CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

In furtherance of the oversight mandate of the Committee on Regional Integration and in line with the overarching desire to strengthen regional integration, the Committee resolved to conduct an inspection and familiarization visit of the following semi-autonomous institutions/organs of the East African Community -

- 1) East African Science and Technology Commission, Kigali, Republic of Rwanda;
- 2) East African Health Research Commission, Bujumbura, Republic of Burundi.

The general objective of the visit was to familiarize Members with the work of the EAC institutions/organs and specifically assess the status of implementation of various projects and programmes with a view to evaluating progress and identifying intervention measures aimed at promoting the East African Community integration agenda.

In line with the Committee's mandate to examine regional integration mechanisms and promote Kenya's strategic engagement within the East African Community. The report comprises the presentations, observations, and recommendations from the inspection visit to the two institutions between the 27th July and 3rd August 2025.

Additionally, the visit was also meant to find out the progress made by the two institutions in discharging its mandate under the EAC Treaty and the challenges thereof for purposes of reporting to the House.

Further, the Committee recommends that the National Treasury and Economic Planning enhance budgetary support to advance the efficiency of the two EAC organs/institutions. The Ministry of East African Community, the ASALs, and Regional Development should also align Kenya's policies on Science, Technology, Innovation (STIs), and Health with the regional frameworks to improve service delivery and research capacity.

I sincerely thank the Speaker and the Office of the Clerk of the National Assembly for the invaluable support accorded to the Committee in the discharge of its mandate.

1. PREFACE

1.1. Establishment and Mandate of the Committee

1. The Committee on Regional Integration is a select Committee of the House established under Standing Order 212 of the National Assembly's Standing Orders, which sets out the mandate of the Committee. The Committee was constituted in October 2023 following the adoption of a motion on membership of committees by the House. The Committee comprises 21 members who will serve for the life of the 13th Parliament.
2. The Committee is also mandated to –
 - (a) examine the records of all the relevant debates and resolutions of the meetings of the East African Legislative Assembly;
 - (b) examine the Bills introduced in the East African Legislative Assembly and Acts of the East African Community;
 - (c) examine the records of all the relevant debates and resolutions of the meetings of the Pan African Parliament, the African, Caribbean and Pacific European Union Joint Parliamentary Assembly and other regional integration bodies; and inquire into and examine any other matter relating to regional integration generally requiring action by the House.

2. INSPECTION VISIT TO THE SEMI-AUTONOMOUS INSTITUTIONS OF THE EAST AFRICAN SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY COMMISSION IN RWANDA, AND THE EAST AFRICAN HEALTH RESEARCH COMMISSION IN BURUNDI

2.1. Background

5. The Committee on Regional Integration is established under the National Assembly Standing Order 212. It is mandated, among other things, to enhance the role and involvement of the House in intensifying and developing the integration process in the East African Community and the greater African region, as well as to examine any other matters relating to regional integration that generally require action by the House.
6. The Committee, in its meetings held on Friday, 6th, June 2025 resolved to undertake an inspection visit to the East African Science and Technology Commission, Kigali, Republic of Rwanda and the East African Health Research Commission in Bujumbura, Republic of Burundi, between 27th July and 3rd August 2025.
7. A delegation comprising four Members visited the two institutions and the Kenya High Commission in Kigali, Rwanda and the Kenya Embassy in Bujumbura, Burundi as per the schedule of the visit.

