from private pharmacies. The Committee observed that some of the said drugs or their generic equivalents were available in the hospital pharmacy indicating gaps in pharmacy inventory management and access. This also suggested shortcomings in dispensing practices or systemic inefficiencies in the distribution of stocked medicines, leading to unnecessary expenses for patients;
- i) There was a locked container filled with expired drugs was observed, which had not yet been collected for safe destruction. This situation indicates lapses in pharmaceutical waste management and poses a risk to safety and regulatory compliance, underscoring the need for timely removal and proper disposal of expired medications to avoid potential misuse or environmental hazards;
- j) The Hospital faces significant infrastructural challenges in its wards, where only two toilets were functional for large numbers of patients in one of the female wards. Additionally, the medical wards lack mosquito nets, exposing patients to increased risks of mosquito-borne diseases and reducing overall comfort and safety. These gaps highlighted the urgent needs for sanitation and infection prevention improvements within the facility;

- k) At the time of visit, Machakos County Referral Hospital was in the process of finalizing establishment of a modern kitchen. It was observed that upgraded kitchen is designed to enhance food service quality for patients with improvements including more hygienic food preparation and new equipment; and

- l) Contracted staff members informed the Committee that they had experienced payment delays of up to three months, resulting in considerable hardship as they struggle to meet their daily subsistence needs. The Committee was informed that these delays had negatively impacted staff morale. Some casuals narrated to the Committee how they had been compelled to eat leftover food due to delayed payments and financial hardship

2.3.4 Meeting with the Governor, Machakos County

50. The Committee held a meeting with the Governor Machakos County on Friday 24th October, 2025. The Governor was accompanied by the Deputy Governor, the County Secretary, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM), the County Secretary (CS), the County Chief Officer of Health, Chief Officer in the Department of Health Services and other senior officials from the County Government Health Department.

51. During the meeting the Committee informed the Governor and the County Executive that-

- a) There is need to urgently address the issue of asbestos roofing in order to ensure the safety of patients, staff, and visitors. The Committee observed that prompt replacement of the asbestos materials with safer, modern roofing is essential to meet occupational health standards and protect public health within the facility;
- b) Although the County had made substantial investments in upgrading healthcare facilities, a persistent challenge remains in ensuring a reliable water supply, especially at Athi River Level Hospital. The lack of consistent water access undermined the effectiveness of infrastructure improvements and affects critical functions such as infection control, sanitation and daily patient care;
- c) There were concerns that inpatients at Machakos Level 5 Hospital have experienced situations where they were instructed to purchase medicines from outside vendors and pharmacies, despite the same drugs being available in the hospital's pharmacy stock. The Committee observed that this reflected issues in accountability and the internal distribution of pharmaceuticals, resulting in an unnecessary financial burden for patients and inefficient use of public resources;
- d) There is an urgent need to install incinerators at the sub-County Level 4 Hospitals within Machakos County to ensure safe and efficient disposal of biomedical and clinical waste as the absence of incinerators at these facilities poses health, safety, and environmental risks;
- e) Healthcare facilities in Machakos County including sub-county Level 4 Hospitals encountered considerable challenges in record keeping and health information management. Discrepancies and inconsistencies in health records were observed, undermining reliable patient tracking, pharmacy inventory and service delivery; and

- f) Casual cleaners at Machakos Level 5 Hospital had not received payment for five months and they did not have formal contracts with their employer, Ms. Nathifu Cleaners Limited Company. This lack of contractual agreement contributed to poor job security and welfare for the cleaning staff, who were also not provided with meals, leading some to consume patient food. It was observed that these conditions highlight serious deficiencies that require urgent redress for ethical and operational reasons.

52. During the meeting, the Governor informed the Committee that-

- a) Machakos County has invested in upgrading and equipping Machakos County Referral Hospital to enhance its ability to deliver specialized and referral services. The County is actively working on further improvements, notably upgrading the Mother and Child unit, Cancer unit and Renal unit, aiming to expand access to advanced healthcare services and reduce patient referrals to hospitals outside the County;
- b) The County has outlined plans to hire additional nurses, pharmacists and pharmaceutical technologists, with ongoing efforts to train and deploy more healthcare personnel to critical service areas. These measures are aimed at addressing workforce shortages, enhancing service delivery and ensuring adequate staffing levels in specialized and high-demand hospital units;
- c) Further, the County Government of Machakos had promoted 422 doctors as part of efforts to recognize and reward staff for their service and qualifications. The promotion process was ongoing, with additional healthcare staff expected to benefit as part of the county's broader workforce development and retention strategy;
- d) The SHA had not remitted all dues owed to county hospitals, with outstanding payments amounting to approximately Kshs. 600 million. This significant financial shortfall has hindered the efficient delivery of healthcare services and stalled the upgrading of facilities. The lack of timely disbursements has strained hospital operations, affected procurement of essential supplies and delayed critical infrastructure projects; and
- e) The County Government of Machakos has committed to address the attitude and professionalism of Human Resources for Health (HRH) staff, alongside strengthening supervision throughout its healthcare facilities. These measures are aimed at ensuring consistent and accurate record keeping which will enhance administration, improve accountability and raise the overall quality of service delivery within the county's health sector.

CHAPTER THREE

3. ANALYSIS OF COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

53. Having undertaken the oversight visit and reviewed submissions from the stakeholders, the Committee made the following observations.

3.1. Critical Healthcare Infrastructure

54. There is widespread deterioration of physical structures and the non-functionality of critical specialized and non-specialized equipment, compounded by a systemic failure in environmental and biomedical waste management infrastructure. This manifests in several key areas in all the three counties visited.

a) Failure of Biomedical Waste Management Infrastructure

55. A critical cross-cutting deficiency is the lack of safe disposal mechanisms, particularly functional incinerators, across the counties. The incinerator at the Kitui County Referral Hospital (KCRH) was dysfunctional, leading to improper disposal of hazardous and toxic biomedical wastes, which posed severe health and environmental risks. Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital lacked an operational incinerator, utilizing a deteriorated old combustion chamber instead, with biomedical waste found strewn around the surrounding areas.

56. Makueni County Referral Hospital also lacked a functional incinerator, resulting in medical and non-medical waste, including recently used bandages and blood-stained linen, being improperly disposed of in an open field next to residential and commercial buildings. Both Athi River Level 4 Hospital and Mwala Level 4 Hospital lacked functional incinerators. At Mwala, biomedical wastes were being temporarily stored in old, rusty containers on-site.

b) Breakdown and Non-Functionality of Essential Equipment

57. Facilities across all three counties had non-functional crucial specialized and non-specialized equipment which compromised service delivery. In Kitui, the mammogram machine, essential for breast cancer screening, was non-functional. Other Managed Equipment Services (MES) machines including the Portable X-ray, OPG Machine and C-Arm were reported as faulty, needing calibration, or having broken components. A theatre table was also non-functional due to the unavailability of spare parts.

58. In Makueni, the Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) medical device for newborns at Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital was dysfunctional. Mortuary refrigerators bought for Mukuyuni in 2013 had been left uninstalled. Ambulances at Makueni Referral Hospital were grounded or stalled, with only one reported operational. Further, a main blood storage fridge at Kitui County Referral Hospital in Kitui was reported to be out of order since 2024.

c) Structural Defects and Hazards

59. Structural deficiencies, poor maintenance and resulting safety risks were widespread in all the three counties visited. Kitui County Referral Hospital exhibited general maintenance challenges, including broken window panes, broken tiles and failing ceilings in the wards which impact patient care quality and safety. The labour ward and delivery room in Kitui were noted as being open to general wards, using only curtains as partitions, raising significant privacy concerns.
60. In Makueni, general dilapidation was noted at the Referral Hospital, including leaking pipes, wet pathways, naked and exposed electrical wires, broken windows at the mortuary and non-functional cold rooms in the kitchen. Machakos facilities suffered from cracked floors, faded and peeling wall paints, loose electrical sockets, exposed electric cables and damaged ceilings.

d) Outdated Fittings and Unsafe Conditions

61. Across the counties, old, rusty hospital beds and worn-out mattresses/linen were observed. The kitchen facilities in Athi River and Mwala were reported as extremely small, poorly equipped and inadequately ventilated, with Mwala specifically using charcoal for food preparation, presenting health and fire hazards. Machakos County faced the public health hazard of asbestos roofing at facilities like Mwala Level 4 Hospital, requiring urgent safe removal and disposal.
62. The pervasive nature of non-functional critical equipment (medical and waste management) alongside the dilapidated state of the hospital buildings highlights a deep-seated challenge in both capital investment and routine maintenance of healthcare infrastructure across all three counties.

3.2. Medical Equipment and Technology

63. During the inquiry, the Committee observed widespread non-functionality and maintenance challenges affecting critical diagnostic equipment; the systemic failure and poor rollout of digital health information systems; and the collapse of essential supporting clinical technology, particularly for waste management.

a) Non-Functional and Faulty Specialized Equipment

64. Across the visited counties, expensive, specialized medical equipment including those potentially supplied under the Managed Equipment Services (MES) program were frequently found to be defective or completely non-functional, hindering diagnostic and high-level care services. In Kitui County Referral Hospital, several specialized machines were reported as faulty or non-functional. This included the mammogram machine, essential for breast cancer screening, which was non-functional and needed system calibration. Other faulty equipment included a Portable X-ray machine and an Orthopantomography (OPG) Machine;

65. A renal dialysis machine was reported as non-functional in Kitui County and labelled obsolete. The theatre department reported an operating table that was not functional because the spare part was not locally available. At Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital in Makueni County, the Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) medical device for newborns was dysfunctional.

b) Digital Health System Failures and Technology Access Gaps

66. A significant cross-cutting technological issue is the unreliability and inconsistent deployment of digital health management systems and access devices, forcing facilities to revert to inefficient manual processes. The online health management system, AFYA 1, was reported as non-functional or collapsed for over two weeks at both Athi River Level 4 Hospital and Machakos County Teaching and Referral Hospital. This downtime forced staff to revert to slow, inefficient manual, paper-based records, impacting patient registration, pharmacy inventory and laboratory results.

67. In Kitui County, although 213 SHA gadgets (tablets and power banks) were received, 101 public health facilities still lack these gadgets, limiting their capacity to submit claims and access timely reimbursements under the Social Health Authority framework.

c) Non-Functionality of Support Infrastructure Equipment

68. Beyond clinical equipment, the essential technological tools required for basic sanitation, hygiene and logistics are either dysfunctional or insufficient. The most critical infrastructure failure observed across all counties relates to biomedical waste disposal technology. The incinerator at Kitui County Referral Hospital, Makueni County Referral Hospital, Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital, Athi River Level 4 Hospital and Mwala Level 4 Hospital in Machakos County lacked functional incinerators, leading to temporary, unsafe storage of infectious materials.

69. The main blood storage fridge was out of order since 2024 in Kitui County Referral Hospital. In Makueni, most acquired ambulances were grounded with only one reported operational at the Referral Hospital. Both Makueni County Referral Hospital and Machakos Level 5 Hospital had only one functional washing machine, hampering the provision of clean linen. Athi River Level 4 Hospital also lacked a functional laundry unit.

3.3. Human Resources for Health (HRH)

70. All the three counties reported or exhibited significant challenges related to chronic understaffing coupled with high workload, persistent failures in staff welfare and compensation and systemic issues regarding career progression and staff professionalism.

a) *Chronic Staffing Shortages*

71. All the three counties reported shortages in specialized and clinical cadres, leading to pressure on existing staff and compromised service delivery. Departments such as the TB Clinic, the blood bank and maternity wards in Kitui County Referral Hospital were reported as severely understaffed. Similarly, Makueni County Referral Hospital faced a general shortage of nurses across all departments, as well as a lack of specialists like Radiologists, leading to long delays in CT scan reports.
72. The laboratory at Athi River Level 4 Hospital in Machakos County was significantly understaffed, operating with only six staff members against an establishment of eleven. In Kitui, staff handling patient documentation were overwhelmed due to the high patient volume and the inadequacy of records officers, especially since each patient requires at least four different records to be kept.
73. The absence of critical healthcare personnel and supervisors observed at Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital in Makueni County indicated a systemic failure that could compromise patient safety. Furthermore, healthcare personnel in Kitui were assigned duties, such as night shifts in the radiology unit, even when the required machinery was non-functional.

b) *Persistent Issues with Welfare, Compensation, and Payment Delays*

74. Staff employed on non-permanent terms particularly Community Health Promoters (CHPs) and casual workers faced significant financial hardship and lack of employment security across the visited counties. Contracted staff members, including casual cleaners at Machakos Level 5 Hospital, reported payment delays of up to three to five months. This lack of timely payment resulted in considerable hardship.
75. In Makueni, Community Health Promoters (CHPs) reported that they had not received their wages for the preceding seven months and lacked formal agreements with the County Government. They also lacked proper working gears/kits like gumboots and umbrellas. Some casual workers employed by healthcare facilities in Makueni were reported to be receiving a minimum wage bill.
76. In Machakos, the delayed payments led some casual workers to be compelled to eat leftover patient food due to financial hardship. They reported that they were not provided with formal contracts or meals.

c) *Career Stagnation and Limited Promotional Pathways*

77. A key factor affecting staff morale and retention is the lack of formal mechanisms or budgetary allocation for promotions, leaving long-serving employees stuck in the same position for decades. Some healthcare workers in both Kitui and Makueni reported having worked for inordinately long periods without promotion. In Kitui, a mortuary attendant reported working for over twenty years without career whole on advancement. In Makueni, a mortuary attendant at Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital had served for at least twelve (12) years without career advancement.
78. Across the three counties, the healthcare workforce relies on staff under Universal Health Coverage programs, on hospital contracts and locums, indicating dependence on non-permanent staffing models to bridge gaps.

