WEDNESDAY, JUNE 10, 2026 AT 2.30P.M.

1. The House assembled at Thirty Minutes past Two O'clock.
2. The Proceedings were opened with Prayer.
3. **Presiding** – The Honourable Speaker.

4. **QUORUM AT COMMENCEMENT OF THE HOUSE**

And there being no Quorum present to commence business, the Honourable Speaker ordered that the Quorum Bell be rung for ten minutes;

And Quorum having been attained within the ten minutes, business commenced.

5. **PETITIONS**

The Hon. Speaker reported the following Petitions -

(i) Alleged Discrimination of Secondary School Deputy Principals on Career Progression by the Teachers Service Commission

“Honourable Members, Article 119 of the Constitution accords any person the right to petition Parliament to consider any matter within its authority. Further, Standing Order 225(2)(b) requires the Speaker to report to the House any Petition other than that presented by a Member.

Honourable Members, I wish to report to the House that my office has received a Petition from Mr. Maurice Otieno Ouma of ID No. 95XXX78 and Mr. Paul Juma Were of ID No. 115XXXX89 and 14 others on behalf of all affected Deputy Principals in the country, regarding alleged discrimination by the Teachers Service Commission (TSC) on career progression guidelines for Secondary School Deputy Principals in the country.

The Petitioner states that the Teachers Service Commission (TSC) jointly with the Salaries and Remuneration Commission (SRC) undertook a Job Evaluation in the public teaching sector and came up with recommendations that led to a paradigm shift in career progression of teachers, in the year 2016, aimed to provide a new grading structure, minimum requirements for appointment, recruitment and promotion, and the introduction of Teacher Professional Development (TPD).

Honourable Members, the Petitioners aver that the consultations and recommendations made led to the development of Career Progression Guidelines for Teachers, 2018 that provides for promotion of teachers among others.

The Petitioners describes that the implementation of the Career Guidelines required serving teachers as at 8th November 2017, to adopt and convert to the new designations and grading structures provided in the guidelines.

Honourable Members, the Petitioners claim that conversion of teachers in Job Grade N to D1 who mostly are Deputy Principals by Career Progression Guidelines for Teachers, 2018 was similar to being demoted, as it did not take into account the number of years that the teachers had stagnated in the various job groups; and in particular teachers in Job Groups M and N whose conversion could be to D3 and D4.

The Petitioners express concern that the Teachers Service Commission Code of Regulations for Teachers which provides for promotion of teachers, in accordance with the schemes of service and which provides for common cadre establishment promotion and competitive promotion has not been met.

Honourable Members, the Petitioners further aver that the Deputy Principals who were duly appointed between 2001 and 2014 under the Scheme of Services replaced by the current Career Guidelines, have been systematically downgraded, denied rightful promotions and unfairly discriminated against, despite having served faithfully over this period.

Honourable Members, the Petitioners state that they have made several efforts to have their concerns addressed through the Teachers Service Commission to no avail.

Honourable Members, the Petitioners affirm that the issues raised in this Petition are not pending before any court of law, constitutional body, or other legal forum.

The Petitioners therefore pray that the National Assembly—

- i. inquires into the matter and recommend appropriate mechanism for solving the impasse for the benefit of the affected teachers and in particular the Deputy Principals promotions;
- ii. makes recommendations that will promote career progression for Deputy Principals as outlined by the guidelines under the TSC Code of Regulations for Teachers, and effect the necessary promotions in various Job Groups; and;
- iii. makes any other orders or recommendations it deems appropriate to address the Petitioner's grievances.

Honourable Members, having determined that the matters raised by the Petitioner are well within the authority of this House, I order that, pursuant to the provisions of the Standing Orders, this petition be committed to the Departmental Committee on Education.

The Committee is required to consider the petition and report its findings to the House and the Petitioner in accordance with Standing Orders. I thank you!"

(ii) Historical Land Injustices and Proposed Conversion of Public Land LR No. 25005 Kericho/Samburet to Community Land for Human Settlement

“Honourable Members, Article 119 of the Constitution accords every person the right to petition Parliament to consider any matter within its authority. Further, Standing Order 225(2)(b) requires the Speaker to report to the House any Petition other than those presented by a Member.

In this regard, Honourable Members, I wish to report that my office has received a Petition from Mr. Kipkoech Arap Chumo of ID No. 36xxxx99 and Others representing Chang Kelek Kipsigis Ogiek squatters and residents of Kericho County. The Petition concerns historical land injustices and the proposed conversion of public land LR No. 25005 Kericho/Samburet to community land for purposes of human settlement.

The Petitioners draw the attention of the House to the historical land injustices suffered by their community, which comprises approximately 1,500 members, who originally inhabited Kibulgeny Samburet Mokokwegaa Forest. They aver that in 1913, the colonial administration forcefully evicted them from the forest, resulting in the loss of their ancestral land, traditional livelihoods and cultural heritage.

Honourable Members, the Petitioners state that following their displacement, they were relocated to Chemogondany, Marinyi and Chepkoiben Tea Estates, there they were compelled to work as casual labourers under colonial labour laws, without secure tenure. In 1962, companies including African Highlands Produce Co. Ltd and Finlay’s (K) Ltd issued eviction notices to resident labourers and their families, rendering them squatters.

The Petitioners further express their disappointment that despite the 2001 excision of the Mau Forest Complex under Legal Notice No. 328 of 30 January 2001, which was intended to resettle the Ogiek community and victims of land clashes, the petitioners were excluded and remain landless. This exclusion has resulted in acute land fragmentation and persistent displacement.

Honourable Members, the Petitioners conclude by making reference to a Motion of no objection regarding the conversion of LR No. 25005 Kericho/Samburet, hived off from the South West Mau Forest, from public land to community land for human settlement, that was approved on 17th March 2021 by the Kericho County Assembly. This resolution affirms the legitimacy of the Petitioners’ claim and the urgent need for corrective action.

The Petitioners therefore pray that the National Assembly—

- (a) facilitates an investigation into the historical land injustices suffered by the community;
- (b) ensures conversion of land LR No. 25005 Kericho/Samburet from public land to community land for purposes of human settlement; and
- (c) directs the relevant ministry to issue of valid title documents to the affected members.

Honourable Members, having established that the matters raised in the Petition is well within the authority of this House, and further, that the matters raised in this Petition are not pending before any court of law, constitutional, or legal body, I hereby commit the Petition to the Public Petitions Committee for consideration pursuant to Standing Order 208A.

The Committee is required to consider the Petition and report its findings to the House and to the Petitioners in accordance with Standing Order 227(2). I thank you.”