2.2. Composition of the delegation

2.3. Objectives of the Inspection Visits

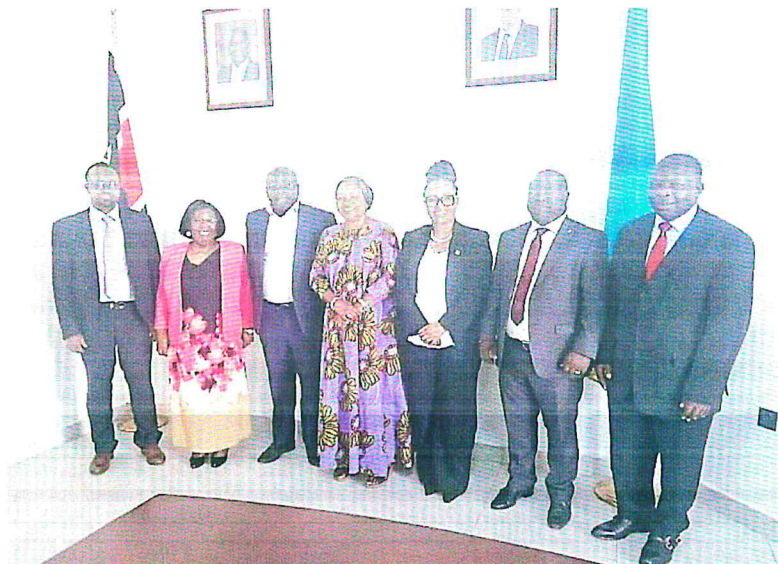
9. The objective of the inspection visit was to find out the progress made by semi-autonomous institutions/organs of the East African Community charged with the responsibility of ensuring the following -
 - i Formulation of regional Science Technology and Innovation (STI) policies & frameworks; Promotion of regional research centres of excellence in all Partner States, mobilization of resources for STI development in the community; and Fostering scientific & technological innovation in the Partner States.
 - ii To establish an institutional governance, management, and operational framework.
 - iii To promote the One-Health approach and integrated research involving animal health, human health and the environment.

3. ENGAGEMENT WITH INSTITUTIONS

10. The inspection visit aimed to enhance the committee's understanding of the role of science, technology, and health research in advancing regional integration. To also evaluate the alignment of institutional mandates with the EAC Treaty, Common Market Protocol, and Vision 2050. The following were the key deliberations at the various meetings held.

3.1. Kenya High Commission

11. Amb. Janet Mwawasi Oben, the High Commissioner, received the delegation and gave a brief information on the mission's functions, including its role in representing Kenya in the Republic of Rwanda.
12. The High Commission emphasized the relations between the Republic of Kenya and Rwanda to strive to build on the existing bilateral and diplomatic engagements to bring together players in both the public and private sectors to promote the economic, cultural and social ties that unify the people of the two nations. Kenya's relations with Rwanda are warm and cordial. The relations between the two countries are not only historical but also defined by the indispensable need to work together within the spirit of the EAC for the mutual benefit of the region.
13. Several Kenyan companies have invested in Rwanda across various sectors, including banking, Construction, Insurance, Aviation, Education, Agribusiness, tourism, and hospitality. Over 6,000 Kenyans are living and working in Rwanda, represented by a strong umbrella body, the Association of Kenyans in Rwanda.

3.2. East African Science and Technology Commission

14. Dr. Sylvance Okoth, the Executive Secretary received the delegation to the headquarters of EASTECO in Kigali and emphasized the importance of STI in driving regional integration. He highlighted that -
 - i East African Science and Technology Commission (EASTECO) is one of the East African Community organs that was established as an Institution of the EAC by the 5th Extraordinary Meeting of the Summit of the EAC Heads of State, in 2007. It is mandated to promote and coordinate the development, management, and application of

science, technology, and innovation (STI) across Partner States. Its legal foundation is anchored in Chapter 16, Article 103(a) of the EAC Treaty and Articles 42–44 of the EAC Common Market Protocol.

- ii EASTECO is a specialized institution of the East African Community (EAC). Its mandate is to coordinate and promote the development and application of science, technology, and innovation across the region.
- iii EASTECO fosters regional collaboration to address challenges in sectors like health, agriculture, and infrastructure.
- iv The Commission supports research, innovation, and capacity building in science and technology, aiming to enhance sustainable development and contribute to the region's economic growth. It also encourages the adoption of modern technologies for improved livelihoods in East Africa.
- v The East African Science and Technology Commission (EASTECO) is the EAC agency mandated to promote and coordinate the development, management and application of science, technology and innovation (STI) activities in the region.
- vi The relevance of EASTECO's role in coordinating STI activities in the region is seen mainly in the EAC's focus on the improvement of its global competitiveness for faster and sustainable economic growth with the intention of becoming an industrialized region, with STI as a key driver of socio-economic development and progressive growth.

3.3. EASTECO's achievements

15. The delegation noted the following key EASTECO's achievements.:

- 1) Development of regional policies on STI, Intellectual Property, Bioeconomy, STEM, and Indigenous Knowledge Systems.
- 2) Establishment of the East African Journal on Science, Technology and Innovation (EAJSTI).
- 3) Launch of regional research grant initiatives and capacity-building programmes.
- 4) Organization of regional STI conferences and ministerial dialogues.
- 5) Support for entrepreneurship, industrial technology transfer, and ICT incubation centres.