3.4. Health Products and Technologies (HPTs) and Supply Chain

79. The three counties encompass chronic deficiencies in supply chain reliability, critical failures in high-value medical equipment maintenance, and widespread gaps in pharmaceutical management and safety.

a. *Persistent Supply Chain Instability and Stockouts*

80. A fundamental challenge across the counties is the unreliable and insufficient supply of essential health products, leading directly to financial burdens on patients. Kitui County reported persistent drug supply challenges from the Kenya Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA), with order fill rates typically ranging between 50% and 70%. This highlights a major gap in the supply chain reliability. Nonetheless, Kitui County holds an outstanding debt balance to KEMSA totaling Kshs 36,396,245.78 as of 30th June, 2025, with large portions exceeding 90 days outstanding. Machakos County also reported an outstanding debt owed to KEMSA amounting to Kshs. 49,100,422.04 since FY 2022/2023.
81. Hospitals frequently compelled patients to purchase necessary drugs externally. Patients at Makueni County Referral Hospital and Machakos County Referral Hospital were directed to buy prescription drugs from private pharmacies, even though the Committee observed that generic equivalents were available in the hospital's pharmacy stock. This practice reflects systemic failures in internal distribution and pharmacy management.
82. Hospitals in Makueni experienced general low drug stock levels, which contributed to the necessity for patients to procure medications out of pocket. Kitui County reported that Kshs 424,864,566 had been allocated for Specialized Materials and Supplies, pharmaceuticals and non-pharmaceuticals in FY 2024/2025, indicating significant financial commitment amidst these supply problems.

b. Inventory Mismanagement and Pharmaceutical Safety Gaps

83. The Committee observed poor record-keeping across the three counties leading to stock discrepancies and unsafe storage of pharmaceuticals posing risks to patient safety and regulatory compliance. At the Makeni County Referral Hospital Pharmacy the lack of bin cards made tracking drug movement unreliable, increasing the risks of pilferage, waste and loss through expiry. The hospitals in Machakos County also faced challenges with pharmacy inventory control.
84. Mwala Level 4 Hospital in Machakos County was found to have expired drugs and certain hazardous medicines on shelves, with some not securely stored in the required refrigerators. This facility also had a faulty refrigerator. Machakos Level 5 Hospital had a locked container filled with expired drugs awaiting safe destruction, highlighting lapses in pharmaceutical waste management and regulatory compliance.

3.5. Universal Health Coverage (UHC); Financial and Operational Challenges

85. A primary cross-cutting observation relates to the financial strain on health facilities due to challenges in the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) and Social Health Authority (SHA) framework, particularly concerning reimbursements and service access.

a. Delayed and Outstanding Reimbursements

86. Health facilities in Kitui County reported that they had submitted claims totaling to Kshs. 631,765,540 by 18th August, 2025, with Kshs. 293,381,362 (46.5%) remaining as the outstanding balance. Similarly, Machakos County faces significant delayed SHA reimbursements, totaling approximately Kshs. 600 million across county hospitals, hindering service delivery and facility upgrades. Makeni County reported a huge pending SHA disbursement due to a high number of rejected claims.
87. Kitui County reported that although they received 213 SHA gadgets (tablets and power banks), 101 public health facilities are still without SHA gadgets, limiting their ability to submit claims and access timely reimbursements.
88. Despite efforts to digitize health records, system downtime forces facilities back into cumbersome and risky manual procedures, severely undermining efficiency and data reliability. The use of manual systems slowed pharmacy workflows, complicated drug inventory management and contributed to discrepancies and long queues for patient registration and data retrieval across various hospitals.

CHAPTER FOUR

4. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

89. With the foregoing, the Committee makes the following recommendations -

4.1. Chief Executive Officer, the Social Health Authority

90. The Committee makes the following recommendations to the Chief Executive Officer of the Social Health Authority (SHA)-

1. To prioritize and release all verified outstanding claims owed to public healthcare facilities and standardize and expedite the claim verification process to drastically reduce the high rate of rejected claims reported by the counties in order to ensure future disbursements are predictable and timely to maintain hospital liquidity; and
2. To ensure that all public health facilities still operating without SHA gadgets are immediately supplied with the necessary equipment such as tablets and power banks to enable them to submit claims electronically and access timely reimbursements.

4.2. Council of Governors

91. The Committee makes the following recommendations to the Council of Governors-

1. To establish specific project timelines for the safe removal and regulatory-compliant disposal of hazardous materials such as asbestos roofing at all public healthcare facilities in the counties;
2. To ensure that all county governments have ring-fenced emergency capital funds and enforce a non-negotiable deadline for the installation or functional repair of certified biomedical waste incinerators at all public healthcare facilities;
3. To ensure that all County Governments strictly adhere to the law requiring the ring-fencing of Facility Improvement Fund (FIF) revenues to ensure these funds are retained and used exclusively at the facility level for service improvement;
4. To coordinate all county governments to conclude individual debt settlement agreements with KEMSA specifying monthly or quarterly instalments that clear all verified arrears within a maximum of six (6) months, with priority given to debts outstanding for more than ninety (90) days;
5. To ensure that all counties immediately clear all outstanding wage arrears for Community Health Promoters (CHPs) and casual/contracted staff and ensure timely payments and adequate compensation in line with minimum wage and labor laws; and

6. To ensure that County Public Service Boards (CPSBs) must implement binding policies to resolve career stagnation by finalizing and rolling out annual promotion schedules for long-serving staff who have worked for inordinately long periods without advancement.

4.3. Governor, Kitui County Government

92. The Committee makes the following recommendations to the Governor, Kitui County-

- 1) To direct urgent capital investment and maintenance efforts to rectify severe infrastructural deficiencies, particularly those compromising patient safety and environmental compliance;
- 2) To ringfence emergency capital funds for the acquisition, repair and installation of functional biomedical waste incinerators and the repair of the malfunctioning overall CCTV camera system;
- 3) To urgently allocate funds for the repair, calibration or replacement of key non-functional equipment specifically the mammogram machine, the Portable X-ray and OPG Machine and the main blood storage fridge;
- 4) To expedite the construction of the prioritized Mother and Child Block and the isolation services wards to address the severe overcrowding and incidents of patients sharing beds observed in the Male General Ward and Maternity Wards and to properly isolate Tuberculosis (TB), highly infectious and multidrug-resistant patients;
- 5) To accelerate efforts to obtain the reimbursement of the outstanding balance on claims submitted to SHA and ensure that all Facilities Improvement Financing (FIF) are utilized lawfully within the Public Finance Management (PFM) Framework and spending arrangements comply with the PFM Act;
- 6) To execute the planned Kshs. 236M budget for recruiting additional health workers in FY 2025/2026, prioritizing the filling of severe staffing gaps in critical areas such as the TB Clinic, blood bank, maternity wards and increase the number of records officers and nurse to manage the high patient workload;
- 7) To initiate an immediate audit and implement a promotion schedule to address cases where healthcare workers, have stagnated for over twenty years; and
- 8) To convert all UHC Staff, including those recruited under the defunct donor programs on fixed-term contracts, to Permanent and Pensionable (PNP) terms to enhance job security and morale.

4.4. Governor, Makueni County

93. The Committee makes the following recommendations to the Governor, Makueni County-

1. To prioritize the immediate acquisition, repair or installation of functional incinerators at the Makueni County Referral Hospital and Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital to immediately halt the practice of improperly disposing of hazardous medical and non-medical waste in open fields next to residential and commercial buildings;
2. To ensure the safe and compliant removal and disposal of the asbestos roofing materials that were observed piled along the fence near the medical wards as these expose patients, families, and healthcare personnel to significant health risks;
3. To ensure the immediate installation and functional commissioning of the mortuary refrigerators that were purchased in 2013 but have remained unutilized at Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital;
4. To immediately repair the dilapidated infrastructure, including leaking pipes, wet pathways, naked and exposed electrical wires inside wards and corridors, broken windows at the mortuary and non-functional cold rooms in the kitchen at Makueni Referral Hospital;
5. To review and adjust the remuneration of casual workers employed by healthcare facilities to ensure they receive fair and adequate remuneration in line with Kenyan labor laws and address concerns that some cadres were being paid below the minimum wage bill;
6. To implement a clear policy to address the grievances of long-serving healthcare workers, such as the mortuary attendant who had served for inordinate long periods without a promotion or career advancement;
7. To prioritize the repair and functional commissioning of the grounded ambulances at Makueni County Referral Hospital to restore emergency fleet;
8. To ensure that essential drug stock levels are maintained and immediately enforce accountability measures to prevent patients from being directed to purchase prescription drugs from external pharmacy stores even when generic equivalents are available in the hospital pharmacy stock;
9. To institute strict inventory management protocols, specifically mandating the use of bin cards in the pharmacy department to eliminate poor record keeping and reliably track drug movement, thereby reducing risks of pilferage and loss through expiry;

10. To immediately clear all outstanding arrears and delayed payments owed to Community Health Promoters (CHPs);
11. To address the internal administrative failures contributing to the high number of rejected claims which results in a huge pending disbursement from the Social Health Authority (SHA), disrupting financial flows; and
12. To strengthen supervision and address the observed instances of lethargy and lackluster attitude among some personnel (such as those in the radiology unit) to ensure consistent, accurate record keeping and improved service delivery.

4.5. Governor, Machakos County

94. The Committee makes the following recommendations to the Governor, Machakos County-

1. To rectify the deplorable welfare situation of the contracted healthcare personnel by ensuring that they are provided with formal contracts, paid fairly, above the recommended minimum wage bill, and supplied with necessary provisions and equipment;
2. To resolve the critical sanitation challenges in healthcare facilities by guaranteeing a reliable water supply and urgently repair or replace dilapidated sanitary infrastructure in all healthcare facilities to ensure there are functional toilet facilities available for the large numbers;
3. To allocate sufficient resources to immediately repair the defective MRI machine at Machakos Level 5 Hospital and ensure maintenance protocols are consistently enforced for all specialized equipment;
4. To allocate sufficient resources to enable the acquisition of functional laundry equipment and address the overcrowding hazard by expanding the small inpatient bed capacity at Athi River Level 4 Hospital;
5. To expedite the plans to hire and promote healthcare personnel such nurses, pharmacists and pharmaceutical technologists in order to address immediate shortages and ensure public facilities are adequately staffed;
6. To mandate immediate action for the safe destruction of the locked container filled with expired drugs at Machakos Level 5 Hospital and reinforce protocols to prevent the unsafe storage of expired and hazardous medicines on open shelves at facilities like Mwala Level 4 Hospital.
7. To immediately ring-fence funds and implement the plan for the safe removal and disposal of asbestos roofing in all public healthcare facilities.

CONSIDERATION OF PENDING LEGISLATIVE BUSINESS BEFORE THE COMMITTEE AND THE COMMITTEE (COMMITTEE PAPER NO. 158)

1. The Committee Secretariat presented the schedule of the pending legislative business before the Committee as contained in *Committee Paper No. 158* for consideration.
2. During deliberations, Members observed that-
 - 1) There are two Bills pending before the Committee namely—
 - a) **The Autism Management Bill, 2025 (Senate Bills No. 19 of 2025)** which seeks to provide for an integrated and coordinated approach to the management of autism in Kenya; and
 - b) **The Assisted Reproductive Technology Bill, 2022 (National Assembly Bills No. 61), 2022** which seeks to provide a legal framework for the provision of assisted reproductive technology services, prohibit certain practices in connection with assisted reproductive technology and regulate surrogacy arrangements
 - 2) There are two petitions pending before the Committee namely—
 - a) petition to protect and propagate commercialization of the new generation (Muthea) antivenom in Kenya; and
 - b) petition by the Kenya Union of Clinical Officers (KUCO) on discrimination interference and violation of clinical officers' practice rights by the Ministry of Health, the Council of Governors and the Social Health Authority

- 3) Pursuant to the provisions of standing order 228 (4) of the Senate Standing Orders, the Committee is mandated *to follow up and report on the status of implementation of resolutions within its mandate*. With the foregoing, during the fourth session, the Committee sought reports from different stakeholders on the implementation status of the report on the Petition on the Management and use of Kenyatta University Teaching, Research and Referral Hospital by Medical Students of Kenyatta University;
- 4) During the First and Second Quarters for FY2025/2026, the Committee undertook five County Visits to Kitui, Makueni, Machakos, Kiambu, Bungoma and Kakamega counties.

Committee Resolutions

3. The Committee resolved as follows—

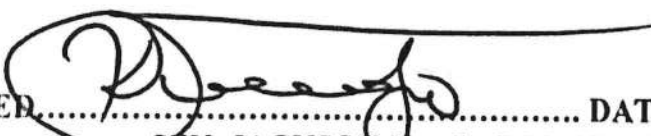
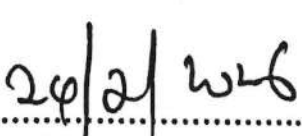

PRELIMINARIES

The meeting was called to order at ten minutes past six o'clock and the proceedings commenced with a word of prayer followed by introductions of those present.

