1. The Senate assembled at thirty Minutes past Two O'clock.
2. The proceedings were opened with Prayer said by the Speaker.

3. **QUORUM OF THE SENATE**

The Speaker, having counted the Honourable Senators present at the commencement of the Sitting and confirming that there was no Quorum, directed that the Bell be rung for ten minutes, pursuant to Standing Order 40;

And there being a Quorum before the expiry of the ten minutes;

The Speaker invited the Clerk to call the Orders of the day.

4. **COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CHAIR**

The Speaker conveyed the following Communications from the Chair:

a) On the launch and mainstreaming of the County Fiscal Performance Measurement Index (CFPMI) Publication

“Honourable Senators,

As you are aware, Article 96 of the Constitution gives the Senate powers to, among other things, undertake its oversight function; and in particular, at Article 96 (3) of the Constitution, exercise oversight over national revenue allocated to the county governments which includes the county assemblies.

As Senators are also aware, every year, Parliament, through the Division of Revenue and the County Allocation of Revenue Acts, determines the allocation of nationally raised revenue between the two levels of government, and among the county governments.

To undertake its oversight role effectively, the Senate requires a standard, scientific, objective and transparent tool, which can measure the performance of county governments especially on fiscal governance including robust adherence to the fiscal responsibility principles envisioned in the Constitution and statute such as the Public Finance

Management Act and the County Governments Act. The need for objective based criteria in assessing county performance cannot be gainsaid especially in the light of increased resourcing of the counties by the senate and the growing need by the citizens for effective and timely service delivery.

Over the years, however, such a tool has not been developed although The Senate was always desirous of the same to guide and strengthen targeted oversight including resource allocation and accountability. To bridge this gap, a scientific performance measurement tool has been prepared by the Parliamentary Budget Office: The County Fiscal Performance Measurement Index (CFPMI) which is grounded on key public finance management indicators, core to county fiscal parameters and trends utilizing recent fiscal data from statutory publications from independent offices such as the Auditor General and Controller of Budget (CoB). As you are aware, these reports are also tabled in the Senate and have been core to the oversight frameworks of the Senate holding counties to account as witnessed in key watchdog committees as well as standing committees

The CFPMI is a composite score meant to evaluate and benchmark the fiscal performance of counties based on the public finance management principles and fiscal safeguards which are critical to socio-economic transformation of the counties through enhanced service delivery. It summarizes the performance of counties across several indicators including budget implementation efficiency, development expenditure and audit opinions as well as county assemblies expenditure trends and pending bills, among others, with normalized values ranging between 0 and 1 for scoring performance levels.

Honourable Senators,

This publication, along with four others launched earlier in the year on 30th May, will constitute part of the Senate's institutional repositories and robust fiscal oversight tools serving as a useful and practical reference material for yourselves, Members of the National Assembly, county assemblies, parliamentary officers, media, scholars, researchers and members of the general public who are interested in legislative work.

It will also make a significant contribution to the continuous capacity development of legislators and parliamentary staff. This therefore serves to make the Senate as the most consequential institution in resourcing counties while dovetailing its oversight and accountability functions for stronger devolution with potential to strengthen sectoral based oversight mechanisms by committees

I will preside over the launch of the County Fiscal Performance Measurement Index (CFPMI) on Thursday, 6th August, 2026 at 11.00 am.

All Honourable Senators are invited to attend this very momentous ceremony.