16. The Executive Secretary further submitted that EASTECO's strategic priorities are aligned with the EAC Vision 2050 and the 6th EAC Development Strategy. These include policy harmonization, promotion of scientific knowledge, application of STI for socio-economic development, enhancement of partnerships, and institutional strengthening.

3.4. Role of EASTECO in Regional Integration

17. EASTECO plays a catalytic and enabling role in regional integration by harmonization of STI Policies. The institution has developed a Regional STI Policy and implementation framework. It also supports Partner States to align national STI policies with regional priorities.

18. Coordination of Research & Innovation. the Commission facilitated the development of the East African Regional Bioeconomy Strategy, East African Digital Health Framework & Research Framework. The organisation promotes joint research through support to networks and initiatives.

19. EASTECO conducted training and capacity building in biotechnology, biosecurity, AI, digital transformation, and data governance. Promotes regional Centres of Excellence and innovation hubs.

20. EASTECO organizes annual EAC STI week, where it promotes youth innovation challenges and regional science competitions; publishes and disseminates research and innovation outputs across the region.

21. EASTECO supports regional integration frameworks towards the implementation of EAC Vision 2050, EAC Industrialization Strategy, and Agenda 2063 and participates in the development of protocols and policies related to innovation and knowledge transfer.

22. EASTECO has the potential to strengthen national-regional STI linkages and develop joint technology transfer programs. Development of regional innovation funds was listed as one of the opportunities realized.

23. Several challenges have impacted the implementation of the set priorities by EASTECO, including inadequate human resources 10/19, limited financing for regional STI projects, inconsistent STI data across the Partner States, and varied levels of STI infrastructure.

3.5. Kenya Mission in Bujumbura

24. The delegation paid a courtesy call to the Kenya Mission in Bujumbura. It was received by Ms. Juliet Kabeu, Chargé d'Affaires, who welcomed the delegation and facilitated discussions on the Mission's role and activities.

25. She gave a briefing on -

(a) The mission's functions, including its role in representing Kenya in the Republic of Rwanda. She outlined the Mission's key mandates, strategic priorities, and ongoing engagements within the Great Lakes Region.

(b) Diplomatic representation, promotion of Kenya's interests within the East African Community (EAC), and facilitation of regional cooperation in political, economic, and social sectors.

(c) Strengthening collaboration in health research and policy coordination.

- (d) The inspection visit of the East African Health Research Commission (EAHRC), which aimed to review the Commission’s operations, assess its contribution to health research within the EAC, and identify opportunities for policy alignment among Partner States.
- (e) The importance of harmonizing health systems across the EAC to address common challenges and improve public health outcomes in the region.
- (f) The role of parliamentary oversight in advancing regional integration objectives reaffirmed the Mission’s commitment to supporting Kenya’s participation and leadership within the EAC framework.
- (g) The challenges faced by the Mission highlighted the possible solutions.

3.6. East African Health Research Commission

- 26. The delegation engaged with the EAHRC officials and reviewed the Commission’s strategic priorities (2018–2025), which include: Initiation of regional research and capacity development programmes, improvement of health research ecosystems, scaling up knowledge management platforms and promotion of the One Health approach integrating human, animal, and environmental health.
- 27. EAHRC’s headquarters in Bujumbura, Burundi, was officially launched in March 2019 and is now equipped with modern facilities to support regional research coordination.

3.7. Digital REACH Initiative

28. The delegation examined the Digital Regional East African Community Health (Digital REACH) Initiative, a 10-year strategic plan (2019–2028) aimed at transforming health systems through digital technology. Key components include: regional health observatories and disease surveillance systems; telemedicine networks connecting Centres of Excellence; digital health infrastructure, policy frameworks, and workforce development; and innovation hubs and shared platforms for data exchange.
29. The initiative was endorsed by the EAC Council of Ministers and launched during the 7th East African Health and Scientific Conference in Dar es Salaam.

3.8. Knowledge Management and Conferences

30. EAHRC established a regional health information portal (www.eahealth.org) and an electronic conference management system. It convenes biennial East African Health and Scientific Conferences and supports peer-reviewed journals such as the East African Health Research Journal (EAHRJ) and East Africa Science (EASci).
31. The Committee also noted the success of the Young East African Research Scientists (YEARS) Forum and the EAGLES' Forum for Health, which engage youth and policymakers in shaping regional health research agendas.

4. COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

32. The Committee made the following observations -
 - (a) The current financial shortages, caused by delayed partner state contributions and dwindling development partner support, continue to adversely affect the performance of all EAC institutions, thus frustrating the implementation of key projects and programmes meant to uplift the lives of East African citizens.
 - (b) There is a lack of a legal framework for the elimination of NTBs due to the delay in the finalization of the amendment of the EAC Elimination of Non-Tariff Barriers Act, 2017 and its Regulations.
 - (c) All the EAC organs and institutions visited by the committee are affected by staff deficits, particularly professional staff cadres. The current staffing levels for EAC organs and institutions, such as EASTECO and EAHRC, are extremely understaffed and not sufficient to execute the assigned mandates.
 - (d) EASTECO and EAHRC play a pivotal role in harmonizing policies, fostering innovation, and strengthening integration.
 - (e) Kenya's active participation and parliamentary support are essential for the success of regional STI and health research programmes.
 - (f) Digital transformation and knowledge management are critical enablers of regional development and resilience.
 - (g) The inspection visit reaffirmed the strategic importance of EASTECO and EAHRC in advancing the EAC's integration agenda. The Committee remains committed to promoting Kenya's leadership and engagement in regional integration and will continue to provide oversight and policy guidance in this regard.

- (h) There is a need to review the current EAC treaty and initiate mechanisms of mobilising funds at the regional level to inspire regional ownership of EAC projects and programmes.

5. COMIITTEERECOMMENDATIONS

Having undertaken the inspection visit to the East African Science and Technology Commission, Kigali, Republic of Rwanda and the East African Health Research Commission, Bujumbura, Republic of Burundi, the Committee made the following recommendations -

- i. To address the challenges associated with delayed financing, the Council of Ministers is encouraged to creatively explore alternative financing mechanisms, such as establishing a levy on imports to the EAC region or exports from the region. The founding partner states could also consider paying contributions due for South Sudan and Burundi on a Big Brother basis. Additionally, they should review the EAC treaty to allow partner states' contributions to be based on the ability to pay and to retain veto power by the highest paying partner states.
- ii. The Ministry of East African Community, the ASALs and Regional Development, in collaboration with the National Treasury and Economic Planning, is directed to ensure that EAC institutions/organs, particularly EASTECO and EAHRC, are funded to advance the EAC's integration agenda.
- iii. The Council of Ministers is further urged to complete the ongoing staff recruitment process and to allow appropriate staffing in all EAC institutions and organs.
- iv. The Ministry of East African Community, the ASALs and Regional Development to recommend to the EAC Council of Ministers that there is a need to monitor the progress of EAC institutions/organs and foster accountability.
- v. The Ministry of East African Community, the ASALs, and Regional Development should align Science, Technology, Innovation, and health policies with the EAC Treaty. They should also support the scaling up of regional innovation budgetary and joint research initiatives to establish the EAC Research and Technological Development Fund.
- vi. EASTECO recommends that all Partner States should leverage regional Centres of Excellence and digital platforms to improve service delivery and research capacity.

The Chairperson called the meeting to order at 12:26 p.m. by welcoming the Members present, after which she prayed.

MIN. NA/ DAA&GPC/ RIC/2025/168 ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

The agenda was unanimously adopted on the proposal of Hon. Farah Salah, MP, and seconded by Hon. Fatuma Hamisi Masito, MP.

MIN.NA/ DAA&GPC/ RIC/2025/169 CONFIRMATION OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

Minutes of the 25th sitting were confirmed as a true record of the previous meeting as proposed by Hon. Fatuma Masito, CBS, MP, and seconded by Hon. Farah Salah, MP.

MIN. NA/ DAA&GPC/ RIC/2025/170 CONSIDERATION OF THE SUBMISSIONS OF MEMORANDA BY THE STAKEHOLDERS ON THE RATIFICATION OF THE AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 24(2)(A) OF THE PROTOCOL ON THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE EAST AFRICAN COMMUNITY CUSTOMS UNION

The Legal counsel took members through the submission of the Memorandum by the African Women's Studies Centre (AWSC) of the University, they observed as follows -

- 1) the inclusion of a gender-balance requirement in the nomination of members to the East African Community Committee on Trade Remedies. AWSC highlighted that its research over the past five years had identified both progress and gaps in women's economic empowerment;
- 2) The submission advocates for gender representation and inclusivity in the nomination of members to the East African Community (EAC) Committee on Trade Remedies;
- 3) currently, the Partner States are not enforcing the gender balance as required in the EAC Treaty;
- 4) the exclusion perpetuates the marginalisation of women and other underrepresented groups in regional decision-making, contrary to the express provision of Article 121 of the EAC Treaty, which promotes women's participation and affirmative action at all political levels.