**MEETING WITH THE GOVERNOR,
MACHAKOS COUNTY GOVERNMENT**

1. The Committee held a de-briefing meeting with the Governor, Machakos County to present its preliminary report and informed the Governor that during the oversight visit to the healthcare facilities in the County, the following observations had been made-
 - a) There is need to urgently address the issue of asbestos roofing in order to ensure the safety of patients, staff, and visitors. The Committee observed that prompt replacement of the asbestos materials with safer, modern roofing is essential to meet occupational health standards and protect public health within the facility;
 - b) Although the County had made substantial investments in upgrading healthcare facilities, a persistent challenge remains in ensuring a reliable water supply, especially at Athi River Level Hospital. The lack of consistent water access undermined the effectiveness of infrastructure improvements and affects critical functions such as infection control, sanitation, and daily patient care;

- c) There were concerns that inpatients at Machakos Level 5 Hospital have experienced situations where they were instructed to purchase medicines from outside vendors and pharmacies', despite those same drugs being available in the hospital's pharmacy stock. The Committee observed that this reflected issues in accountability and the internal distribution of pharmaceuticals, resulting in unnecessary financial burdens for patients and inefficient use of public resources;
- d) There is a pressing need to install incinerators at the sub-County Level 4 Hospitals within Machakos County to ensure safe and efficient disposal of biomedical and clinical waste. Currently, the absence of incinerators at these facilities poses health, safety, and environmental risks;
- e) Healthcare facilities in Machakos County, including sub-county Level 4 Hospitals, encountered considerable challenges in record keeping and health information management. Discrepancies and inconsistencies in health records were observed, undermining reliable patient tracking, pharmacy inventory and service delivery;
- f) Casual cleaners at Machakos Level 5 Hospital had not received payment for five months, and no formal contracts existed with their employer. This lack of contractual agreement contributed to poor job security and welfare for the cleaning staff, who were also not provided with meals, leading some to consume patient food out of necessity. The Committee observed that these conditions highlight serious deficiencies in labor management and worker support that require urgent redress for ethical and operational reasons

2. The Governor informed the Committee that-

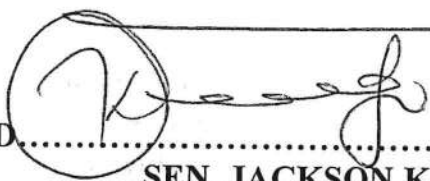
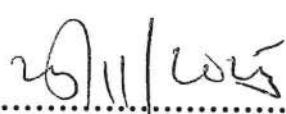
- a) Machakos County has invested in upgrading and equipping Machakos County Referral Hospital (MCRH) to enhance its ability to deliver specialized and referral services. The County is actively working on further improvements, notably upgrading the Mother and Child unit, Cancer unit, and Renal unit, aiming to expand access to advanced healthcare services and reduce patient referrals to hospitals outside the County;
- b) The County has outlined plans to hire additional nurses, pharmacists, and pharmaceutical technologists, with ongoing efforts to train and deploy more healthcare personnel to critical service areas. These measures are aimed at addressing workforce shortages, enhancing service delivery, and ensuring adequate staffing levels in specialized and high-demand hospital units;
- c) Further, The County Government of Machakos had promoted 422 doctors as part of efforts to recognize and reward staff for their service and qualifications. The promotion process remained ongoing, with additional healthcare professionals expected to benefit as part of the county's broader workforce development and retention strategy;

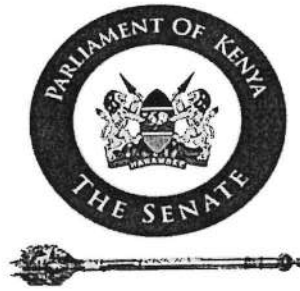
- d) The Social Health Authority (SHA) had not remitted all dues owed to county hospitals, with outstanding payments amounting to approximately KES 600 million. This significant financial shortfall has hindered the efficient delivery of healthcare services and stalled the upgrading of facilities within Machakos County. The lack of timely SHA disbursements has strained hospital operations, affected procurement of essential supplies, and delayed critical infrastructure projects, underscoring the urgent need for resolution to ensure sustainability and improvements in healthcare delivery;
- e) The County Government of Machakos has committed to addressing the attitude and professionalism of Human Resources for Health (HRH) staff, alongside strengthening supervision throughout its healthcare facilities. These measures are aimed at ensuring consistent and accurate record keeping which will enhance administration, improve accountability and raise the overall quality of service delivery within the county's health sector.

PRELIMINARIES

The Committee delegation commenced the tour of the Machakos County Health facilities at 10.00 a.m. by visiting the Athi-River Level 4 Hospital, and thereafter proceeded to the Mwala Sub-County Hospital and later to Machakos County Referral Hospital.

OVERSIGHT VISIT TO ATHI-RIVER LEVEL 4 HOSPITAL

1. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to the Athi-River Level 4 Hospital in Mavoko Sub-County on Friday 24th October, 2025. The Committee was received Mr. Benjamin Mwongela, the Mavoko Sub-County Public Health Officer, Dr. Catherine Kilonzo, the Mavoko Sub-County Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Jemimah Ndila, the Hospital Administrator alongside Ms. Mary Mutua, the Outpatient Department Head in charge of clinical officers and Mr. Mark Ndambuki, the Sub-County Nutritionist.
2. During the visit the Committee was informed that Athi River Level 4 Hospital is a public primary referral hospital serving Athi River, Mavoko and surrounding areas. The facility provides a wide range of inpatient and outpatient services, including general consultations, diagnostic services, maternity care and pediatrics. However, the facility had a relatively small inpatient bed capacity of twenty (20) beds.

3. The Committee was informed that there are plans to expand the facility through infrastructural improvements at the hospital construction of a new Mother and Child Unit, X-ray unit and a theatre block to enhance healthcare delivery and expand diagnostic and surgical capacity. Further, the management had conducted staff promotions in the May, 2025 and organized training sessions to enhance workforce capacity and skills.
4. During the tour of the facility, the Committee observed that-
 - a) The online health management system, *AFYA 1*, was not functional and had reportedly collapsed or been disconnected for over two weeks forcing operations to revert to slow and inefficient manual, paper-based records. The Committee observed that this had severely impacted patient registration, pharmacy inventory, laboratory results and general data retrieval contributing to delays and long queues;
 - b) The facility faced significant sanitation and cleanliness challenges. The hospital lacked reliable water supply and poor maintenance of hygiene standards. It was reported that for the past six (6) months, there has been no running water in the maternity wards and patients had to rely on buckets and basins for their basic cleaning needs;
 - c) The laboratory at the facility is currently understaffed and has been facing persistent shortage of essential reagents. During the visit it was reported that the laboratory had six (6) staff members against an establishment of eleven (11) staff members which was associated with overwhelming workloads and disruption of diagnostic services;
 - d) The facility faced challenges related to poor physical infrastructure conditions including cracked floors, faded and peeling wall paints, loose electrical sockets and exposed electric cables and damaged ceilings that expose patients and staff to uncomfortable and potentially unsafe conditions;
 - e) The Hospital faced significant challenges including insufficient procedure beds with old rusty beds, unclean linen and lack of working surfaces and equipment. Beds used at the maternity wards appeared old and were rusty beds, with worn-out mattresses and linen. Additionally, the beds lacked mosquito nets, posing significant risks for patient safety and increasing vulnerability to mosquito-borne diseases;
 - f) There was no functional laundry unit to ensure patients always had access to clean linen at the facility risking infections, general hygiene and compromised patient comfort and dignity;
 - g) The hospital kitchen was extremely small and lacked running water supply. Water bottles were used to fetch water were found strewn all over the floor. Further, the kitchen was inadequately equipped and lacked modern equipment and essential tools necessary for efficient operation; and

- h) There was poor waste disposal at the facility due to lack of a functional incinerator, which posed significant health risks to both the hospital environment and the surrounding community.

MIN/SEN/SCH/283/2025

OVERSIGHT VISIT TO MWALA LEVEL 4 HOSPITAL

1. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Mwala Level 4 hospital on Friday, 24th October, 2025 and was received by Dr. Emmanuel Wambua the Hospital's Medical Superintendent, Ms. Eunice Manuna, the Nursing Service Manager, Mr. Brian Mulwa, Member of the County Assembly Mwala Makutano Ward and Justus Kasanga, Member of the County Assembly Wamunyu /Yathui Ward.
2. The Committee was informed that Mwala Level 4 Hospital offers a variety of services, including maternity, emergency, specialized treatments, and laboratory diagnostics. Its modern infrastructure includes a 16-bed maternity wing, 10-bed general ward, pediatric ward, and a fully equipped laboratory and surgical theater.
3. The Committee was further informed that the Health Records Unit was operated by four (4) contracted employees two of whom were contracted by the facility while the other two were contracted under partnership with the service provider. The four were supported by students on attachment and industrial attachment at the facility. Nonetheless, the facility experienced challenges related to understaffing, which adversely affected service delivery and compromised the quality of care;
4. The Committee was further informed that Mwala Level 4 Hospital has been identified as having asbestos roofing, which has been flagged as a major public health hazard due to the well-documented cancer risks associated with asbestos exposure. However, plans had been mooted to ensure safe removal and disposal of asbestos before the end of the 2024/2025 Financial Year.
5. During the tour of the facility the Committee made the following observations-
 - a) Mwala Level 4 Hospital currently lacks a functional incinerator, resulting in significant challenges for proper biomedical waste management. As a result, biomedical wastes including sharps, syringes and other possible infectious materials are being temporarily stored in old, rusty containers on-site, awaiting periodic collection and disposal by the County Government;
 - b) The Health Record Management System was experiencing a failure over two weeks before the visit, forcing staff to revert to manual, paper-based recording for all patient data and administrative tasks. This system downtime had resulted in service delays, increased risk of record errors and omissions and greater administrative burdens for healthcare personnel;

- c) The laboratory equipment, including the Full hemogram Machine, Centrifuge, Liver Function Machine, and Tuberculosis (TB) machine, were observed to be in good working condition. The Committee observed that this allows the hospital to maintain essential diagnostic services for a broad range of conditions supporting effective patient management;
- d) At the pharmacy, expired drugs and certain hazardous medicines were found on the shelves, with some medicines not securely stored in the refrigerators as required by their respective manufacturers. Additionally, there was a faulty refrigerator;
- e) The kitchen was found to be small, poorly unequipped and inadequately ventilated, lacking critical fixtures such as smoke extractors and essential cooking equipment. It was observed that charcoal was used for food preparation presenting a significant health risks from smoke and carbon monoxide exposure, fire hazards, and poor air quality, which could negatively impact patients and staff; and
- f) The facility was generally well maintained, with the majority of service units fully operational. Notably, the maternity unit was observed to be in good condition, possessing adequate ventilation, a sufficient number of beds, clean washrooms, and provision of mosquito nets, thereby promoting patient comfort and ensuring safety in line with established healthcare standards.

**OVERSIGHT VISIT TO MACHAKOS
REFERRAL HOSPITAL**

1. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Machakos County Teaching and Referral Hospital on Friday 24th October, 2025 and was received by Dr. Muya Ndambuki, the County Secretary Machakos County, Mr. Justus Kasivu, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM), Ms. Winfred Nzuki, the Hospital's Chief Executive Officer and Dr. Daniel Katua, the Medical Superintendent besides a host of officers from the Health Department in the County.
2. The Committee was also accompanied by Mr. Vincent Mutie Nzioka, Member of the County Assembly- Upper Kaewa/Iveti Ward and Chairperson, Committee of Health and Mr. Philip Ndolo Member of the County Assembly Mitamboni Ward, and a member of Committee of Health.
3. The Committee was informed that Machakos Level 5 Hospital is the largest government health facility and main referral hospital in Machakos County serving as the primary center for advanced care in the region and neighboring counties. The hospital provides curative, palliative, rehabilitative, and specialized referrals, including surgery, maternity and outpatient services.

4. The Committee was informed that the Hospital had a bed capacity of 541 beds, including 123 maternity beds. Additionally, the Newborn Unit accommodated a total of 75 cots and 10 Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) beds. Further, the Hospital employed a total of forty-nine (49) consultants, with forty-seven (47) on Permanent and Pensionable (PNP) terms and two (2) locums, alongside seventy-four (24) medical officers comprising eighteen (18) PNP and six (6) locums.
5. The Committee was further informed that there were seventy-nine (79) registered clinical officers, including 21 general and forty (40) specialist officers on PNP terms, two (2) under Universal Health Coverage (UHC), fifteen (15) general officers under the Center for International Health, Education and Biosecurity Kenya (CIHEB), and one (1) locum. Nursing staff totaled three hundred and fifty-five (355), made up of three hundred and thirty-three (333) general and specialist nurses on PNP terms, fourteen (14) under UHC, two (2) general nurses under CIHEB, and six (6) locums.
6. Further, the pharmacy department had 14 pharmacists, all employed on PNP terms. Radiography services were supported by 14 radiographers, of whom 8 were on PNP terms, three (3) under UHC, and three (3) locums. Nutrition services included 7 nutritionists all on PNP terms and 1 locum psychologist. The hospital also employed 10 anesthetists (clinical officers) on PNP terms, 15 physiotherapy staff with thirteen (13) on PNP terms and two (2) locums, and 8 occupational therapists, including 7 on PNP terms and 1 under UHC.
7. The Committee was informed that the hospital was equipped with nine dialysis machines, and its mortuary had a capacity to hold twenty-four (24) bodies. However, during the visit, the Committee was informed that 45 bodies were preserved at the mortuary, exceeding its storage capacity.
8. The facility had specialized equipment, including one (1) MRI machine (defective), two (2) X-ray machines (one fixed and one portable), one (1) OPG machine (dental X-ray), one (1) CT scan machine, four (4) Ultrasound machines, and one (1) C-Arm machine in the theatre (all machines functional except the MRI).
9. The Committee was informed that the hospital faced challenges related to delayed SHA reimbursements amounting to 250 million, which had adversely affected the delivery of effective services. Further, in the FY 2023/2024, the facility collected 141 million Facility Improvement Fund (FIF) revenues.
10. During the tour of the facility the Committee made the following observations-
 - a) The Hospital was equipped with a high-resolution CCTV camera system that comprehensively monitors all departments within the facility. The Committee was informed that the installation includes wireless surveillance cameras and a modern control centre, which has significantly enhanced security for patients, staff, and visitors by deterring and detecting incidents such as theft and other unauthorized activities;

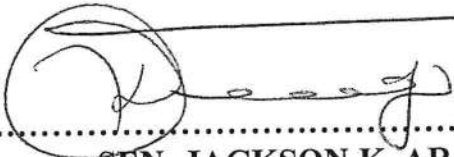
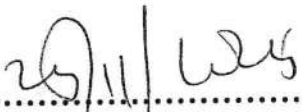
- b) The Hospital has an ICT laboratory dedicated to staff training, where healthcare workers and administrative personnel acquire essential skills for operating the hospital's integrated digital systems. The Committee was informed that the facility supports ongoing professional development, boosting staff capacity to manage electronic health records, digital financial operations, and other automated services that improve overall hospital efficiency and service delivery;
- c) During the visit, the AFYA 1 Health Management System utilized in the County was reported as not working, hindering its intended support for service delivery and operational efficiency. This outage contributed to challenges in patient processing, record management, and general hospital administration and resulted in delays and need for manual interventions;
- d) The Hospital has two well-established mental health wards that separately accommodate male and female patients, supporting both inpatient psychiatric care and specialized mental health interventions. This arrangement enables the hospital to provide gender-sensitive treatment and a safer environment for individuals with acute psychiatric conditions, ensuring proper supervision and tailored psychosocial support for each group;
- e) However, it was observed that the wards were equipped with old, rusty hospital beds and worn-out linen, which reflected a lack of proper maintenance and timely replacement of these essential items. These conditions also pointed to persistent infrastructural and supply challenges within the unit, affecting both patient comfort and the overall quality of care;
- f) The Hospital is equipped with a modern incinerator designed for the safe and efficient disposal of biomedical and clinical waste. The Committee was informed that the incinerator is part of the hospital's advanced medical facilities for managing toxic and infectious materials. However, it was noted that the incinerator needed repairs, specifically its entrance door to ensure continued optimal operation and security;
- g) The Hospital laundry unit was equipped with only one functional washing machine, significantly limiting its capacity to process the substantial volume of linens and medical garments generated daily. The Committee noted that this hampered efficient laundry operations and contributed to delays in supplying clean linen to the inpatient wards;
- h) At the medical wards, some patients informed the Committee that they had been compelled to buy drugs out of pocket from private pharmacies. The Committee observed that some of the said drugs or their generic equivalents were available in the hospital pharmacy indicating gaps in pharmacy inventory management and access. This also suggested shortcomings in dispensing practices or systemic inefficiencies in the distribution of stocked medicines, leading to unnecessary expenses for patients;

- i) There was a locked container filled with expired drugs was observed, which had not yet been collected for safe destruction. This situation indicates lapses in pharmaceutical waste management and poses a risk to safety and regulatory compliance, underscoring the need for timely removal and proper disposal of expired medications to avoid potential misuse or environmental hazards;
- j) The Hospital faces significant infrastructural challenges in its wards, where only two toilets were functional for large numbers of patients in one of the female wards. Additionally, the medical wards lack mosquito nets, exposing patients to increased risks of mosquito-borne diseases and reducing overall comfort and safety. These gaps highlighted the urgent needs for sanitation and infection prevention improvements within the facility;
- k) Contracted staff members informed the Committee that they had experienced payment delays of up to three months, resulting in considerable hardship as they struggle to meet their daily subsistence needs. The Committee was informed that these delays had negatively impacted staff morale. Some casuals narrated to the Committee how they had been compelled to eat leftover food due to delayed payments and financial hardship;
- l) The Committee was informed that payment for casual workers at the Hospital was processed through the Health Superintendent's vote, with wages disbursed directly into individual staff accounts.

PRELIMINARIES

The meeting was called to order at ten minutes past five o'clock and the proceedings commenced with a word of prayer followed by introductions of those present.

MIN/SEN/SCH/279/2025

MEETING WITH THE GOVERNOR, MAKUENI COUNTY GOVERNMENT

1. The Committee held a de-briefing meeting with the Governor, Makueni County to present its preliminary report and informed the Governor that during the oversight visit to the healthcare facilities in the County, the following observations had been made-
 - a) There were expired drugs and reliance of manual and paper-based record keeping systems in the hospital pharmacy which slowed down pharmacy workflows and increased the risks;
 - b) The employees exhibited high level of positive attitude and motivation towards work. However, there were some extreme cases where the personnel demonstrated some lethargy and lackluster attitude such as the radiology unit. Further there were complaints that some healthcare personnel had not been promoted for inordinate long periods. It was observed also that some time some cadres were being remunerated below the recommended minimum wage bill;

- c) The Makueni Hospital Mammogram machine to support early breast cancer detection was operational. However, low utilization was reported suggesting barriers including limited community awareness. The Committee observed that there were also dedicated desks for gender-based violence and mental health which is a significant step in strengthening care for survivors of violence and individuals with psychiatric needs;
- d) There was presence of old, stalled and non-operational ambulances at the Makueni Referral Hospital while there was no functional ambulance in the facilities visited representing a critical gap in emergency medical response capacity and directly threatening patient safety and ability to deliver urgent medical care. Further, the mortuary refrigerators purchased for Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital in 2013 required installation to ensure the effective functioning of the cooling system
- e) The hospitals visited experienced general low drug stock levels, which compelled patients to procure medications out of pocket. However, the hospital wards were generally clean, uncongested and had clean beds;
- f) The Makueni County Referral Hospital lacked a functional incinerator and hazardous medical wastes including sharps, contaminated materials, pharmaceuticals were found disposed improperly exposing patients, staff and the neighbouring community to infectious agents and toxic substances;
- g) Patients had informed the Committee that they faced challenges of long delayed CT scan imaging reports due to shortage of Radiologists forcing patients to wait for their reports to be sent to Kenyatta National Hospital (KNH) for analysis. Further, the Committee had observed general shortage of nurses across all the departments and units in the facilities visited.

2. The Governor informed the Committee that-

- a) All healthcare workers hired by the Makueni County Public Service Board hold positions on Permanent and Pensionable terms, ensuring job security and access to retirement benefits as mandated by county public service employment regulations;
- b) The County Government will address concerns that some employees were receiving a minimum wage bill and ensure that casual workers employed by healthcare facilities receive fair and adequate remuneration in line with Kenyan labor laws and government guidelines;

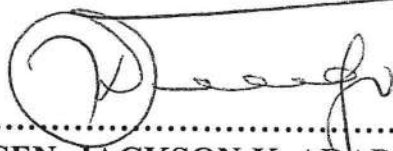
- c) Further, the County Government will address the attitude of Human Resources for Health (HRH) staff and strengthen supervision to ensure consistent, accurate record keeping, thereby improving administration, accountability and service delivery in healthcare facilities;
- d) Makueni County had a huge pending disbursement from the Social Health Authority (SHA) due to high number of rejected claims, a problem that was disrupting financial flows at the healthcare facilities and affected timely payment for health services;
- e) The County had achieved a significant reduction in maternal mortality caused by hemorrhage during childbirth by introducing heat-stable *carbetocin* to prevent and treat postpartum hemorrhage, the leading cause of maternal deaths in the Country;
- f) Faced severe resources drain resulting from serving a large influx of patients from other parts of the Country arising from its proximity to Mombasa-Nairobi Highway and attendant socio-economic activities;
- g) The County Government of Makueni has allocated funds in its budget specifically to clear all outstanding arrears and delayed payments owed to Community Health Promoters (CHPs), aiming to strengthen grassroots health outreach and motivation;
- h) The County was actively transitioning from a manual paper-based system to a digital health information system, aiming to improve efficiency in record-keeping, service delivery and resource management across its healthcare facilities.

PRELIMINARIES

The Committee delegation commenced the tour of the Makueni County Health facilities at 10.00 a.m. by visiting the Mukuyuni Sub-County Hospital

OVERSIGHT VISIT TO MUKUYUNI SUB-COUNTY HOSPITAL, MAKUENI

1. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to the Mukuyuni Sub- County Hospital on Thursday 23rd October, 2025 accompanied Dr. Solomon Mutiso, the Hospital administrator alongside Mr. Joseph Musango the nursing officer in charge.
2. The Committee was informed that Mukuyuni Sub County Hospital was a level-4 facility that had a bed capacity of eight (8) inpatient beds and offered a wide range of health services including Outpatient Curative Services, Inpatient Care, Emergency Services, Tuberculosis treatment, HIV Testing and Treatment, Maternal and Child Health Services, Family Planning, Mental Health Services, Dental Services among others. However, the only ambulance that had been assigned to the facility has been withdrawn and assigned to another facility, Kilungu Sub-County Hospital headquarters adversely affecting emergency response capacity at the facility.
3. During the tour of the facility, the Committee observed that:
 - a) During the visit, there was absence of critical healthcare personnel and supervisors at the facility indicating a critical systemic failure that could possibly lead to poor staff performance, compromise patient safety and lead to general decline in service quality at the facility;
 - b) The hospital mortuary received three (3) coolers, that would have been used in preservations of the bodies, procured by the use of the National Governments Constituency Development Fund (NG-CDF) in 2013. However, the coolers had been left uninstalled since and were now lying unutilized in the facility;

- c) The facility was inadequately staffed with critical areas such as the laboratory facing the greatest challenges. Further, some staff members such as the mortuary attendant informed the Committee that they had served for at least twelve (12) years without a promotion or career advancement;
- d) There was poor record keeping of drugs notably characterized by the lack of clear and updated transfer records of drugs from the main pharmacy to the dispensing pharmacies which undermined effective drug inventory management and accountability, potentially leading to stock discrepancies;
- e) The facility lacked an operational incinerator and was instead utilizing a deteriorated old combustion chamber with broken doors to dispose medical waste during the Committee visit. The Committee observed biomedical waste was brown around the surrounding areas, posing likely health risks to both staff and the community;
- f) The maternity unit had six functional beds, however, they had what appeared like aged linen and old mosquito nets. Further, the Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) medical device for newborns was dysfunctional, potentially resulting in inadequate respiratory support for the neonates and possibly compromising the quality of care;
- g) Community Health Promoters (CHPs) informed the Committee that they had not signed any formal agreement with the County Government and had not received their wages for the preceding seven months. Additionally, they lacked proper working gears/kits like gumboots and umbrellas to protect while working in rough terrains or adverse weather.

**OVERSIGHT VISIT TO MAKUENI
TEACHING AND REFERRAL HOSPITAL,
MAKUENI COUNTY**

1. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Makueni County Referral Hospital on Thursday 23th October, 2025 accompanied by Dr. Justine Kyambi, the County Secretary Makueni County, Ms. Joyce Mutua, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM), Health Services, Ms. Damaris Kavoi, the County Executive Committee Member, Finance, Planning, Budget and Revenue, Ms. Martha Munyao the hospital's Chief Executive Officer, Dr. Daniel Gichogo, the hospital Director of Clinical Services and Dr. Geoffrey Muthoka in charge of Health Services and host officers from the Health Department in the County.