He further noted that the submissions proposed an amendment to Article 24 (2a) of the EAC Treaty: by addition of - **“24(2)(a) *Each partner state should ensure that at least one-third (1/3) of nominees are of the opposite sex*”**

Justification - African Women's Studies Centre (AWSC) of the University stated that the amendment will align with the **EAC Gender Policy (Objective 4.5(c))** by making gender balance mandatory and promoting inclusivity in political and decision-making bodies within the EAC framework.

MIN. NA/ DAA&GPC/ RIC/2025/170 CONSIDERATION AND ADOPTION OF THE REPORT ON THE APPROVAL OF THE RATIFICATION OF THE AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 24(2) (A) OF THE PROTOCOL ON THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE EAST AFRICAN COMMUNITY CUSTOMS UNION;

The committee considered the Report the approval of the Ratification of the Amendment to Article 24(2)(a) of the Protocol on the Establishment of the East African Community Customs Union and made the following **observations and recommendations, THAT: -**

- 1) Article 24(2)(a) of the Customs Union Protocol capped the Membership of the Trade Remedies Committee to nine (9), which excluded any future member of the EAC from nominating members to the Trade Remedies Committee.
- 2) The amendment was done in line with the provisions of Article 150 (6) of the Treaty for the establishment of EAC, which provides that "Any amendment of the Treaty shall be adopted by the Summit and shall enter into force when ratified by all the Partner States". It is also consistent with the expansion of the Community through the admission of new Partner States.
- 3) The amendment is necessary as it expands the membership of the Trade Remedies Committee following the admission of new Partner States and further accommodates more representation in case more countries join the EAC.
- 4) The 30th Meeting of the Council held on 28th November 2014 directed Partner States to deposit with the EAC Secretary General instruments of Ratification of the amendment of Article 24(2)(a) by 15th August, 2015. The amendment shall come into force once ratified by all partner States. So far, Partner States are yet to ratify the amendment.
- 5) The ratification of the amendment will allow for the operationalization of the Trade Remedies Committee that shall provide the EAC Partner States with a platform to handle matters pertaining to Rules of Origin, anti-dumping measures, subsidies and countervailing measures, and safeguard measures within the EAC Customs Union.
- 6) The Council of EAC Ministers should urge Partner States to fast-track the approval of the Ratification of the Amendment to the Protocol.
- 7) In the meantime, the Committee notes that with the proliferation of complaints by the Kenyan traders on increased dumping of some goods such as maize and eggs from some EAC countries, Kenya has established The Kenya Trade Remedies Agency (KETRA under Section 3(1) of the Kenya Trade Remedies Act, 2017 which provides a mechanism for Kenyan traders to lodge complaints on trade remedies matters. There is therefore a need for the government to strengthen this Agency.
- 8) The Committee further notes -
 - a) that while the current amendment under consideration does not include this provision as proposed by the African Women's Studies Centre (AWSC), the proposal is consistent with Kenya's national commitments to gender equity and the principles of inclusivity under Articles 27 and 100 of the Constitution of Kenya (2010).
 - b) The Ministry of East African Community (EAC), ASALs, and Regional Development, in consultation with the Ministry of Foreign and Diaspora Affairs, formally submits this proposal to the EAC Council of Ministers as Kenya's official position for consideration as a future amendment to the EAC Treaty under Article 150 of the Treaty;
 - c) The Ministry East African Community (EAC), ASALs, and Regional Development, shall report to Parliament within six (6) months on progress made regarding this proposal at the regional level;

Recommendations

Having considered the Ratification on its consideration of the Report on the approval of the Ratification of the Amendment to Article 24(2)(a) of the Protocol on the Establishment of the East African Community Customs Union, the Committee adopted the Report, pursuant to Section 8 of the Treaty Making and Ratification Act, Cap. 4D as having being proposed by Hon. Wanjiku Muhia, CBS, MP and seconded by Hon. (Dr.) Makali Mulu, CBS, MP.