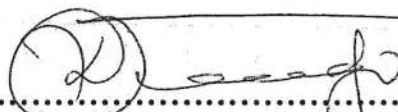
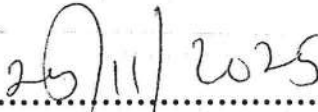
2. The Committee was accompanied by Hon. Jackson Mbalu, Member of the County Assembly representing Kikumbulyu North Ward and Chairperson of the counterpart Committee of Health and Hon. Kyalo Mumo Member of the County Assembly representing Tulimani Ward and a Member of County Assembly Committee of Health.
3. The Committee was informed that Makueni County Referral Hospital (MCRH) is a level 5 facility that offers specialist and general services including Emergency, Mental Health, Nutrition Care, and had facilities for advanced surgeries such as neurosurgery and obstetric safe surgery. The Facility had a bed capacity 435 beds including the Maternity that had a bed capacity of 129 beds.
4. The Committee was informed that the staffing structure at the hospital included various cadres with a total of 225 staff on permanent and pensionable terms, supplemented by 15 staff under the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) program, 2 partners, and 109 on hospital contracts. Additionally, the cadres were composed of 16 Consultants, 10 Medical Officers, 14 General Clinical Officers, 18 Specialist Clinical Officers, 56 Specialist Nurses, 5 Nurse Anesthetists, 65 General Nurses, 3 Pharmacists, 7 Pharmaceutical Technologists, 3 Radiographers, 3 Nutritionists, 9 Physiotherapists, 5 Psychological Counsellors, 4 Occupational Therapists, and 7 RCO Anesthetists.
5. During the tour of the facility, the Committee made the following observations-
 - a) The Radiology Department was adequately equipped with one (1) x ray machine, one (1) CT scan, two (2) ultrasound, one (1) mammogram machine, one (1) OPG machine, Computer-Aided Risk Score for Mortality (CARM) machine in the Theatre, one (1) Laparoscopic tower in the Theatre, 4 Renal Dialysis machines and a Telemedicine for teaching and consultations;
 - b) There was no functional incinerator at the facility and both medical and non-medical waste was being disposed in an open field next to residential and commercial buildings and during the visit some recently used bandages and blood-stained linen were found strewn all over the said field posing serious health risks to human health and the environment. The Committee observed that this violated the regulatory standards for safe waste management and promoted spread of dangerous pathogens to nearby residents;
 - c) While the Hospital had removed the asbestos roofing, they had been disposed in an open field and piled along the fence to the wards exposing the patients, their families and healthcare personnel to significant health problems related to asbestos fibres;

- d) There was only one functional laundry machine, and the linen awaiting cleaning were not properly sorted, indicating inadequate hygiene practices. Additionally, the unit was operated by two casual workers who did not have any signed contractual agreements with either the facility or the Government, raising concerns about staffing and compliance with employment regulations;
- e) The Hospital had acquired an adequate number of ambulances, however, most of them had been grounded and only one was reported to be operational. Additionally, it was noted that the ambulances' interiors included broken old beds with rugged, worn-out covers;
- f) The hospital compound near the parking lot was dotted with abandoned, unused and broken-down motor vehicles posing a significant health, safety and environmental concerns. The Committee observed that the derelict vehicles and machinery were an eye sore and a source of pollution and hazard to both staff and the public since they were parked along the hospital busy paths and walk ways;
- g) The Mother and Child Unit was spacious, clean, and well-ventilated, with adequate bed capacity. However, the Committee observed that the unit faced challenges such as insufficient supply of mosquito nets and linen. It was also reported that the Unit was also understaffed and faced a severe shortage of nursing personnel;
- h) Patients informed the Committee that they had been directed to purchase prescription drugs from external pharmacy stores located along the hospital road indicating inadequate supply of essential drugs and medicine at the hospital;
- i) At the Pharmacy, there were no bin cards and record keeping was poorly done making it unreliable to track drug movement and thereby increasing risks of pilferage, waste and loss of medicine through expiry and mismanagement. There were discrepancies between bin card entries and physical counts for instance there were excess stock of *Tradmin*, a brand of the prescription drug on the shelves as opposed in the recorded stocks;
- j) General dilapidated infrastructure at the facility which included leaking pipes and wet pathways increasing the risk of slips and falls for both patients and hospital staff, naked and exposed electrical wires inside wards and corridors posing immediate hazards, broken windows at the mortuary compromising building security and hygiene and non-functional cold rooms in the kitchen which undermined food safety and storage.

**OVERSIGHT VISIT TO KITUI COUNTY
TEACHING AND REFERRAL HOSPITAL,**

1. The Committee conducted an oversight visit to Kitui County Referral on Wednesday, 22nd October, 2025 and was received by Ms. Ruth Koki, the County Executive Committee Member (CECM) Department of Health and Sanitation, Dr. Benson Musyoka, Chief Officer, Medical Services, Mr. Aggrey Kamba, Chief Officer, Drugs and Medical Supplies, Ms. Lynn Kitwan, Chief Officer, Public Health and Sanitation and Dr. John Mungai, the Medical Superintendent at the Hospital;
2. The Committee was informed that Kitui County Referral Hospital was opened in 1905 as a local native hospital. It has since evolved to a fully-fledged referral hospital with health expertise and specialized services and has deservedly earned recognition throughout Kitui County and its environs as a preferred diagnostic, treatment, and referral centre. The Hospital has in the previous years witnessed expansive investment in the latest technology, systems, procedures, drugs, non-pharmaceuticals, health expertise and medical equipment that have enabled adequate provision of most of the specialized health services.
3. The Committee was taken through a presentation on the operation of the facility and the services offered in its different departments and units. The Committee was informed that the facility offers a range of specialized department and units including the outpatient, inpatient, Intensive Care Unit (ICU), radiology department, the laboratory, the maternity, the renal unit, the pharmacy, the blood bank, the Tuberculosis (TB) clinic and specialized clinics such as dental units;
4. The Committee was informed that Kitui County Referral Hospital currently has a bed capacity of 320 beds. In FY 2022/2023, 2023/2024, and 2024/2025, the facility recorded a rise in total workload of 299,195, 358,340, and 409,440 patients, respectively. This implies that the facility has an average daily workload of 1,121 patients

5. The Radiology Department is equipped with the 4 X-ray machines, 1 CT scan, 5 Ultrasound machines and 1 C-Arm X-ray machine housed in its General Theatre. The Committee was further informed that the facility has 31 consultants, 19 medical doctors, 70 Registered Clinical Officers, 185 nurses, 10 pharmacists, 7 radiographers, 18 nutritionists, 12 anesthetists, 7 physiotherapists and 4 occupational therapists. The Hospital had recently constructed a new mortuary wing that could hold 60 more bodies;
6. The Committee was informed that the hospital had admitted patients beyond its capacity as most private hospitals had turned away patients following a standoff between the private healthcare practitioners and the Social Health Authority (SHA).
7. During the tour of the facility, the Committee made the following observations-
 - a) At the radiology unit, it was reported that the X-ray machine had broken down for about three weeks and patients had been referred to private facilities outside the Hospital. However, during the visit the X-ray machine had been repaired and commenced operations. Nonetheless, the mammogram machine essential for breast cancer screening was non-functional;
 - b) The absence of a functional mammogram machine means women must travel outside the County for breast cancer screening, risking delays in diagnosis and treatment;
 - c) The Male General Ward, (Ward No. 6), had admitted patients beyond its designated capacity leading to multiple incidents of patients sharing beds. The Committee observed that Tuberculosis (TB) patients had been accommodated in a cubicle in the same ward which could heighten infection risks in addition to possibly violating infection prevention and control standards. However, the Committee was informed that the County Government had prioritized construction of sixteen (16) bed capacity isolation services wards for the highly infectious and multidrug-resistant patients who were isolated in improvised isolation rooms;
 - d) The Hospital's TB Clinic is currently responsible for managing approximately 400 patients but critically lacks a dedicated TB-specific laboratory. Diagnostic and laboratory services for TB, such as sputum microscopy, GeneXpert molecular tests and cultures are typically conducted in general labs, risking contamination and delays in diagnosis;
 - e) Maternity wards have been severely overcrowded forcing some mothers to share single beds, a situation that substantially increases the risk of hospital-acquired infections and leads to considerable physical and psychological discomfort for both mothers and newborns. This congestion was associated with high patient load especially given county's expanded role in serving neighboring counties and strain on regional healthcare delivery systems;

- f) The labor ward and delivery room were found to be open and directly accessible from the general wards with only curtains used as partitions instead of solid doors. The Committee observed that this configuration caused significant privacy concerns. However, the Committee was informed that the County Government has prioritized construction of a 276-bed capacity mother and child block to accommodate maternity, labour and pediatric units. Further, the Hospital's new "Little Angels Newborn Unit" had made major improvements, including new equipment like radiant warmers, incubators, laundry, and intensive care space.
- g) The Hospital faces challenges in proper drugs records management within its pharmacy characterized by inadequate records officers' capacity, too few staff handling documentation for high patient volume and managing majority of the records manually without uniform standards. Some offices were congested with non-current records and lacked sufficient storage facilities, increasing vulnerability to physical loss and damage;
- h) The Committee observed that each patient requires at least four different records to be kept, a responsibility that is reportedly overwhelming for the available staff, especially with the shortage of both health records and nursing personnel;
- i) The Hospital mortuary stood out as well-maintained, clean, and equipped with modern refrigeration systems including newly installed refrigerators and upgraded cold rooms which provided hygienic, dignified storage for deceased and comfort for bereaved families. Nonetheless, the Committee was informed by the mortician in charge that they faced challenges related to workload and the lack of promotional opportunities;
- j) The facility faces general several infrastructural maintenance challenges including window panes, broken tiles and failing ceilings in the wards all of which would negatively impact the quality and safety of patient care. The Committee observed that this would expose wards to dust, wind, rain, and increased risk of theft or unauthorized entry;
- k) The Hospital's overall CCTV camera system was reported as malfunctioning which compromised the security and heightened risks related to both patient safety and asset protection. The Committee noted that functional security cameras are crucial for maintaining order, monitoring sensitive spaces like drug stores and mortuaries and providing evidence in case of security breaches or disputes;
- l) The Hospital's blood bank is presently domiciled in a very small room with limited storage space and it faces operational challenges with its main blood storage fridge reported to have been out of order since 2024;


- m) The Renal Unit at the Hospital has five functional dialysis machines offering at least ten (10) sessions per day. The Committee was informed that the County Government was in the process of procuring twenty (20) more dialysis machines and consequently set up a new renal centre;
- n) The incinerator was dysfunctional which led to improper disposal of hazardous and toxic biomedical wastes posing severe health and environmental risks for hospital staff, patients and surrounding eco system;
- o) There were some healthcare workers who had worked for inordinate long period without promotion such as the mortuary attendant who had reportedly worked for over twenty years without advancement;
- p) Some departments and units in the hospital such as the TB Clinic, the blood bank and the maternity wards were severely understaffed leading to challenges in service delivery and overall functioning of the facility. However, the Committee observed that healthcare personnel had been assigned duties to work even at night in the radiology unit even when the machine was not working.

**MEETING WITH THE GOVERNOR,
KITUI COUNTY GOVERNMENT**

1. The Committee paid a courtesy call on the Governor, Kitui County Government on Wednesday, 22nd October, 2025 and briefed him about the objective of the oversight visit.
2. The Governor informed the Committee that-
 - a) Kitui County has a total of 326 public healthcare facilities, comprising 3 Level IV hospitals, 9 Level 3B facilities, 54 Level 3A facilities, 245 Level 2 facilities, and 3 Beyond-Zero mobile clinics;
 - b) Recently, the public healthcare facilities in the County had experienced a significant influx of patients following a standoff between the private healthcare providers and the Social Health Authority (SHA). This crisis reportedly began when private and faith-based hospitals started requiring patients to pay cash for services;

- c) As of 31st July 2025, Kitui County had successfully registered 365,613 persons, accounting for 32.2% of the county's total target population of 1,136,187. On 2nd June 2025, the County launched an enhanced SHA registration strategy. This strategy increased monthly SHA registrations to an average of 36,025 persons, a rise from the previous monthly average of 29,497. This steady growth demonstrates the County's commitment and sustained momentum in expanding SHA coverage;
- d) To support SHA registration process, the County received 213 SHA gadgets including tablets and power banks. However, despite this allocation, 101 public health facilities are still without SHA gadgets, limiting their ability to submit claims and access timely reimbursements;
- e) As of 18th August 2025, health facilities in the County had submitted claims totaling Kshs. 631,765,540. Of this amount, Kshs. 338,384,178 (53.5%) had been reimbursed, while Kshs. 293,381,362 (46.5%) remained as the outstanding balance.
- f) The Kenya Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA) remains the primary supplier of essential Health Products and Technologies to the County. However, the County has also been affected by persistent drug supply challenges from KEMSA), experiencing order fill rates that typically range between 50% and 70%;
- g) The County public healthcare facilities have become heavily strained as they serve not only local residents but also an increasing number of patients from neighboring counties including Garissa, Machakos, Makueni, and Embu;
- h) The County Government had taken major steps to invest in its healthcare personnel with a strong emphasis on converting staff on fixed-term contracts especially those under the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) scheme. Currently, the Department of Health and Sanitation has a workforce of 1,943; 1,794 on permanent and pensionable terms, 143 UHC staff, six (6) on contracts. In the current FY 2025/2026, the County has set aside a budget of Kshs. 236M for recruiting additional health workers in order to strengthen the county's healthcare workforce and enhance service delivery;
- i) The County Government is actively upgrading its healthcare facility infrastructure and broader service delivery capacities and had procured a new laundry machine for hospital use.

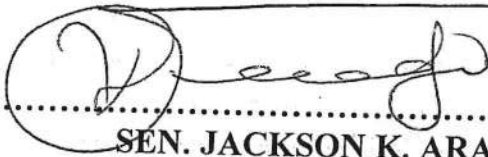
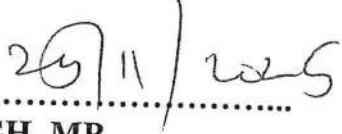
ANY OTHER BUSINESS

2.0 KITUI COUNTY REFERRAL HOSPITAL

2.1 INTRODUCTION

Kitui County Referral Hospital was opened in 1905 as a local native hospital. It has since evolved to a fully-fledged level IV hospital with health expertise and specialized services and has deservedly earned recognition throughout Kitui County and its environs as a preferred diagnostic, treatment, and referral center.

The hospital has, in the previous years, witnessed expansive investment in the latest technology, systems, procedures, drugs, non-pharmaceuticals, health expertise, and medical equipment that have enabled adequate provision of most of the specialized health services.

OUR VISION

To be the leading county hospital in the provision of quality client-centered health care services in Kenya.

OUR MISSION

To provide accessible and affordable quality health care services to all and facilitate training, research, and policy development.

2.2 CURRENT STATUS

The facility has a **320-bed capacity** across different departments. In FY 2022/2023, 2023/2024, and 2024/2025, the facility recorded a rise in total workload of **299,195, 358,340, and 409,440** patients, respectively (KHIS, 2024). This implies that the facility has an average daily workload of **1,121** patients.

2.3 SERVICES OFFERED

2.3.1 GENERAL OUTPATIENT DEPARTMENT

The following services are offered at the general outpatient department.

- i. Customer care services
- ii. The 24-hour Accident and Emergency (A&E) services
- iii. Doctors and clinical officers' consultation
- iv. Emergency treatment, Emergency admissions and referrals
- v. Gender based violence reception, counseling, and treatment
- vi. Minor surgeries

2.3.2 RADIOLOGY DEPARTMENT

A general outpatient department that offers the following services;

- i. One (1) CT-Scan
- ii. One (1) X-ray machine
- iii. One (1) Ultrasound
- iv. One (1) Mammogram – Not functional (compression plate not working – need replacement)

2.3.3 DENTAL DEPARTMENT

This department offers the following services:

- i. One (1) dental chair offering conservative treatment, Minor and major oral surgeries, Maxillofacial surgeries

2.3.4 NURSING DEPARTMENT

In the hospital, the nursing department provides the following services:

- i. Diagnosing, treating, evaluating, and managing acute and chronic illnesses and diseases
- ii. Obtaining health histories and conducting physical examination
- iii. General administrative support
- iv. Care of patients in the ambulance

2.3.5 MATERNAL CHILD HEALTH AND FAMILY PLANNING (MCH/FP)

The department offers the following services: -

- i. Mother and Child healthcare and family planning services, Growth and monitoring

2.3.6 COMPREHENSIVE CARE, CHEST, SKIN, AND LEPROSY CLINIC, ISOLATION WARD

The department offers the following services:

TB screening, and management of opportunistic infections, eight (8) bed capacity Isolation services ward (the highly infectious and multidrug-resistant patients are isolated in improvised isolation rooms).

2.3.7 NUTRITION DEPARTMENT

The department offers the following services: -

- i. Preparing and implementing therapeutic diets for inpatients and outpatients
- ii. Conducting nutrition assessment, counseling, and support in specialized clinics (TB, CCC, MCH, DM)

2.3.8 DEPARTMENT OF SURGERY

The department offers the following services: -

- i. One (1) theatre with two (2) operating tables offering general and specialized surgical services.

2.3.9 DEPARTMENT OF INTERNAL MEDICINE - MEDICAL WARDS

The department offers: Heart care with Electrocardiogram (ECG) and Echocardiography (ECHO), Specialized Diabetic Care Clinic, Kidney Care with dialysis, Specialized Gastroenterologist Care, Oncology (Cancer) Care, Medical Output Care, and General Medical Care.

2.3.10 RENAL UNIT

Five (5) functional machines offering 10 sessions per day, 60 per week, and 3,120 annually.

2.3.11 DEPARTMENT OF OBSTETRICS AND GYNAECOLOGY

Services offered include: major and minor gynecological surgeries; management of normal labor, delivery, and their complications; management of antenatal complications; and Post-natal care services.

2.3.12 REHABILITATIVE SERVICES (PHYSIOTHERAPY, ORTHOPAEDIC TECHNOLOGY, AND OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY DEPARTMENTS)

There is one (1) each of trade meal, static bike, parallel bars, and two (2) pulling systems, and hydrotherapy equipment, and two (2) electric stimulation devices, one (1) set each of cuff weights, ankle and wrist weights among others, that offer assessment, diagnosis, and treatment services for movement issues, provide treatment for people suffering from physical problems arising from injury, disease, illness, and ageing.

2.3.13 HEALTH RECORDS AND INFORMATION DEPARTMENT

Services offered are: Registration of patient, opening of in/out patient file, Booking and preparing of consultant clinics, issuing of birth and death notifications.

2.3.14 PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Services offered are: Filling of P3 forms, Postmortem services, performing clinical and forensic autopsies, and Forensic, Clinical, Anatomic, and Hematopathology.

2.3.15 AMENITY DEPARTMENT

This department offers a wide range of personalized specialist care services, inclusive of all the other departments, i.e., obstetrics/gynecology, surgical, pathology, medicine, neonatal, and pediatric.

2.3.16 LABORATORY DEPARTMENT

The facility has a class E medical laboratory equipped with one (1) biochemistry, two (2) 5-part full hemogram, two (2) electrolyte analyzers, two (2) immunoassay machines, three (3) microscopes, one (1) fluorescent microscope, two (2) biosafety cabinets, one (1) incubator, one (1) freezer, four (4) fridges, one (1) microtome, one (1) water bath, three (3) centrifuges.

It offers clinical laboratory assays on specimens, complete blood count, coagulation profile, lipid profile, liver function tests, renal function tests, thyroid function test, hemoglobin test, Hemoglobin A1C, transfusion services, spinal fluid analysis, glucose level, ESR, HCG, and histology services.

2.3.17 SPECIAL OUTPATIENT CLINICS

The services offered include: Hemophilia, Diabetic, surgical, medical, obstetric, and gynecological clinics, Youth Friendly Clinic, Key Populations Drop-In Centre (DICE), and Health Services to Key Populations

2.3.17 PROVIDER-INITIATED HIV TESTING AND COUNSELLING (PITC) DEPARTMENT

Response

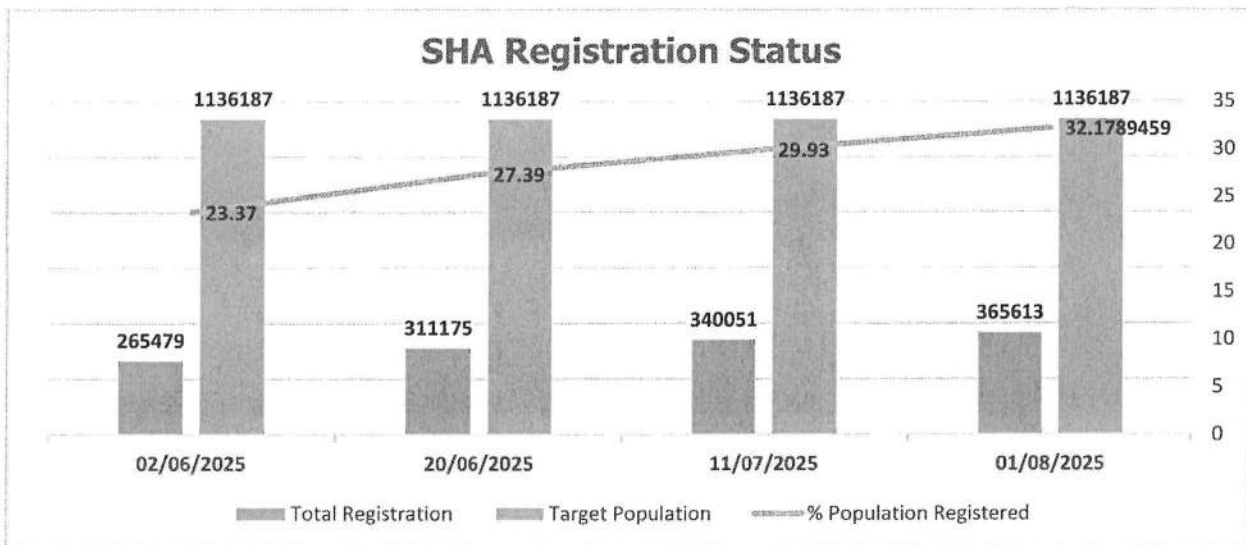
a. SHA Registration Status

As of **31st July 2025**, Kitui County had successfully registered **365,613** persons, accounting for **32.2%** of the county’s total target population of **1,136,187**.

On **2nd June 2025**, the County launched an enhanced SHA registration strategy. This strategy increased monthly SHA registrations to an average of **36,025** persons, a rise from the previous monthly average of **29,497**. This steady growth demonstrates the County’s commitment and sustained momentum in expanding SHA coverage.

The Progress of registration is as indicated in **Figure 1**.

b. Strategies to Identify and Enrol Vulnerable Populations, especially in Hard-to-Reach Areas

i. Community Health Promoters (CHPs) as Frontline Agents

Engagement of **2,470 Community Health Promoters (CHPs)** actively supporting household-level registration across all **247** villages in the county through;

- Engaging the CHPs to register at least **10** individuals per day during their routine household visitation including Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), elderly residents, and hidden/isolated households geared towards ensuring inclusivity.

ii. Collaboration with Local Leadership

Engagement of Chiefs, Assistant Chiefs, Village Administrators, Religious Leaders, and ward leaders to actively participate in community mobilization and sensitization. They also support CHPs in gaining community trust and ensuring accurate household targeting.

iii. Awareness Creation and Community Outreach

- Vernacular radio programs, social media campaigns, and Information Education and Communication (IEC) materials have been deployed to enhance community understanding of SHA benefits.
- Use of vernacular radio talks and social media to sensitize the population on SHA with testimonials from the beneficiaries.
- Active registration helpdesks established at all **311** health facilities and registration of clients seeking services in healthcare facilities.

Currently, the County has a total number of **129,642** persons categorized as the vulnerable population, which includes the elderly, orphans, and people with disability (State Department of Labour and Social Protection, 2022).

3. Thorough breakdown of the total amount reimbursed by SHA to healthcare facilities in your County since its inception, providing a breakdown of reimbursements made to each healthcare facility and any outstanding or delayed payments.

Response

Kitui County has a total of **311** public healthcare facilities, comprising 3 Level IV hospitals, 9 Level 3B facilities, 54 Level 3A facilities, 245 Level 2 facilities, and 3 Beyond-Zero mobile clinics. For a facility to be reimbursed by the Social Health Authority (SHA), claims must be raised and submitted online through the SHA portal using designated SHA gadgets.

To support this process, the County received **213** SHA gadgets (tablets and power banks) from the Digital Health Agency. The distribution was as follows:

- a. 3 Level IV hospitals.

- b. 9 Level 3B facilities.
- c. 53 Level 3A facilities.
- d. 145 Level 2 facilities.
- e. 3 Beyond-Zero mobile clinics.

Despite this allocation, **101** public health facilities are still without SHA gadgets, limiting their ability to submit claims and access timely reimbursements.

As of **18th August 2025**, health facilities in the County had submitted claims totaling **KShs. 631,765,540**. Of this amount, **KShs. 338,384,178 (53.5%)** had been reimbursed, while **KShs. 293,381,362 (46.5%)** remained as the outstanding balance.

4. Specific measures and strategies being applied by your county Government to track Universal Health Coverage (UHC) fund flows, highlighting challenges, if any, experienced with timely disbursement from the national government for UHC-related services.

Response

To ensure effective implementation of Universal Health Coverage (UHC), the County Government has put in place the following measures and strategies;

- i. Implementation of the Facilities Improvement Financing Act, 2023, effective 15th May, 2025.
- ii. Semi-automation and integration of health services, including tracking of funds flow.
- iii. Accounting and submitting financial reports of previous Authority to Incur Expenditures (AIEs) before issuing subsequent AIEs.
- iv. Sensitization and training of health care workers, facility in-charges on financial management and reporting.
- v. Internal audits at the facilities' level.
- vi. Supportive supervision to ensure prudent use and accountability measures are adhered to.
- vii. Monthly monitoring and evaluation on implementation status.
- viii. Engagement of key stakeholders, including community engagement.

However, despite these efforts, the county continues to face challenges related to delays and inconsistencies in the timely disbursement of funds from the National Government, which occasionally hampers the smooth delivery of UHC-related services. These include;

a. Financial/Claim Processing of UHC funds

- i. **Limited transparency and feedback on submitted claims** – Health centres and dispensaries are unable to access the status of claims submitted to SHA through the system. In addition, there is no reliable

mechanism for tracking, confirming, or receiving timely feedback on whether claims are approved, rejected, or pending.

- ii. Delays in claim processing by SHA** – Claims submitted by county health facilities experience prolonged processing times, leading to cash flow gaps that affect the operational efficiency of facilities.
- iii. Delayed disbursements of SHA funds** – There are significant delays in the release of reimbursements, limiting facilities' ability to finance essential services and commodities.
- iv. Delayed disbursement of other grants** – Disbursements of DANIDA and Community Health Promoters (CHPs) grants from the National Government are also delayed, further straining service delivery at the primary health care level.
- v. Impact on facility operations** – The cumulative effect of these delays and inefficiencies includes stock-outs of essential medicines, delayed payments for contracted services, and reduced ability to implement planned activities at the facility level.
- vi.** Out of 2,470 CHPs, 97 of them are not registered for the National Government CHP stipend, hence they are not paid.
- vii.** Forty-nine (49) health facilities that received SHA gadgets are still experiencing challenges with the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentists Council (KMPDC) online portal credentials, which have hindered their ability to process and submit claims.

b. System and Infrastructure Inefficiencies

- i. Frequent SHA system downtimes** – Challenges such as One-Time Password (OTP) failures and delays in generating login credentials disrupt claim submission and processing.

- ii. **Introduction and Use of Biometric Gadgets** – Primary healthcare facilities are yet to be equipped with the biometric devices necessary for client registration and identification during service delivery.
 - iii. **Inadequate ICT resources** – The number of SHA gadgets (tablets and power banks) provided is insufficient to cover all public health facilities. In addition, limited or inconsistent provision of data bundles further constrains effective system use.
 - iv. **Network connectivity challenges** – Persistent network outages, particularly in remote and hard-to-reach areas, hinder facilities from accessing the SHA portal in real time, thereby slowing down registration, claim processing, and service reporting.
 - v. **Limited Information Communication Technology (ICT) support and maintenance capacity** – Facilities often lack timely technical support to troubleshoot gadget malfunctions, system errors, or connectivity problems, leading to prolonged service interruptions.
- 5. Breakdown of total amount of money received in each healthcare facility in the FY 2024/2025 pursuant to the provisions of the Facility Improvement Financing Act, 2023, detailing the amounts collected, retained, and/or ring-fenced and used exclusively for the improvement of health services**

Response

In FY 2024/2025, the County Government had not operationalized the Facilities Improvement Financing (FIF) Act, 2023, until 15th May 2025. During this period, healthcare facilities were funded directly through the County Revenue Fund (CRF). From the start of the Financial Year up to 14th May 2025, hospitals had generated a total of **KShs. 468,243,193** on an accrual basis.

Following the rollout of the FIF Act, 2023, health facilities were allowed to retain revenue at source. Between 15th May and 30th June 2025, healthcare facilities generated **KShs. 241,633,621** on an accrual basis, which was retained at the facility level, as detailed in the table below.

6.Strategies employed by your County Government to address staffing requirements to meet increased service demand under UHC, detailing specific steps being taken to train and continuously upskill healthcare personnel;

Response

The successful implementation of Universal Health Coverage (UHC) in Kitui County relies heavily on the availability of a well-trained, motivated, and equitably distributed health workforce. Currently, the County Ministry of Health and Sanitation has a workforce of **1,943** (**1,794** on permanent and pensionable terms, **143** UHC staff, **six (6)** on contractual basis).

To address staffing requirements and meet the increased service demand under UHC, the County has adopted a range of strategies that focus not only on filling existing staffing gaps but also on ensuring continuous professional development, capacity building, and retention of healthcare workers across all levels of service delivery. These strategies include:

a. Recruitment

In FY 2023/2024, the County Ministry of Health and Sanitation recruited 13 healthcare workers. In the current FY 2025/2026, the Ministry has set aside a budget of **Ksh. 236M** for recruiting additional health workers. This recruitment will strengthen the county's healthcare workforce and enhance service delivery.

b. Upskilling and Specialized Training

The County has progressively released officers for specialized training. Since FY 2022/2023, a total of 62 healthcare workers have been released and bonded to pursue various courses in line with the Training Needs Assessment. The courses are expected to enhance the officers' competencies and contribute significantly to strengthening healthcare service delivery within the county.

d. Capacity Building and Continuous Professional Development (CPD)

f. Support by the National Government with UHC staff

The County Ministry of Health and Sanitation has received support from the National Government through the recruitment of 143 UHC staff, who have been deployed across various health facilities to enhance service efficiency and improve healthcare.

Responses

The Kenya Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA) remains the primary supplier of essential Health Products and Technologies to Kitui County. The KEMSA non-supplies are procured from the Mission for Essential Drugs and Supplies (MEDS), with which the County has a formal Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). Any additional non-supplies from MEDS are sourced from pre-qualified local suppliers.

To ensure uninterrupted service delivery, the County Ministry of Health and Sanitation orders Drugs and Medical Supplies quarterly.

Below is a summary showing KEMSA orders and supplies for the three financial years;

8. The type, the total, and operational status of medical equipment supplied in public hospitals in Kitui County under the Management Equipment Services programme, the Global funding, and Gavi since FY 2022/2023, including their recipient facilities.

Response

a. Managed Equipment Services (MES)

The Managed Equipment Services (MES) program was introduced as a National Government initiative in 2016 and started equipping the hospitals in March 2017.

The program was to bridge gaps in diagnostic, surgical, renal, imaging, and critical care services, thereby enhancing access to specialized healthcare at the county level. The project was implemented to play a critical role in advancing Universal Health Coverage (UHC) by improving service readiness, promoting equity, and supporting the overall goal of delivering quality healthcare to all citizens.

In the County, the MES project was implemented in Kitui County Referral Hospital and Mwingi Level IV Hospital. The equipment were distributed in Lots in the following departments: theatre, renal, radiology, Central Sterilization Services Department (CSSD). Some equipment are still functional and in use.

b. GAVI Cold Chain Equipment Distribution Overview

The Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization (GAVI) supported Cold Chain Equipment (CCE) distribution across Kitui County. The equipment were distributed in multiple batches between 2023 and 2025 to strengthen vaccine storage, immunization logistics, and health facility cold chain infrastructure. The distribution includes both on-grid and solar-powered refrigerators and combo units, targeting health centers, dispensaries, and sub-county hospitals.

c. Global Fund Equipment Status Report

The Global Fund has been a key partner in strengthening health systems worldwide by supporting the fight against HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, and malaria. The project covers equipment ranging from laboratory analyzers and GeneXpert machines to Cluster of Differentiation 4 (CD4) and viral load testing platforms, as well as hospital-grade diagnostic and treatment tools. It has significantly enhanced the capacity of health facilities to deliver quality and timely services, ensuring that facilities are better equipped to meet the growing service demands under Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

In Kitui County, the project supplied;

- i. 61,560 kg of bulky liquid oxygen,

- ii. 540 oxygen cylinders (300 units of 8,500L cylinders, 170 units of 3,400L cylinders, and 70 units of 1360L cylinders),
- iii. Seven (7) patient monitors,
- iv. Fourteen oxygen splitters,
- v. Six (6) manifolds together with oxygen piping.

Response

The registration and accreditation of health facilities is governed by different bodies like the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentists Council (KMPDC), Pharmacy and Poisons Board (PPB), Kenya Medical Laboratory Technicians and Technologists Board (KMLTTB), Nursing Council of Kenya (NCK), Clinical Officers Council (COC), among others.

The County's mandate is to carry out inspections before registration of the facilities and submission of the reports to the regulatory bodies for further evaluation and consideration for registration. There are 125 privately owned health facilities in the County. In collaboration with relevant regulatory bodies, the County Ministry of Health and Sanitation continuously undertakes supportive supervision.

a. Date of registration and current registration status;

Kitui County has 125 privately operated and faith-based healthcare facilities. The registration of healthcare facilities spans from as early as

1964 (Our Lady of Lourdes Mutomo Hospital in Kitui South) to as recent as July 2025 (Jackal Medical Care in Kitui East).

82.4% (N=103) of the total facilities are active and have up-to-date registrations. However, 17.4% (N=22) of the private health facilities are marked as not active, often due to non-renewal of licenses, closures, or pending approvals.

b. Accreditation status with the relevant institutions

90% (N=112) of the private health facilities are accredited by recognized regulatory bodies such as the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentists Council (KMPDC), Clinical Officers Council (COC) and the Nursing Council of Kenya (NCK). This reflects compliance with national standards. However, 10% (N=13) of the private health facilities lack accreditation.

c. Copies of the latest inspection report

- iv. 16 dispensary laboratories.

a. Licensing and Certification

The Kenya Medical Laboratory Technicians and Technologists Board (KMLTTB) is the statutory body mandated to register and license medical laboratory practitioners and laboratories.

In FY 2025/2026, the County Government of Kitui has budgeted for inspection, licensing, certification, and accreditation of all public health care laboratories. Consequently, the county Ministry of Health and Sanitation has applied for the inspection, classification, and subsequent registration of 14 laboratories. The registration of the remaining laboratories will be taken in a phased manner.

b. Infrastructure

Medical laboratory infrastructure is designed to uphold accuracy, efficiency, biosafety, and compliance with national and international standards (e.g., WHO). In Kitui County, medical laboratories have sufficient structural capacity, with safety measures in place to ensure compliance and safeguard both staff and patients, as outlined below:

i. Physical infrastructure

Laboratory layout and design

There are: -

- Clear separation of clean and contaminated areas.

- Adequate ventilation (with fume hoods or biosafety cabinets, depending on the infectious materials handled in the specific laboratory).
- Smooth, washable surfaces for walls, floors, and benches to allow easy cleaning.
- Controlled access to authorized staff only.

Utilities

- Stable electricity supply with backup (generators/UPS).
- Safe water supply (piped and rainwater).
- Reliable waste disposal system (biohazard bins, incinerators, sharps containers).
- Fire extinguishers, fire assembly points, fire exits, and sand buckets.
- Amenities: sufficient staff toilets and patient toilets.

ii. Essential Equipment

The laboratories are equipped with general equipment and automated analyzers, depending on the level of the laboratory. These do include, but are not limited to, Microscopes, centrifuges, refrigerators, freezers, incubators, automated clinical and haematology analyzers, Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) machines, biosafety cabinets, etc.

iii. Health Workforce

The laboratories are manned by a dedicated skilled workforce of 152 medical laboratory officers, with different qualifications and specialities including Microbiology, Haematology, Blood transfusion science, Histopathology, Biochemistry, and Parasitology. The officers are registered by the KMLTTB and hold valid practicing licenses.

iv. Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)

The laboratories have prepared SOPs based on authoritative, evidence-based inferences from the International Organization for Standardization (ISO 15189 - 2022). The standards provide requirements for the quality and competence of medical laboratories, ensuring they provide reliable results that support patient care and public health.

General/Administrative SOPs

- Document control and record keeping.
- Specimen request and acceptance/rejection criteria.
- Chain of custody for clinical specimens.
- Staff training and competency assessment.
- Equipment calibration, maintenance, and repair logs.
- Inventory and reagent management.

Pre-Analytical phase SOPs

- Patient identification and consent procedures.
- Phlebotomy and blood collection procedures.

- Specimen handling, transport, and storage.
- Criteria for handling compromised specimens.

Analytical Phase SOPs

- Operation of machines and equipment.
- Test procedure SOPs.
- Internal quality control (IQC) procedures and proficiency testing.

Post Analytical Phase SOPs

- Validation and verification of results.
- Result entry, review, and approval.
- Critical value reporting.
- Record retention and archiving of reports.
- Confidentiality and data protection measures.

Quality and Safety SOPs

- Biosafety guidelines (use of PPE, Biosafety cabinet use).
- Waste management and disposal (sharps, biohazards, chemical waste).
- Exposure management.
- Fire safety, evacuation, and first aid procedures.
- Occurrence/incident reporting and investigation.

11. Detailed report on legal compliance and licensing of all pharmacies within public healthcare facilities in Kitui County, providing registration and accreditation status, including Pharmacy and Poisons Board License as at 30th June 2025

Legal Backing of Registration of Pharmacies in Public Hospitals

The Pharmacy and Poisons Board, established under the Pharmacy and Poisons Act (Cap 244), is mandated to regulate health products and technologies (HPT) and the profession of pharmacy. The board is mandated to carry out inspection and licensing of pharmacies, including those in hospitals and clinics, and license the practice of pharmacists and pharmaceutical technologists under CAP 244 Part II, section 9 (1) and (2).

The board requires that all hospitals have a superintendent overseeing the running of the hospital pharmacy. The superintendent should be a pharmacist or a pharmaceutical technologist registered or enrolled, respectively, with the board.

The pharmacists or pharmaceutical technologists in charge of the hospital pharmacies in the county are required to attach their practicing licenses to their respective hospitals, and this should be renewed annually.

The hospital should also have a valid license from the Kenya Medical Practitioners and Dentists Council.

Kitui County Referral Hospital pharmacy has been licensed by the board since January 2025. In FY 2025/2026, the County has budgeted for the licensing of the public health facilities' pharmacies through Facilities Improvement Financing.

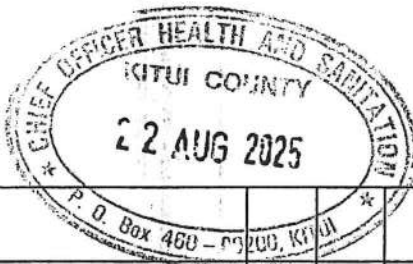

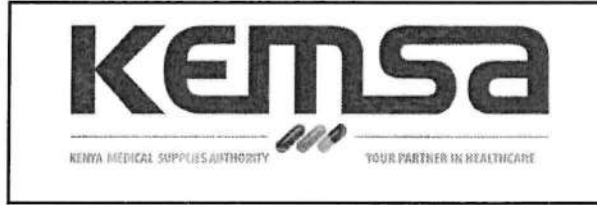

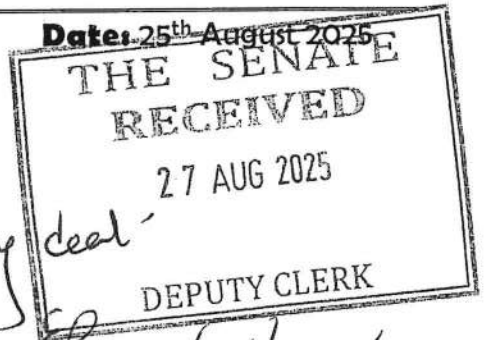

RESPONSE ON THE IMPLEMENTATION STATUS OF UNIVERSAL HEALTH COVERAGE (UHC) IN MAKUENI COUNTY

Query No.1: Detailed report on the percentage of Makueni County budget dedicated to health sector highlighting the amount and/or percentage specifically earmarked for development expenditure and recurrent expenditure;

Makueni County Government's Commitment to Health

The Makueni County Government continues to demonstrate strong commitment to health as a fundamental right for its citizens. This commitment is clearly reflected in the FY 2024/25 Supplementary Budget (2), where **37% of the total county budget** has been allocated to the health sector.

Further analysis of the health budget reveals a strong focus not only on recurrent expenditure but also on development, which includes infrastructure upgrades and the acquisition of modern medical technologies and equipment.

This allocation underscores the county's dedication to not only maintaining current health services but also investing in sustainable improvements and innovation in healthcare delivery.

Query No.2: Comprehensive data on the proportion of Makueni county residents who have been registered with the Social Health Authority (SHA) as at 31st July, 2025 and the strategies being applied to identify and enroll vulnerable populations especially in hard-to-reach areas;

SHA Registration and Coverage Efforts in Makueni County

According to the 2009 census, Makueni County has an estimated population of 987,653. In line with legal requirements, all residents are expected to be registered under the Social Health Authority (SHA). As of July, the registration rate stood at only 31%, indicating low uptake associated with Poverty, low awareness, misinformation, ignorance and lack of necessary requirements (E,G ID cards, lack of phone numbers etc).

To address this, in the 2025/26 FY budget, the county has allocated kes. 95 million for mass mobilization of Makueni residents to register to Social Health Authority (SHA) and Social Health Insurance Fund (SHIF) premium payments for vulnerable and indigent households. The strategies to enhance registration ton SHA include:

- a) **Deploying Community Health Promoters (CHPs)** to conduct door-to-door household outreach
- b) **Community mobilization** through sensitization forums and events
- c) **Engaging local leaders** to champion and market the SHA program
- d) **Partnering with community-based organizations** and social groups for grassroots advocacy

The county targets to achieve over 50% registration coverage in the 2025/26 FY, with continued efforts to reach full universal enrollment in the long run.

Query No.3: Thorough breakdown of the total amount reimbursed by SHA to healthcare facilities in Makueni County since its inception providing a breakdown of reimbursements made to each healthcare facility and any outstanding or delayed payments;

The submission for SHA claims and reimbursements has been categorized into SHA Claims and Reimbursements for Hospitals and SHA claims and reimbursements for Rural Health Facilities

SHA Claims and Reimbursements for Hospitals

As of the latest reporting, hospitals have received KES 349.7 million, representing 69% of the total KES 506.8 million claimed.

The table below indicating the status of the collections and reimbursements since the start of SHA operationalization on 1st, October,2024 to 30th June 2025 as requested.

Despite this progress, an outstanding balance of KES 157.1 million (31%) remains unreimbursed. This funding gap is significant and continues to undermine the ability of hospitals to operate smoothly. Facilities experience challenges in purchasing essential medicines, paying suppliers, and meeting day-to-day operational costs, leading to disruptions in service delivery.

Challenges Experienced

- **Delayed or Partial Disbursements** – Despite the 14th-day cycle, reimbursements often fall short of the total claimed, leaving facilities with arrears.
- **Outstanding Balances** – The persistent 31% gap has created financial strain, particularly in high-volume hospitals
- **System Inefficiencies** – Verification bottlenecks, rejected claims, and delays timely settlement.
- **Service Delivery Impact** – The cash flow shortfall forces facilities to defer procurement of drugs and supplies, and in some cases, depend on county treasury support.

Recommendations

- Expedite settlement of the KES 157.07M outstanding balance, prioritizing the most affected hospitals.
- Support smaller facilities that have not received any reimbursement (e.g., Mutyambua).
- Institutionalize prompt disbursements to sustain and build upon the 69% reimbursement milestone.
- Strengthen claims management at facility level to minimize delays and disputes.

The reimbursement of **KES 66,413,161.08** to PHC facilities marks a significant milestone in strengthening community-level health services. However, despite this positive achievement, a three-month delay (June, July and August 2025) in subsequent reimbursements has created financial strain across facilities. The irregularity of disbursements has disrupted financial planning, constrained procurement of essential supplies, and delayed implementation of key health interventions. The PHC reimbursement lacks clear criteria on how reimbursement is being done and this has seen a large number of facilities missing out therefore affecting their financial standing and hence service delivery

Query 4: Specific measures and strategies being applied by Makueni County Government to track Universal Health Coverage (UHC) fund flows, highlighting challenges, if any, experienced with timely disbursement from the national government for UHC related services;

Measures and Strategies for Tracking UHC Fund Flows in Makueni County

Makueni County has put in place several measures to ensure accountability, transparency, and efficiency in the management of funds received under the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) programme. These measures are aimed at strengthening health financing, ensuring timely reimbursements to facilities, and enhancing service delivery.

Key Measures and Strategies employed include;

- **Automated Claims Management**
 1. Health facilities submit claims through the Social Health Authority (SHA) electronic portal, allowing for real-time tracking of claims submitted, verified, and reimbursed.
 2. Facility in-charges are trained to capture accurate data to reduce claim rejections.
- **Periodic Financial Reconciliation**
 1. The Department of health conducts a weekly assessment of claims and sendbacks claims to monitor quality of claims submitted and identify gaps if any to enhance efficiency
 2. The Department of Health conducts monthly and quarterly reconciliation of claims versus reimbursements, enabling early detection of outstanding balances and underpayments.
- **Facility-Level Accountability Structures**
 1. Facility management committees and health centre boards monitor fund inflows and utilization.
 2. Regular reporting mechanisms ensure that funds received are aligned with expenditure on essential health commodities, equipment, and service delivery.
- **Data-Driven Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E)**
 1. The county applies health information systems to track service volumes, claims patterns, and financial inflows.
 2. Dashboards are used at county level to generate reports on reimbursements and outstanding claims.
- **Stakeholder Engagement and Escalation**
 1. Continuous engagement with the Social Health Authority (SHA) both at local and national level undertaken to follow up on pending disbursements.
 2. Escalation channels are utilized when delays threaten service continuity.

Challenges Experienced

Despite these strategies, Makueni County continues to face several challenges related to UHC fund flows:

- **Delayed Disbursements from SHA**
 - Reimbursements often lag behind claim submissions, with delays ranging from weeks to several months. This disrupts cash flow and weakens service continuity at the facility level.
- **Outstanding Balances**
 - Significant portions of claimed amounts remain unreimbursed, leading to operational deficits in facilities that depend heavily on timely reimbursements.
- **Systemic Bottlenecks in Claims Processing**
 - Errors in claim submissions, portal downtimes, and lengthy verification processes contribute to delays and rejections.
- **Uneven Distribution of Funds**
 - High-volume facilities tend to absorb larger allocations, while smaller and remote facilities often receive lower or no reimbursements, affecting equity in service delivery.
- **Dependence on County Exchequer Support**
 - In the face of delays, the county treasury is forced to step in and support facilities with operational funds, straining local resources.

Query5: Breakdown of the total amount of money received in each healthcare facility in the Financial Year 2024/2025 pursuant to the provisions of the Facility Improvement Financing Act, 2023, detailing the amounts collected, retained and/or ring-fenced and used exclusively for the improvement of health services;

The county enacted the Makueni Health Act, 2016, which empowered health facilities to collect and retain own revenues. These retained funds are utilized to support maintenance, and development activities at facility level, thereby promoting efficiency, accountability, and sustainability in healthcare delivery. Pursuant to this provision all funds received through Facility Improvement Financing Act, 2023 are retained at the specific health facility. The table below presents the amounts collected and retained by health facilities during the **Financial Year 2024/2025**.

Query No.6: Strategies employed by your County Government to address staffing requirements to meet increased service demand under UHC, detailing specific steps being taken to train and continuously upskill healthcare personnel;

The Government of Makueni County, through the Department of Health Services, is committed to providing high-quality health services in accordance with the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, and to achieving Sustainable Development Goal 3 (SDG 3) on good health and well-being. We recognize the critical role of competent and motivated health personnel, which constitute the human resources for health (HRH), a key pillar of the health system as guided by the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Kenya Health Policy 2014–2030, among other national and international frameworks.

Since devolution, the Department of Health has worked closely with the County Public Service Board (CPSB) to progressively address HRH concerns, including recruitment, redeployment, training, re-tooling, and promotion of health personnel. At the departmental level, the Departmental Human Resource Management Advisory Committee (DHRMAC) provides oversight and guidance on HRH matters, meeting at least monthly or as required.

We are committed to the continuous upskilling of healthcare personnel to ensure delivery of specialized, high-quality, and evidence-based health services. The Department undertakes annual training needs assessments, gathering staff feedback to inform capacity-building initiatives. Following these measures, the following has been achieved;

1. Long- and short-term specialized training:

Currently 49 staff are on long-term specialized training categorized since the FY 2022/23 as follows;

2. Senior Management Courses

Further, 77 staff have completed Strategic Leadership Development Programme (SLDP) and Senior Management Courses (SMC). Staff completing specialized training are deployed to facilities according to their acquired specialty, including anesthesiology, gynecology, pediatrics, critical care, anesthesia, and family medicine.

3. Continuous skills upgrading in key health programs:

a. Reproductive, Maternal, Neonatal, Child, and Adolescent Health:

- *Jhpiego-supported trainings*: 40 providers trained on EmONC (Sept 2023); 436 providers supported through EMOTIVE mentorship
- *Jacaranda Health-supported mentorship*: 101 providers trained on EmONC

b. Nutrition Training for Health Care Workers (FY 23–24):

- *Baby-Friendly Hospital Initiative (BFHI)*: 3-day facility-based training at Makueni County Referral Hospital and Makindu Sub-County Hospital, reaching 65 health providers (nurses, nutritionists, clinical officers, medical officers) to promote recommended infant and young child feeding practices

c. Laboratory Services Capacity Building and HR Development:

- *Malaria Diagnostics*: 36 laboratory officers trained on blended malaria microscopy (Global Fund supported)
- *Tuberculosis Diagnostics*: 28 newly employed officers trained on TB refresher microscopy
- *Quality Management Systems*: 30 officers trained on ISO 15189:2022; 18 officers trained on Laboratory Continuous Quality Improvement (LCQI)

Through these comprehensive human resource strategies, Makueni County is strengthening its capacity to deliver high-quality, accessible, and equitable health services in line with the principles of Universal Health

Coverage (UHC). We remain committed to sustaining these measures, fostering a resilient health workforce, and ensuring that all residents have access to essential health services without financial hardship, thus aligning with both national policy frameworks and international health standards.

Query No. 7: The Kenya Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA) official fill rate for orders placed by your County Government in Financial Years 2022/2023, 2023/2024 and 2024/2025 and the current total outstanding debt owed by the County Government to KEMSA and other Health Products and Technologies suppliers;

Availability of sufficient, efficacious, and quality Health Products and Technologies (HPTs) is a critical pillar of any health system, as emphasized by the WHO and Kenya Health Policy 2014–2030. The Government of Makueni County, through the Department of Health Services, has continuously ensured the availability of quality HPTs by procuring from nationally approved suppliers. In the financial years 2022/2023, 2023/2024, and 2024/2025, government of Makueni did not procure from KEMSA due to low fillrates. However, in the financial year 2025/2026, the county government resumed procurement from KEMSA following improved institutional capacity. The reported fill rates are as follows:

- **Hospitals (17 facilities):** Original order value – Ksh 35,562,222; Supplied commodities – Ksh 20,711,222; **Fill rate – 58.2%**
- **Rural Health Facilities (Health centres and dispensaries, 225 facilities):** Original order value – Ksh 35,113,436; Supplied commodities – Ksh 30,205,277; **Fill rate – 86.0%**

As of 20th August 2025, the outstanding KEMSA debt for HPTs stands at **Ksh 51,227,113**.

QUERY No.8: The type, total number and operational status of medical equipment supplied in public hospitals in the county under MES programme, the Global Fund and Gavi since Financial Year 2022/2023, including the recipient facilities.

The Medical Equipment Services (MES) Program was launched in 2015 by the National Government of Kenya as a flagship initiative to improve access to specialized healthcare across the country. The program was implemented through a Managed Equipment Services model, where the government entered into a 7-year lease agreement with international suppliers to provide, install, and maintain modern medical equipment in public hospitals.

The rollout targeted at least two hospitals; Makueni County Referral and Makindu Sub-County Hospitals. Key equipment categories supplied included:

- **Renal dialysis machines** for kidney care
- **Theatre equipment** for surgical services
- **ICU and HDU equipment** to support critical care
- **Radiology and imaging equipment** (X-rays, ultrasound, CT scanners)
- **Sterilization units** for infection control

Under the MES arrangement, suppliers were also responsible for training biomedical staff and healthcare workers, as well as servicing and maintaining the equipment to ensure functionality.

Access to high-quality laboratory services is a fundamental component of the right to the highest attainable standard of health, as guaranteed under Article 43(1)(a) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, which affirms every individual's right to healthcare services. Ensuring legally compliant and licensed laboratories is also central to the realization of Universal Health Coverage (UHC), which seeks to provide equitable access to essential health services without financial hardship.

Medical laboratory services are a cornerstone of an effective healthcare system, providing accurate and timely diagnostic results essential for disease detection, clinical management, and treatment. High-quality laboratories enhance patient outcomes, support evidence-based medical decisions, and strengthen disease surveillance and public health response.

Makueni County Government has **eighty-nine (89) medical laboratories** embedded within its health facilities.

1. Licensing and regulatory oversight of medical laboratories in Makueni County

All 89 public medical laboratories operate under the mandate of the Kenya Medical Laboratory Technicians and Technologists Board (KMLTTB).

Below is a summary of the licensing status of medical laboratories in the county:

- Only **two public laboratories are fully licensed** by KMLTTB:
 1. Makueni County Referral Hospital
 2. Makindu Sub-County Hospital
- The majority of **Level 2, 3, and 4 laboratories** are unlicensed though under supportive supervision from KMLTTB and Kenya Accreditation Service (KENAS)
- Private laboratories generally hold KMLTTB licenses; however, compliance monitoring is uneven.

Makueni County has employed 195 registered medical laboratory professionals across its six sub-counties. Staffing remains unevenly distributed, with Level 5 and Level 4 facilities sub-optimally staffed, while primary healthcare facilities (health centers and dispensaries) are often manned by a single laboratory personnel or rely on sample networking arrangements.

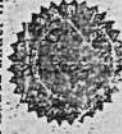
